### AB155 COMMENTS/NEW ADDITIONS

The Criminal History Records Repository is in favor of AB155. These changes are necessary to allow for the submission of fingerprint cards to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) for licensing and employment. Additional changes are also needed in NRS 239B.010 to allow for the submission of fingerprints for licenses required by the counties so they can perform background checks on city and county employees. The required changes to NRS 239B.010 are attached.

#### **HISTORY**

- In 1972, Public Law 92-544 allowed for the submission of fingerprint cards to the FBI for licensing and employment provided a state statute existed as a result of legislative enactment.
- In a letter dated December 20, 2000, the FBI Criminal Justice Information Services Division (CJIS) commenced a comprehensive review of the state statutes enacted pursuant to Public Law 92.544.
- In a letter dated April 26, 2001, the CJIS division of the FBI provided the result of its review of Nevada Statutes. Of the 29 Nevada statutes, 16 satisfied the criteria of Pub. L. 92.544. Eleven statutes did not meet the criteria. Two of the statutes needed clarification. Changes needed to be made by May 1, 2002.
- Mr. Dennis DeBacco requested an extension until after the 2003 legislative session in a letter dated May 17, 2001. That extension was given until July 2003.
- On October 21, 2002, an informational letter from the CJIS division was received by Repository staff which recommended language to allow for the submission of fingerprints for licenses and employment submitted pursuant to NRS 239B.010.
   NRS 239B.010 was one of the eleven statutes which did not originally meet the criteria of Pub. L. 92-544.

## IF BILL IS NOT APPROVED WITH THE NEW ADDITIONS

Failure to enact this needed new language would result in the rejection by the FBI after July 1, 2003, of all fingerprint cards submitted under these 10 statutes. (The Gaming statute had been revised in the 2001 session.) Fingerprint submissions are the only avenue to receive FBI background checks for employment and licensing. If the changes to NRS 239B.010 are not approved, fingerprint based federal background checks for city and county employees working in sensitive positions as well as those submitted pursuant to county ordinances could not be submitted to the FBI after July 1, 2003.

#### IF THE BILL IS APPROVED WITH THE NEW ADDITIONS

The Criminal History Records Repository would submit the new statutes to the FBI for its review and approval. There would be no interruption in the criminal background service.
