A.B. 796 - Makes various changes in law relating to taxation of sheep.

Senator Glaser explained that an industry representative was in Carson City last Friday when this bill was first scheduled for hearing. Because that meeting was cancelled and the representative could not attend today's meeting, Senator Glaser spoke on the bill

Senator Glaser explained that the bill was requested by the Woolgrowers Assocation, and it would raise the tax on the sheep in order to promote the industry.

Senator Sloan moved that A.B. 796 be passed out of committee with the recommendation: Do pass.

Seconded by Senator Faiss.

A.J.R. 36 - Urges United States Fish and Wildlife Service to abandon certain projects which use large amounts of water from Truckee River.

Assemblyman Rusk explained that this bill would ask the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to stop using large amounts of water from the reservoir to cool down the fishes to encourage spawning.

AN ACT relating to the Nevada Tahoe regional planning commission; providing for the extension of its powers and duties under additional circumstances; making a conditional appropriation; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. NRS 278.024 is hereby amended to read as follows: 278.024 1. In the region of this state for which there has been created by NRS [278.702 to 278.770, inclusive,] 278.780 to 278.828, inclusive, and sections 7 to 14, inclusive, of this act, a regional planning agency, the powers conferred by NRS 278.010 to 278.630, inclusive, upon any other authority are subordinate to the powers of such regional planning agency, and may be exercised only to the extent that their exercise does not conflict with any ordinance or plan adopted by such regional planning agency. The powers conferred by NRS 278.010 to 278.630, inclusive, shall be exercised whenever appropriate in furtherance of a plan adopted by the regional planning agency.

2. Upon the adoption by a regional planning agency created by NRS [278.702 to 278.770, inclusive,] 278.780 to 278.828, inclusive, and sections 7 to 14, inclusive, of this act, of any regional plan or interim plan, any plan adopted pursuant to NRS 278.010 to 278.630, inclusive, shall cease to be effective as to the territory embraced in such regional or interim plan. Each planning commission and governing body whose previously adopted plan is so affected shall, within 90 days after the effective date of the regional or interim plan, initiate any necessary procedure to revise its plan and any related zoning ordinances which affect adjacent territory.

SEC. 2. NRS 278.792 is hereby amended to read as follows:

AN ACT relating to animals; providing for the liability of dog owners and certain counties for injury to or death of livestock in certain circumstances; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 575 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto the provisions set forth as sections 2 to 5, inclusive, of this act.

SEC. 2. As used in sections 3 to 5, inclusive, of this act, "livestock"

1. All animals of the bovine, caprine, equine, ovine and porcine species; and

SEC. 3. 1. If a dog chases, worries, injures or kills any livestock on the land of any person other than land which is owned or leased by the owner of the dog, the dog may be killed by the owner of the livestock.

2. The owner of a dog which is killed pursuant to subsection 1 may not bring an action for damages against the person who killed the dog.

SEC. 4. 1. The owner or possessor of any dog which worries, injures or kills any livestock on the land of another is liable to the owner of the livestock for double the amount of his actual damages.

2. In any action to recover damages the plaintiff does not have to show that the owner or possessor of the dog knew of any particular propensity of the dog.

19 SEC. 5. In counties which collect fees for the issuance of dog license 20 tags:

Those fees must be deposited into a separate account in the general fund of the county and may be used only to pay damages to the owners of any livestock which are injured or killed by dogs whose owners are unknown. The liability of a county is limited by the amount in the account.

AN ACT relating to animals; making various changes in the law relating to the taxation of sheep; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. NRS 562.170 is hereby amended to read as follows: 562.170 1. The boards of county commissioners of the several counties, at the time of their annual levy of taxes, must levy the rate of tax fixed by the board, as provided for in NRS 562.160, not to exceed the equivalent of [8] 18 cents per head on all sheep. [assessed by the taxing authorities of the various counties for the year concerned.]

2. The tax [shall] must be collected as other taxes are collected and paid in full to the state treasurer, who shall keep the [same] money in a separate fund to be known as the sheep inspection fund. The sheep inspection fund [shall] must be made available and disbursed by the proper state officials upon request of the board for the purposes provided for in this chapter.

3. At the end of each fiscal year the balance of the sheep inspection fund may not exceed an amount equivalent to 6 cents per head of all sheep.

Sec. 2. NRS 562.210 is hereby amended to read as follows:

562.210 1. The board shall have power to do all things it may consider necessary to may encourage, promote, advance and protect the sheep interests of the state, and may, directly or indirectly, by expenditure, or by payment or otherwise to any association formed for any such purposes or objects, pay annually, out of the sheep inspection fund, for any enumerated purposes, not to exceed the equivalent of 2 10 cents of the levy assessed pursuant to NRS 562.170.

ASSEMBLY JOINT RESOLUTION—Urging the United States Fish and Wildlife Service to abandon certain projects which use large amounts of water from Truckee River.

WHEREAS, The population of the Truckee Meadows area which includes the cities of Reno and Sparks and nearby communities is rapidly growing; and

WHEREAS, This increase in population means a greater demand for

WHEREAS, There is a limited water supply in the area; and

WHEREAS, The area has not recovered from a drought in 1976 and 1977; and

WHEREAS, The limited amount of available water is, therefore, a precious resource which should not be wasted in any way; and

Whereas, The United States Fish and Wildlife Service is engaged in programs which use 1,200 acre-feet of water a day to cool the Truckee River and to aid the Lahontan cutthroat trout and cui-ui suckers in Pyramid Lake to spawn; and

WHEREAS, The success of those programs is, at best, questionable; and

WHEREAS, The water used by the United States Fish and Wildlife
Service is being taken from the same reservoirs which provide water
to the people of the Truckee Meadows area; and

WHEREAS, While the legislature of this state recognizes the environmental importance of the federal projects, it nonetheless feels that the people should be given priority to the water; now, therefore, be it
