ASSEMBLY CONCURRENT RESOLUTION-Memorializing health and care facilities in the State of Nevada to designate "No Smoking" rooms and areas in such facilities.

WHEREAS, The Surgeon General has determined that smoking is dangerous to the health of the people; and

WHEREAS, The health of the people is the greatest concern of health and care facilities in the state; and

WHEREAS, The interest of the public in decreasing its consumption of tobacco and avoiding incidental effects of smoking has led to an increase in public and private areas designated as "No Smoking" areas; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of Nevada, the Senate concurring, That all health and care facilities in the State of Nevada designate certain areas or rooms in such facilities as "No Smoking" areas; and be

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be prepared and transmitted forthwith by the legislative counsel to the state board of health and each health and care facility established in the State of Nevada.

ASSEMBLY JOINT RESOLUTION—Memorializing the Congress of the United States to reaffirm its commitment to the war on poverty as declared in the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964.

WHEREAS, The Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. §§ 2701 et seq., established certain programs designed to meet the basic needs of low income persons in our society; and

WHEREAS, The programs which were established pursuant to this federal legislation enabled citizens of the United States and the State of Nevada in low income groups to secure food, shelter, health care, jobs, education and protection of their guaranteed rights; and

Whereas, The proposed dismantling of the Office of Economic Opportunity and the abolishment of its programs will reverse the gains and destroy the goals already established by the Federal Government; and

WHEREAS, The people of the State of Nevada will suffer the hardships and burdens produced by the withdrawal of federal funds and programs designed to meet the needs of low income groups; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly and the Senate of the State of Nevada, jointly, That this 57th session of the legislature of the State of Nevada supports the continuation of the war on poverty on a national level as supplemented by the state and local governments; and be it further Resolved, That this legislature, on behalf of the people of the State

Resolved, That this legislature, on behalf of the people of the State of Nevada hereby respectfully memorializes the Congress of the United States to reaffirm its commitment to the poor; and be it further

SUMMARY—Urges study by educational institutions and the state department of comprehensive health planning of transcendental meditation. (BDR 2157)

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION—Urging a feasibility study by educational institutions and the state department of comprehensive health planning of transcendental meditation.

WHEREAS, This increasingly complex society in which we live tends to create anxiety, stress and tension which drive people to find a means of coping with this existence or escaping from it altogether; and

Whereas, Few methods of treating these symptoms of our society have received as much favorable comment and provided as much relief and mental calm as the practice of transcendental meditation as taught by the Maharishi Mahesh Yogi through the centers of the Science of Creative Intelligence, one of which will be located in Las Vegas, Nevada; and

WHEREAS, The efforts and purpose of this organization are to accomplish its objectives some of which are to develop the full potential of the individual, realize the highest ideal of education, maximize the intelligent use of the environment and achieve the spiritual goals of mankind in this generation; and

WHEREAS, The benefits which result from instituting programs utilizing transcendental meditation are presently unknown; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate of the State of Nevada, the Assembly concurring, The educational institutions in this state are encouraged to study the feasibility of instituting courses in the practice of transcendental meditation with the view toward possible treatment of psychosomatic illnesses and utilization in preventive medicine; and be it further

Resolved, That the department of comprehensive health planning is encouraged to study the benefits of transcendental meditation in the treatment of drug abuse insofar as it is practical and medically wise; and be it further

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
