The meeting was called to order at 4:15 P. M. Senator Floyd R. Lamb was in the chair. PRESENT: Senator Floyd R. Lamb, Chairman Senator James I Gibson, Vice Chairman Senator Eugene V. Echols Senator Norman D. Glaser Senator Norman Ty Hilbrecht Senator Thomas R. C. Wilson Senator C. Clifton Young

Senator Lamb asked Dr. Baepler to speak.

Dr. Baepler said he would like to address <u>A. B. 612</u> to clarify, if possible, the intent of the Legislature relative to the proposed legislation and amendments. He said as he understood the bill, currently amended, it would mean that if the federal government increased the slot machine rebate from the current 80% to 95%, that these additional funds would revert to the University Capital Improvement Fund to be co-mingled with the current \$5. million which is allocated each year from these funds for capital purposes. If the bill stops at that particular point, he felt that in a practical way these sports pavilions will never be built in that it does not seem feasible that they can actually accrue a total of \$15. million in that fund in order to go ahead with construction. And basing this on today's prices, it gives them about an 8% a year inflation factor for construction. He asked if that was a reasonable Senator Wilson said he thought the average was 12%. figure. Dr. Baepler said that at 8% these projects are going up in cost about \$1. million a year. So that as you look ahead, even as the money is accumulated, it's being eaten up with inflation and therefore he wanted to suggest, if at all possible, that should the federal legislation pass, that a separate capital fund be set up consisting of those monies in excess of the current 80% rebate to be put in a fund that could be bonded against, the fund being specified for university capital projects; and even though the Committee may not want to put it in the legislation, if it could be made a matter of minute records so the intent of this legislation would be clear that these funds be used first of all for the sports facility. The Regents, of course, on February did indeed pass the resolution calling for the extra slot machine rebate money to be put into pavilions, but he said he would very much appreciate that expression of legislative intent in the minutes rather than in the bill so that the matter really does not have to be debated endlessly over the next several years.

Dr. Baepler said he felt it was critical that they have the ability to bond, if the legislation passes, and this means that they would come back to the next session of the Legislature with that project specified in detail, put through the Public Works Board, through the Governor, hopefully part of the executive recommendation as approved by the Public Works Board, to the Legislature before bonds could be authorized. But at least a bondable fund would be created.

Senator Wilson said he felt this suggestion was an improvement over the bill, not just an alternative to it. Dr. Baepler said this would certainly be appreciated by the University community very much. It makes the project a good possiblility, in fact it makes it a reality if the federal legislation passes. Senator Gibson said this would be a further amendment. Mr. Sparks said they needed that section pertaining to bonding to remain in the bill. Dr. Baepler said he thought the portion that related to the bonding might be too specific. This would open it up to more general uses and the University would go on the intent of the Committee for this project which does agree with the Regent's motion. The language should somehow indicate that this fund would be segregated from the \$5. million a year fund. It could provide a fund that could be used for bonding purposes, the project however to be a part of the capital improvement program. Senator Gibson said those projects were of such magnitude so as to require bonding to accomplish. He said he felt they had to be general.

Senator Lamb asked if a Letter of Intent from this Committee would be worthwhile to them. Dr. Baepler said it would be extremely useful. He said at the present time the Regents are in favor and the Committee is in favor. He said they spend a lot of time and effort in working towards one of these projects and he hated to have to constantly do battle to preserve a project when this was the original intent of even going after the federal legislation at this point.

He thanked the Committee for hearing him.

Senator Lamb said he had <u>S. B. 233</u>, the unclassified salary bill. Mr. Sparks said that all of the amendments that both Committees have agreed upon are contained in these amendments which have been completed by the bill drafter now. There is one further amendment that Senator Gibson has requested and that is to remove the unclassified Special Deputy in the Insurance Division. Other than that all of the amendments that the Committee has agreed upon are in the bill. Senator Lamb said that the chair would entertain a motion that the Committee accept the amendments and pass the bill out as amended.

Senator Young moved to amend and do pass; Senator Gibson seconded and the motion carried.

<u>S. B. 469:</u> Changes monetary limitation tort liability of state and its political subdivisions. Senator Lamb said a problem arose on the Senate floor today in regard to this bill and the tort liability of the state. He said the state has been rocking along for several years with this limit of \$25,000 and many on the Committee on Judiciary are a little concerned about it. He asked Mr. Thompson from the Attorney General's office to speak about this.

Mr. Thompson said they frankly think they have had a very good experience over the past 12 years since they waived sovereign immunity. Mr. Barrett keeps a total compilation of the total claims paid out to date and they total approximately \$475,000; are the result of cases being filed in court and either settled by the Board of Examiners or by jury verdict. He said if you average that out over a period of years, it is probably about a 35 or maybe \$45,000 per year, which they feel is not too much. He said they won some and lost some; they have about a 50 - 50 ratio on going to court. He listed some of the suits they have lost. He said that last fall the Attorney General, Mr. Barrett and he met and discussed a proper figure to raise this to. Because if you accept the fact that \$25,000 in 1965 was a realistic figure, then it certainly is not today, it probably should be doubled and he thought that was the figure they tossed around last fall at the meeting.

Senator Young asked if he felt that there might be a chance that the immunity might be held to be unreasonably low and perhaps invalidated if kept at \$25,000. Mr. Thompson said he did not think the courts could quarrel with the Legislature's judgment on that. He felt they would respect the Legislatures's judgment on that, but frankly he felt it was kind of a low figure over the past 12 years, inflation being what it is. He listed the types of cases they had, he said the Highway Department had the most, the Department of Motor Vehicles was next. He gave a breakdown on settlements and the amounts given. Senator Gibson said he did not see any real pressure on the \$25,000. Mr. Thompson said that \$25,000 which was realistic in 1965, is not realistic today.

The Committee discussed the overall situation and the suits that had been filed and the one big case that was presently pending.

<u>A. B. 604:</u> Provides for minimum program standards for learning disabilities. Senator Lamb said he had promised Jim Joyce and John Vergiels that they would hear them when the Committee considered <u>A. B. 604</u> this morning. He neglected to notify them so he had asked them to come and speak to the Committee now.

Mr. Vergiels said his understanding is that the Committee thought there was a fiscal note and he said he had made calls to local school superintendents and he did not believe there would be any fiscal requirements on the bill. He said the whole thing they heard about the bill was that it might cause some administrative discomfort in the State Department of Education but he said they had discounted that. He detailed information that had been discussed during the morning session and discussed the possibilities of charges down the road if this bill was passed. Mr. Vergiels said he would not have supported the bill if he had felt there would be any costs involved and he personally felt there would not be a problem. The grouping of the children in the special units in the larger communities and in the rural counties was discussed. Mr. Vergiels said that many of the special ed people in the state had been trying to get a learning disability separate category for a long time.

A. B. 334: Reguires use of 10 percent of liquor tax proceeds for alcoholism and drug abuse treatment. Mr. Meyer said that Mrs. Gomes who sponsored this bill was still in session in the Assembly and they wanted to request that this bill be reheard on Tuesday when the Legislature reconvenes. Senator Lamb said the Committee would take it under advisement and let Mrs. Gomes know.

Senator Lamb asked the Committee if there were five votes to bring the <u>A. B. 604</u> back. Senator Hilbrecht said he thought it was a good idea. Senator Wilson moved that the Committee reconsider its action on <u>A. B. 604</u>. Senator Hilbrecht seconded. The Committee discussed the bill. Senator Wilson withdrew his motion and Senator Hilbrecht withdrew his second. The bill will be discussed later.

Senator Lamb adjourned the meeting at 5:15 P. M. He asked the Committee to be back at 9:30 A. M. on the following day.

SUMMARY--Regulates distribution of slot machine tax money in excess of \$10 million per year; specifies construction projects for universities. (BDR 41-1731) FISCAL NOTE: Local Government Impact: No.

AN ACT relating to public financial administration; providing for the distribution and use of certain proceeds of slot machine taxes; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. NRS 463.385 is hereby amended to read as follows:

463.385 1. In addition to any other license fees and taxes imposed by this chapter, there is hereby imposed upon each slot machine operated in this state a tax equal to the amount of any credit which may be allowed against the tax imposed on slot machines by 26 U.S.C. § 4461 or other federal statute for the payment of a state tax. If no [such] credit is allowed, no tax is payable under this subsection.

2. The commission shall:

(a) Collect the tax annually on or before June 20, as a condition precedent to the issuance of a state gaming license to operate any slot machine.

(b) Include the proceeds of the tax in its reports of state gaming taxes collected.

The commission shall pay over the tax as collected to the state treasurer to be deposited to the credit of the state distributive school fund and the higher education capital construction fund, hereby created in the state treasury, in the amounts and to be expended only for the purposes specified in subsections 4 and 5.
