MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON HUMAN RESOURCES AND FACILITIES

SIXTY-FIRST SESSION NEVADA STATE LEGISLATURE March 10, 1981

The Senate Committee on Human Resources and Facilities was called to order by Chairman Joe Neal at 8:04 a.m., Tuesday, March 10, 1981, in Room 323 of the Legislative Building, Carson City, Nevada. Exhibit A is the Meeting Agenda. Exhibit B is the Attendance Roster.

SENATE BILL NUMBER 324 (EXHIBIT C)

Mr. Robert Forbuss, Vice President, Clark County School Board said the members of the board are required to attend as many as three meetings per month. He said these same members are assigned to committees which require a great amount of time each month. Mr. Forbuss said he feels the salary increase is warranted due to the increased amount of time spent by members as well as the rising rate of inflation.

Senator Kosinski asked Mr. Forbuss if the bill had been originated from the state school boards association.

Mr. Forbuss said that the bill originated from the Clark County School Board, but added that most of the trustees do favor the bill.

Mr. Forbuss noted that the Clark County School District is the 25th largest in the nation.

Mr. John Hawkins, Representative, Nevada State School Boards Association said the school trustees did not include this bill in their legislative program, but do not oppose the bill.

SENATE BILL NUMBER 326 (EXHIBIT D)

Mr. Chuck Neeley, Representative, Clark County School District said the bill is merely a clean-up bill and the money is actually allocated under emergency financial assistance. He added that the Clark County School District does support the bill.

The Chairman asked Mr. Neeley to explain the language on page 2, lines 10 through 14.

Mr. Neeley said as he understands it, money is allocated by the state board of education; when added with other resources, this amount cannot exceed the final budget that was approved by the school district.

SENATE BILL NUMBER 333 (EXHIBIT E)

Ms. Martha Gould, President, Nevada Library Association spoke in support of <u>Senate Bill No. 333</u>. This testimony is Exhibit F.

Senator Jean Ford said the law is such that Clark County Library trustees must live within the taxing district; they cannot live within the city. She added the bill would add people from the area that is contracting service and has no direct representation on the board.

Senator Kosinski asked if all the representatives could be from an incorporated city.

Senator Ford said that they could not because the bill only applies to the Clark County, Henderson, and Boulder City Library Districts.

Senator Kosinski said the bill says "any county or district library".

Senator Ford said the bill was designed for Clark County Library District. She suggested the bill be amended on page 2, Section 1, line 4 by replacing the words "or district library" and inserting the words "library district".

SENATE BILL NUMBER 330 (EXHIBIT G)

Senator Ford said <u>Senate Bill No. 330</u> would require the Department of Motor Vehicles to place a special area on a person's driver's license to indicate the wish to donate body parts upon death. She added similar programs are already established in 22 states.

Ms. Sharon Alcamo, Diver's License Division, Department of Motor Vehicles said there is currently a program through the department for donors to indicate on their diver's license the wish to donate body parts. Information pertaining to the donation of parts is available through the department; if a person wishes to donate parts he or she indicates this to the department and receives a small pink sticker that is affixed to the driver's license. Ms. Alcamo said according to the information she has received, there are 43 states that are involed in some way with the donor program.

Ms. Alcamo said the Department of Motor Vehicles anticipates some 380,000 transactions in the Driver's License Division next year and 330,000 the following year; if the process takes about 30 seconds, the division would require two additional driver's license clerk positions, and a microfilm-keypunch operator position in the administrative office to handle the program.

Ms. Alcamo said the division receives many requests for additional information to be added to the driver's license including blood type, handicap designation, deaf-mute designation, attendance of driver training courses, and organ donor information. She said for this reason, the division has tried to keep any information not pertaining to driver's licensing information off the license itself.

Ms. Alcamo suggested the bill to take effect January of 1982, if the committee gives a "Do Pass" recommendation so that the data cards for the driver's licenses as they are currently set up can be used before the change takes place.

Ms. Alcamo said as the program currently exists, there is no administrative problem for the driver's license personnel; the personnel simply offers pamphlets pertaining to organ donorship to the public and offers telephone numbers for people in the Lyon's Club and Kidney Foundation that people may call for further information.

Senator Blakemore suggested a civic organization take the program as a project to find and designate people who are interested in donating body organs and parts.

Senator Kosinski asked Ms. Alcamo to provide a fiscal note relative to the bill.

The Chairman asked Ms. Alcamo whether she could ask the driver's license personnel to inform each applicant of the program as it currently exists, possibly adding a space on the application form for the designation of his or her wish to be a donor or not.

Ms. Alcamo said she would ask that this be done and added that she sees no problem in implementing the program as it currently exists adding donor designation to the application.

Senator Bilbray moved to "Indefinitely Pospone" <u>Senate</u> <u>Bill No. 330</u>.

Senator Getto seconded the motion.

The motion carried unanimously.

SENATE BILL NUMBER 333 (EXHIBIT E)

Senator Faiss moved to "Amend and Do Pass" Senate Bill No. 333 with Senator Ford's proposed amendment (page 3).

Senator Bilbray seconded the motion.

The motion carried unanimously.

SENATE BILL NUMBER 326 (EXHIBIT D)

Senator Kosinski moved to "Indefinitely Postpone" <u>Senate</u> <u>Bill No. 326</u>.

Senator Getto seconded the motion.

The motion did not carry. (Senators Neal, Blakemore, Faiss, and Bilbray voted "No")

Senator Bilbray moved to re-refer <u>Senate Bill</u>
No. 326 to the Senate Taxation Committee with
no recommendation.

Senator Getto seconded the motion.

The motion carried unanimously.

SENATE BILL NUMBER 324 (EXHIBIT C)

Senator Kosinski moved to "Indefinitely Postpone" Senate Bill No. 324.

Senator Blakemore seconded the motion.

The motion did not carry. (Senators Neal and Bilbray voted "No" Senator Faiss was not present for the vote.)

The Chairman asked the committee to consider a request from the Nevada Council of the Blind for a bill draft request to create a visual and/or aural service division.

Senator Blakemore moved to send the request to the bill drafter's office.

Senator Bilbray seconded the motion.

The motion carried unanimously.

SENATE BILL NO. 324—SENATOR BILBRAY

FEBRUARY 27, 1981

Referred to Committee on Human Resources and Facilities

SUMMARY—Increases salaries for boards of trustees of certain school districts. (BDR 34-1164)

AN ACT relating to boards of trustees of school districts; increasing the salaries of the clerk, president and other trustees in certain districts; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. NRS 386.320 is hereby amended to read as follows: 386.320 1. If the total pupil enrollment in the school district for the immediately preceding school year is less than 1,000: 3

(a) The clerk and president of the board of trustees may each receive a salary of \$20 for each board of trustees meeting they attend, not to exceed \$40 a month.

(b) The other trustees may each receive a salary of \$15 for each board

of trustees meeting they attend, not to exceed \$30 a month.

(c) The board of trustees may hire a stenographer to take the minutes of the meetings of the board of trustees, and such stenographer may be paid a reasonable fee for each meeting attended.

2. If the total pupil enrollment in the school district for the immedi-

12 ately preceding school year is 1,000 or more: 13

(a) The clerk and president of the board of trustees may each receive 14 a salary of [\$40] \$55 for each board of trustees meeting they attend. 15 not to exceed [\$160] \$220 a month. 16

(b) The other trustees may each receive a salary of [\$35] \$50 for each board of trustees meeting they attend, not to exceed [\$140] \$200

(c) The board of trustees may hire a stenographer to take the minutes of the meetings of the board of trustees; and [such] this stenographer 20 21 may be paid a reasonable fee for each meeting attended.

SENATE BILL NO. 326—COMMITTEE ON HUMAN RESOURCES AND FACILITIES

MARCH 2, 1981

Referred to Committee on Human Resources and Facilities

SUMMARY—Clarifies law relating to emergency financial assistance to public schools. (BDR 34-937)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: No. Effect on the State or on Industrial Insurance: No.

AN ACT relating to public schools; specifying the limit placed on the amount of emergency financial assistance which may be allocated to school districts; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. NRS 387.1245 is hereby amended to read as follows:

387.1245 The board of trustees of any school district in this state whose estimated receipts from all sources provided by this chapter and chapter 374 of NRS are less than the total estimated receipts from [such] these sources in the final approved budget for [such] the fiscal year, and which cannot therefore provide a minimum program of education and meet its contract obligations, may apply for emergency financial assistance from the state distributive school fund and may be granted such assistance upon compliance with the following conditions and procedures:

1. The tax levy for the applying district [shall] must be the maximum [of \$1.50] for operating costs as authorized by law, not including any special tax authorized by the provisions of NRS 387.328.

2. [Such application shall] Each application must be made to the state board of education in [such form as shall be] the form prescribed by the superintendent of public instruction, and in accordance with guidelines for evaluating needs for emergency financial assistance as established by the state board of education.

3. Before acting on any such application, the state board of education and state board of examiners, jointly, shall determine the difference between the total amount of money appropriated and authorized for expenditure during the current biennium from the state distributive school fund and the total amount of money estimated to be payable from

that fund during the biennium, and shall make no distribution in excess of that difference.

4. The state board of education shall review each application and shall by resolution find the least amount of additional money, if any, which it deems necessary to enable the board of trustees of the applying school district to provide a minimum educational program and meet its irreducible contract obligations. In making [such] this determination, the state board of education shall consider also the amount available in the distributive school fund and the anticipated amount of future applications, so that no deserving school district will be wholly denied relief. Any money allocated by the state board of education under this section may not exceed, when added to all other estimated resources, the total estimated receipts in the final approved budget of the applying school district for the fiscal year.

5. If the state board of education finds that emergency assistance should be granted to an applying school district, it shall transmit its resolution finding such amount to the state board of examiners, along with a report of its then current estimate of the total requirements to be paid from the state distributive school fund during the then current fiscal year.

6. The state board of examiners shall independently review each resolution so transmitted by the state board of education, may require the submission of such additional justification as it deems necessary, and shall find by resolution the amount of emergency assistance, if any, to be granted. The board may defer, and subsequently grant or deny, any part of a request. Any emergency assistance granted by the state board of examiners may not exceed, when added to all other estimated resources, the total estimated receipts in the final approved budget of the applying school district for the fiscal year.

7. The state board of examiners shall transmit one copy of its finding to the state board of education and one copy to the state controller. Upon receipt of a A claim pursuant to a grant of emergency assistance , such claim shall must be paid from the state distributive school

fund as other claims against the state are paid.

8. Money received by a school district pursuant to a grant of relief may be expended only in accordance with the approved budget of [such] that school district for the fiscal year for which [such] the grant is made. No formal action to incorporate the money so received in the approved budget is required, but [such receipts shall] the receipts must be reported as other receipts are reported and explained in a footnote as short-term financing is explained.

9. The state board of education shall transmit to the legislature a report of each grant of emergency assistance paid pursuant to this section. Sec. 2. This act shall become effective upon passage and approval.

SENATE BILL NO. 333—COMMITTEE ON HUMAN RESOURCES AND FACILITIES

MARCH 2, 1981

SUMMARY—Authorizes additional trustees for certain district libraries. (BDR 33-890)

AN ACT relating to district libraries; providing for the addition of library trustees to represent the residents of a city receiving services under contract; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. NRS 379.022 is hereby amended to read as follows:
379.022 1. After ordering the creation of a county library district
and the establishment of a free public library therein as provided in NRS
379.021, the board of county commissioners shall appoint five competent
persons who are residents of [such] the county library district who shall
be known as district library trustees.

2. The term of office of the trustees appointed after July 1, 1971, pursuant to subsection 1 is as follows:

(a) Three persons [shall] must be appointed for [a term] terms of 2 years.

(b) Two persons [shall] must be appointed for [a term] terms of 4 years.

Thereafter the offices of district library trustees [shall] must be filled for terms of 4 years in the order in which the terms expire. No person may be appointed to hold office for more than two consecutive 4-year terms.

3. A vacancy occurring because of the expiration of the term in any office of district library trustee filled by election or appointment prior to July 1, 1971, [shall] must be filled by an appointment by the board of county commissioners for a term of 4 years.

4. A vacancy in the office of district library trustee which occurs other than by expiration of the terms [shall] must be filled by appointment by the board of county commissioners for the unexpired term.

5. District library trustees [shall] serve without compensation.

6. The board of county commissioners may remove any district library trustee who fails, without cause, to attend three successive meet-

ings of the trustees.

7. If the library trustees of any county or district library have entered into a contract pursuant to NRS 379.060 with any city within the county, they may add to their number two additional library trustees who are appointed by the governing body of the city to represent the residents of the city. The terms of office of the two additional library trustees are 3 years or until the termination of the contract with the city for library services, if that termination occurs sooner. The additional library trustees have the same powers and duties as the trustees appointed pursuant to subsection 1.

TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF SB 333

SENATE BILL NO. 330—COMMITTEE ON HUMAN RESOURCES AND FACILITIES

AN ACT relating to anatomical gifts; requiring the department of motor vehicles to include an indication of a driver's wish concerning such a gift on his driver's license; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

The People of the State of Nevada, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. NRS 451.573 is hereby amended to read as follows: 451.573 1. [A person who makes a gift of all or part of his body may attach written permission for a physician to carry out the appropriate procedures on a driver's license or an identification card issued by the department of motor vehicles. The department of motor vehicles shall include in its format for the driver's license a heading "Organ Donor" with a box in which the driver may have indicated his wish to make a gift, effective upon his death, of all or a part of his body. Whenever a license is being issued, a representative of the department shall fill in the box in accordance with the applicant's wish. The driver who makes such a gift may grant written permission on the driver's license or an identification card issued by the department for a physician to carry out the appropriate procedures.

2. The department and its representatives are not liable for damages in a civil action or subject to prosecution in any criminal proceeding on account of any entry on or document attached to a driver's license or an identification card issued by the department.
