MINUTES OF MEETINGS
APRIL 23, 1973

The meeting was called to order at 8:30 a.m. Senator Lamb was in the chair.

A.B. 947:

SUMMARY: Increases amount of allowable administrative claims against state and removes prohibition against inclusion of certain interest in tort claims against state.

This bill clarifies the payment of interest after judgments and will allow interest to be paid only AFTER the judgment. Senator Raggio said, "You don't want to pay interest before judgment, just after the judgment," and the committee agreed this was the intent. Also this bill allows the state board of examiners to settle claims for \$15,000 or less.

Senator Monroe moved they recommend do pass as amended. Senator Brown seconded the motion, and it passed.

A.B. 47:

SUMMARY: Provides standards of ethical conduct for public officers and employees and establishes a state ethics commission.

Senator Monroe moved to kill this bill. Senator Raggio said, "I'll second it to get a vote on that." It passed with Senators Monroe, Brown, Lamb, Raggio voting for it and Senator Young voting no. Senators Gibson and Pozzi were absent.

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Senator Brown asked what they intended to do with the bill which would allow for colored photographs on the drivers licenses, and Senator Lamb said, "We decided to do nothing about it." He said that motor vehicles and the highway department had fought so much about the bill that they had decided to do nothing.

JUDGES RETIREMENT:

The question was asked if the longevity bonuses would be included toward judge's retirement, and they decided that it did. The committee felt that this would give them a great benefit in their retirement incomes and were reluctant about this but felt they had no other choice. Senator Young said, "We ought to pass some law that they should retire at a certain age." Senator Raggio said, "Whats wrong with having them contribute something to this (their retirement fund)?"

LEGISLATIVE SESSIONS:

Senator Young felt that the sessions should move toward split sessions, or meeting for 20 days and going home for 10 in order to allow the bill drafter time to get the bills prepared and allow the legislators to take care of their businesses at home while this is being done. Senator Lamb said that so many bills were introduced and "That's another thing, the cost. You could extend the term of office for assemblymen. These guys are always running for office every session, so they are always introducing lots of bills. You could do the same for the senate, and you would see a lot of difference." Senator Pozzi mentioned that the assembly had introduced 1,000 bills whereas the senate had introduced 600. Senator Raggio also pointed out that there were twice as many assemblymen as senators. (Senator Pozzi had entered the meeting at 8:45.)

APPROPRIATIONS:

Mr. Barrett mentioned that there had been only a \$46,000 change (and he couldn't recall whether it was over or under) in what the governor had recommended be appropriated this session and what the legislature had appropriated.

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A.B. 687:

SUMMARY: Abolishes employment security fund and creates employment security revolving fund.

Mr. Barrett said, "I don't really know anything about this." Senator Pozzi said, "They can use these funds to draw up architectural studies for buildings and if they don't build the building, the money goes down the tubes."

Mr. Ernest Newton of the taxpayers association said, "This money comes entirely from the penalty and interest fund and is appropriated in blank to be used as a revolving fund for expenses which the department of labor will not reimburse ESD for. This fund has built up over the years at a rate of about \$25,000 per year until now there is \$338,000 in the fund.

*Mr. Newton said this figure, "Was advanced for architectural and engineering studies for a proposed other ESD building which was never built. The director thought he would build a substantial building in addition to the present ESD building, and now this building is not to be built and wasn't even requested.

"Generally speaking, there is probably a need for a revolving fund to take care of expenses that accrue in emergencies that the department of labor will reimburse and if they don't reimburse it will be paid out of the fund. That's why I think the \$10,000 is necessary. They spent \$9,236 in the last two years that they were not reimbursed for.

"There is also the proposal that the money in this fund be put in the trust fund. Granted, the \$338,000 wouldn't make it pass the solvency test, it would still be \$3-1/2 million short. It bothers me to see \$338,000 laying there at the sole discretion of the director or anybody without a report to the legislature in detail, without audit--it's never been audited. The state auditors don't audit because its not their general fund appropriation. The feds don't audit because its not their money but an accumulation of penalties and interest levied against the various taxpayers."

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Senator Gibson came into the meeting at 9:00 a.m.

Mr. Newton said, "There is a suggestion with the second amendment with regard to the increase in employees salaries retroactive to January 1. This cost will very probably be reimbursed by the department of labor, but they won't be reimbursed immediately and that's why there is the suggestion that the bill be made effective July 1 so they can be financed by the revolving fund until the federal government reimburses."

Mr. Barrett said, "The flood in their basement a few years ago cost \$25,000. \$10,000 for a two-year period might not really be enough. The other buildings are state buildings and qualify for buildings and grounds work, but not the ESD building." Mr. Newton felt that they were probably reimbursed for that particular cost anyway. Mr. Newton said, "I am not married to the \$10,000 figure and this could be changed." Senator Lamb said, "Why don't we change it to \$20,000?" Mr. Barrett said \$20,000 is more reasonable than \$10,000."

Senator Lamb said, "Is there some way if they needed this money they could come back and get it?" Mr. Barrett said that they aren't able to come to the interim finance committee and don't have access to interim financing the way other state agencies do.

Senator Monroe said, "Why should this agency have a slush fund when other agencies don't?" Senator Raggio said, "They don't have the opportunity to appear before interim finance." Senator Lamb said, "I think you would be wasting your time to ask him." (This was in response to Senator Raggio's request that they call in Mr. Archie and ask him about what figure he felt he could live with.) Senator Raggio said, "I would like to have someone talk with Mr. Archie before we act on this. If he has anything committed I would hate to cut him off at the pockets." The committee decided to have Mr. Barrett talk with Mr. Archie about a figure to be left in the revolving fund before they acted.

A.B. 477:

SUMMARY: Provides commission with authority to promulgate engine and exhaust emission standards for motor vehicle pollution control.

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Senator Brown moved they amend and do pass this bill. Senator Young seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA BONDS:


Mr. Wooster, the bill drafter, stated that they had at first thought the bonding for the University of Nevada was included in one bill, but they just discovered that the first bill covered only funds to be bonded and covered by slot machine rebate funds. This bill would cover just those bonds needed on other sources of funds, such as the student union where the students will be paying for the building ultimately. The committee decided to introduce this bill.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE FUNDS

Three accounts are required to administer the unemployment insurance program.

Clearing Account

All contributions from employers are deposited in this account as received. After bank clearance, the funds are transferred to the United States Treasury for deposit to this State's account in the Unemployment Trust Fund, established and maintained pursuant to Section 904 of the Social Security Act, as amended.

Unemployment Trust Fund Account

This fund is maintained by the United States Treasury and represents the reserve from which funds are drawn, as needed, for deposit to the Benefit Payment Account. This fund has two sources of revenue: Employer contributions and interest from the State's reserve in the trust fund.

Benefit Payment Account

Funds are requisitioned from the trust fund and upon receipt are deposited to the credit of this account, from which all state claims for unemployment benefits are paid.

ABOLISHES EMPLOYMENT SECURITY FUND
CREATES EMPLOYMENT SECURITY REVOLVING FUND

AS AMENDED, SECOND REPRINT

THE EMPLOYMENT SECURITY DEPARTMENT DOES NOT OPPOSE THE INTENT OF THE ASSEMBLY'S ACTION TO CHANGE THE EMPLOYMENT SECURITY FUND TO AN EMPLOYMENT SECURITY REVOLVING FUND, BUT THE BILL AS PRESENTLY WRITTEN HAS SEVERAL OMISSIONS AND ADDITIONS THAT WOULD PREVENT IT FROM BEING WORKABLE LEGISLATION OR A FUND THAT WOULD BE BENEFICIAL OR USEFUL TO THE DEPARTMENT.

THE EMPLOYMENT SECURITY FUND WAS INITIALLY ESTABLISHED IN 1937 IN ORDER THAT EMPLOYMENT SECURITY AGENCIES WOULD HAVE THE CAPABILITY OF PAYING ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS WHICH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT REFUSES TO PAY OR DOES NOT HAVE NECESSARY RESOURCES TO PAY FOR THE GIVEN REQUIREMENT AT THE TIME THE EXPENDITURE IS REQUIRED. AS WRITTEN, THIS BILL CREATES A FUND WHICH ESD DOESN'T EVEN NEED BECAUSE UNDER EXISTING PROCEDURES NEVADA ESD CANNOT USE FEDERAL FUNDS UNTIL APPROVED AND RECEIVED.

PARAGRAPHS 5 THROUGH 8, ON PAGE 2, OF THE CURRENT DRAFT ARE REMOVED FROM THE LEGISLATION. BASICALLY, THESE PARAGRAPHS STATE THAT THESE FUNDS SHALL BE USED BY THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR FOR THE PAYMENT OF COSTS OF ADMINISTRATION WHICH ARE FOUND NOT TO BE PROPERLY AND VALIDLY CHARGEABLE AGAINST FEDERAL GRANTS RECEIVED FOR OR IN THE UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION ADMINISTRATION FUND. SPECIFICALLY, THE EXISTING LAW GIVES THE DEPARTMENT THE CAPABILITY TO REPAY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT FOR ANY AUDIT EXCEPTIONS TAKEN BY THEM.

ALSO, THE EMPLOYMENT SECURITY FUND WAS PURPOSELY ESTABLISHED TO ALLOW EMPLOYMENT SECURITY TO INITIATE SPECIAL PROJECTS AND TO COPE WITH EMERGENCY SITUATIONS THAT ARISE, SUCH AS A FLOODING PROBLEM IN THE CENTRAL OFFICE A FEW YEARS BACK THAT HAD TO HAVE IMMEDIATE FINANCIAL AND REMEDIAL ACTION.

THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TAKES THE POSITION THAT THE AGENCY MAY NOT INITIALLY USE FEDERAL FUNDS FOR THE ACQUISITION OF LAND, OR THE INITIAL ARCHITECTURAL FEES, FOR PROPOSED BUILDING PROJECTS, BUT WHEN THE BUILDING PROJECT HAS BEEN APPROVED BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, THEY WILL REIMBURSE THE FUND IN TOTAL FOR INITIAL MONETARY OUTLAYS, INCLUDING THE ARCHITECTURAL AND ATTORNEY FEES, AND LAND SURVEYS. THE WAY THE BILL IS CURRENTLY WRITTEN, IT WOULD PRECLUDE THE USE OF THE FUND FOR THESE PURPOSES AND THE AGENCY WOULD HAVE NO ALTERNATIVE BUT TO ASK FOR STATE MONIES FOR BUILDING PROJECTS AND OTHER THINGS OF THIS NATURE.

THE PRESENT WORDING OF THE BILL ON LINES 1 AND 2, ON PAGE 2, STATES THAT IT WOULD CREATE AN EMPLOYMENT SECURITY REVOLVING FUND TO CONSIST OF \$200,000 OF MONIES REGULARLY APPROPRIATED TO THE DEPARTMENT. THE ONLY MONIES THAT ARE REGULARLY APPROPRIATED TO THE DEPARTMENT ARE FEDERAL FUNDS, AND FEDERAL DOLLARS WILL NOT BE MADE AVAILABLE FOR CREATION OF

SUCH A FUND. THE AGENCY HAS DRAFTED A PROPOSED REWRITE OF AB 687 THAT WE FEEL WOULD ENCOMPASS THE INTENT OF THE ASSEMBLY IN THAT IT WOULD ABOLISH THE PRESENT EMPLOYMENT SECURITY FUND AND CREATE AN EMPLOYMENT SECURITY REVOLVING FUND. IT WOULD LIMIT THE AMOUNT OF THE FUND TO \$200,000 WHILE AT THE SAME TIME PROVIDING THAT ALL MONIES COLLECTED FROM INTEREST AND FORFEITURES IN EXCESS OF THE \$200,000 WOULD BE CREDITED TO THE UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION TRUST FUND ON A QUARTERLY BASIS.

EMPLOYMENT SECURITY DEPARTMENT TAKES NO EXCEPTION TO SUBMITTING A DETAILED REPORT OF THE FUND, BUT WE DO NOT BELIEVE THAT THE PROPER PLACE FOR SUCH A REPORT IS IN THE EXECUTIVE BUDGET. WE PROPOSE INSTEAD TO SUBMIT A DETAILED ACCOUNTING OF ALL RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS OF THE FUND ON AN ANNUAL BASIS TO THE LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL BUREAU.

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 687 - COMMITTEE ON COMMERCE

Summary - Abolishes employment security fund and creates employment security revolving fund. Fiscal Note: No. (BDR 53-1656)

Explanation - Matter underlined is new.

AN ACT relating to unemployment compensation; abolishing the employment security fund and creating the employment security revolving fund; providing for appropriate transfer of monies; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. NRS 612.585 is hereby amended to read as follows:

2 612.585 1. There is hereby established as a special fund, separate
3 and apart from all public monies or funds of this state, an unemploy-
4 ment compensation fund, which shall be administered by the executive
5 director exclusively for the purposes of this chapter.

6 2. This fund shall consist of:

7 (a) All contributions, or reimbursements in lieu of contributions col-
8 lected under this chapter.

9 (b) Interest earned upon any monies in the fund.

10 (c) Any property or securities acquired through the use of monies
11 belonging to the fund.

12 (d) All earnings of such property or securities.

13 (e) All money credited to the account of the State of Nevada in the
14 unemployment trust fund pursuant to section 903 of the Social Security
15 Act, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 1103).

16 (f) All interest and forfeitures collected under NRS 612.620 to 612.675,
17 inclusive, and 612.740 will be credited to the Employment Security Revolving
18 Fund. When the Employment Security Revolving Fund is in excess of \$200,000,
19 the excess monies will be credited to the Unemployment Compensation Trust
20 Fund on a quarterly basis. 4-172

21 (g) All other monies received for the fund from any other source

22 3. All monies in the fund shall be mingled and undivided.

23 4. All fines and penalties collected pursuant to the criminal provisions
24 of this chapter shall be paid to the state permanent school fund.

25 SEC. 2. NRS 612.615 is hereby amended to read as follows:

26 612.615 1. There is hereby created in the state treasury a special fund
27 to be known as the Employment Security Revolving Fund. The revolving fund
28 will be maintained in the state treasury and will be created from existing
29 monies now in the Employment Security Fund. The fund will be established

1 at \$200,000 and will be replenished through the receipt of interest and
2 forfeitures collected under NRS 612.620 to 612.675, inclusive, and 612.740.
3 The fund shall not exceed \$200,000. All monies in excess of \$200,000 shall
4 revert to the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund on a quarterly basis.

5 2. All interest and forfeits collected under NRS 612.620 to 612.675,
6 inclusive, and 612.740 shall be paid into this fund.

7 3. All monies which are deposited or paid into this fund are hereby
8 appropriated and made available to the executive director. Such monies
9 shall not be expended or made available for expenditure in any manner
10 which would permit their substitution for, or a corresponding reduction
11 in, federal funds which would, in the absence of such monies, be avail-
12 able to finance expenditures for the administration of the employment
13 security laws of the State of Nevada.

14 4. Nothing in this section shall prevent such monies from being used
15 as a revolving fund to cover expenditures, necessary and proper under the
16 law, for which federal funds have been duly requested but not yet
17 received, subject to the repayment to the fund of such expenditures when
18 received.

19 5. The monies in this fund shall be used by the executive director for
20 the payment of costs of administration which are found not to have been
21 properly and validly chargeable against federal grants received for or in
22 the Unemployment Compensation Administration Fund.

23 6. All monies in this fund shall be deposited, administered and dis-
24 bursed in the same manner and under the same conditions and require-
25 ments as are provided by law for other special funds in the state treasury.

26 7. Any balances in this fund within the \$200,000 limitation shall not
27 lapse at any time, but shall be continuously available to the executive
28 director for expenditure consistent with this chapter.

29 8. Monies in this fund shall not be commingled with other state
30 funds, but shall be maintained in a separate account on the books of
31 the depository.

32 9. The executive director will submit a detailed report of the
33 Employment Security Revolving Fund each fiscal year to the Legislative
34 Counsel Bureau, detailing all receipts and disbursements of the fund.

35 SEC. 3. NRS 612.620 is hereby amended to read as follows:

36 612.620 1. When any contribution as provided in this chapter shall
37 remain unpaid on the date on which it becomes due and payable, as pre-

1 scribed by the executive director, it shall bear interest at the rate of
2 one-half of 1 percent for each month or portion of a month thereafter
3 until such payment, plus accrued interest, is received by the executive
4 director.

5 2. Interest accrued under this section shall not be waived under any
6 circumstances.

7 3. Interest collected pursuant to this section shall be paid into the
8 Employment Security Revolving Fund.

9 SEC. 4. NRS 612.655 is hereby amended to read as follows:

10 612.655 1. Where a payment of contributions, forfeit or interest
11 has been erroneously collected, an employer may, not later than 3 years
12 after the date on which such payments became due, make application for
13 an adjustment thereof in connection with subsequent contributions, for-
14 feit or interest payments or for a refund. All such adjustments or refunds
15 will be made without interest. An adjustment or refund will not be made
16 in any case with respect to contributions on wages which have been
17 included in the determination of an eligible claim for benefits, unless and
18 until it is shown to the satisfaction of the executive director that such
19 determination was due entirely to the fault or mistake of the employment
20 security department.

21 2. Refunds of interest and forfeit collected under NRS 612.620 to 612.675,
22 inclusive, and 612.740 and paid into the Employment Security Revolving Fund
23 established by NRS 612.615 shall be made only from the Employment Security
24 Revolving Fund.

25 SEC. 5. Upon the effective date of this act, all monies in the Employment
26 Security Fund hereby abolished shall revert to and become a part of the
27 Employment Security Revolving Fund.

28 SEC. 6. This act shall become effective upon passage and approval.
