- Online research databases provide student access to age-appropriate information
 - Both Gale and EBSCOhost databases include informational sources for students from primary grades through high school
 - o Grolier Online provides access to three encyclopedias, one of which is in Spanish and was developed with the Spanish-speaking peoples of the Americas as its focus
- Provide research opportunities beyond the scope of any individual library
 - o Full text articles from over 500 publications for high school students, 150 publications designed for middle school students, and more than 50 for elementary students
 - o Full text coverage from more than 240 newspapers and business journals
 - o EBSCO Animals
 - O Gale's cross-curricular database covers science, biographies, authors, multicultural topics
- Information is current, reliable, and up-to-date.
 - O Surfing the web for information often produces results that are biased, unreliable, or incomplete.
- Teachers: both EBSCO and Gale include sources for professional development, including full-text journals for educators
- Funding: school budgets cannot support online databases purchased individually.
- Remote access allows students to continue research projects from home

Statements from school librarians:

My students are so happy to have EBSCO Searchasaurus (where) they can find unusual animal facts and pictures for their reports....my library may not have information on Tibetan Prickly Puffer Fish!
