Aging

- There has been an upward trend in the proportion of "older" persons (aged 50-64) among the homeless population.
 - They are not old enough to qualify for Medicare.
 - Due to poor nutrition and living conditions, they may resemble someone much older.
- They may become eligible for services at different points.
 - Subsidized housing available at age 62
 - Medicare available at age 65
 - Social Security benefits available at age 65

Challenges of Unsheltered Seniors (aged 50-62)

- ▶ Often have similar healthcare needs to housed persons 10-20 years older.
- ▶ Higher rates of geriatric syndromes when compared to the general population
 - Includes problems performing daily activities, walking, vision, hearing, falls, and frailty
- Higher rates of cognitive impairments when compared to younger homeless adults
 - Impairments resulting from depression or dementia can contribute to worsening of physical health



Gaps in Benefits

- Social Security benefits do not cover housing.
- Monthly SSI payment is below the poverty line.
- SSI is intended to pay for housing and basic needs, however it is not enough to do so realistically.
- Increased homelessness among elderly persons is largely the result of poverty and the declining availability of affordable housing. (National Coalition for the Homeless, 2019).




Housing Costs

- ▶ Householders in their 50s to mid-60s are especially at risk of having insufficient resources to manage rising health care and housing costs (Housing America's Older Adults, 2018).
- Serious shortage of low income housing in the US, in Nevada, and in Southern Nevada.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING UNITS PER 100 EXTREMELY LOW INCOME HOUSEHOLDS




Affordable Housing Help

- Clark County Social Service, through its Community Resource Management Unit, has 728 affordable senior housing units in its current development pipeline with units opening every month starting June 2020.
- ▶ Pebble and Eastern Development In collaboration with Coordinated Living of Southern Nevada and Ovation Development, an additional 195-unit senior affordable housing unit will open soon.
 - Income restrictions on units are for households at 60% of the area median income or below
 - ▶ I person = \$29,280
 - \triangleright 2 person = \$33,480




Number of Nevada Homeless






Number of Southern Nevada Homeless (NV-500)


Southern Nevada Total Homeless





Total # Clients - 2019









Number of Seniors Accessing Services by Program Type



Number of Seniors Accessing Services Compared with Non-Seniors by Program Type




Number of Seniors Accessing Services Compared with Non-Seniors by Program Type

Clark County Social Service

- Our mission is to provide a safety net of human services to a growing community.
- Our vision is to support self-sufficiency for at-risk people through a variety of services.
 - This includes seniors and those faced with housing challenges.




Homemaker Program – also known as Homemaker Home Health Aide / Alternative Health Care

- Community-based service to provide in-home care in order to preserve or improve the quality of recipients' lives and reduce the need for out-of-home care.
- Case managers work with clients to determine the type and amount of services they need.
 - This may include grocery shopping, laundry, light housekeeping, light meal preparation, personal hygiene, and prescription pick-up.
- Services are provided regionally.



Homemaker Program – also known as Homemaker Home Health Aide / Alternative Health Care



Long Term Care

- Assistance in securing appropriate long term care placement for Clark County residents who are unable to function in independent living due to medical problems.
 - This includes: adult day care, group care/assisted living, custodial care nursing facilities
- Requests for services may be initiated from facilities, hospitals, workers, families of persons in need of care, or clients.
- There are no fees, however, patients pay a portion of their income towards their care along with eligibility for Medicare, Medicaid, private insurance and self-pay.



Senior Advocate Program

- Provides information and referrals to senior citizens 60 years of age or older and their caregivers on a variety of topics including:
 - Medicare
 - Social Security
 - Senior Housing
 - Utility Assistance
 - Senior Service Programs
- Royal Pages are provided by this program which is a senior resource directory



Transportation Program

- ▶ Clients are provided with transportation in order to access medical and other essential appointments.
 - Clients who attend medical appointments are generally discharged from medical follow-up services in a shorter time period than peers who are unable to attend medical appointments.
 - This preserves in-home placement and avoids costly out-of-home placements
- ▶ Transportation can be direct (CCSS staff vehicle)or may be provided in the form of bus tickets or other mode of transportation.



Clark County Recreation Centers

- ▶ There are several community centers designed specifically for seniors.
 - ▶ They are located in each quadrant of the community.
- They offer a variety of services including meals, exercise programs, activities, and opportunities for seniors to connect with one another.
 - Activities are free or low-cost.
