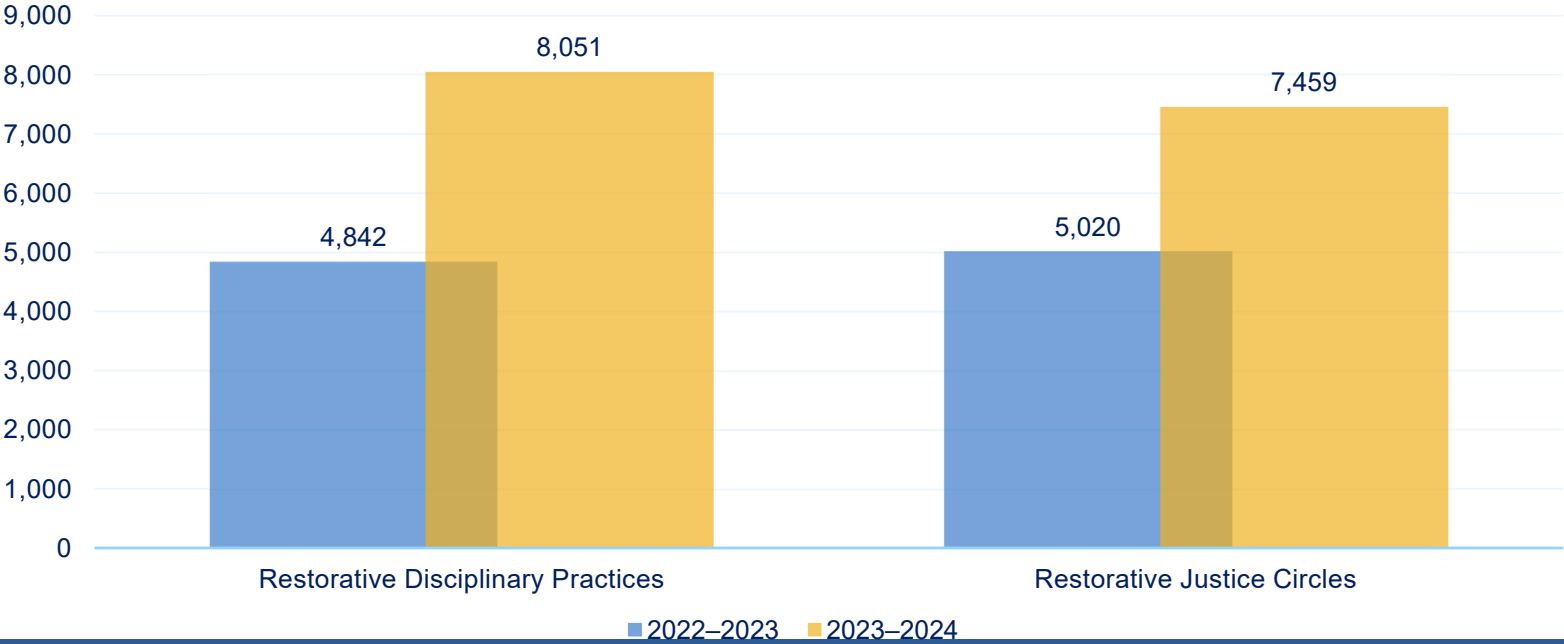

2023–2024 SUSPENSIONS AND EXPULSIONS

Overall Student Suspensions*

- 7% reduction from 2022–2023 school year
 - High Schools: 32% fewer suspensions

Disproportionality in Student Suspensions*

- Disproportionality ratios decreased for 7 of 8 student groups tracked by the District's Focus: 2024 strategic plan

Overall Discretionary Expulsions*

- 11% reduction from 2022–2023 school year
