
ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 127—ASSEMBLYWOMAN BENITEZ-THOMPSON

PREFILED FEBRUARY 9, 2017

Referred to Committee on Education

SUMMARY—Revises provisions relating to emergencies in schools. (BDR 34-196)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: May have Fiscal Impact.
Effect on the State: Yes.

AN ACT relating to education; requiring school districts in certain counties to appoint an emergency manager; requiring boards of trustees of school districts and governing bodies of charter schools to consult with certain persons and entities before constructing, expanding or remodeling buildings for schools or related facilities or acquiring sites for those purposes; requiring the Department of Education to conduct an annual conference regarding safety in public schools; requiring the Department, to the extent that money is available, to make block grants to provide certain mental health workers in public schools; revising provisions governing the development and contents of a plan to respond to a crisis or an emergency in a school; revising provisions governing emergency drills in schools; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

1 Existing law provides for crisis and emergency response in public schools.
2 (NRS 388.229-388.261) **Section 4** of this bill requires each school district in a
3 county whose population is 100,000 or more (currently Clark and Washoe
4 Counties) to designate an employee to serve as an emergency manager, whose
5 duties are defined in that section. **Section 5** of this bill requires the board of trustees
6 of each school district and the governing body of each charter school to consult
7 with the emergency manager, the chief of school police or his or her designee, or
8 the Division of Emergency Management of the Department of Public Safety, as



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9 applicable, before: (1) designing, constructing or purchasing new school buildings
10 or related facilities; (2) enlarging, remodeling or renovating existing school
11 buildings or related facilities; or (3) acquiring sites for building schools or related
12 facilities.

13 **Section 6** of this bill requires the Department of Education to coordinate with
14 the Division of Emergency Management, any emergency manager, any chief of
15 police of a school district that has police officers and any school resource officer to
16 conduct an annual conference regarding safety in public schools. **Section 6**
17 additionally requires the board of trustees of each school district and the governing
18 body of each charter school to designate certain persons to attend this conference.

19 **Section 7** of this bill requires the Department of Education, to the extent that
20 money is available for the purpose, to: (1) develop and carry into effect a program
21 of block grants; and (2) make and administer block grants to school districts and
22 charter schools to provide for contract social workers and other mental health
23 workers in schools with identified needs.

24 Existing law requires the Department of Education to develop a model plan for
25 the management of a crisis or emergency in a public school, including a charter
26 school, and a private school. Among other requirements, the model plan must
27 include a procedure for carrying out a lockdown at a school. (NRS 388.253)

28 **Section 2** of this bill defines "lockdown" for these purposes. Existing law also
29 requires the board of trustees of a school district and the governing body of a
30 charter school to establish a development committee to develop a plan to be used
31 by each public school of the school district or the charter school, as applicable, in
32 responding to a crisis or an emergency and requires the development committee to
33 consult with certain persons and entities when developing the plan. (NRS 388.241,
34 388.243) **Section 9** of this bill requires each development committee, when
35 developing the plan, to also consult with an emergency manager, a school resource
36 officer or the chief of school police of the school district, if such a person exists in
37 the school district.

38 Existing law requires each school district, each charter school and each private
39 school to provide drills for pupils at least once each month during the school year to
40 instruct those pupils in the procedures to be followed in the event of a fire or other
41 emergency. (NRS 392.450, 394.170) **Sections 13 and 14** of this bill require at least
42 one-half of these drills to include instruction in appropriate procedures to be
43 followed in the event of a lockdown, as defined in **section 2** of this bill. **Section 13**
44 also revises provisions governing the emergency drills conducted at a public school
45 located in a city or town to require the drills to be conducted under the supervision
46 of the chief of the fire department of the city or town or voluntary fire department,
47 as applicable. Finally, **section 13** requires: (1) any public school located in a county
48 whose population is less than 100,000 (currently all counties other than Clark and
49 Washoe Counties) to conduct the drills under the supervision of the person
50 designated for that purpose by the board of trustees of the school district or the
51 governing body of the charter school, as applicable; and (2) a public school located
52 in a county whose population is 100,000 or more (currently Clark and Washoe
53 Counties) to conduct such drills under the supervision of the emergency manager.

1 Whereas, The Legislature recognizes that it is of utmost
2 importance that the public schools in this State are built and
3 maintained in a manner which provides the greatest protection for
4 pupils and staff against harm; and



1 Whereas, Each school must be built and maintained to meet or
2 exceed recommended safety standards and be designed to anticipate
3 and protect against modern threats; and

4 Whereas, Academic achievement of pupils is adversely affected
5 when the pupils do not feel safe from harm; and

6 Whereas, Acts of violence which occur at schools have
7 devastating effects on pupils which may include depression, fear
8 and inappropriate behavior; and

9 Whereas, Efforts must be taken to mitigate acts of violence at
10 schools; and

11 Whereas, Social workers and other licensed mental health
12 workers who are employed by schools help ensure the safety of
13 pupils, prevent violent and other inappropriate actions by pupils and
14 address the overall well-being of pupils by assessing the needs of
15 pupils and providing pupils with necessary mental health services,
16 counseling and other assistance; and

17 Whereas, The Legislature hereby finds and declares that it is
18 optimal to have a ratio of at least 1 social worker or licensed health
19 worker per 250 pupils; and

20 Whereas, Each school district must ensure that administrators,
21 teachers and other staff are properly trained regarding the
22 appropriate response to a crisis and crisis management, prevention
23 of violence and emergency response planning so that all schools are
24 prepared to respond appropriately to a crisis or emergency and to
25 quickly mitigate any effects of such a crisis or emergency; now,
26 therefore,

28 THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN
29 SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

30

31 **Section 1.** Chapter 388 of NRS is hereby amended by adding
32 thereto the provisions set forth as sections 2 to 7, inclusive, of this
33 act.

34 **Sec. 2.** *“Lockdown” means a circumstance in which the*
35 *persons on school property are restricted to the interior of a school*
36 *building and isolated from threats until the school property and*
37 *surrounding vicinity are deemed to be secure by:*

38 1. *If the school district has school police officers, the chief of*
39 *school police of the school district or a person designated by him*
40 *or her; or*

41 2. *If the school district does not have school police officers,*
42 *the school resource officer or a person designated by him or her*
43 *or, if the school district does not have school resource officers, a*
44 *local law enforcement agency.*



1 **Sec. 3.** *“School resource officer” means a deputy sheriff or*
2 *other peace officer employed by a local law enforcement agency*
3 *who is assigned to duty at one or more schools, interacts directly*
4 *with pupils and whose responsibilities include, without limitation,*
5 *providing guidance and information to pupils, families and*
6 *educational personnel concerning the avoidance and prevention*
7 *of crime.*

8 **Sec. 4.** *Each school district in a county whose population is*
9 *100,000 or more shall designate a full-time employee to serve as*
10 *an emergency manager whose job responsibilities are focused*
11 *solely on the planning and coordination of available resources for*
12 *the mitigation of, preparation and training for, response to and*
13 *recovery from emergencies or crises.*

14 **Sec. 5. 1.** *The board of trustees of each school district and*
15 *the governing body of each charter school shall consult with the*
16 *person described in subsection 2 or 3, as applicable, regarding*
17 *safety in schools before:*

18 (a) *Designing, constructing or purchasing new buildings for*
19 *schools or related facilities;*

20 (b) *Enlarging, remodeling or renovating existing buildings for*
21 *schools or related facilities; or*

22 (c) *Acquiring sites for building schools or related facilities.*

23 2. *In a county whose population is 100,000 or more, the*
24 *board of trustees of a school district or the governing body of a*
25 *charter school that plans to take an action described in subsection*
26 *1 shall consult with the emergency manager designated pursuant*
27 *to section 4 of this act or, if the school district has school police*
28 *officers, the chief of school police of the school district or a person*
29 *designated by him or her.*

30 3. *In a county whose population is less than 100,000, the*
31 *board of trustees of a school district or the governing body of a*
32 *charter school that plans to take an action described in subsection*
33 *1 shall consult with:*

34 (a) *If the school district has school police officers, the chief of*
35 *school police of the school district or a person designated by him*
36 *or her or, if the school district has designated a full-time employee*
37 *to serve as an emergency manager, the emergency manager; or*

38 (b) *If the county has not designated a full-time employee to*
39 *serve as an emergency manager and does not have school police*
40 *officers, the Division of Emergency Management of the*
41 *Department of Public Safety.*

42 **Sec. 6. 1.** *The Department of Education shall, at least once*
43 *each year, coordinate with the Division of Emergency*
44 *Management of the Department of Public Safety, any emergency*
45 *manager designated pursuant to section 4 of this act, any chief of*



1 *police of a school district that has police officers and any school*
2 *resource officer to conduct a conference regarding safety in public*
3 *schools.*

4 *2. The board of trustees of each school district and the*
5 *governing body of each charter school shall designate persons to*
6 *attend the conference held pursuant to subsection 1. The persons*
7 *so designated must include, without limitation:*

8 *(a) An administrator from the school district or charter school,*
9 *as applicable;*

10 *(b) If the school district has school resource officers, a school*
11 *resource officer or a person designated by him or her;*

12 *(c) If the school district has school police officers, the chief of*
13 *school police of the school district or a person designated by him*
14 *or her; and*

15 *(d) If the school district has an emergency manager designated*
16 *pursuant to section 4 of this act, the emergency manager.*

17 *3. The conference conducted pursuant to subsection 1 may be*
18 *attended by:*

19 *(a) A licensed teacher of a school or charter school;*

20 *(b) Educational support personnel employed by a school*
21 *district or charter school;*

22 *(c) The parent or legal guardian of a pupil who is enrolled in a*
23 *public school; and*

24 *(d) An employee of a local law enforcement agency.*

25 **Sec. 7.** *To the extent that money is available for the purpose,*
26 *the Department shall:*

27 *1. Develop and carry into effect a program of block grants for*
28 *the purposes described in subsection 2; and*

29 *2. Make and administer block grants to school districts and*
30 *charter schools to provide for contract social workers and other*
31 *mental health workers in schools with identified needs.*

32 **Sec. 8.** NRS 388.229 is hereby amended to read as follows:

33 388.229 As used in NRS 388.229 to 388.261, inclusive, *and*
34 *sections 2 to 7, inclusive, of this act*, unless the context otherwise
35 requires, the words and terms defined in NRS 388.231 to 388.235,
36 inclusive, *and sections 2 and 3 of this act* have the meanings
37 ascribed to them in those sections.

38 **Sec. 9.** NRS 388.243 is hereby amended to read as follows:

39 388.243 1. Each development committee established by the
40 board of trustees of a school district shall develop one plan to be
41 used by all the public schools other than the charter schools in the
42 school district in responding to a crisis or an emergency. Each
43 development committee established by the governing body of a
44 charter school shall develop a plan to be used by the charter school



1 in responding to a crisis or an emergency. Each development
2 committee shall, when developing the plan, consult with:

3 (a) The local social service agencies and local public safety
4 agencies in the county in which its school district or charter school
5 is located.

6 (b) *If the school district has an emergency manager designated*
7 *pursuant to section 4 of this act, the emergency manager.*

8 (c) *If the school district has school resource officers, a school*
9 *resource officer or a person designated by him or her.*

10 (d) *If the school district has school police officers, the chief of*
11 *school police of the school district or a person designated by him*
12 *or her.*

13 (e) The director of the local organization for emergency
14 management or, if there is no local organization for emergency
15 management, with the Chief of the Division of Emergency
16 Management of the Department of Public Safety or his or her
17 designee.

18 2. The plan developed pursuant to subsection 1 must include,
19 without limitation:

20 (a) The plans, procedures and information included in the model
21 plan developed by the Department pursuant to NRS 388.253;

22 (b) A procedure for responding to a crisis or an emergency and
23 for responding during the period after a crisis or an emergency has
24 concluded, including, without limitation, a crisis or an emergency
25 that results in immediate physical harm to a pupil or employee of a
26 school in the school district or the charter school; and

27 (c) A procedure for enforcing discipline within a school in the
28 school district or the charter school and for obtaining and
29 maintaining a safe and orderly environment during a crisis or an
30 emergency.

31 3. Each development committee shall provide a copy of the
32 plan that it develops pursuant to this section to the board of trustees
33 of the school district that established the committee or the governing
34 body of the charter school that established the committee.

35 4. Except as otherwise provided in NRS 388.249 and 388.251,
36 each public school, including, without limitation, each charter
37 school, must comply with the plan developed for it pursuant to this
38 section.

39 **Sec. 10.** NRS 388.245 is hereby amended to read as follows:

40 388.245 1. Each development committee shall, at least once
41 each year, review and update as appropriate the plan that it
42 developed pursuant to NRS 388.243. In reviewing and updating the
43 plan, the development committee shall consult with the director of
44 the local organization for emergency management or, if there is no
45 local organization for emergency management, with the Chief of the



- 1 Division of Emergency Management of the Department of Public
2 Safety or his or her designee.
- 3 2. Each development committee shall provide an updated copy
4 of the plan to the board of trustees of the school district that
5 established the committee or the governing body of the charter
6 school that established the committee.
- 7 3. The board of trustees of each school district and the
8 governing body of each charter school shall:
- 9 (a) Post a notice of the completion of each review and update
10 that its development committee performs pursuant to subsection 1 at
11 each school in its school district or at its charter school;
- 12 (b) File with the Department a copy of the notice provided
13 pursuant to paragraph (a);
- 14 (c) Post a copy of NRS 388.229 to 388.261, inclusive, *and*
15 *sections 2 to 7, inclusive, of this act* at each school in its school
16 district or at its charter school;
- 17 (d) Retain a copy of each plan developed pursuant to NRS
18 388.243, each plan updated pursuant to subsection 1 and each
19 deviation approved pursuant to NRS 388.251;
- 20 (e) Provide a copy of each plan developed pursuant to NRS
21 388.243 and each plan updated pursuant to subsection 1 to:
- 22 (1) Each local public safety agency in the county in which
23 the school district or charter school is located;
- 24 (2) The Division of Emergency Management of the
25 Department of Public Safety; and
- 26 (3) The local organization for emergency management, if
27 any;
- 28 (f) Upon request, provide a copy of each plan developed
29 pursuant to NRS 388.243 and each plan updated pursuant to
30 subsection 1 to a local agency that is included in the plan and to an
31 employee of a school who is included in the plan;
- 32 (g) Provide a copy of each deviation approved pursuant to NRS
33 388.251 as soon as practicable to:
- 34 (1) The Department;
- 35 (2) A local public safety agency in the county in which the
36 school district or charter school is located;
- 37 (3) The Division of Emergency Management of the
38 Department of Public Safety;
- 39 (4) The local organization for emergency management, if
40 any;
- 41 (5) A local agency that is included in the plan; and
- 42 (6) An employee of a school who is included in the plan; and
- 43 (h) At least once each year, provide training in responding to a
44 crisis and training in responding to an emergency to each employee
45 of the school district or of the charter school, including, without



1 limitation, training concerning drills for evacuating and securing
2 schools.

3 4. The board of trustees of each school district and the
4 governing body of each charter school may apply for and accept
5 gifts, grants and contributions from any public or private source to
6 carry out the provisions of NRS 388.229 to 388.261, inclusive ~~H~~ ,
7 *and sections 2 to 7, inclusive, of this act.*

8 **Sec. 11.** NRS 388.253 is hereby amended to read as follows:

9 388.253 1. The Department shall, with assistance from other
10 state agencies, including, without limitation, the Division of
11 Emergency Management, the Investigation Division, and the
12 Nevada Highway Patrol Division of the Department of Public
13 Safety, develop a model plan for the management of a crisis or an
14 emergency that involves a public school, including, without
15 limitation, a charter school, or a private school and that requires
16 immediate action. The model plan must include, without limitation,
17 a procedure for:

18 (a) Coordinating the resources of local, state and federal
19 agencies, officers and employees, as appropriate;

20 (b) Accounting for all persons within a school;

21 (c) Assisting persons within a school in a school district, a
22 charter school or a private school to communicate with each other;

23 (d) Assisting persons within a school in a school district, a
24 charter school or a private school to communicate with persons
25 located outside the school, including, without limitation, relatives of
26 pupils and relatives of employees of such a school, the news media
27 and persons from local, state or federal agencies that are responding
28 to a crisis or an emergency;

29 (e) Assisting pupils of a school in the school district, a charter
30 school or a private school, employees of such a school and relatives
31 of such pupils and employees to move safely within and away from
32 the school, including, without limitation, a procedure for evacuating
33 the school and a procedure for securing the school;

34 (f) Reunifying a pupil with his or her parent or legal guardian;

35 (g) Providing any necessary medical assistance;

36 (h) Recovering from a crisis or an emergency;

37 (i) Carrying out a lockdown at a school ; ~~in which persons are~~
38 ~~not allowed to enter or exit the school;~~

39 (j) Providing shelter in specific areas of a school; and

40 (k) Providing specific information relating to managing a crisis
41 or an emergency that is a result of:

42 (1) An incident involving hazardous materials;

43 (2) An incident involving mass casualties;

44 (3) An incident involving an active shooter;

45 (4) An outbreak of disease;



1 (5) Any threat or hazard identified in the hazard mitigation
2 plan of the county in which the school district is located, if such a
3 plan exists; or

4 (6) Any other situation, threat or hazard deemed appropriate.

5 2. In developing the model plan, the Department shall consider
6 the plans developed pursuant to NRS 388.243 and 394.1687 and
7 updated pursuant to NRS 388.245 and 394.1688.

8 3. The Department may disseminate to any appropriate local,
9 state or federal agency, officer or employee, as the Department
10 determines is necessary:

11 (a) The model plan developed by the Department pursuant to
12 subsection 1;

13 (b) A plan developed pursuant to NRS 388.243 or updated
14 pursuant to NRS 388.245;

15 (c) A plan developed pursuant to NRS 394.1687 or updated
16 pursuant to NRS 394.1688; and

17 (d) A deviation approved pursuant to NRS 388.251 or 394.1692.

18 4. The Department shall, at least once each year, review and
19 update as appropriate the model plan developed pursuant to
20 subsection 1.

21 **Sec. 12.** NRS 388.259 is hereby amended to read as follows:

22 388.259 A plan developed pursuant to NRS 388.243 or
23 updated pursuant to NRS 388.245, a deviation and any information
24 submitted to a development committee pursuant to NRS 388.249, a
25 deviation approved pursuant to NRS 388.251 and the model plan
26 developed pursuant to NRS 388.253 are confidential and, except as
27 otherwise provided in NRS 239.0115 and NRS 388.229 to 388.261,
28 inclusive, *and sections 2 to 7, inclusive, of this act*, must not be
29 disclosed to any person or government, governmental agency or
30 political subdivision of a government.

31 **Sec. 13.** NRS 392.450 is hereby amended to read as follows:

32 392.450 1. The board of trustees of each school district and
33 the governing body of each charter school shall provide drills for the
34 pupils in the schools in the school district or the charter schools at
35 least once each month during the school year to instruct those pupils
36 in the appropriate procedures to be followed in the event of a
37 *lockdown*, fire or other emergency . ~~[- except a crisis governed by~~
38 ~~NRS 388.229 to 388.261, inclusive.]~~ Not more than three of ~~[those]~~
39 *the drills provided pursuant to this subsection* may include
40 instruction in the appropriate procedures to be followed in the event
41 of a chemical explosion, related emergencies and other natural
42 disasters. *At least one-half of the drills provided pursuant to this*
43 *subsection must include instruction in appropriate procedures to*
44 *be followed in the event of a lockdown.*

20 4. The principal, teacher or other person in charge of each
21 school building shall cause the provisions of this section to be
22 enforced.

23 5. Any violation of the provisions of this section is a
24 misdemeanor.

25 *6. As used in this section, "lockdown" has the meaning*
26 *ascribed to it in section 2 of this act.*

27 **Sec. 14.** NRS 394.170 is hereby amended to read as follows:

28 394.170 1. The authorities in charge of every private school
29 within this State shall provide drills for the pupils in the schools at
30 least once in each month during the school year to instruct those
31 pupils in the appropriate procedures to be followed in the event of a
32 *lockdown*, fire or other emergency . ~~{; except a crisis governed by~~
33 ~~NRS 394.168 to 394.1699, inclusive.}~~ Not more than two of ~~{those}~~
34 *the drills provided pursuant to this subsection* may include
35 instruction in the appropriate procedures to be followed in the event
36 of a chemical explosion, related emergencies and other natural
37 disasters. *At least one-half of the drills provided pursuant to this*
38 *subsection must include instruction in the appropriate procedures*
39 *to be followed in the event of a lockdown.*

40 2. In all cities or towns which have regularly organized, paid
41 fire departments or voluntary fire departments, the drills required by
42 subsection 1 must be conducted under the supervision of the chief of
43 the fire department of the city or town.

44 3. The State Fire Marshal shall prescribe general regulations
45 governing the drills required by subsection 1 and shall, with the



1 cooperation of the Superintendent of Public Instruction, arrange for
2 the supervision of drills in schools where the drills are not
3 supervised pursuant to subsection 2.

4 4. A copy of this section must be kept posted in every
5 classroom of every private school by the principal or teacher in
6 charge thereof.

7 5. The principal, teacher or other person in charge of each
8 school building shall cause the provisions of this section to be
9 enforced.

10 6. Any violation of the provisions of this section is a
11 misdemeanor.

12 *7. As used in this section, "lockdown" has the meaning*
13 *ascribed to it in section 2 of this act.*

14 **Sec. 15.** NRS 414.135 is hereby amended to read as follows:

15 414.135 1. There is hereby created in the State General Fund
16 the Emergency Assistance Account. Beginning with the fiscal year
17 that begins on July 1, 1999, the State Controller shall, at the end of
18 each fiscal year, transfer the interest earned during the previous
19 fiscal year on the money in the Disaster Relief Account created
20 pursuant to NRS 353.2735 to the Emergency Assistance Account in
21 an amount not to exceed \$500,000.

22 2. The Division of Emergency Management of the Department
23 of Public Safety shall administer the Emergency Assistance
24 Account. The Division may adopt regulations authorized by this
25 section before, on or after July 1, 1999.

26 3. Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (c), all
27 expenditures from the Emergency Assistance Account must be
28 approved in advance by the Division. Except as otherwise provided
29 in subsection 4, all money in the Emergency Assistance Account
30 must be expended:

31 (a) To provide supplemental emergency assistance to this state
32 or to local governments in this state that are severely and adversely
33 affected by a natural, technological or man-made emergency or
34 disaster for which available resources of this state or the local
35 government are inadequate to provide a satisfactory remedy;

36 (b) To pay any actual expenses incurred by the Division for
37 administration during a natural, technological or man-made
38 emergency or disaster; and

39 (c) For any other purpose authorized by the Legislature.

40 4. Beginning with the fiscal year that begins on July 1, 1999, if
41 any balance remains in the Emergency Assistance Account at the
42 end of a fiscal year and the balance has not otherwise been
43 committed for expenditure, the Division may, with the approval of
44 the Interim Finance Committee, allocate all or any portion of the



1 remaining balance, not to exceed \$250,000, to this state or to a local
2 government to:

3 (a) Purchase equipment or supplies required for emergency
4 management;

5 (b) Provide training to personnel related to emergency
6 management; and

7 (c) Carry out the provisions of NRS 388.229 to 388.261,
8 inclusive **H**, *and sections 2 to 7, inclusive, of this act.*

9 5. Beginning with the fiscal year that begins on July 1, 1999,
10 the Division shall, at the end of each quarter of a fiscal year, submit
11 to the Interim Finance Committee a report of the expenditures made
12 from the Emergency Assistance Account for the previous quarter.

13 6. The Division shall adopt such regulations as are necessary to
14 administer the Emergency Assistance Account.

15 7. The Division may adopt regulations to provide for
16 reimbursement of expenditures made from the Emergency
17 Assistance Account. If the Division requires such reimbursement,
18 the Attorney General shall take such action as is necessary to
19 recover the amount of any unpaid reimbursement plus interest at a
20 rate determined pursuant to NRS 17.130, computed from the date on
21 which the money was removed from the Disaster Relief Account,
22 upon request by the Division.

23 **Sec. 16.** The provisions of NRS 354.599 do not apply to any
24 additional expenses of a local government that are related to the
25 provisions of this act.

26 **Sec. 17.** This act becomes effective on July 1, 2017.
