The meeting was called to order at 8:00 a.m.

Senator Lamb said that Senator Dodge had asked for five minutes to speak to the Committee.

Senator Dodge said he wanted to speak on the action that the Committees had taken on the Western Nevada Community College. He felt that this program was locked out for six years as a result of the action.

Senator Gibson said that his understanding was that they did not do what Senator Dodge had said. As far as the Senate action was concerned, the projects were left in the priority of completion that they were scheduled for; they didn't change that at all, so it is still a five year program. The only delay is the review of those projects and when they will fit them into that program at the next session. He said the Committee was suspending them, but they were not moving any projects in lower priority up any higher, they are still in the schedule of the five year program. The Senate Finance Committee all agreed that that had been their understanding at the time action was taken.

Senator Dodge said that he had misunderstood the action taken. As long as this project remains in the order of priority whereby it could be considered on its merits in two years, he was satisfied.

Senator Dodge asked that the records indicate this and if everyone understood that, it was all right.

S.B.369: Mr. Mello said he had talked with the Chairman of the Committee and he indicated that he thought the bill was dead however it has not yet been voted on.

Senator Lamb said if the bill died the money would come back out. ..

SECRETARY OF STATE - ARCHIVES: S.B.87: Mr. Mello said that this bill was scheduled to come to Ways and Means on this date.

DISTRIBUTIVE SCHOOL FUND: Mr. Bremner moved the Assembly Ways and Means Committee go with the Senate Finance Committee; Mr. Howard seconded and the motion carried.

UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA RENO: Senator Gibson moved that the Senate Finance Committee go with the Assembly on the wage positions; Senator Glaser seconded and the motion carried.

Mr. Vergiels moved that the Assembly Ways and Means Committee strike the \$215,471 from the second year of additions for continuing accreditation; Mr. Kosinski seconded and the motion carried.

AGRICULTURE EXPERIMENT STATION: Senator Gibson moved to go along with the Assembly Committee in adding the new position plus benefits; Senator Glaser seconded and the motion carried.

DESERT RESEARCH INSTITUTE: Senator Gibson asked about the Human Systems Laboratory; he wondered if this was the water research now. Mr. Dolan said that according to Dr. Smith this division had been in previous years heavily involved in anthropological and archaeological research, but in the past two years it has moved more into some of the environmental impact statements. They will be heavily involved in the environmental impact statements for the Valmy Power Plant; they will be involved in energy transfer programs with the Utah and California Power Commissions; they would be involved in some studies that would be in water research. He is trying to change the direction of this; he said that he hated the name but he is trying to get it completely changed around and get it away from strictly archaeological and anthropological systems.

Senator Gibson moved the Senate go with the Assembly; Senator Echols seconded and the motion carried.

COMMUNITY COLLEGE DIVISION ADMINISTRATION: Mrs. Brookman moved that the Assembly go with the Senate; Mr. Kosinski seconded and the motion carried with Messrs. Bremner, Glover and Howard dissenting.

HOMEMAKING SERVICES: Senator Gibson moved the Senate go with the Assembly; Senator Young seconded and the motion carried.

CARSON CITY TAXES: Mr. Glover moved that the Assembly go with the Senate; Mr. Howard seconded and the motion carried.

C.I.P. - Fencing, Governor's Mansion: Senator Gibson moved the Senate go with the Assembly; Senator Echols seconded and the motion carried.

C.I.P. State Motor Pool, Las Vegas: Senator Gibson suggested that the Senate go with the Assembly on this project and if they are able to arrange the county land, some of this money will not have to be spent. He so moved; Senator Young seconded and the motion carried. Mr. Mello said there should be a Letter of Intent on the action.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION ADMINISTRATION: Mr. Vergiels referred to a letter from Mr. Gamble on this budget and said he was not satisfied with the explanation. Mr. Serpa said that he was entirely satisfied with the reductions listed in the letter.

SUBJ: Preliminary Estimates on \$150,000 Reduction of Education Administration Budget

You have asked for a determination by this office of programs and positions that would be reduced to accommodate the \$150,000 Ed. Admin. budget reduction recommended by the Ways and Means Committee.

A preliminary review of our structure reveals that such reductions can take place by a consolidation of the Administrative offices with commensurate reduction of staff in those offices. This could be shown thusly:

Consolidate Superintendent's office andTECHNICALAdministrative<br/>Savings - 2 Administrative Positions<br/>2 Clerical staff reduction\* \$ 56,495.<br/>22,500.

Total \$ 78,995.

In order to accomplish the remaining reduction, consultant positions and technical and support staff would be reduced on a commensurate basis, e.g.:

For each 2 consultant positions	\$ 45,600.
l clerical position	11,400.
l technical position	12,540.

Total \$ 69,540.

Total Savings \$ 148,535.

Elementary education, environmental education, driver education, mathematics, language arts, arts and humanities, health and P.E., science, social studies, and vocational education.

- A reduction of audits of pupil attendance in all districts for the Distributive School Fund.
- 3. Reduction and/or elimination of state department sponsorship and participation in workshops for driver education, school transportation, and district teacher institutes.

Our response to proficiency and competency standards as provided by this legislative session, as well as our own program, could be seriously curtailed.

Any layoff procedures cut across various departmental budgets, including vocational and federal programs, and seniority is the greatest in the Ed. Admin. budget. These reductions would be felt in all budgets and could seriously deteriorate current programs across the board.

It would be our major concern to maintain those programs and activities with the highest priorities of the board within legislative intent as expressed by those reports of the finance committees of the Assembly and Senate, as well as new bills that have been approved.

Any reductions in the office in Las Vegas would depend upon final disposition of positions as a result of personnel rules and at a commensurate rate of the overall department reduction. (REPRINTED WITH ADOPTED AMENDMENTS) SECOND REPRINT

AN ACT making an appropriation to the division of state parks in the state department of conservation and natural resources for capital improvements in state parks and restoring equipment of the Virginia and Truckee Railroad; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

## The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated from the state general fund to the division of state parks in the state department of conservation and natural resources:

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1 The sum of \$1,160,660 for capital improvements in Nevada state parks, including contracts for consultative services related to the improvements of state park property.

2. The sum of \$103,000 for the restoration of equipment of the Virginia and Truckee Railroad.

SEC. 2. After June 30, 1979, the unencumbered balance of the appropriation made in section 1 shall not be encumbered and shall revert to the state general fund.

SEC. 3. This act shall become effective upon passage and approval.

## MARCH 3, 1977

SUMMARY—Revises provisions for allocating certain money to community training centers for retarded persons. (BDR 39-936) FISCAL NOTE: Local Government Impact: No. State or Industrial Insurance Impact: Yes.

#### EXPLANATION-Matter in italics is new; matter in brackets [ ] is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to community training centers for retarded persons; increasing minimum amounts of money allocable to each center; providing for allocation of certain other money to the centers; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

## The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. NRS 435.290 is hereby amended to read as follows: 435.290 1. A center holding a certificate of qualification from the division is [eligible to receive] entitled to aid from the community training center fund in amounts not less than the amounts allocable under [subsections 2 and 3.] this section.

2. [Each] Except as provided in subsection 5, each center in the state is [eligible to receive that percentage of available funds as the ratio of the number of enrollees of each center bears to the total number of enrollees in all centers in the state, but not less than \$300] entitled to not less than:

(a) Four hundred dollars per enrollee per quarter [, except that each community center shall be given a minimum of \$14,000]; or

13 (b) Sixteen thousand dollars per year [as long as] if the center main-14 tains a minimum of five enrollees per quarter and [their] its staff and 15 operating expenses are [in the amount of \$14,000 or more] at least 16 \$16,000 each year, [.]

17 whichever is greater.

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18 3. The division, in its discretion, may grant aid from the community 19 training center fund to help in establishing new centers. This aid in the 20 aggregate shall not exceed [one-half of the fund during the fiscal year 21 ending June 30, 1970, and shall not exceed] one-fourth of the [fund 22 thereafter.] money available in the fund for the year in which it is given.

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4. Except as provided in subsection 5, after providing for the allocations authorized in subsections 2 and 3, the division shall allocate any other money available in the fund to the qualified centers according to the number of programs offered by each center and the number of enrollees in each program. The division shall determine the relative weight to be given to these factors.

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5. The amount of money which a center is entitled to receive per enrollee per quarter or per year does not exceed the amount specified in the budget for the community training center fund as approved by the most recent session of the legislature.

## The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 217 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section which shall read as follows:

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1. Upon request of the board, the rehabilitation division of the department of human resources shall conduct examinations and determine the need for rehabilitation of injured victims who are entitled to compensation pursuant to NRS 217.010 to 217.270, inclusive.

2. If the rehabilitation division determines that a victim would benefit from rehabilitation services, the board may provide that the compensation which it awards shall be paid to the rehabilitation division for the benefit of the eligible victim.

SEC. 2. NRS 217.010 is hereby amended to read as follows:

217.010 1. It is the policy of this state to encourage the cooperation and assistance of the public in law enforcement and to promote the public welfare.

15 2. It is the purpose of NRS 217.010 to 217.270, inclusive, to provide 16 compensation to innocent persons who are injured as the result of certain 17 serious crimes or in their attempts to prevent the commission of crime 18 or arrest suspected criminals, and in cases where such innocent persons 19 are killed, to provide compensation to their dependents.

SEC. 3. NRS 217.020 is hereby amended to read as follows:

As used in NRS 217.010 to 217.270, inclusive, and section 217.020 I of this act, unless the context otherwise requires, the words and terms defined in NRS 217.030 to 217.070, inclusive, have the meanings ascribed to them in such sections.

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SEC. 4. NRS 217.035 is hereby amended to read as follows: 217.035 "Crime" means [an act or omission] a felony or gross misdemeanor committed within this state. [which is forbidden by law and punishable upon conviction by death, imprisonment, fine or other penal discipline.]

SEC. 5. NRS 217.070 is hereby amended to read as follows: 217.070 "Victim" means a person who is physically injured or killed: While attempting to prevent the commission of a crime not initially 1. involving:

(a) Self-defense of the life, limb or property of the victim;

(b) Defense of the life, limb or property of a relative of the victim;

(c) Defense of the life, limb or property of a person or institution based upon a preexisting legal obligation on the part of the victim to so 18 defend; or

(d) An attempt to arrest a suspected criminal for any offense under circumstances covered by paragraphs (a), (b) or (c) of this subsection.

2. While attempting to aid a police officer to arrest a suspected criminal for any offense under circumstances other than those covered by paragraphs (a), (b) or (c) of subsection 1.

3. As the result of the commission of the crime of murder, voluntary manslaughter, mayhem, kidnaping, forcible rape, robbery, burglary or battery.

SEC. 6. NRS 217.080 is hereby amended to read as follows:

28 217.080 Members of the board [shall serve without] are not entitled 29 to additional compensation [,] but are entitled to subsistence allowances 30 and travel expenses [pursuant to the provisions of NRS 281.160] provided by law while engaged in the performance of official duties under NRS 217.010 to 217.270, inclusive **[.]**, and section 1 of this act. 31 32

SEC. 7. NRS 217.190 is hereby amended to read as follows: 217.190 The board may order the payment of compensation in accordance with the provisions of NRS 217.010 to 217.270, inclusive, 34 35 36 for physical injury to or death of the victim which resulted from an 37 attempt to prevent the commission of crime or to arrest a suspected 38 criminal or aiding or attempting to aid a police officer to do so.] If 39 physical injury to or death of a person results from aiding or attempting 40 to aid a police officer, [as provided in this section,] no compensation may 41 be allowed by the board unless [such] the police officer files with the 42 board an affidavit in support of any claim which may be made.

SEC. 8. NRS 217.200 is hereby amended to read as follows:

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217.200 1. The board may order [the payment of compensation 44 45 and] the award of a governor's certificate for meritorious citizen's service to a victim as defined in subsections 1 and 2 of NRS 217.070 and may 46 47 order the payment of compensation to any victim for:

48 (a) Medical expenses, and nonmedical remedial care and treatment rendered in accordance with a religious method of healing, actually and 49

reasonably incurred as a result of the personal injury or death of the victim

(b) Loss of earning power, actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the total or partial incapacity of the victim;

(c) Pecuniary loss to the dependents of a deceased victim;

(d) Funeral expenses, not in excess of \$1,000, which are actually and reasonably incurred as a result of the death of the victim; and

(e) Any other loss which results from the personal injury or death of the victim and which the board determines to be reasonable.

2. No compensation may be paid in excess of the following amounts in any single case:

(a) For expenses under paragraphs (a) and (d) of subsection 1, \$5,000; 12 (b) For benefits under paragraphs (b) and (c) of subsection 1, \$5,000; 13 14 and

(c) For benefits under paragraph (e) of subsection 1, \$3,000.

3. An award of compensation may be made subject to such terms and conditions as the board considers necessary or advisable with respect to payment, disposition, allotment or apportionment of the award.

NRS 217.220 is hereby amended to read as follows: SEC. 9.

217.220 **[1.]** Compensation shall not be awarded if the victim:

[(a)] 1. Is a relative of the offender;

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[(b)] 2. Was, at the time of the personal injury or death of the 22 victim, living with the offender as a member of his family or household 23 or maintaining a sexual relationship, whether illicit or not, with such 24 25 person or with any member of the family of such person;

[(c)] 3. Violated a penal law of this state, which caused or con-26 tributed to his injuries or death; 27

[(d)] 4. Was injured or killed as a result of the operation of a 28 29 motor vehicle, boat or airplane unless such vehicle, boat or airplane was 30 used as a weapon in a deliberate attempt to harm the victim. [; or

(e) Was not a resident of the State of Nevada at the time the incident 31 upon which the claim is based occurred. 32

2. No compensation may be awarded in an amount in excess of 33 \$5,000.] 34

SEC. 10. NRS 217.240 is hereby amended to read as follows:

36 217.240 Whenever an order for [the payment of] compensation for personal injury or death is made pursuant to NRS 217.010 to 217.270, 37 inclusive, and section I of this act, the board is [, upon payment of the 38 order, ] subrogated to the cause of action of the applicant against the per-39 son or persons responsible for such injury or death and may bring an 40 action against such person or persons for the amount of the damages sus-41 tained by the applicant. If an amount greater than [that paid] the com-42 pensation awarded pursuant to the order is recovered and collected in any 43 such action, the board shall pay the balance to the applicant. 44

SEC. 11. NRS 217.260 is hereby amended to read as follows: 217.260 [Funds] Money for payment of compensation or for pro-46 viding rehabilitation services as ordered by the board shall be paid from 47 the emergency fund account. 48

SEC. 12. If a claim is based on provisions added or amended by this
