SUMMARY—Revises provisions related to unprofessional conduct by dentists. (BDR 54-1147)

AN ACT relating to dentistry; prohibiting a dentist from using any computer code or computer software to advertise on the Internet in a false or misleading manner; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law provides that certain acts constitute unprofessional conduct if performed by a dentist. Such acts include: (1) publishing or circulating any fraudulent, false or misleading statement concerning the skill or method of practice of any dentist; (2) using advertising which is false or misleading; or (3) claiming or inferring professional superiority over neighboring practitioners. (NRS 631.348) If a dentist engages in unprofessional conduct, the Board of Dental Examiners of Nevada may implement disciplinary actions, including revoking or suspending the license of a dentist. (NRS 631.350)

9 This bill establishes that it is unprofessional conduct for a dentist to use, or 10 permit to be used, any computer code or computer software to advertise or inform 11 any person on the Internet of the services, Internet website or dental practice, office 12 or clinic of a dentist in a manner that is false or misleading.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. NRS 631.348 is hereby amended to read as follows:
631.348 The following acts, among others, constitute
unprofessional conduct:

Using or permitting to be used any Uniform Resource 2 3. [4.] 5. Using fraud or misrepresentation to secure a license;

5. 6. Practicing under a name, other than a lawfully assumed 11 12 or fictitious name, that is false or misleading;

13 [6.] 7. Submitting a false or fraudulent claim for payment to an 14 insurer for dental services rendered: or

Failing repeatedly to advise an insurer that the dentist 15 [7] 8. has forgiven the patient's share of the payment to the dentist under a 16 policy of insurance. This failure to notify an insurer includes 17 forgiving one patient's debts more than once and forgiving the debt 18 19 of different patients with different insurers on a regular basis.

Sec. 2. This act becomes effective on July 1, 2017. 20
