### S.B. 317 - Creates fund for use by State agencies to carry into practical effect, ideas which will save money for the State (Attachment A).

Senator McCorkle said the bill should not create an expense; the only cost at most would be in the next biennium. He said money will come back to the State disproportionately greater in two years.

Senator Lamb questioned this bill as a priority.

Senator McCorkle said the money is not incentive money; it is to implement money-saving programs. Mr. Barrett remarked he thinks State agencies are already trying to be as economical and efficient as possible.

Senator Lamb said he did not think the bill would pass the legislature.

> Senator McCorkle moved to amend S.B. 317 to \$1,000,000.

Seconded by Senator Wilson.

Motion carried.

Senator McCorkle moved "Do Pass" on S.B. 317.

Seconded by Senator Jacobsen.

Senators Lamb and Gibson voted no.

Motion carried.

Senator Lamb announced he would file a minority report.

#### PREDATORY ANIMAL AND RODENT CONTROL COMMITTEE - Page 719

Senator Lamb reviewed the problem previously discussed with this program, stating that they reported 4,300 pelts, of which 12 were bobcats. He said this number of bobcats is much too low for a catch this size. He referred to a receipt from the Seattle Fur Exchange that shows that out of 70 pelts received, 17 were bobcats.

Senator Lamb reported that, after he mentioned there were furs in a warehouse in Ely during the last discussion of this matter, the furs in the warehouse disappeared.

Senator Lamb remarked that, during the meanwhile, Joe Miner, Administrator of the Predatory Control Program, has submitted a \$35,000 check.

Senator Lamb announced that he had this problem investigated by

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William Witte, Chief Investigator, Attorney General's Office. This report is confidential and a copy is not provided in these minutes. Senator Lamb read much of this information from the report into the record. This information can be found on Tape 1, 4-10-79, Senate Finance Committee, catalogued in the Research Library.

The report suggested that some pelts may be being stolen but there is no information as to who may be responsible. The report also described a pelt-logging procedure Mr. Miner has been requested to follow.

Senator Lamb said that Mr. Miner has reported that furs are not good after January. Senator Lamb said that furs are very good through February; recently Mr. Miner has agreed to save furs through March.

Senator Lamb submitted receipts for furs to illustrate the cost of coyote and bobcat furs (see Attachment B). He said he would like to choose a fair average cost of the 4,300 furs and reduce the budget according to the amount the Committee feels will be brought in to support the budget. According to Mr. Miner's information, a bad fur brings about \$30 to \$40.

Senator Wilson requested that the agency be brought back for a further hearing. Senator Jacobsen concurred.

Senator Glaser said it seems evident furs are being stolen and wondered if Mr. Miner could develop an incentive program for State trappers. Senator Wilson remarked that a monetary incentive would not cover the cost of stolen fur.

Senator Glaser commented that 4,300 pelts at \$50 a pelt, is \$215,000.

Senator Glaser moved that the General Fund be reduced by \$100,000 the first year, and \$200,000 the second year; and that these amounts be shown as income from Sales instead.

Seconded by Senator McCorkle.

Senator Wilson said since the budget is to be reduced, an audit should be required for the next trapping season. Senator Glaser suggested that the Committee write a letter of intent to Mr. Miner.

Senator Echols suggested that all General Fund money be withdrawn from this program. Senator Lamb said he wants to be fair to the program; he realizes some furs may be damaged.

Senator Glaser remarked that the peak trapping season is over and furs will not be taken again until next winter; they need to adjust the agency's budget according to when the agency can earn an income.

Senator Lamb called for a vote on the motion.

Motion carried.

Senator Lamb remarked that if all General Fund money were removed from this budget, predatory animal control would not be hurt. He said, due to the high cost of furs, many people are trapping privately. Senator Gibson said he does not think the budget should be maintained if private people are already doing the job of predatory animal control. Senator Glaser reported that many people are trapping privately in the Elko area, but that private trapping is dependent on the market value of furs.

Senator Jacobsen suggested that "Dutch" Borda come in to tes before the budget is further reduced.

A.B. 254 - Provides for purchase of land adjacent to purchasing warehouse. (Attachment C).

Senator McCorkle said the land should be purchased now if it must eventually be purchased. Senator Gibson said he thought it is a good investment.

Senator Gibson moved "Do Pass" on A.B. 254.

Seconded by Senator McCorkle.

Motion carried.

# S.B. 282 - Provides that payments made under Boulder Canyon Project Adjustment Act paid to Clark County. (Attachment D)

Senator Gibson explained that this is the payment that comes to the State from Boulder Dam in lieu of tax payment. He said the bill would transfer the money to Clark County and treat it as an ad valorem tax. He said he has not supported the bill in the past, but this bill gets the State out of the ad valorem tax.

Senator Wilson asked how the revenue is derived. Senator Gibson said it is a payment from the U.S. government to the State of Nevada.

Senator Wilson said there has always been a policy in Nevada that water is a State resource. He said it is a bad precedent for a resource such as water to be administered by political subdivisions and not the State.

Senator Wilson moved to indefinitely postpone <u>S.B. 282.</u>

Seconded by Senator Jacobsen.

Senator Echols voted no.

Motion carried.

## S.B. 22 - Provides means for veterans to obtain homes and farms. (Attachment E)

Senator Echols announced that amendments are coming on this bill.

Senator McCorkle said that yesterday in the Commerce and Labor Committee, a bill was passed giving savings and loan organizations authority to give long term loans on mobile homes, which is the missing link in the housing problem. He said with that bill S.B. 22 is not needed.

Senator Gibson said there may be some merit in looking into the State Housing financing law to see if some priority can be given veterans. He said such priorities exist for the elderly; many states provide assistance to veterans.

Bill held.

# S.B. 319 - Repeals requirement for counties to participate in payment of non-federal share of cost of certain child welfare services. (Attachment F).

Senator Gibson moved "Do Pass" on S.B. 319.

Seconded by Senator Wilson.

Motion carried.

Senator Glaser absent.

## S.B. 224 - Appropriation to department of parole and probation for employment of additional personnel. (Attachment G)

(S.B. 224 - bill action continued)

Senator McCorkle said the Committee reduced the number of employees from 38-1/2 to 28-1/2 people which is a 26 percent reduction; \$66,235 is 26 percent.

Senator McCorkle moved to amend <u>S.B. 224</u> to provide for salaries from May 1, 1979 rather than April 1, date originally planned for.

Seconded by Senator Gibson.

Motion carried.

## S.B. 222 - Appropriation to motor pool division for purchase of additional vehicles. (Attachment H)

Mr. Barrett said these vehicles are for the new positions in parole and probation and gaming.

Senator Lamb suggested the bill be held until the budget is voted on.

Bill held.

S.B. 213 - Appropriation to mental hygiene and mental retardation for automated system of management. (Attachment I)

Senator Gibson moved "Do Pass" on S.B. 213.

Seconded by Senator Glaser.

Senator Gibson said this is not for program evaluation; it is to carry out present needs for record keeping. Senator Gibson feels it is a needed efficiency.

Senator Lamb voted no.

Motion carried.

S.B. 181 - Removes prerequisites for withdrawal of certain judicial officers from public employee's retirement system. (Attachment J)

(Information on S.B. 181 is provided by Public Employees' Retirement System; see Attachment K.)

Senator Gibson said he is cautious about such actions. He said the State is eventually going to have to review judges' retirement system, because it is a non-contributory system which is creating problems in other states. Senator Gibson believes there is precedent for making this change.

Senator McCorkle said if there is a precedent, he is for the bill.

Senator McCorkle moved "Amend and Do Pass" S.B. 181 (as described in Attachment K).

Seconded by Senator Wilson.

Motion carried.

Senator Lamb absent.

S.B. 436 - Revises provisions on source of salary for district supervisor of water commissioners.

(Attachment L)

Senator Glaser introduced this bill. Mr. Sparks noted that the position in the bill remains unclassified.

Senator Glaser moved "Do Pass" on S.B. 436.

Seconded by Senator Jacobsen.

(Committee Minutes)

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(S.B. 436 - bill action continued)

Motion carried.

Senator McCorkle absent.

## S.B. 435 - Supplemental appropriation for support of State Board of Pardons Commission. (Attachment M)

Mr. Sparks remarked that this is not the Finance Committee's bill.

Senator Gibson moved to "Amend and Do Pass" S.B. 435 by transferring these funds out of the Supreme Court Budget.

Seconded by Senator Jacobsen.

Motion carried.

## S.B. 206 - Permits disabled persons to receive State supplementary assistance. (Attachment N)

John Duarte, State Welfare Division testified that people eligible for this assistance now receive a total income of \$189 from the federal government. He said the federal government may increase this amount to \$206.70 in the near future. This increase would not affect Senate Bill 206 at all; the supplement is paid on top of the federal payment.

Senator Lamb said he would be receptive to reducing the supplementary assistance slightly; but he feels these people really need help. They are people who cannot help themselves. Senator Gibson said he feels there is a rationale for giving them the amount specified in the bill because they would then be receiving the same benefits as the aged.

Senator McCorkle said he is willing to place the subject of <u>S.B. 206</u> at a higher priority than other State services but he stated he would like to take the money required for this program from some other programs. He said <u>S.B. 206</u> should have a high priority but he does not want to fund additional monies. He asked for specific recommendations of programs which could be reduced to save the amount of money required to make the supplement.

Senator Lamb said he is not opposed to taking money out of other budgets such as the Predatory Animal Control budget.

Senator Glaser asked if the State has the \$5,000,000 that <u>S.B. 206</u> will cost. Senator Lamb asked Senator Glaser if the handicapped are more important than the Vocational Education Bill for \$8,000,000. Senator Gibson remarked that <u>S.B. 206</u> is an ongoing program and incurs costs in the future.

Senator Gibson asked if the supplementary payments of \$43.25 per month and \$46.70 per month for each year of the biennium place the benefit at the same income as the aged receive. Mr. Duarte said yes.

Senator Gibson asked if there are possible savings by making the appropriation called for in <u>S.B. 206</u>. He said he has been told that by making this supplement, some people will be able to care for children at home rather than institutionalizing them. Mr. Duarte said he is not sure whether this would be valid in certain cases; he said most people, however, who come into this program, are usually self-sustained people.

Senator Gibson asked if totally and permanently disabled are under Title XIX medical care. Mr. Duarte said Title XIX pays for institution care for those who are institutionalized in nursing homes and intermediate care facilities.

Senator Gibson asked if these people still get the federal subsidy. Mr. Duarte said if their income is not over \$45, they receive a \$25 subsidy for personal incidental allowance within the facility.

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Senator Gibson asked if people are at home, are they eligible for only Title XIX funds. Mr. Duarte said that is correct. They do not receive Social Security Insurance if their income is not greater than \$189 per month.

Senator Gibson asked Mr. Duarte if he thinks \$40 will make much of a difference. Mr. Duarte answered that any added dollars benefit these recipients. He said these people are on fixed incomes and receive increases only through additional appropriations such as S.B. 206 provides.

Mr. Duarte reported that the State's portion of the bill is estimated at \$3,638,980 for the first year of the biennium, and \$4,420,000 the second year.

Senator Jacobsen moved "Do Pass" on S.B. 206.

Seconded by Senator Gibson.

Senator McCorkle voted no.

Motion carried.

#### PAROLE AND PROBATION - Page 511

Senator McCorkle moved that new positions be reduced from 38.5 to 28.5.

Mr. Barrett said these positions are needed because this area is growing; they are working much overtime and have a backlog of work. Senator Wilson said this relates to prison costs, and he does not think savings will be realized by reducing costs here. Senator Gibson said he can understand why they need additional clerical help.

Senator McCorkle withdrew his motion.

Senator Gibson moved that this budget be approved.

Seconded by Senator Wilson.

Motion carried,

Senator Jacobsen absent.

#### PAROLE AND PROBATION - CRIME COMMISSION GRANTS - Page 515

Senator Gibson moved that this budget be approved.

Seconded by Senator Wilson.

Motion carried.

Senator Jacobsen absent.

#### PAROLE BOARD - Page 516

Senator Gibson mentioned that the agency asked that their travel allowance be restored.

Mr. Sparks remarked that Longevity has been left out which they are entitled to which is \$300 the first year, and \$350 the second year.

Senator Glaser moved to add \$300 the first year, and \$350 the second year, for Longevity.

Seconded by Senator Echols.

Motion carried.

Senator Jacobsen absent.

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Senator Lamb remarked that In-State Travel seems high. Mr. Barrett said this estimate is probably too low. They have asked for a supplement and will probably spend \$10,000 this year.

Senator Gibson moved to increase In-State Travel to \$12,000 each year of the biennium.

Seconded by Senator Wilson.

Motion carried.

Senator Jacobsen absent.

Mr. Barrett explained that <u>Contract Services</u> pays for substitutes on the Board whenever matters involving a parolee are discussed which are familiar to Board members who are ex-parole officers.

Senator Glaser moved to amend Contract Services to \$1,500 each year of the biennium.

Seconded by Senator Gibson.

Senator Lamb voted no.

Motion carried.

Senator Jacobsen absent.

Senator Gibson moved that this budget be approved as amended.

Seconded by Senator Glaser.

Motion carried.

Senator Jacobsen absent.

### INVESTIGATION AND NARCOTICS-DEPARTMENT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSISTANCE -

Page 533

Mr. Sparks reminded the Committee about the number of vehicles in this budget.

Mr. Barrett remarked that some vehicles are confiscated during the trial of cases.

Senator Lamb suggested that autos can be repainted, instead of purchasing new ones each year. Senator Lamb read a list of vehicles owned by this program, which consisted largely of 1978 Fords and Mercury's. He said they should drive their cars over 60,000 miles as other State agencies do.

Senator Gibson suggested that if there were a pool of undercover cars, they could be exchanged between agencies. Mr. Barrett said Gaming has a number of undercover cars.

Mr. Barrett remarked that they are not trying to replace the entire fleet. They are asking for \$54,000. He said he would have to get more information to determine what the agency is buying with this money. Mr. Sparks said they would buy 15 the first year, and 19 the second.

Senator McCorkle moved to eliminate the \$54,000 for autos.

Senators Echols, Glaser and Wilson expressed concern for the safety of the undercover agents; they are involved in a high risk business. They suggested that a turnover in vehicles may be necessary.

Senator Lamb said he can understand purchasing some new cars but not all.

Mr. Barrett said he will have Mr. Calhoun to a future meeting to explain their use of vehicles.

Senator Echols said he would like to ask Mr. Calhoun if they have considered contracting with an auto agency to provide cars on a rotation basis.

Budget held.

CRIME COMMISSION - FEDERAL GRANTS - Page 539

Senator Glaser moved that this budget be approved.

Seconded by Senator Echols.

Senator McCorkle voted no.

Motion carried.

#### UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA SYSTEM

Mr. Barrett reminded the Committee that there is a one-shot appropriation to aid the Universities to make the recommended faculty reductions.

Senator Gibson said he is concerned about reducing faculty by attrition in the Engineering Department because they may lose their accreditation. Mr. Barrett said it was the Budget Office's intentions that positions be reduced where there is little demand, but not in areas where accreditation is an issue.

Mr. Barrett referred the Committee to correction sheets of the University System budgets (See <a href="Attachment O">Attachment O</a>). Mr. Sparks remarked, regarding the corrections, that these corrections amount to \$415,000 the first year, and \$473,000 the second year, if they are accepted by the Committee.

A general discussion ensued among Committee members regarding the University budget.

Mr. Barrett said the change in the definition of FTE from 16 credits to 15 credits, is a substantial advantage to the University. He said there would be an \$817,000 decrease in the University System's budget if 16 were now being used. He said if 16 had been used to calculate UNR's budget, it would have meant the reduction of 20 additional positions.

Mr. Barrett added that most corrections apply to Community College budgets, because an analyst erred in omitting the rural and health course factors.

#### UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA SYSTEM - Page 230.1

Mr. Barrett briefly reviewed his corrections in the University System Budgets (see Attachment O).

Senator Glaser moved to amend the University System budgets by adding Mr. Barrett's corrections which adds \$415,000 to the budgets the first year of the biennium, and adds \$473,000 the second year.

Seconded by Senator Gibson.

Motion carried.

Senator Lamb read a letter from the School of Medical Sciences which invited the Finance Committee to visit the Medical School.

Senator McCorkle led a discussion on whether or not to change the definition of FTE from 15 credit units to 16. Mr. Barretts explained that only undergraduates are counted as 15 to 1, not grauate students who are now allowed a ration of 8 to 1. Senator McCorkle said he felt the only reason the University wants to change the FTE definition to 15, is to justify staffing patterns. Mr. Barrett said part of their rationale for going to 15 credits was that declining or stable enrollments would require a further

reduction in professional staff if the 16 credit definition was kept. It softens the reduction in faculty. Senator McCorkle mentioned that he would like to change the ratio of graduate students who equal faculty members from 3 to 1 to 2 to 1. He described savings that would be realized by changing this ratio, and the definition of FTE. Mr. Barrett said these changes would affect all colleges.

Senator McCorkle moved to redefine FTE as 16 credits.

Seconded by Senator Echols.

Senator Echols said he feels there will be a continual decline in higher education. Senator Lamb said they anticipate an increase in enrollment due to population increase.

Senator Gibson said the overall recommendations should be considered. He said the overall recommendation represents a considerable belt-tightening for the University. The Governor's recommedation is considerably under what they requestd. He said he feels that Senator McCorkle's recommendation is too drastic to accomplish in a 2-year period. He said he believes that the University must shift gears, but he is concerned that basic degree programs would have to be curtailed. He said the University does not have the flexibility to make rapid adjustments due to tenure and other factors. Senator McCorkle said he spoke with certain Regents about reviewing the tenure system.

Senator McCorkle withdrew his motion.

Senator Gibson expressed concern that the Committee might sanction something which would jeopardize accreditation.

Senator Lamb recessed the meeting at 10:30 a.m.

Meeting reconvened at 3:00 p.m.

UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA SYSTEM ADMINISTRATION - Page 230.2

Senator Echols moved that this budget be approved.

No second.

Mr. Barrett said they are convinced of the value of the Community College Coordinator and other new positions.

Senator McCorkle moved to eliminate the architect.

No second.

Senator McCorkle said he feels this position duplicates service already provided by the Public Works Board.

Senator Wilson asked what the architect does in the Chancellor's Office. Mr. Barrett replied he coordinates all the capital construction for the University. He said the University and Public Works Board used to have problems over capital improvements at the University. Since the University obtained its own architect, there problems seem to have disappeared.

Senator McCorkle said he has talked with several contractors and they indicate they see no purpose for an architect working for the Chancellor's Office.

Senator Wilson asked Mr. Barrett if an architect is really needed. Mr. Barrett replied yes; that the University is continually designing and building.

Senator Gibson commented, regarding Page 230.4, that he does not feel the justification for the overhead expense is there. He said the State needs to guard against making this office a super bureaucracy on top of the administration of the campus.

#### (Univ. Nevada Administration budget - action continued)

Senator Gibson moved to reduce the State appropriation for the University of Nevada administration by 10 percent both years of the biennium.

Seconded by Senator McCorkle.

Motion carried.

Senators Jacobsen, Glaser absent.

#### UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA, LAS VEGAS - Page 230.6

Mr. Sparks summarized a handout submitted by UNLV. Senator Gibson remarked that he would like the 20 to 1 ratio maintained but said he would like the budget set so they would not have to reduce faculty. Mr. Sparks said that would cost about \$700,000. Just to maintain the existing work program would cost about \$600,000 plus raises, in addition to this amount.

Senator Gibson moved to restore the professional positions to 300.68 for each year of the biennium.

Seconded by Senator Wilson.

Senator Wilson said he would have them hold these positions until additional students cause them to be filled. Mr. Barrett remarked that this policy, if enacted for UNR, will be very expensive.

Senator Gibson said he is worried about the Universities' morale if faculty cuts are made. He added that cuts are often made of new faculty, who are often the best.

Senator McCorkle said there is general agreement that enrollment will not increase this year. He suggested an adjustment be made in faculty for the following year.

Senator Gibson said the one-shot which acts as a cushion for loss of faculty, would not be needed if his motion is accepted.

Senator Lamb called for a vote on the motion.

Senators Echols, McCorkle, and Lamb voted no.

Motion did not carry.

Senator Glaser, Jacobsen absent.

Meeting adjourned at 3:35 p.m.

AN ACT relating to state financial administration; creating a fund for use by state agencies to carry into practical effect ideas which will save money for the state; making an appropriation; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 353 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section which shall read as follows:

1. A fund to promote economy in government is hereby created as

an agency fund under control of the interim finance committee.

2. The head of any state agency may apply to the interim finance committee for an allocation from the fund for use by the agency in carrying out an idea whose practical application would eventually result in a saving of money by the state.

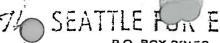
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3. If the interim finance committee determines that the idea is sound and likely to repay the money to be spent in carrying it out, the committee may make an allocation from the fund directly to the agency.

SEC. 2. There is hereby appropriated from the state general fund to the fund to promote economy in government the sum of \$2,000,000 for the biennium ending June 30, 1981. 12 13 14

AN ACT relating to state purchasing; providing for the purchase of land adjacent to the purchasing warehouse building in Las Vegas, Nevada, and for repayment of the purchase price; making an appropriation; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. NRS 333.121 is hereby amended to read as follows:
333.121 1. We recently testified before your Committee regarding SB 181. We expressed no position regarding the bill because it had not been considered by the Retirement Board. However, we indicated that we had assisted in drafting the present wording which would resolve the immediate concern for some judges who are members of our System. We discussed a letter from our Deputy Attorney General dated February 2, 1979, which expressed concern regarding the question of whether or not there was membership in the District Court Judges and Supreme Court Justices Retirement Systems and recommended instead a ninety day option for all District Court Judges and Supreme Court Justices to be allowed to withdraw from the System. At their meeting held February 28 through March 2, 1979, the Retirement Board adopted a motion to support SB 181 as amended to reflect the recommendation by Bill Isaeff that members of our System who are District Court Judges or Supreme Court Justices have the option, during a ninety day period, to withdraw from our System if they so desire without terminating employment with the provision that they not be allowed to reestablish credit for this service in the Public Employees Retirement System. Therefore, we have drafted a suggested amendment for your consideration and assistance.

Please be assured that we are available to discuss this matter with you and your Committee should you so desire.

Any Justice of the Supreme Court of District Judge who is a member of the System on July 1, 1979, may withdraw from membership by providing written notice to the Board of his decision to withdraw from the System and rely entirely upon the provisions of NRS 2.060 or NRS 3.090 for future pension benefits. Any such notice must be received by the Board on or before September 30, 1979. Upon receipt of notice of withdrawal, the System shall promptly refund all employee contributions credited to the individual account of the justice or judge. Any Justice of the Supreme Court or District Judge who exercises the option granted by this subsection is forever barred from reestablishing this service in the System. Any Justice of the Supreme Court or District Judge who does not exercise the option granted by this subsection must remain a member of the System until eligible to exercise the option granted in subsection 3.

#### Program Statement

The University of Nevada Las Vegas experienced a decline in enrollments in the fall of 1979. However, it is not felt that this necessarily indicates any continuing trend; enrollments at University of Nevada Las Vegas have remained relatively stable since 1975-76. For budgetary purposes, enrollments are projected to remain constant over the next biennium.

Revenues - It is recommended the University of Nevada Las Vegas be supported by the same types of revenue as in the past. The Social Work Grant has been removed to the University's estimative budget; the salaries of five professionals and one classified person have been removed from the regular budget and 70 full-time equivalent students associated with the Social Work Grant have been excluded from enrollment projections for both years of the biennium. No increases in tuition from the current level are recommended at this time.

#### Expenditures

The same 20 to 1 overall student/faculty ratio in instruction is recommended in this budget as is recommended in the University of Nevada Reno's budget; it is composed of a 19.5 student/faculty ratio for all programs except nursing, which is recommended at a 7.5 to 1 student/faculty ratio. The computation used to derive the number of faculty in instruction is as follows:

5,457 students of which 105 are nursing students 5,352 divided by 19.5 equals 274.46 faculty 105 divided by 7.5 equals 14.00 faculty

288.46 faculty divided by 10 equals 28.85 full-time graduate assistants divided by 3 equals 9.6 faculty equivalent graduate assistants. 288.46 faculty minus 9.6 faculty equivalent graduate assistants equals 278.85 faculty. 5,457 students divided by 278.85 faculty equals 19.75 faculty per student.

As with the University of Nevada Reno's budget, deans are excluded from instruction and placed in the functional area of academic support. The same ratios for the number of wage dollars per faculty and out-of-state travel dollars per faculty are recommended for the University of Nevada Las Vegas as are recommended for the University of Nevada Reno. One full-time equivalent graduate assistant is budgeted for each ten faculty and every 4.85 faculty generates one classified employee. Operating dollars per faculty reflect the University's request for fiscal year 1979-80 with a 7% increase for fiscal year 1980-81.

No new positions are recommended in other functional areas.

#### Program Statement

Enrollments at Clark County Community College are expected to increase by approximately 12.4% in 1979-80 and by almost 6% in 1980-81. While the universities have been experiencing declining enrollments, the community colleges have been growing.

Revenues - No receipts of federal vocational technical education funds are anticipated in the next biennium.

Expenditures - The recommended amounts for instruction were developed on the basis of a 24 to 1 student/faculty ratio for courses on the main campus of Clark County Community College and a 12 to 1 student/faculty ratio for courses taught in the outlying rural areas. The Dental Hygiene Program is recommended at a

6 to 1 student/faculty ratio while the Nursing Program is recommended at a 10 to 1 student/faculty ratio. Deans are excluded from the instructional portion of the budget and placed in academic support. The ratios used for support levels of instruction are shown at the beginning of the instruction area. The same support levels were used for all community colleges for wages per faculty, operating dollars per faculty, out-of-state travel per faculty, and faculty per classified positions. The net effect at Clark County Community College of the different student/faculty ratios in various programs is an overall student/faculty ratio of 20.9 for fiscal year 1979-80 and 20.8 for fiscal year 1980-81. The ratio of full-time to part-time faculty in instruction is recommended at 45% full-time, 55% part-time.

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#### Program Statement

For the last three years, the University of Nevada Reno has experienced declining enrollments. It is believed that this pattern is not an isolated anomolous situation, but rather part of a national trend. Because Washoe County and the communities surrounding the University of Nevada Reno are experiencing population increases, enrollments are projected to remain constant during the next biennium.

Revenues - It is recommended that the University of Nevada Reno be supported by the same types of revenue as in the past; the Social Work Grant has been removed to the University's estimative budgets. The salaries of the professional and classified persons paid for from the Social Work Grant have been excluded from this budget as well as the 13 full-time equivalent students generated by the program.

Non-resident tuition is recommended at the current level of \$1,500 per year per student.

### Expenditures

In instruction, the number of recommended faculty positions is generated from the number of projected net annual full-time equivalent students. The overall number of total students to total faculty is 20 to 1. This number represents a 19.5 to 1 student/faculty ratio in all programs except nursing, which is recommended at a 7.5 to 1 student/faculty ratio. Included in the overall 20 to 1 ratio is an equivalency ratio of graduate students to professional faculty for the purposes of generating student credits. Three full-time equivalent graduate assistants are considered to be equivalent to one full-time faculty member in the number of student credits generated. The specific method used to derive the number of faculty in instruction is as follows:

5,932 divided by 19.5 equals 304.21 faculty 80 divided by 7.5 equals 10.67 faculty

314.88 faculty divided by 10 equals 31.50 full-time graduate assistants divided by 3 equals 10.50 faculty equivalent graduate assistants. 314.88 faculty minus 10.50 faculty equivalent graduate assistants equals 304.38 faculty. 6,012 students divided by 304.38 faculty equals 19.75 faculty per student.

Support levels for the faculty are generated from the ratios appearing in the beginning of the instruction functions. Deans have been separated from the instruction function in the National Association of College and University Budget Officers formula and placed in academic support. Deans are therefore excluded from all ratios used in the instruction area. One full-time equivalent graduate assistant is budgeted for each ten faculty and every 4.9 faculty generates one classified employee.

Operating dollars per faculty reflect the University's request for fiscal year 1979-80 and a 7% increase for fiscal year 1980-81.

Wage dollars per faculty member are those authorized in 1978-79 with a 5.5% increase per year for each year of the biennium.

Out-of-state travel reflects \$50 for each faculty member.

No new positions are recommended in other functional areas.

#### **Expenditures**

Recommended amounts for salaries reflect a 0.50 full-time equivalent new professional position in the Seismological Laboratory.

In Extended Programs and Continuing Education, \$50,000 in operating has been recommended for each year of the biennium to assist in the teaching of upper division and graduate courses in rural areas.

#### Program Statement

Enrollments at Western Nevada Community College are projected to increase by 10% for each year of the forthcoming biennium.

Revenues - No federal vocational-technical education funds are anticipated in the next biennium.

#### Expenditures

In the instructional area, credits generated on the main campus are recommended at a 24 to 1 student/faculty ratio while those generated on the Carson campus are recommended at a 20 to 1 student/faculty ratio. Courses taught in the outlying rural areas are recommended at a 12 to 1 student/faculty ratio. Both LPN and RN nursing courses are recommended at a 10 to 1 student/faculty ratio. The net overall student/faculty ratio recommended for Western Nevada

Community College is 19.6 for both years of the biennium. The mix of full-time to part-time faculty is 45% and 55% respectively, the same as is budgeted for Clark County Community College. Two new deans are recommended in the area of academic support to handle the increased student load at the Carson campus. An additional professional position appears in the President's Office; this position originally existed in the Office of the President of the Community College Division. Expenditures for utilities are recommended at a 24% increase over actual expenditures for 1977-78 for the first year of the biennium; for the second year of the biennium, utilities are recommended at a 130% increase over the first year. This increase reflects the planned addition of 120,000 new square feet to Western Nevada Community College facilities, 100,000 new square feet on the northern campus and 20,000 new square feet on the southern campus. The recommendation of 8.5 new janitorial positions in the second year of the biennium is also due to this increase in available space.

### Program Statement

Enrollments at Northern Nevada Community College are projected to increase by 10 full-time equivalent students each year.

Revenues - Federal funds for vocational-technical education are not anticipated during the next biennium.

#### Expenditures

Recommendations in instruction for Northern Nevada Community College represent an overall student/faculty ratio of 15.3 each year of the biennium with a ratio of full-time to part-time faculty of 54% to 46%. The ratios used to develop the overall student/faculty ratio were a 12 to 1 student/faculty ratio for instruction in outlying rural areas and a 10 to 1 student/faculty ratio for the Nursing Program. The Nursing Program at Northern Nevada Community College was initiated by members of the community who were interested in training nurses for the local hospital. One full-time faculty person was added to teach and administer the Nursing Program. The faculty/classified ratio, wage dollars/faculty ratio, operating dollars/faculty ratio and out-of-state travel/faculty ratio recommended are the same as those recommended for Western Nevada and Clark County Community Colleges. Except in instruction, positions are recommended at the same levels as were authorized in the previous biennium.
