The organizational meeting of the Agriculture Committee was called to order by Chairman Hickey at 2:15 on January 21, 1975. He welcomed the members and assured them that he felt that they would enjoy this committee assignment.

Mr. Hickey gave the members a brief summary of the type of bills that will be referred to this committee. Among these are the Dairy Commission bills and part of the Greenbelt Amendment. In the Greenbelt Amendment, Mr. Hickey stated that he felt it would be important for this committee to help determine terminology for what is open space and what is agriculture land.

Mr. Hickey also asked that as many members of the committee as possible should try to attend the meeting scheduled by Dr. Radtke, Community Resource Development Program Leader. It is a workshop scheduled for February 10 and 11. The place of the meeting is to be announced.

Mr. Hickey then presented the committee with a copy of the rules which were adopted by the Agriculture Committee of the 57th Session. He asked for any comments or suggestions. Dr. Robinson asked if the committee would like to add a rule that any final voting action of the committee would not be made until all witnesses have been heard, questioned and dismissed and the chairman shall determine when a final action is to be taken. This was discussed by the committee and it was decided that this would be the practice of the committee but that it was not necessary to include it in the rules.

Dr. Robinson then moved that the rules be accepted as the operating rules for the Agriculture Committee for the 58th Legislative Session. Mr. Getto seconded the motion. The vote was unanimous.

Mr. Coulter moved that the meeting be adjourned and Mr. Getto seconded the motion. The meeting was adjourned at 2:45.

AGRICULTURE COMMITTEE

I. Duties of the Chairman

- A. Prepare agenda;
- B. Call committee together;
- C. Require minutes to be kept and presented at following meeting; and

II. Duties of Vice-Chairman

He shall assume the duties of the chairman in his absence.

III. Committee Action

- A. A quorum must be present to hear a bill;
- B. A quorum shall consist of at least four (4) committee members;
- C. A simply majority of the committee present can pass or reject a bill;
- D. Attendance shall be recorded at each meeting;
- E. "No" votes shall be recorded;
- F. A two-thirds majority of all committee members (5) shall be required to reconsider a bill; and
- G. The committee shall address the chair to gain the floor.

Any rule not stated in the special rules of the Agriculture Committee shall be governed by Mason's Manual on Parliamentary Procedure.

MR. CHARLES CAMERON, LAKE MEAD DAIRY COOP ASSOCIATION  
REGARDING THE FEDERAL MARKETING ORDER AND THE  
NEVADA DAIRY COMMISSION.

1. What is your exact position with the Lake Mead Coop Association?
2. How long have you been with the Association and how did you come by your position?
3. Is the Lake Mead Coop merged, joined or otherwise affiliated with any similar association? (A possible answer to that would be a Western something)

What is the name and address of this other association?

4. What area does the Lake Mead Association and other one encompass and what is the number of producers in each state and territory so encompassed? Are there nonproducer members in the coop?
5. Has the number of producers in this area increased or decreased in the past three years? If so, will you explain whether they were created, dissolved, or reassigned from other jurisdictions or areas.
6. Explain why the influx or exodus of producers has occurred?
7. From what locations is milk shipped into the Southern Nevada area? What is the basis for determining the allocations of quantities of milk from these areas?
8. As bargaining agents or distributors for your producers in this territory, is the revenue received from the sale of milk to Nevada firms equally distributed to all your producers or, if not, in what manner are they compensated?
9. Is there an administration or service fee charged the producers in the coop's territory for receiving and distributing milk and other services?
10. How is this charge determined and what percentage or dollar amount is deducted from the producer's income on a "100 pound" basis?
11. If milk sold in Nevada to Nevada firms is price controlled by the Nevada Dairy Commission, does milk sold outside Nevada but to Nevada firms fall within the jurisdiction of other state's equivalent to the Dairy Commission. Please explain.

13. What number and percentage of both Nevada and non-Nevada producers of the Lake Mead Federal Order voted for adoption of the Federal Order?
14. Is it possible for Nevada producers to withdraw from the Federal Order if they wish to without the support of non-Nevada producers?  
How would you describe what control your coop has over its members? Can they freely leave the association and operate on an independent basis immediately upon withdrawal?
15. What restrictions are there in your contract?
16. Have you been very cooperative with the Nevada Dairy Commission in supplying them with requested information and data and within the time limits specified? If your answer is affirmative, how can we confirm this with other sources?
17. Is it true that Nevada member producers have not been allowed to provide the Nevada Dairy Commission with data requested of them because of their affiliation with your coop? If this is incorrectly stated, explain why they are reluctant or afraid to cooperate with the State agency.
18. What would your coop do if the Nevada Dairy Commission was abolished or materially altered in membership structure for authority to set prices?
19. Have your entertained the idea or have you been aware of any person in the coop or persons connected with the Nevada Dairy Commission entertaining the idea of a position with Federal Milk Marketing Order?
