## WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

## NEVADA STATE LEGISLATURE, 54TH SESSION

Meeting was called to order by Chairman Norman D. Glaser at 11:06 A.M. February 24, 1967 in Ways and Means Committee Room.

Present: Howard, Jacobsen, Harris, Ashworth, Bowler, Mello, Tyson (11:13), Young (11:17).

Absent: None

Also present: Bob Bruce, Fiscal Analyst; various members of the Department of Education, including Mr. Lincoln Liston, Burnell Larsen, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and County Superintendents from all counties in Nevada excepting Storey County, per attached list, as well as Wallace Smith, Assistant Superintendent, Mineral County; Mr. Fant, Administrative Assistant, Washoe County and Shirley Wedow, National PTA Membership Chairman. Assemblyman Zel Lowman was an interested observer. Press.

Chairman Glaser announced that inasmuch as some members of the Committee would have to leave early, a certain order would be followed in hearing the various superintendents.

He called first on Marvin Picollo of Washoe County.

Mr. Picollo said he considered this the most critical year Washoe County has ever faced because of increased commitments and decreased income. He said the Teachers' Association is asking \$6200 as a beginning salary. This would cost \$1,824,823. They now get \$5,300. They are going in with no carry over balance but must have competitive salary or will lose teachers. They would much prefer to go with the Peabody Plan because they understand it. Not that they are opposed to the Dodge Plan, but if they change to it they will have to change their budget. Militancy among teachers is growing, he feels if they have made a mistake it is in asking for the minimum. The Stead phase out has hurt badly. They have lost federal monies and had to convert teachers to other types of programs. Mr. Jacobsen said he had heard there were teachers on the payroll they could not use. Mr. Picollo said this is not true. He finished his presentation at 11:23.

James Mason - Clark County.

His situation is similar to that in Washoe County. They need money. The Board of Trustees have had to cut another \$1,000,000 from their budget. There were 3500 new pupils this year, not as much growth as anticipated. They have 86 schools. Growth will be up when California Edison Power Company starts building a steam plant in 18 months. One of biggest problem is recruitment of teachers, will need 450 teachers for next year, this could run to 600. Nevada produces about 10% of teachers, 90 to 95% have to be recruited outside. Salaries are low, now paying \$5,500 there, Teachers' Association wants \$6,000 for 67-68, \$6,500 for 68-69 school year. They will have a very difficult time unless they can go to \$6,000 for the coming year, will have as high as 50% turnover. Another problem, building program. All right, every child in a seat until 1969. He estimated 2,000 new pupils 18 months from now because of Cal-Edison. Peabody Formula would provide them with

about 3 1/2 million. That is the floor, not the ceiling, of their problem. Cost per pupil, \$5.10 or \$5.11. Two years ago was over \$5.50. Mr. Mason finished his presentation at 11:40.

Robert J. Zander - Elko County.

Salaries biggest problem. Teachers asking for \$6200 base. Mr. Zander said they are behind other counties as much as \$1500. With Peabody request still will not be able to go to \$6200 base. They have eleven rural schools, are going to the maximum \$1.50 this year. He said the best they can do for their teachers is \$5,600 base. He said they have 23 schools in all, total enrollment of 180 students. In the 11 schools have 15 teachers. Chairman Glaser asked about schools on double sessions, was told there are 15 double sessions in Elko. They were successful in passing bond issue in September, only 1/2 what originally asked for. Chairman Glaser asked offhand how much additional money they thought was needed for the next biennium and was told to go to \$6,000 salary base and put in a few improvements would cost in the neighborhood of \$350,000 over what can be expected each year. Mr. Zander finished his presentation at 11:46.

Mr. Harris out - 11:40

Mr. Bowler said he had to leave soon and would like to hear from some small county first.

Preston Price - Lincoln County.

He said if the Peabody Formula as amended is passed his county would receive \$37,000 less than they have this year. Under Dodge plan, would be \$34,000 less. They have received special aid for the last 6 years. Salary schedule for next year will be \$5512, following year if proposal is passed to increase Peabody and remove special aid, would go to \$5732 base salary. Under present formula, would have \$58,000 less than this year. Discussed transportation problems. Average per pupil expenditure is \$710. Only other route on money is from distributive school fund. He said they have asked for 2 years for special. Chairman Glaser asked if they would need some on top of the \$37,000. He said if the Peabody Formula is enacted, they would need an additional \$60,000 under special aid. Mr. Price finished his presentation at 11:53.

Harris back - 11:53.

Robert Best - Lyon County.

Total enrollment - \$2200 - need for additional state support is critical. They will be starting with a \$96,000 deficit. The salary schedule was raised last year, base is \$5,600. Increased annual increment given to teachers to \$200 and top for Master's was set at \$9,100, cannot be supported between all income. Teachers request \$5700 and increment to \$250. To do this would take another \$57,000. He feels it is necessary to pay above salary schedule in rural areas because of special needs and high transportation costs. Discussed new construction. Reaction to Dodge Plan - see if it is an equitable disposition. He had serious doubt in this area and felt the base figure was not substantiated sufficiently well. Lyon County would get \$42,000 less than under state proposal. They would have no chance to add programs, felt Dodge plan is inflexible. Mr. Best finished his presentation at 12:04.

Chairman Glaser declared the meeting in recess at 12:05 until the hour of 1:15 P.M.

Mr. Bowler, Ashworth excused from afternoon meeting.

Meeting resumed at 1:18, called to order by Vice Chairman Donald Mello in the absence of Chairman Norman Glaser.

Absent: Harris, Ashworth, Bowler (excused)

Mr. Walter V. Olds - Churchill County.

Mr. Olds said he would approach the subject in rather a different vein, inasmuch as his county was in a situation where "we can meet our budget regardless of what you do." He said they rank 15th in average teacher's salaries. They have stayed within their financing while basic salary is \$5500, earned increments. Top salary is \$8,000, leaving them about \$1,000 below par. Would not gain on minimum under Peabody formula. He said historically 8% of their budget went into transportation. They haul 2/3 of every child in the county. Last year total enrollment increased 118, transportation load increased 124. They hauled everyone not in walking distance of school. Was asked what he called walking distance. He said three rode 1 1/2 miles, average distance 15 miles per day. They are running up against same thing as other districts in regard to hiring teachers and need help. Dodge SB 15 would give them essentially same amount as Peabody, could leave out either one for a 2-year period, then after that some sacrifice would have to be made under Dodge. They recommend Peabody. They have 2500 pupils. Seven schools. Mr. Olds finished his presentation at 1:25.

Arlo K. Funk - Mineral County.

Mr. Funk said Mineral County has the lowest valuation of any county in the state re per pupil. Expect increased enrollment anywhere from 100 to 200 students, based on new houses to be built at NAD. He said their economy is based on one industry, NAD. Teachers presently getting \$5592, want \$5700. Federal impact - are getting 269.42 per student this year..1930 students, 7 schools. Mr. Funk concluded his presentation at 1:30.

Chairman Mello asked Mr. Picollo about the Stead phaseout. What happened to the teachers. He was told they absorbed some 80 teachers. Discussion of teachers being transferred back there when housing starts up and school opens.

Gene Scarselli - Douglas County.

Mr. Scarselli said Douglas is a wealthy county, \$1.16 tax rate - 1.8 million bond issue. .. will need more teachers, construction of new elementary school at Gardnerville, new school at Tahoe, staff. Special education, kindergarten, etc. Have never had music teachers, librarians, vocational and job program. All are contemplated to be finished before September. Teachers are asking \$6200 base, \$1.16 per pupil. Their tax rate would be \$1.38 if they get what they want, leaving leeway of .12 in which to raise teachers' salaries if get \$6200 and still have to ask \$1.50 to give any raises. Teachers have not demanded a salary raise, it will be automatic if others get them. They need 20 or 25 teachers. \$6200 will get them through for one year, need more than 6200 after. He blames the legislature idea of assessed valuations; came up with 54 million assessment this year, 14.6 million copped off it. He worked out the budget on \$41,000,000.

Lyman P. Bruce - Humboldt County.

Mr. Bruce said his county, a rural one like Lyon and Elko, has been suffering, up to \$1.50 limit soon, \$1.35.7 - building program - have not yet instituted any remedial programs with exception of the Indian School at McDermitt. Have no library services except at one high school, no guidance counseling service. With new high school would have opportunity to reorganize existing program, particularly in Winnemucca. Will have vocational, foreign languages, etc. Salaries problem, teachers requested from \$5500 to \$5700 with 4% index. He said they can get beginning teachers at \$5500 but they have no incentive to remain after a couple of years. To attract experienced teachers need more, under \$6200 could institute programs and raise salaries and remain a little below the \$1.50 limit. It would cost approximately \$133,000 to institute this type of program. They have 10 schools, 6 rural, 4 in Winnemucca - 1767 pupils. Mr. Howard asked how much the total would be - if cut to bone and <sup>no</sup> improvements would still need \$35,000 to \$45,000, otherwise \$133,000. \$52,000 additional teachers' sal.

Chairman Glaser returned and took over the meeting at 1:42.

Mrs. Anne Tomany - Esmeralda.

She said they had dropped to a three teacher rural area, four certified teachers at beginning of year, problem was finding a teacher who could come in with low beginning salary. Two teachers at Dyer School and not enough money to pay them. Two substitutions and a teacher aid had depleted the budget almost to nothing. She said she would go along with anything, as "it is frightening." Mr. Jacobsen asked how many schools - 3 total. Beginning salary \$5300. Total pupils - 41.

Mrs. Tyson out = 1:40

Allen C. Frenzel - Eureka County.

Mr. Frenzel said Eureka County in somewhat better shape. It has 155 students located in 3 rather small schools. Starting salary is \$5700 and housing is provided at \$35.00 per month. Next year starting salary for B.A. \$7,000 through 5 steps to \$8,000 which can be reached in five years. They are going to demonstrate what any district can do with sufficient capital. After next year all students will be housed in new facilities. One of the biggest problems is keeping teachers in a rural county. In 1965 he lost 6 of 15 teachers, the next year 7, this year 9. They are 16th in average salary. Get young teachers, keep two or three years and that's about it. The school board has a progressive outlook on life, feel a good teacher deserves a living wage, gave raise without question. Without the increased valuation from mining they couldn't do it. They hope with county money, not state aid, they can move ahead. Mr. Young asked if they had made any study of county of origin sales tax tied into Peabody formula, answer was, "no, about all we sell in our county is gas."

Mrs. Tyson back - 1:51

Frank Langlinais - Lander County

School is at the \$1.50 rate and this last year it was suggested there would be a 33% increase in students, largest in state. Pupils, 686 with 4 schools. Students are being housed in condemned buildings around Battle Mountain.

Salary schedule - \$5680. In addition, for biennium would be \$90,000. If they go to \$6200 could forego 387.127 and still barely meet needs. They would be willing to forego the special apportionment. Teachers have come before the Board and now want school district to pay 40% of the insurance premiums on hospitalization. We have to add special classes, remedial, libraries, music, counseling and other things. "Before we weren't large enough, now people wonder why we don't have these programs" Under Dodge's proposition, these special things could not be added because of increased ADA. Because of low salaries, teachers called after they had signed contracts and said they would look somewhere else, finally filled a job which had been open at Austin. Mr. Glaser asked if they had special programs, would \$90,000 take care of it. Answer was yes.

Ray Tennant - Nye County.

Mr. Tennant said Nye County's size has created problems. It is the largest school district in the United States in area of square miles, has 1050 students. Building program will be finished this summer. New buildings are needed to meet increased enrollments. There are problems in transportation, of 1050 are transporting approximately 200 of them on nine bus routes. Because of the geography of the county and children living on the boundary of the county, some are being sent into other counties for high school where tuition is not as great as if they were going to California. This year 27 students are being sent to California, pay \$767 per student there. Point will be reached where a high school will have to be built in Pahrump Valley. No salary schedule demanded yet, waiting on Legislature for support on the Peabody Formula. If \$6200 is enacted, possibly would be able to offer base salary of \$5700, is already \$5500. Another \$37,000 needed just to meet increment.

John R. Orr - White Pine.

Mentioned a recruiting team from California recruiting teachers in White Pine. He said his county has problems of isolation, housing, higher prices locally, proceeds of mines are difficult to predict and it is necessary to carry an adequate cash balance throughout the year to start the next year. He touched on the national teacher shortage which has resulted in militant requests for more money, fringe benefits. Have asked for 13% salary increase making base \$6200. He feels their county should be \$500 to \$1000 higher than Washoe or Clark because of isolation. There is no place to go to recruit teacher. Requested increase from \$5500 to \$6200, base \$5300 last year, brought up from \$5100, is now \$5800 (some town out of state).

In writing budget for next year it was necessary we remove NRS to the tune of \$2360 and special funds so budget is written \$136,000 short. Have \$1.50 tax rate and set for number of years - 13% salary increase requested, cost \$140,000. Budget written on existing salary schedule, if SB 63 were decreased "we would be \$796 behind what we are this year." \$5800, 112.00 and \$56.00 to this point, would be just holding the line - need \$387,127 if SB 63 cut back. If passed as written they are \$69,400 ahead. SB 15 would increase increase them approximately \$50,00, would raise \$241,000 and advance \$50,000. Increase if based on 4% would cost approximately \$40,000 to go into biennium and if grant teachers' salary request would cost \$280,000 in two period. 142 teachers, 9 attendance areas, 11 school buildings, 2600 enrollment, predict budget on 2495.

Marvin J. Killfoil - Pershing County

Problems comparable to those of most other counties. Largest problem in critical areas of salaries and teacher recruitment. Mr. Killfoil said he felt the smaller and more isolated the county, the greater the salary schedule must be. He believes the smaller counties get what is left from what some other county did not want. Teachers go from town to town. Most money available is the main thing. They do not stop at his place he said. Students are suffering from lack of best teachers available. Turnover average is 10% to 20%, teachers stay 2 or 3 years then go to Clark or some other place. Base is \$5500, would like to go to \$5800, do not have standard index. Would cost \$60,000 for the biennium and under state plan their school district would gain some \$1,000,000. Under Dodge proposal would gain some \$40,000 for biennium. Dodge cannot much more than meet teacher increments. Under state plan entire amount used for salaries because another crucial area is programs, they have been anxious to maintain music and art teachers and establish vocational programs. Received \$9,000 under emergency fund last year, it was placed in vocational program. If received \$51,000 as proposed by Peabody. approximately \$20,000 would go into vocational educational program - all but salary increment - teacher recruitment and vocational education program, have 41 teachers, 705 students, 3 schools - transport 37 students 43 miles one way, 5 bus routes. Feel Dodge plan is not quite flexible enough.

John Hawkins - Ormsby County.

Mr. Hawkins said he has 3600 students, 180 certified personnel in 7 schools, 1 high, 1 junior, 5 elementary. All schools consolidated within the city limits, thus have been able to maintain one of the lowest per pupil costs in the state. Re present formula, he finds they are in same position as Clark, Washoe and others. Two years ago, balance of \$190,000, the next year \$170,000, under present formula can only carry \$79,000 to next year and no balance after that - financially going downhill very rapidly. In order to have a balanced program would have to cut capital outlay by 50%, could meet present schedule increment for certified personnel. In relation to Dodge plan, Ormsby County possibly has one of the higher rates on ADA basis. Under governor's plan would get good instructors, have adequate facilities and would have education on the margins - remedial workshop, handicapped, special teachers in music, etc. Can't continue to maintain if Dodge formula is put into effect, no encouragement for teachers in this area. One other need concerns Ormsby County. It has one of the lowest assessed valuations in the state, lots of state land not on tax rolls.. One big difficulty is in construction - bonded to the limit on school bonds, need help in this area. Have application as submitted to State Department of Education. Meet all qualifications for State Aid . Asks consideration if it comes to us. SB 113 - Pozzi.Discussion. Transfer of land. For additional building will have to go outside. Could receive state land for school. Asked about school tax now. This year maintenance and operation, \$1.26. Added to bonds, \$2.02.

Mr. Larsen commented on school construction, said question came up whether or not budget item or special legislation. He said he has been informed amount of request could be part of education budget - teacher base \$5670, have request for \$6,000.

Mr. Scarselli asked to say some about the Dodge plan. He said "it would ruin us." He said assessed valuation money is collected under guise of education with not all going back to education.

Shirley Wedow of the PTA spoke on behalf of the Peabody Formula with \$6200 and \$1.16.

Mr. Jacobsen said it might be wise if someone could speak for the Dodge Plan. Mr. Glaser said the plan is called the Dodge Plan because it was developed by a Legislative Commission Sub-Committee of which Dodge was chairman. Mr. Jacobsen said if no one spoke for it, they must all be against it. Mr. Picollo said he was not against it, he was just not familiar enough with it to say one way or another.

Meeting was adjourned at approximately 2:40 P.M.


Dear Mr. Larson,

Dear Mr. Larson,

Under provisions of N.R.S. Title 34, Education, Chapter 387, Section 387.155, the Ormsby County School District makes formal application for the apportionment of \$259,128.00 as an entitlement for school construction purposes.

The number of pupils of parents who are state employees and of pupils who are wards of the State of Nevada exceeds fifteen percent of the total average of the daily attendance for the school year 1965-66. The attendance records are on file in the State Office of Education. The present bonded indebtedness exceeds sixty percent of the bonding capacity of the district.

Formula: 828:400 ADA state connected students x 1,220 = \$1,010,648.00. The amount previously granted equals \$751,520.00. The amount requested at this time equals \$259,128.00. These funds are to be used for the construction and improvement of school facilities. The amount must be a budgetary request from the State Legislature.

The Ormsby County School District will submit such reports as the State Department of Education may reasonably require and will open the school facilities for inspection by the State Board of Education, any member thereof or its duly authorized representative.

**RE: ADDITIONAL INFORMATION CONCERNING A REQUEST DATED SEPTEMBER 28, 1966, TO MR. BURNELL LARSON, STATE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION, FOR \$259,128.00 FOR SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION UNDER N.R.S. TITLE 34, EDUCATION, SECTION 387.145 to 387.165 INCLUSIVE.**

The Ormsby County School District respectfully submits a request for \$259,128.00 for construction purposes. The needs for such funds are as follows:

All present school facilities in the Ormsby County School District are being used. There are no classrooms available for future expansion.

Student enrollment growth in Ormsby County as depicted on Table I indicates that Ormsby County has one of the most rapid growing school systems in the State of Nevada.

Over the period of 1961 to 1966 there has been an 82 percent increase in student enrollment. Using a conservative estimate of 10 percent increase over the next two year period would mean that 700 additional students over the present enrollment will be attending the Ormsby County Schools in the fall of 1968.

Table II illustrates the growth of state impacted students attending the Ormsby County Schools. An additional 212 state connected pupils attending school in 1965-66 as compared to 1964-65. This represents a heavy demand for school facilities due to state connected pupils without the necessary tax base to support the building needs to house these students.

Table III indicated the efforts of the Ormsby County School District and the taxpayers of the district to meet their school plant needs. Ormsby County ranks first in the State of Nevada in the amount of tax rate for bond redemption, and fourth in the State of Nevada for total school tax rate.

In summary, all factors: local tax effort, the need for facilities, the local restrictions on the property tax base due to the large increasing tax exempted State and Federal properties; the increasing number of state connected pupils plus the overall rapid increase in student enrollment makes it necessary to apply for additional state aid for construction as provided under the Nevada Revised Statutes.

The tentative proposed uses for the requested state construction funds are as follows:

In order to house the additional students expected in the fall of 1968, an additional Junior High School or High School plus an additional elementary school must be constructed at an estimated total cost of \$2,400,000.00. In addition to this at least one additional school site must be secured. These necessary buildings and site acquisition exceeds the present school bond authorization of \$1,7 million dollars.

REQUIREMENTS TO QUALIFY:

1. ADA must exceed 15% of total average ADA.
2. Must have a bonded indebtedness exceeding 60% of its bonding capacity.

In comparison, similar assistance in areas given federal construction assistance require a lower percentage of ADA and no bonding requirements.
