The legislators convened at the rear of the Legislative Building on Wednesday, April 15, 1981, at 1:30 P. M. to commence the field trip. Guests and others in attendance proceeded according to their particular arrangements.

Upon arrival at Lahontan Dam, the group was first shown the dam site and heard a short lecture regarding its history, operation and projected improvements by Mr. Dick Lattin, of the Truckee-Carson Irrigation District. Concerns were voiced by various persons present, representing the general area in Fallon, regarding the future of the dam and its utilization.

The committee members, staff and guests then drove to the newer section of the park facilities contained within the Lahontan Recreation Area, where they boarded vans for a tour of this section. Mr. Bob Francke and Mr. Darrell Craig of the State Parks Division conducted the tour, providing information and facts about the various sites visited. A fact sheet giving vital statistics about the recreation area was distributed (Exhibit B).

Upon completion of this portion of the tour, the committe members and others present proceeded to the Mason Valley Wildlife Refuge near Yerington, Nevada, where they viewed the new fish hatchery and proposed well site. They visited the Mason Valley farm owned and operated by the Department of Wildlife, viewing the facilities, headquarters and two wells. They also inspected the proposed fish site well which runs at 8 cubic feet a second, and the main irrigation canal.

The tour was completed at approximately 6:00 P. M.
