S.B. 371 - Provides for programs of community education.

Ted Sanders, Jim Costa and Jerry Nielsen testified on behalf of this bill. The cost of this bill would be \$350,000 a year. Mr. Sanders, Superintendent of Public Instruction, testified that the Department of Education favors this bill. Mr. Sanders stated these programs include, in some schools, extensive recreational programs, adult basic education programs, senior citizen programs, etc.

Senator McCorkle asked why this bill requires a coordinator. Mr. Nielsen, who works directly with this program, stated the need for a coordinator is essential for proper distribution of monies, and to bring the programs to the attention of the people.

Ms. Carol Barrell, of the City of Las Vegas testified in favor of the community education bill. She said that presently the two community schools in Clark County have 400 students each day, with a total enrollment of 2,000 students each 8-week session. They range in age from 3 years old on up. Between 85 and 115 classes are offered at each school each 8-week session. In response to the advisory board and students' needs and desires, the schools are no longer offering recreational programs. Instead they are working with other entities to integrate and bring services to the neighborhoods. The have such programs as those sponsored by the Childrens' Behavioral Services, classes by the fire department, and alcohol and drug Other programs have been designed for special populations such as creative dramatics for the blind, sign language for the deaf, exercise for senior citizens, gymnastics for the handicapped, remedial reading and writing.

Mr. Sanders, Dr. Earnhart, and Shirley Wedow agreed that this was not one of the top priorities of education programs such as special education.

Senator Glaser moved to indefinitely postpone S.B. 371.

Seconded by Senator Gibson.

Motion carried.

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S.B. 236 - Makes various changes to laws regulating gaming.

Roger Trounday, Director, and Jack Stratton, Gaming Control, spoke on behalf of this bill. Mr. Trounday presented the Committee with following change: Page 12, section 10, paragraph 5, line 37 should be amended to read as follows:

"Expenditures from the revolving account may not exceed the amount authorized by the legislature in any one fiscal year. . ."

Mr. Trounday said the appropriation on page 17, line 41 is not necessary. He said Mr. Daykin feels they need an appropriation from the General Fund to be deposited in the chairman's revolving fund. Mr. Trounday doesn't feel they need that appropriation because the bill does nothing more than increase the amount that can be drawn out of the appropriation which the legislature gives them. It is not asking for additional funds. The increase from the \$3,000 to the \$10,000 provides for a larger amount to be withdrawn at a given time; and the total will not exceed the \$30,000 which they requested on page 606 of the budget document.

Mr. Barrett agreed with Mr. Trounday; the \$3,000 came from their budget in the first place.

Senator Wilson recommended deleting the appropriation. Senator Gibson recommended substituting \$10,000 for \$3,000 and leaving the existing wording in. Mr. Sparks was directed to get the necessary amendments written.

A.B. 303 - Appropriation to Nevada historical society for preservation of historic photographs.

Dr. John Townley, Director, Nevada Historical Society, supported this bill. He stated they have 150,000 photographs donated to the society over the past years and there are 20,000 that are fading. They can use an ultra-violet light to produce a working negative for reprints.

Senator Wilson moved "Do Pass" A.B. 303.

Seconded by Senator McCorkle.

Motion carried.

A.B. 501 - Provides for salary of state industrial attorney.

State Industrial Attorney Patty Becker testified for this bill. This salary would be paid for out of the NIC fund, and her salary is now \$26,125.

Senator McCorkle moved "Do Pass" A.B. 501.

Seconded by Senator Wilson.

Motion carried .

A.B. 294 - Appropriation to drivers' license division for employment of additional personnel.

Bart Jacka, Director, Department of Motor Vehicles, stated this is a request for an appropriation of \$81,938 for the Division. At the time the budget was prepared by the past administration, additional personnel was approved by the Budget Division. It was decided that a one-shot appropriation would be necessary to catch up the backlog that exists in the Drivers' License Division.

Senator Gibson moved "Amend and Do Pass" A.B. 294 by making the appropriation from the General Fund.

Seconded by Senator Wilson.

Motion carried .

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A.B. 576 - Requires attorney general to charge state agencies not supported from state general fund for services rendered.

Larry Struye, Chief Deputy Attorney General spoke in favor of the bill resulting from the presentation of Attorney General Bryan to Assembly Ways and Means and Senate Finance Committees. At the present time, there is a statute (NRS 228.150) which prohibits the Attorney General from receiving any fee for services required by law.

George T. Bennett, Executive Secretary, State Board of Pharmacy, stated that this bill does not state an hourly fee, so they don't know what the cost will be. They used their Deputy Attorney General for approximately 8 to 10 hours per week and paid him a fee of \$50. It would have cost the board \$20,000 for outside legal services. He stated it would restrict their normal operations if the charge is excessive.

Senator Wilson moved "Amend and Do Pass" A.B. 576.

Seconded by Senator Echols.

Motion carried.

S.B. 363 - Extends allowance for mileage of witnesses.

Sam Mamet, representing Clark County, stated this is not legislation from Clark County; but he was asked to be available in case any questions came up. The fiscal impact would be minimal; instead of paying witnesses just one way, they would make it a round trip.




