Dr. Crowley testified that the initial recommendation was that both universities would be cut by the number of faculty vacancies. The Assembly's proposal is that they be reduced by 11 vacancies the first year and 7 vacancies the second year. The universities would reduce their budgets by the remaining reductions recommended by the Governor, divided by 2. At UNR the number is about 16, at UNLV it's about 8 faculty. One justification for the Assembly's proposal is that it would make it easier to fire tenured faculty. Dr. Crowley said this is not necessarily true, explaining the difficult procedure necessary to fire tenured faculty. He said that even if removing tenured faculty were successful, they are more likely to be the younger tenured faculty.

Senator Lamb suggested that President Crowley talk to both Committees in a joint session later today.

<u>AB 417</u> - Increases salaries of employees of State of Nevada in classified service. (Attachment A)

Ernest Newton said there is a problem in that competition with industry for employees is great up to about \$14,000 to \$16,000 year salaries. Private industry has a difficult time competing with government for employees at the lower ranges of income. The situation is stable from about \$14,000 to \$20,000 a year salaries. But above \$20,000, private industry can hire state employees without any trouble; because private industry pays more for professional people.

Senator Lamb said Mr. Newton is probably referring to the Finance Committee's discussion of giving across-the-board raises.

<u>AB 474</u> <u>Makes fiscal changes to Public Employees</u> Retirement Act. (Attachment B)

Vernon Bennett presented possible amendments to <u>AB 474</u> for the Finance Committee's approval (<u>Attachment C</u>).

Senator Wilson asked what "holding oneself ready for work" means. Mr. Bennett replied this is "standby".

Mr. Bennett said their original request was amendment no. 1.

Senator Gibson commented that returning to work after regular working hours is another definition of overtime, which is prohibited. He said he does not understand what the people who want this are really

after. Senator Gibson said he knows they want credit for hours they worked which were not in the regular work routine. Mr. Bennet explained that holiday pay is a concern to all workers. Standby and recall pay is a concern of policemen and firemen. He said recall pay is very similar to overtime, which is a problem they cannot resolve. Mr. Bennett said the reason the Board went along with holiday and standby is that it is applicable to everyone.

Senator Gibson remarked that overtime should not be approved under any condition. He asked if Mr. Bennett can state the cost of recall pay. Mr. Bennett said no; it is an individual thing.

Senator Gibson said he would prefer the second option under amendment A.1, omitting the word "recall". His rationale is that other retirement systems have gotten into trouble by giving certain benefits to public service employees.

Senator Gibson moved to Amend <u>AB 474</u> by approving the second alternative under A.1 (<u>Attachment C</u>) and removing the word "recall".

Seconded by Senator McCorkle.

Motion carried.

Senator Echols absent.

Mr. Bennett explained amendment B (Attachment C).

Mr. Sparks described this bill. The Committee discussed longevity pay. Senator McCorkle remarked that this amount is not enough to provide incentive to stay on the job; which is the purpose of longevity pay.

Mr. Barrett said this bill is part of the negotiated pay package with state employees. He said they feel there is some benefit to increasing it to 20 years. Senator Jacobsen stated that if an employee has stayed 17 years, he will stay 20, without incentive pay. Senator McCorkle remarked that due to the economic crisis, this program, which is not essential, should be cut.

Senator Lamb called for a second vote on the motion.

Senators Lamb, Gibson, Glaser voted no.

Motion carried.

AB 197 Changes allowances for subsistence and travel expenses of State officers and employees. (Attachment E)

Senator Wilson asked if the amount in this bill will meet employee expenses. Mr. Barrett said yes; he thinks that someone can, in this state, get 3 reasonable meals and lodging for less than \$20, so \$40 should certainly meet their expenses.

Senator Wilson asked what is the average expenditure of an employee who stays overnight in Las Vegas. Mr. Barrett said he does not know. He said people are spending something more than \$30; which includes \$17.50 for a room, but it is difficult to find a room at this cost in Las Vegas.

Senator Wilson said if people are spending more than \$30, it is difficult to say that \$40 will meet their expenses. Mr. Barrett said this is something they did not negotiate.

Senator Lamb suggested that most rooms cost \$20 to \$22. Mr. Barrett said his office took a survey in December and it is difficult to find a room in Nevada for less than \$22; \$24 is about average. He said they allow up to \$50 expense, without an explanation, for rooms out of state.

Senator Wilson asked if 19 cents is a reasonable mileage allowance. Mr. Barrett replied, in view of rising gasoline prices, it may not be.

Senator Wilson moved "Do Pass" AB 197.

Seconded by Senator Jacobsen.

Motion carried,

<u>AB 24</u> <u>Creates risk management division in department</u> of administration. (Attachment F)

Senator Gibson said the money is already in the budget for this. Mr. Barrett said it is for one person and half a secretary. He said he hopes it can be increased by half a secretary from his office.

Senator Lamb said, in view of the current energy program, this Commission might be helpful.

Senator Wilson said he is not fully in favor of creating this Commission, but he is willing to support it as the Governor's priority. He suggested amending the bill by changing the word "create" to "recommend" to assure the Commission would not be jurisdictional, on page 2, line 50. Senator Gibson concurred.

SECTION 1. 1. The Commission on the Future of Nevada, consisting of 25 members appointed by the governor, is hereby created within the office of the governor. 2. The governor shall appoint:

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(a) One member from each region designated in this subsection from among persons nominated by the governing bodies of the local govern-ments within that region. The regions of the state for the purpose of appointing members to the commission are designated as follows:

 (1) Region 1 consists of Carson City and the counties of Churchill, Douglas, Lyon and Storey;

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 321 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto the provisions set forth as sections 2 to 9, inclusive, of this act. SEC. 2. The legislature finds that:

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11 12 1. The State of Nevada has a strong moral claim upon the public land retained by the Federal Government within Nevada's borders because:

(a) On October 31, 1864, the Territory of Nevada was admitted to statehood on the condition that it forever disclaim all right and title to unappropriated public land within its boundaries;

(b) From 1850 to 1894, newly admitted states received 2 sections of each township for the benefit of common schools, which in Nevada amounted to 3.9 million acres;

(c) In 1880 Nevada agreed to exchange its 3.9-million-acre school grant for 2 million acres of its own selection from public land in Nevada 13 14 15 held by the Federal Government;
