<u>S.B. 35</u> - Revolving account for Secretary of State (See <u>Attachment A.</u>) Mr. William Swackhamer, Secretary of State, stated <u>S.B. 35</u> is the result of an audit. The auditors requested that the State have a revolving fund from which minor refunds will be made. This may create a problem with bounced checks, but that can be lived with.

S.B. 40 - Payment of presidential primary from contingency fund. (See Attachment B.) Mr. Swackhamer said the law requires the State to pay for the presidential primary. He said that estimating the cost of the primary is very difficult and he felt the Secretary of State should not be asked to produce this figure. He requests the Statutory Contingency Fund to pick this up. There is no difference in cost.

 Mr. Sparks asked how much the last primary cost. Mr. Swackhamer said \$156,000.

Senator McCorkle asked how much was in the Contingency Fund. Mr. Barrett said they are requesting up to a balance of \$500,000.

S.B. 41 - Punchcard voting (See Attachment C.)

Mr. Swackhamer said 5 counties that had computers available, adopted punchcard voting several years ago; but rural counties were not able to. In recent years manufacturers have developed a hand counter. The first one to use it in Nevada was in Elko County. Mr. Howard and Mr. Swackhamer observed this system. Elko had approximately 1700 voters; the polls closed at 7:00 p.m. and the last vote was counted at 7:58 p.m. It was very efficient.

Mr. Swackhamer said the advantage for counties to go to punchcard voting is money savings. Election boards and Counting Boards are necessary to count ballots. If a punchcard system is used, the Counting Board is unnecessary, and money is saved. The advantage to the State is that if all counties were on the punchcard system the State would not have to provide paper, which is a large expense.

Mr. Swackhamer asked the Legislature to set aside a sum of money, after an agreement is made with a county, to purchase the machines and lease them to the counties. He said a couple of years ago a private company estimated the cost of having the additional counties on this system. They estimated a minimum of \$115,000; but since vendors usually give low estimates, Mr. Swackhamer doubled this amount and requests \$230,000. He said if arrangements are not made with the counties, the money will not be spent.

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Senator Lamb asked if there would be a financial savings. Swackhamer said definitely, to the county and to the State. Mr. Senator Lamb asked how much savings. Mr. Swackhamer said about \$8,000 if the State has to continue buying ballot paper. He said it would cut county personnel almost in half.

Senator Gibson asked how many counties are involved. Mr. Swackhamer answered 9 rural counties. He said right now Elko, White Pine and Lyon are the last three counties to go on the new system. Clark, Washoe, Churchill, Douglas, and Carson City counties are on it also.

Senator Lamb asked how much a county like Lyon saved in the last election. Mr. Howard said Lyon County had about a 20 percent cutback due to the punchcard system. Mr. Howard described the savings experienced in Washoe County from this He said it was better to have a uniform system throughsystem. out the State, so regulations could be established. He said that then a challenge to a statewide election would not be possible.

Senator Lamb asked if a computerized system could be tampered Mr. Howard explained there were built-in safeguards, with. providing for a non-partisan appointed board by the County Clerk to conduct tests before and after each counting of the ballots. He said these checks were required by law. Mr. Swackhamer added there was one other safeguard. The program has to be filed in the Secretary of State's Office 5 days be-If someone manipulated the program afterfore the election. ward, the original can be retrieved for comparison.

Senator Gibson asked what safeguards protect ballots when they are brought from the precincts to the computer building. Mr. Howard said the law requires that the ballots be sealed and taken to the computer building by 2 members of the Election Board or by one of the deputy sheriffs.

Senator McCorkle said it appears that the counties have not requested this service. Mr. Swackhamer responded that no one has actually approached his office about this. He said they were asking the counties to adopt a uniform procedure. He said they have contacted several counties and they are interested, for example Humboldt County.

Senator McCorkle commented that the only reason to implement this program is if there were a savings to the State. If the savings is only \$8,000 a year, it is only 3-1/2 percent of the \$230,000 that would be tied up, which is really a loss. If the money were invested, it would return more than \$8,000. Mr. Swackhamer said this appropriation would not be lost for investment purposes. It is invested until it is spent.

Senator Gibson said there was another reason for the State to be interested in this system. He said that reporting the outcome (of an election) can be made more efficient. He said paper ballot counting is a long process. He said the savings indicated for Washoe County are about 41 percent, and he thought the savings would be fairly consistent throughout the counties.

Senator Jacobsen asked Mr. Swackhamer if he could contact counties that are not using it and find out how many are receptive to implementing the system and how many are not. Mr. Swackhamer said he has talked to most of the County Clerks, (not the County Commissioners who have the ultimate say) and they are very receptive. Senator Jacobsen said he was wondering what objections there were to the system. He also asked about the cost of one of the hand-counting machines. Mr. Swackhamer said they cost about \$1,900.

Senator Lamb called for a vote on the bills.

Motion carried.

Senator Echols absent.

S.B. 40

Senator Gibson asked if money had to be put into the Contingency Fund. Mr. Barrett said he did not think so. He said they came back twice and it had been \$400,000. They were now asking that it be \$500,000.

Senator Jacobsen asked if the presidential primary was a requirement in Nevada. Senator Gibson said yes.

Senator Jacobsen asked if it would be better to eliminate it. Senator Gibson said this was talked about in the Government Affairs Committee. He said Nevada has the benefit of all the presidential aspirants coming to Nevada and the publicity from holding a presidential primary. He said he recommended that it continue at least for one more election.

Senator Lamb asked if it was really necessary. Senator Gibson said he wasn't for it originally but there may be some benefit to continuing it. He said there are 3 Western States which have coinciding dates and we're regarded as the Western or Pacific Rim during the primary.

> Senator Gibson moved "Do Pass" on <u>S.B. 40</u>. Seconded by Senator Wilson. Senators Lamb and Jacobsen voted "No". Motion carried. Senator Echols absent.

Senator Lamb announced that this bill needed an amendment of about \$230,000.

Senator McCorkle asked how effective this program was. Mr. Barrett said he had a list but did not have it with him. Senator Glaser said that if the program is handled right, he thought it would be a good incentive to employees. Senator McCorkle asked if \$5,000 were being saved. Mr. Sparks replied yes.

Senator Lamb called for a vote on the motion.

Motion carried.

Senator Echols absent.

DEPARTMENT OF GENERAL SERVICES - DIRECTOR'S OFFICE - Page 67

Senator Glaser moved that this budget be approved.

Senator McCorkle asked about the <u>Salary Adjustment Reserve</u>. Mr. Sparks replied that if the salary increase is not as this budget contemplates, that is the 8% and 5-1/2%, all of the General Services budgets will be adjusted. Senator Lamb said this had to be remembered for every budget.

Senator Gibson said he would second the motion as long as it was subject to the Committee's action on the unclassified salaries.

Senator McCorkle asked if they would vote on the Director's salary separately. Senator Gibson said it should be in a bill which pertained to all the unclassified salaries.

Senator Lamb called for a second on the motion.

Seconded by Senator Gibson.

Motion carried.

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BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS - Page 69

Senator Jacobsen moved that this budget be approved.

Senator Lamb asked Mr. Barrett if the Mansion should be in this budget. Mr. Barrett answered that there is one new position in this budget for the Mansion.

Senator McCorkle said he would like to see some of the positions cut in favor of prison labor. Senator Glaser said that not all of the 92 positions are in Carson City. Mr. Barrett said that Mrs. Glover is preparing a memo on the utilization of prison help.

Budget held pending receipt of information on prison labor.

STATEWIDE LEASES - Page 73

Senator Wilson asked if this was the budget the rental schedule addresses. Mr. Barrett said leases in non-state owned buildings are included in this budget. (See Attachment D.)

Senator Gibson moved that this budget be approved.

Seconded by Senator Jacobsen.

Motion carried.

Senator Echols absent.

LOST CITY MUSEUM - Page 77

Senator Gibson said he would like the <u>Museum Attendant II</u> position upgraded because the Museum has not been able to hire anyone for it; therefore the Museum has had to close certain hours. He asked if this budget could be held.

Budget held for discussion.

MARLETTE LAKE - Page 79

Senator Wilson asked what the relationship was between this budget and some of the discussions concerning the proposed changes; and Carson City floating a bond issue to improve the system. Mr. Barrett said he did not think there would be any changes. He said the only way to change this budget is to turn the system over to Carson City.

Senator Lamb asked if the State bought all water from the City, why would this budget be needed. Mr. Barrett said the budget operates the system in the hills; it does not operate the system in Carson City.

Senator Wilson said he thought there might be a future proposal involving Carson City acquiring the system in the hills. He said he was talking about the water rights and also building a system for appropriation, storage and delivery. He asked if this budget should be held to see if those proposals are going to generate this session.

Senator Jacobsen said their present proposal is not for Carson City to have anything on the hill; everything from Lakeview this way will be acted upon.

Senator Lamb asked if it was in the proposal that the State deliver a certain amount of water to a certain point. Senator Jacobsen replied yes, to Lakeview. He said it takes care of the obligation to Virginia City and Lakeview development.

Senator Wilson said that he heard there was discussion about enlarging the storage capacity of the lakes, either Marlette or

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Hobart. Senator Jacobsen said it was Hobart. Senator Wilson said the Division of Water Resources is working on whether there is enough water capacity and run-off to be able to sell enough to service the debt on the bonds.

Senator Lamb asked Senator Jacobsen if it would not be good business for the State to retain title but give the City management responsibility, letting them sell the water. He said there seems to be an overlap if the State has to deliver it down to a certain point, then the City takes it. Senator Jacobsen replied that he felt it was the State's responsibility to see that the Capitol Complex had an adequate supply of water. If the State changed its present policy to what Senator Lamb suggests, the Capitol would be under the jurisdiction of the Carson City, and that is not advisable.

Senator Lamb asked why should the State deliver water to Lakeview. He said, from a business standpoint, why is the State delivering water to the City, and then buying it back from them. Senator Jacobsen said he could see his point. He said they were still meeting on this issue and thought this budget ought to be held.

Budget held for discussion.

GENERAL SERVICES WORKING CAPITAL FUND - Page 81

Senator Lamb said this budget has really increased, by 32 percent.

Mr. Sparks said it was the mail and telephone service for all the State agencies.

Senator Gibson asked why the Governor's estimate on the <u>Telephone</u> cost was greater than the agencies' requests. Mr. Barrett referred the Committee to the Actual Year, which is greater than the Work Program Year.

Senator McCorkle asked if this money was reimbursed by each department. Mr. Barrett replied yes. He said this was cost plus overhead; directly, there is no General Fund money in here.

Senator McCorkle asked if 11 PBX operators were needed. Mr. Barrett said they checked it out and thought so. He explained where the operators are located.

Senator Glaser moved that the budget be approved.

Seconded by Senator Jacobsen.

Motion carried.

Senator Echols absent.

GENERAL SERVICES ACCOUNTING - Page 83

Senator McCorkle said this is a 37 percent increase. Senator McCorkle moved that the budget be reduced by 10 percent.

Senator Gibson asked what the latest information was on the CETA program. Mr. Barrett indicated it probably would not last long.

Senator Lamb called for a second to the motion.

Seconded by Senator Glaser.

Senator Wilson asked if the State was obligated to take the CETA program. Mr. Barrett said no. He said the program itself was built to self-destruct.

Mr. Barrett said a 10 percent reduction did not give the Budget Office much guidance. He asked if the Committee wanted to get rid of 10 percent of CETA. Senator McCorkle said no, the CETA subject is separate. He said he did not want the 10 percent

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taken out of CETA because CETA may be taken out anyway. Mr. Barrett suggested that the Committee take out the 10 percent by eliminating the new non-CETA position.

Senator Lamb suggested striking the new position.

Senator McCorkle withdrew his motion.

Senator Glaser withdrew his second.

Senator Gibson moved to eliminate the new non-CETA position.

Seconded by Senator Wilson.

Motion carried.

Senator Echols absent.

Mr. Barrett said CETA positions are paid for in another budget. He said there were 2 CETA positions in Accounting not seen in this budget.

Senator McCorkle said he preferred to make a general cut rather than a line item cut. He would rather leave where to cut to the Department's discretion. Senator Gibson said this could be done some of the time, but not all the time.

Senator Wilson said that an across-the-board cut might encourage a policy of cutting without regard to merit which would encourage agencies to return next session with padded budgets. He said he would rather do it on a case-by-case basis (department-by-department, or line-by-line item).

RECORD MANAGEMENT SERVICES - Page 91

McCorkle Senator, moved that the new position be eliminated; and Other, Contract Services and Print Duplicating Copy, by 10 percent.

Seconded by Senator Glaser.

Mr. Sparks said there is an additional new position in the second year.

Mr. Barrett said they are moving back into the Capitol Building; and if the budget is cut in Duplicating, agencies in the Capitol Building may set up their own duplicating services.

Senator Gibson said there was justification for the increase in microfilm; it eliminated expensive storage.

Senator McCorkle said the Committee was not eliminating just the new position, but also some other person who is already employed, who can be transferred.

Senator Lamb called for a vote on the motion to eliminate the new positions.

Senators Lamb, Gibson, and Jacobsen voted no.

Motion did not carry.

Senator Echols absent.

Senator McCorkle said they could fill the new positions with 12 other people. Mr. Barrett said they worked in other reproduction centers which would be understaffed if people were taken out.

Senator Gibson said the Committee had originally sponsored the central duplicating effort because of uncontrollable duplicating.

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Senator Gibson suggested a percentage cut might be better.

Mr. Barrett said the budget is tight and cutting it invited agencies to do non-efficient things. Mr. Sparks concurred.

Senator Lamb moved to eliminate the new position recommended for the second year.

Senator Wilson asked if it was the staff's opinion that it was counterproductive to cut this budget. Mr. Sparks said yes.

Senator Lamb called for a second on the motion.

Seconded by Senator Jacobsen.

Motion carried.

Senator Echols absent.

Senator Wilson moved that this budget be approved with the exception of the new position.

Seconded by Senator Gibson.

Motion carried.

Senator Echols absent.

PURCHASING ADMINISTRATION - Page 95

Senator Lamb asked Mr. Barrett if they needed \$1,000 in In-State Travel. Mr. Barrett said yes.

Senator Lamb asked Mr. Barrett to explain Other Government Services. Mr. Barrett said this is for payments made to General Services Accounting. Senator Gibson said this was in the other budget, not this one.

Senator Lamb asked if there was a way to cut this. Mr. Barrett said if one of the positions were cut in General Services Accounting, it would cut this back a little; but the amount would be negligible.

Senator McCorkle asked if the <u>Duplicating Copy</u> costs came out of the Record Management Services budget. Mr. Barrett said a portion of that was Record Management Services.

Senator Gibson asked if cutting <u>CDP services</u> had to be cut in its own budget or this one. Mr. Barrett said General Services have not been cut in the past. Senator Gibson said he was thinking of Data Processing. He asked if cuts were made there, would it affect all the agencies. Mr. Barrett said no. Reductions in Data Processing had to be made in the agency receiving the service. He said if he wanted to make a reduction in Data Processing for Purchasing, he will have to make the reduction here (Purchasing Budget), and that will be less income to Central Data Processing; and they will then cut back.

Senator Wilson asked why the recommendation is higher than the request. Mr. Barrett ansered that part is salary increase and part is the increase in group insurance.

Senator Wilson moved that the new positions be eliminated. Seconded by Senator McCorkle. Senators Lamb and Gibson voted no. Motion carried.

Senator Echols absent.

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Senator McCorkle moved that the Communications Expense be reduced by \$25,000.

Senator Wilson said he would rather make an across-the-board cut in this case. He asked Senator Lamb why he voted no on eliminating the new position. Senator Lamb said he thought it was a good budget and they needed everything in it.

Senator Wilson asked Mr. Sparks to comment on the budget. Mr. Sparks said the 2 positions bear strictly on volume and the Department needs the help.

Senator Gibson said the Legislature is constantly pressured to get rid of the Department, but it has demonstrated a substantial savings to the State. He said if this budget is hampered too much, it will increase the presure to bypass Central Purchasing.

Senator McCorkle moved that the Operating Expenditure be reduced by 7-1/2 percent.

Motion died.

Senator Gibson moved that this budget be approved.

Seconded by Senator Wilson.

Senator McCorkle voted no.

Motion carried.

Senator Echols absent.

SURPLUS PROPERTY SECTION - Page 98

Senator Gibson moved that this budget be approved.

Senator Glaser asked why they needed an appropriation with such a large Balance Forward. Mr. Barrett explained that the state funds were the state match for the commodity program on the Indian reservations.

Senator Lamb asked why this program was needed at a time when unemployment is low in Nevada. Mr. Barrett said this program was run by federal regulations. He said all but \$10,000 is federal money.

Senator Gibson said one year they cut the Commodity Food Program completely, and were back to Interim Finance to restore it.

Senator Lamb said he did not like to see it expand. Senator Jacobsen said he thought the expansion came from increased Senior Citizens' programs and large school populations.

Senator Jacobsen moved that this budget be approved.

Seconded by Senator Gibson.

Motion carried.

Senator Echols absent.

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NEVADA MAGAZINE - Page 112

Senator Wilson asked if the agency request presupposed a bimonthly edition. Senator Glaser said yes.

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 225 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto the provisions set forth as sections 2 and 3 of this act.

SEC. 2. 1. There is hereby created a revolving account for the office of secretary of state in the sum of \$1,500, which must be used for refunds of revenue and for no other purposes.

2. The secretary of state shall deposit the money in the revolving account in a bank qualified to receive deposits of public funds as provided by law and the deposit must be secured by a depository bond satisfactory to the state board of examiners.

3. The secretary of state or his designee may sign all checks drawn upon the revolving account.

4. Payments made from the revolving account must be promptly reimbursed from the appropriate revenue in the state general fund collected by the secretary of state and the claim for reimbursement must be processed and paid as other claims against the state are paid.

SEC. 3. Unless otherwise specifically provided by law, all fees collected by the secretary of state shall be deposited with the state treasurer for credit to the state general fund.

SEC. 4. NRS 78.755 is hereby amended to read as follows:

3 SEC. 2. 1. The secretary of state may purchase punchcard vote 4 recording devices and lease them to counties, giving priority to those 5 counties still using the paper ballots.

2. The secretary of state may pay for such devices purchased by him: (a) Out of any money specifically appropriated for that purpose by the legislature, or out of any surplus from the general operating funds of his office; or

(b) By causing the state board of examiners to borrow all or any portion of the purchase money from the Federal Government or any of its entities, any state or municipal government or any private lending institution, and issue special obligation bonds under the provisions of the State Securities Law. The bonds must be secured by a pledge of all gross revenues accruing from leases of the devices.

SEC. 3. 1. The secretary of state and each participating county shall enter a written agreement designated as "Lease of Equipment with Option to Purchase." A county may lease more than one device but each device must be leased under a separate agreement. Each agreement must provide in substance;

(a) That the device particularly described in the agreement is leased
 by the state, as lessor, to the county, as lessee, for a term of 2 years from
