SENATOR JACOBSEN MOVED TO INTRODUCE BILL DRAFT REQUEST #31-1948.(SB, 657)

SENATOR ECHOLS SECONDED THE MOTION.

THE MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

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THE COMMITTEE ELECTED AS A WHOLE BODY NOT TO INTRODUCE BILL DRAFT REQUEST #S16-91.

Mr. Sparks told the committee that there was a letter of intent forwarded to the Desert Research Institute regarding their wind energy program in 1979, and that program is no longer receiving federal funds; therefore, the State appropriations for last year and this year will revert to the General Fund. He indicated that the appropriation from last year has already reverted, and they are holding the appropriation from this year until the outcome of the letter is determined. He also indicated that the committee acted on this matter previously but, were awaiting receipt of this letter.

Senator Gibson noted that all that would be necessary would be to formally acknowledge on the record the receipt of this letter of intent; (please see Exhibit D).

Mr. Sparks then handed another letter to the committee and explained that this letter was sent to the committee from S. Barton Jacka, Director of the Department of Motor Vehicles regarding the problems that they are encountering with the insurance for mandatory insurance program and the increase in registration costs for vehicles in Carson City, (please see <u>Exhibit E.</u>).

SENATOR ECHOLS SECONDED THE MOTION.

THE MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

A discussion ensued regarding Lynch Communications and the ramifications of the action necessary with regard to the cancellation of the contract that the State of Nevada held with this company.

Senator McCorkle said that all the evidence that has been presented to him clearly supports the fact that the County of White Pine is well able to do without this four million dollars.

Senator Gibson noted, thought, that Whie Pine has already encumbered some expenses in preparing the site for the construction project as proposed by Lynch Communications. He said that they have already installed utility outlets and such.

Senator McCorkle concurred that they should be reimbursed for that expenditure but added that the balance should revert to the General Fund.

Mr. Sparks suggested that the Interim Finance Committee take this up next week and determined, with the help of Lynch Communications, exactly what the company has expended in trying to compjy with some of the necessary start-up requirements they accomplished prior to the cancellation of their contract.

Senator Gibson suggested that this money might be allocated to the Kennedy Sky-lites project in order to prevent any more costly delays being incurred by them.

The committee agree with this suggestion.

There being no further business, the meeting was recessed at 9:34 a.m.

Dear Senator Lamb & Assemblyman Bremner:

It is the intention of Pacific Western Systems, Inc. to enter into an agreement with U.N.R., Desert Research Institute for the installation and development of a Wind Powered generating system on the top of Winnemucca Mountain.

It is the intention of Pacific Western Systems, Inc. to furnish the following:

- 1. Site for the installation.
- 2. Power as required.
- 3. Technical assistance for the transfer and installation of wind generator.
- 4. Mechanical fabrication as required for development of the system.
- 5. Use of other facilities as Pacific Western now owns on mountain top such as power lines, water lines, etc., as might be utilized in the installation.
- D.R.I. to supply the following:
 - 1. Instrumentation for the collection of scientific data as might be required.
 - 2. Scientific and Engineering guidance.
 - 3. Such hardware as now exists.
 - 4. Whatever supervision that might be required in the dismantling and re-assembly of existing generator.

For the purpose of evaluating in kind contributions, Pacific Western values their labor at \$35.00 per hour and the use of Pacific Western trucks and equipment at \$1.00 per mile for large truck and 50¢ per mile for pick-up, suburban, etc. Pacific Western agrees to provide in kind matching effort up to \$35,000.

We hope this defines our intentions and agreement as it is now understood.

Pacific Western would like to explore licensing rights for the manufacturing of this equipment, should it demonstrate commercial possibilities.

BUDGET EXPLANATION

This budget is based on proposed legislation which would require a random sampling of up to 10% of the vehicle owners to see that they actually have insurance in force. A certified letter and a verification form would be sent to the registrant. The filled out verification forms from the registrant would be sent to the appropriate insurance companies. The insurance companies would return those verification cards which did not reflect policies in force. Non responses from registrants and returns from insurance companies would be turned over to the appropriate District Attorneys for prosecutions.

SALARIES:

We believe that four people will be necessary to make this project effective, handling up to 5,000 certification requests per month.

OPERATING EXPENSE:

SUPPLIES - Heavy first year to set up the required stock of supplies and expendables.

POSTAGE - All mail must be sent out certified in order to make the program function. Delivery receipts will be part of the evidence to be turned over to the District Attorney.

FORMS - This category will provide the continuous form letters, certification forms, suspension notices and D.A. notices.

DATA PROCESSING - This category will provide one computer terminal and related computer costs for random selection of names for sampling. Terminal will also be used to suspend registration for the uninsured.
