Dear Assemblyman Williams:

During the summer of 2001, then Attorney General Frankie Sue Del Papa, and I had a discussion regarding student violence in schools and root causes. The Attorney General and I did not want an incident such as Columbine or San Diego to happen in Nevada. Research indicated that harassment and intimidation through bullying was at the heart of most school shooting incidents. Together we started a Bully-Free Task Force. The task force continues to this day with members from numerous organizations and agencies participating at their own expense. Last year, through the generosity of the Nevada PTA, The Grace Danberg Foundation, Inc., Bellagio and MGM Grand Hotel Casinos, we were able to print student pledges and information sheets on the effects of bullying to be distributed to all K-8 students.

AB 513 submitted by the current Attorney General's Office on behalf of the prior Attorney General establishes timelines for the development of a recommended policy and model program to deal with harassment and intimidation in Nevada schools. AB 513 further requires districts to provide appropriate training for all staff. Harassment and intimidation are leading causes of school violence. Harassment and intimidation affect student achievement. I strongly support all of AB 513 and/or any amendments necessary to minimize the funding needed to implement the bill requirements.

Assembly Education Committee Presentation April 9, 2003

A new report finds bullying and teasing topping the list of children's school troubles. The pain brought about by taunts and shunning at school appears to have played a role in recent fatal school shootings—evidence that this unrelieved stress may explode into tragedy. The report finds that more than two-thirds of school shooters said they felt persecuted or bullied by other students. The motive for the shooting was often revenge.
