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ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 285–ASSEMBLYMEN WOODBURY, OSCARSON; AND TITUS

## MARCH 13, 2015

Referred to Committee on Education

SUMMARY—Revises provisions relating to the self-administration of certain medications by pupils in public schools. (BDR 34-812)

EXPLANATION - Matter in *bolded italics* is new; matter between brackets for its material is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to pupils; allowing pupils to self-administer prescribed medications for diabetes under certain circumstances; requiring a public school to establish protocols for containing blood-borne pathogens and the handling and disposal of needles, medical devices and other medical waste; providing immunity from liability to certain school administrators and employees for certain harm as a result of the self-administration of medication by a pupil; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

## Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law allows the parent or legal guardian of a pupil who has asthma or 1 2345678 anaphylaxis to request authorization from the principal or, if applicable, the school nurse of the public school in which the pupil is enrolled to allow the pupil to selfadminister medication for the treatment of asthma or anaphylaxis while the pupil is on the grounds of a public school, at an activity sponsored by the public school or on a school bus. Existing law provides that if the request contains certain specified information, the principal or, if applicable, the school nurse is required to approve the request. (NRS 392.425) This bill similarly allows the parent or legal guardian of ğ a pupil who has diabetes to request an authorization to self-administer medication for the treatment of diabetes and requires the principal or, if applicable, school 10 11 nurse to approve the request if the request contains certain information. This bill 12 also requires a public school to: (1) establish protocols for containing blood-borne 13 pathogens and the handling and disposal of needles, medical devices and other medical waste; and (2) provide a copy of these protocols to the parent or legal 14 15 guardian of a pupil who requests permission to allow the pupil to self-administer 16 medication.





Existing law provides that the board of trustees of a school district, a school district and a public school and any employee or agent thereof are immune from liability for the injury to or death of a pupil as a result of the self-administration of medication. (NRS 392.425) This bill extends that immunity from liability to those persons for any injury or death caused by exposure to certain medical devices or medical waste from the self-administration of medication by a pupil.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 **Section 1.** NRS 392.425 is hereby amended to read as follows: 2 392.425 1. The parent or legal guardian of a pupil who has 3 asthma, for anaphylaxis or *diabetes* may submit a written request to the principal or, if applicable, the school nurse of the public 4 school in which the pupil is enrolled to allow the pupil to 5 6 self-administer medication for the treatment of the pupil's asthma, for anaphylaxis or *diabetes* while the pupil is on the grounds of a 7 8 public school, participating in an activity sponsored by a public 9 school or on a school bus.

10 2. A public school shall establish protocols for containing 11 blood-borne pathogens and the handling and disposal of needles, 12 medical devices and other medical waste and provide a copy of 13 these protocols and procedures to the parent or guardian of a 14 pupil who requests permission for the pupil to self-administer 15 medication pursuant to subsection 1.

16 **3.** A written request made pursuant to subsection 1 must 17 include:

(a) A signed statement of a physician indicating that the pupil
has asthma , [or] anaphylaxis or diabetes and is capable of
self-administration of the medication while the pupil is on the
grounds of a public school, participating in an activity sponsored by
a public school or on a school bus;

(b) A written treatment plan prepared by the physician pursuant
to which the pupil will manage his or her asthma, for anaphylaxis
or diabetes if the pupil experiences an asthmatic attack , for
anaphylactic shock or diabetic episode while on the grounds of a
public school, participating in an activity sponsored by a public
school or on a school bus; and

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(c) A signed statement of the parent or legal guardian:

30 (1) Indicating that the parent or legal guardian grants 31 permission for the pupil to self-administer the medication while the 32 pupil is on the grounds of a public school, participating in an 33 activity sponsored by a public school or on a school bus; [and]

34 (2) Acknowledging that the parent or legal guardian is aware 35 of and understands the provisions of subsections [3] 4 and [4] 5;





1 [3.] (3) Acknowledging the receipt of the protocols provided 2 pursuant to subsection 2;

3 (4) Acknowledging that the protocols established pursuant 4 to subsection 2 have been explained to the pupil who will self-5 administer the medication and that he or she has agreed to comply 6 with the protocols; and

7 (5) Acknowledging that authorization to self-administer 8 medication pursuant to this section may be revoked if the pupil 9 fails to comply with the protocols established pursuant to 10 subsection 2.

4. The provisions of this section do not create a duty for the 11 12 board of trustees of the school district, the school district, the public 13 school in which the pupil is enrolled, or an employee or agent 14 thereof, that is in addition to those duties otherwise required in the 15 course of service or employment.

[4.] 5. If a pupil is granted authorization pursuant to this 16 17 section to self-administer medication, the board of trustees of the 18 school district, the school district and the public school in which the 19 pupil is enrolled, and any employee or agent thereof, are immune from liability for the injury to or death of [the]: 20

(a) The pupil as a result of self-administration of a medication 21 22 pursuant to this section or the failure of the pupil to self-administer 23 such a medication <del>[.</del>

24 <del>-5.]</del> ; and

25 (b) Any other person as a result of exposure to or injury caused by needles, medical devices or other medical waste from 26 27 the self-administration of medication by a pupil pursuant to this 28 section.

29 **6**. Upon receipt of a request that complies with subsection  $\frac{12}{12}$ 30 3, the principal or, if applicable, the school nurse of the public 31 school in which a pupil is enrolled shall provide written 32 authorization for the pupil to carry and self-administer medication to 33 treat his or her asthma, for anaphylaxis or *diabetes* while the pupil is on the grounds of a public school, participating in an activity 34 35 sponsored by a public school or on a school bus. The written 36 authorization must be filed with the principal or, if applicable, the 37 school nurse of the public school in which the pupil is enrolled and 38 must include:

39 (a) The name and purpose of the medication which the pupil is 40 authorized to self-administer; 41

(b) The prescribed dosage and the duration of the prescription;

42 (c) The times or circumstances, or both, during which the 43 medication is required or recommended for self-administration;

44 (d) The side effects that may occur from an administration of the 45 medication; [and]





(e) The name and telephone number of the pupil's physician and
 the name and telephone number of the person to contact in the case
 of a medical emergency concerning the pupil <del>[.</del>

4 - 6.]; and

5 (f) The procedures for the handling and disposal of needles, 6 medical devices and other medical waste.

7 7. The written authorization provided pursuant to subsection 8  $\begin{bmatrix}5\\6\end{bmatrix}$  6 is valid for 1 school year. If a parent or legal guardian submits 9 a written request that complies with subsection  $\begin{bmatrix}2\\2\end{bmatrix}$  3, the principal 10 or, if applicable, the school nurse of the public school in which the 11 pupil is enrolled shall renew and, if necessary, revise the written 12 authorization.

13 [7.] 8. If a parent or legal guardian of a pupil who is 14 authorized pursuant to this section to carry medication on his or her 15 person provides to the principal or, if applicable, the school nurse of 16 the public school in which the pupil is enrolled doses of the 17 medication in addition to the dosage that the pupil carries on his or 18 her person, the principal or, if applicable, the school nurse shall 19 ensure that the additional medication is:

20 (a) Stored on the premises of the public school in a location that 21 is secure; and

(b) Readily available if the pupil experiences an asthmatic attack
 , [or] anaphylactic shock *or diabetic episode* during school hours.

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[8.] 9. As used in this section:

(a) "Medication" means any medicine prescribed by a physician
for the treatment of anaphylaxis , for asthma ; or diabetes,
including, without limitation, asthma inhalers , fand auto-injectable
epinephrine ; and insulin.

(b) "Physician" means a person who is licensed to practice
medicine pursuant to chapter 630 of NRS or osteopathic medicine
pursuant to chapter 633 of NRS.

(c) "Self-administer" means the auto-administration of a
 medication pursuant to the prescription for the medication or written
 directions for such a medication.
