**Section 1.** NAC 385.408 is hereby amended to read as follows:

385.408 The minimum passing scores are a standard score of [40] 410 on each of the five tests and an average standard score of [45] 450 on the five tests.

PARALLEL SECTION **Sec. 2.** NAC 389.694 is hereby amended to read as follows:

389.694 1. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, a person who is 17 years of age or older and who seeks an adult standard diploma may waive units of credit for English, mathematics, science and social studies by taking tests of his general educational development in these subjects. A person who seeks an adult standard diploma and who is enrolled in an alternative program for the education of pupils at risk of dropping out of high school established by a school district pursuant to NRS 388.537 may not waive any units of credit pursuant to this section.

2. The maximum number of credits which may be waived in the areas of English, mathematics and science must be based on the number of credits previously earned which meet the minimum requirements for course content outlined in NAC 389.450 to 389.511, inclusive, and the credits waived upon the completion of the General Educational Development Test.

- 3. Credits in elective courses may be waived only in the area of social studies. The maximum number of credits which may be waived in the area of social studies must be based on the General Educational Development Test.
- 4. The following table sets forth the scores which a person must achieve on the tests to waive credits in required and elective courses and the corresponding number of units which may be waived:

SECOND PARALLEL SECTION

**Sec. 3.** NAC 389.694 is hereby amended to read as follows:

389.694 1. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, a person who is 17 years of age or older and who seeks an adult standard diploma may waive units of credit for English, mathematics, science and social studies by taking tests of his general educational development in these subjects. A person who seeks an adult standard diploma and who is enrolled in an alternative program for the education of pupils at risk of dropping out of high school established by a school district pursuant to NRS 388.537 may not waive any units of credit pursuant to this section.

- 2. The maximum number of credits which may be waived in the areas of English, mathematics and science must be based on the number of credits previously earned which meet the minimum requirements for course content outlined in NAC 389.450 to 389.511, inclusive, and the credits waived upon the completion of the General Educational Development Test.
- 3. Credits in elective courses may be waived only in the area of social studies. The maximum number of credits which may be waived in the area of social studies must be based on the General Educational Development Test.
- 4. The following table sets forth the scores which a person must achieve on the tests to waive credits in required and elective courses and the corresponding number of units which may be waived:

A workshop was conducted on January 26, 2002, to provide the opportunity for comments by affected parties and the public. There were comments from the public.

The Notice of Intent to Act Upon a Regulation for public hearing for Board adoption of revisions to NAC 385 & 389, Tests of General Education Development (GED), was sent to approximately one-hundred fifty individuals and educational organizations. One public hearing was conducted on January 26, 2002, to provide the opportunity for comments by affected parties and the public. There were no comments from the public. The Board adopted the permanent language on January 26, 2002, without revision.
