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Mr. Sparks explained Exhibit C, a letter from Linda Ryan, Director of CSA, to the Committee.

Mrs. Ryan came before the Committee and testified that as to her support for the continuation of this program. She Senate Committee on Finance May 22, 1981

testified as to the necessity to continue this program until they have completed their program with the rural communities on the impact of the MX Missile Project. She said that if they were allowed to complete this study, it would take until, at the outside, June of 1982 to complete.

Mr. Sparks asked if there would be any more Federal monies being provided in the near future if the CSA were not to take advantage of what they are being offered presently.

Mr. Ryan replied that there would not be any more Federal funds for this.

Mr. Sparks asked if the program, upon the curtailment of Federal funds, would simply self-destruct.

Mrs. Ryan replied that it would.

Senator Echols referenced the Committee to Exhibit C, paragraph 4, and asked Mrs. Ryan to explain what the CSA means by that statement.

Mrs. Ryan stated that the rural communities are being supplied with guidelines as to what kind of information to compile for the CSA, and the CSA is supplying the funds to do so, but the CSA itself is not directly involved with the compilation of this information. She further amplified by giving the Committee examples of the types of information requests being made by the CSA for these impact studies.

RE: 1981-83 OPERATING BUDGET

Dear Ron:

The Ways and Means Committee's recommendation to eliminate our <u>only</u> staff electrical engineering position and to further reduce our 1982-83 Operating Budget by \$125,878 will result in the following adverse affects:

1. Eliminate Electrical Engineer: eliminate any possibility for "in-house" design: eliminate capability of checking consulting electrical engineering work; increase consulting engineering costs; eliminate providing electrical engineering services to institutions and agencies; curtail in-house master planning as related to power, signal, fire alarm and communication systems and curtail staff construction inspections.

The proposed \$150,000 prison planning program will be impacted since we will have no alternative other than increasing the consulting services to replace Board capability on electrical matters. The staff engineer is needed to estimate electrical costs, inventory electrical installations, evaluating expansion capabilities and adequacy of existing systems and to review consultant recommendations.

As indicated in our budget presentation, we plan to update institutional master plans for the NYTC, NGTC, Community Colleges, Parks & Forestry facilities, Capitol Complex and Las Vegas Administrative Complex in 1982. The engineer would have a role in each of these planning programs.

2. Reduce the 1982-83 Operating Budget by \$125,878: This will require a substantial reduction in staff. I have advised Ways and Means that I would propose to transfer the Chief Inspector and Assistant Chief Inspector out of the operating budget and into the inspection budget. This will obviously impact that budget and necessitate additional fund transfers from construction. The further reductions of one professional position (architect or engineer), a draftsman and a clerical position will have an adverse affect on our ability to accomplish the existing and proposed Capital Improvement Program.

As I advised the Committee in our budget presentation, I do not recommend reducing staff in the forthcoming biennium. There are simply too many costly and complicated projects and planning programs to complete with what is already a minimum staff. If, however, the 1983-85 CIP is at a low level, the Board is committed to budget reduction.

Therefore, I urge you and your committee to reconsider restoration of this budget back to its original amount.



Dear Bill:

Reference is made to your April 7 letter concerning action by the Ways and Means Committee on the State Public Works Board Operating Budget.

By now, you have received a copy of my letter to Chairman Bremner which notes that it will be extremely difficult if not impossible for the Board to function without an Electrical Engineer. I should note that the position of Mechanical-Electrical Engineer you refer to has been changed to Electrical Engineer by Personnel. That information had been previously conveyed to Judy.

If we are forced to reduce our budget by 20% in FY 82-83, it would be necessary to reduce personnel, since 83.4% of our Budget is salary.

Subject to the approval of the Board, I would prefer to transfer the Chief Inspector and the Assistant Chief Inspector out of our operating budget and into the inspection budget. Their salary and travel would then be paid with project funds. Under this scheme, it would also be necessary to terminate one Draftsman, an Architect or the only Civil/Structural Engineer and one clerical position.

As I noted in my letter to Mr. Bremner, I do not recommend reducing the staff in the forthcoming biennium. There are simply too many costly and complicated structures to complete with what is already a minimum staff. As I told the Committee, if the 1983 program is at a low level, we certainly can reduce our budget at that point in time. I am therefore requesting the Committee to re-open our budget to reconsider these problems.

1981-1983 OPERATING BUDGET

Dear Assemblyman Bremmer:

I have been advised of the Committee's decision to eliminate the Board's only staff Electrical Engineer position and to reduce the 1982-1983 operating budget by an additional 20%.

The elimination of the Electrical Engineer position will very seriously affect the Boards' ability to complete current projects satisfactorily and cause the loss of all in-house design capability.

While I would estimate that at least 75% of all Capital Improvements involve electrical engineering, the position also provides design, maintenance and operating assistance to most State institutions and many State agencies.

The position has been vacant since last October, but through no fault of the Board. While it has been vacant, we have attempted to meet the needs with architects and private engineering consultants. This is neither satisfactory or economical. For the Board to fulfill its statutory obligations satisfactorily, it must have in-house capability in architecture, mechanical, electrical, civil and structural engineering.

The decision to reduce the Boards' 1982-1983 operating budget, which has "aiready been cut by the Governor, will most seriously affect both current and proposed programs. To realize such a reduction, it will be necessary to eliminate at least 4 staff positions as well as commensurate reductions in operating costs. Since it now apppears that in addition to the 1981-1983 CIP, over \$80,000,000 in current projects will be under construction during the next biennium, a loss of 1/4 of the professional and technical staff will obviously delay and very seriously affect the ability to complete those improvements satisfactorily. Most public works organizations with which I am familiar would require staffs 3 to 4 times the current size of the Boards' to accomplish a program of such similar magnitude.

SUBJECT: 1981-1983 OPERATING BUDGET

I have been advised that the Ways and Means Committee has closed the State Public Works Boards' 1981-1983 Operating Budget with a recommendation that the vacant Electrical Engineer position be eliminated and that there be a 20% reduction in the Boards' Operating Budget for the second year of the 81-83 biennium.

As indicated by the attached, I have advised the Committee Chairman that the elimination of our one Electrical Engineer position, which has been vacant for 6 months through no fault of this office, will create extreme problems in the project administration, eliminate any possibility for in-house design and adversely affect institutional maintenance and operating programs.

Under the current schedules, the two Pavilions, the Business and Hotel Administration Building at UNLV, the Mackay School of Mines at UNR, the Learning Resource Center at the Clark County Community College, the EPA Facility at UNLV, the Stead Armory and the Medical School will all still be under construction during the next biennium. The satisfactory completion of this work, plus any additional work authorized by this Session of the Legislature, will require a complete and hard working staff for the 2 year period.

Attached is a copy of the membership of the Ways and Means Committee. I would urge you to contact them and request that the Boards' budget be reopened to reconsider a decision that could be most serious. Enc.(2)
