ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 266–COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

(ON BEHALF OF THE NEVADA ASSOCIATION OF SCHOOL BOARDS)

MARCH 10, 2003

Referred to Committee on Ways and Means

SUMMARY—Revises provisions governing education and makes appropriations for education. (BDR 34-903)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: No. Effect on the State: Contains Appropriations not included in Executive Budget.

EXPLANATION - Matter in *bolded italics* is new; matter between brackets [omitted material] is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to education; requiring the Superintendent of Public Instruction to prepare a compilation of certain information for inclusion in the biennial budgetary request for the State Distributive School Account; requiring each school district to maintain a certain percentage in the ending balance of the general fund of the school district; revising provisions governing the calculation of basic support for pupils who are enrolled in kindergarten for a full school day; authorizing school districts to develop alternative plans for the reduction of pupil-teacher ratios in certain grades; requiring that the annual base salary of teachers and other licensed educational personnel must be cumulatively increased each year by a certain percentage; providing that certain children who are at risk must be admitted to kindergarten for a full school day; making various appropriations for education and educational personnel; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:



1 **Section 1.** Chapter 385 of NRS is hereby amended by adding 2 thereto a new section to read as follows:

3 1. The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall compile the 4 biennial budgetary request for the State Distributive School 5 Account prepared by the Department. In compiling the request, 6 the Superintendent shall take into account, without limitation:

7 (a) The projected enrollment of pupils for each school district 8 and for the school districts as a whole;

9 (b) The projected costs of salaries and benefits for existing and 10 newly hired teachers, and for other school district employees, 11 including, without limitation, the cost of merit increases and the 12 cost of living adjustments recommended by the Superintendent of 13 Public Instruction;

14 (c) The projected costs of supplies, equipment, services, fuel 15 and utilities based upon such published indices, reports and 16 research as the Superintendent of Public Instruction considers are 17 credible and reliable regarding those costs to schools;

(d) The projected cost of existing and proposed educational
 programs, including, without limitation, enhancements to existing
 programs that are not included in the per pupil basic support
 guarantee; and

(e) The revenue that is anticipated to be available for the
 general operations of school districts other than money available
 from the State General Fund.

25 2. The compilation prepared pursuant to subsection 1 must be 26 included with the biennial budgetary request for the State 27 Distributive School Account prepared by the Department.

28 Sec. 2. Chapter 387 of NRS is hereby amended by adding 29 thereto a new section to read as follows:

1. The board of trustees of each school district shall maintain *an ending balance of 5 percent in the general fund of the school district.*

33 2. The ending balance maintained pursuant to subsection 1
34 must not be used to:

35 (a) Settle or arbitrate disputes between a recognized 36 organization representing employees of a school district and the 37 school district, or to settle any negotiations.

(b) Adjust the district-wide schedules of salaries and benefits
of the employees of a school district.

40 Sec. 3. NRS 387.1233 is hereby amended to read as follows:

41 387.1233 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2,
42 basic support of each school district must be computed by:

(a) Multiplying the basic support guarantee per pupil establishedfor that school district for that school year by the sum of:



(1) [Six-tenths] Except for those pupils enrolled in 1 2 kindergarten who are counted pursuant to subparagraph (2), six*tenths* the count of pupils enrolled in the kindergarten department 3 on the last day of the first school month of the school district for the 4 5 school year, including, without limitation, the count of pupils who reside in the county and are enrolled in any charter school on the last 6 7 day of the first school month of the school district for the school 8 year.

9 (2) The count of pupils enrolled in *kindergarten for a full* 10 *school day and the count of pupils enrolled in* grades 1 to 12, 11 inclusive, on the last day of the first school month of the school 12 district for the school year, including, without limitation, the count 13 of pupils who reside in the county and are enrolled in any charter 14 school on the last day of the first school month of the school district 15 for the school year.

16 (3) The count of pupils not included under subparagraph (1) 17 or (2) who are enrolled full-time in a program of distance education 18 provided by that school district or a charter school located within 19 that school district on the last day of the first school month of the 20 school district for the school year.

21 (4) The count of pupils who reside in the county and are 22 enrolled:

23 (I) In a public school of the school district and are concurrently enrolled part-time in a program of distance education 24 25 provided by another school district or a charter school on the last 26 day of the first school month of the school district for the school 27 year, expressed as a percentage of the total time services are 28 provided to those pupils per school day in proportion to the total time services are provided during a school day to pupils who are 29 30 counted pursuant to subparagraph (2).

(II) In a charter school and are concurrently enrolled parttime in a program of distance education provided by a school district or another charter school on the last day of the first school month of the school district for the school year, expressed as a percentage of the total time services are provided to those pupils per school day in proportion to the total time services are provided during a school day to pupils who are counted pursuant to subparagraph (2).

(5) The count of pupils not included under subparagraph (1),
(2), (3) or (4), who are receiving special education pursuant to the
provisions of NRS 388.440 to 388.520, inclusive, on the last day of
the first school month of the school district for the school year,
excluding the count of pupils who have not attained the age of 5
years and who are receiving special education pursuant to
subsection 1 of NRS 388.490 on that day.



1 (6) Six-tenths the count of pupils who have not attained the 2 age of 5 years and who are receiving special education pursuant to 3 subsection 1 of NRS 388.490 on the last day of the first school 4 month of the school district for the school year.

5 (7) The count of children detained in detention homes, 6 alternative programs and juvenile forestry camps receiving 7 instruction pursuant to the provisions of NRS 388.550, 388.560 and 8 388.570 on the last day of the first school month of the school 9 district for the school year.

10 (8) The count of pupils who are enrolled in classes for at 11 least one semester pursuant to subsection 4 of NRS 386.560, 12 subsection 4 of NRS 386.580 or subsection 3 of NRS 392.070, 13 expressed as a percentage of the total time services are provided to 14 those pupils per school day in proportion to the total time services 15 are provided during a school day to pupils who are counted pursuant 16 to subparagraph (2).

(b) Multiplying the number of special education program units
 maintained and operated by the amount per program established for
 that school year.

(c) Adding the amounts computed in paragraphs (a) and (b).

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If the enrollment of pupils in a school district or a charter 21 2. 22 school that is located within the school district on the last day of the first school month of the school district for the school year is less 23 than the enrollment of pupils in the same school district or charter 24 school on the last day of the first school month of the school district 25 26 for either or both of the immediately preceding 2 school years, the 27 largest number must be used from among the 3 years for purposes of 28 apportioning money from the State Distributive School Account to that school district or charter school pursuant to NRS 387.124. 29

30 3. Pupils who are excused from attendance at examinations or 31 have completed their work in accordance with the rules of the board 32 of trustees must be credited with attendance during that period.

4. Pupils who are incarcerated in a facility or institution operated by the Department of Corrections must not be counted for the purpose of computing basic support pursuant to this section. The average daily attendance for such pupils must be reported to the Department.

5. Pupils who are enrolled in courses which are approved by the Department as meeting the requirements for an adult to earn a high school diploma must not be counted for the purpose of computing basic support pursuant to this section.

42 Sec. 4. NRS 387.303 is hereby amended to read as follows:

43 387.303 1. Not later than November 10 of each year, the 44 board of trustees of each school district shall submit to the



1 Superintendent of Public Instruction and the Department of 2 Taxation a report which includes the following information:

(a) For each fund within the school district, including, without 3 limitation, the school district's general fund and any special revenue 4 5 fund which receives state money, the total number and salaries of licensed and nonlicensed persons whose salaries are paid from the 6 7 fund and who are employed by the school district in full-time 8 positions or in part-time positions added together to represent full-9 time positions. Information must be provided for the current school 10 year based upon the school district's final budget, including any amendments and augmentations thereto, and for the preceding 11 school year. An employee must be categorized as filling an 12 13 instructional, administrative, instructional support or other position.

14 (b) The count of pupils computed pursuant to paragraph (a) of 15 subsection 1 of NRS 387.1233.

(c) The school district's actual expenditures in the fiscal yearimmediately preceding the report.

18 (d) The school district's proposed expenditures for the current 19 fiscal year.

20 (e) The schedule of salaries for licensed employees in the 21 current school year and a statement of whether the negotiations regarding salaries for the current school year have been completed. 22 23 If the negotiations have not been completed at the time the schedule of salaries is submitted, the board of trustees shall submit a 24 25 supplemental report to the Superintendent of Public Instruction upon completion of negotiations or the determination of an arbitrator 26 27 concerning the negotiations that includes the schedule of salaries 28 agreed to or required by the arbitrator.

29 (f) The number of teachers who received an increase in salary 30 pursuant to subsection 2 of NRS 391.160 for the current and preceding fiscal years. If the board of trustees is required to pay an 31 increase in salary retroactively pursuant to subsection $\begin{bmatrix} 2 \\ 2 \end{bmatrix}$ of NRS 32 33 391.160, the board of trustees shall submit a supplemental report to the Superintendent of Public Instruction not later than February 15 34 35 of the year in which the retroactive payment was made that includes 36 the number of teachers to whom an increase in salary was paid 37 retroactively.

(g) The number of employees eligible for health insurance
within the school district for the current and preceding fiscal years
and the amount paid for health insurance for each such employee
during those years.

42 (h) The rates for fringe benefits, excluding health insurance, 43 paid by the school district for its licensed employees in the 44 preceding and current fiscal years.



1 (i) The amount paid for extra duties, supervision of 2 extracurricular activities and supplemental pay and the number of employees receiving that pay in the preceding and current fiscal 3 4 years.

5 (j) The expenditures from the account created pursuant to subsection 3 of NRS 179.1187. The report must indicate the total 6 7 amount received by the district in the preceding fiscal year, and the 8 specific amount spent on books and computer hardware and 9 software for each grade level in the district.

10 2. On or before November 25 of each year, the Superintendent of Public Instruction shall submit to the Department of 11 Administration and the Fiscal Analysis Division of the Legislative 12 13 Counsel Bureau, in a format approved by the Director of the 14 Department of Administration, a compilation of the reports made by 15 each school district pursuant to subsection 1.

The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall, in the 16 3. 17 compilation required by subsection 2, reconcile the revenues and 18 expenditures of the school districts with the apportionment received 19 by those districts from the State Distributive School Account for the 20 preceding year.

Sec. 5. 21 NRS 387.304 is hereby amended to read as follows: 22

387.304 The Department shall:

23 1. Conduct an annual audit of the count of pupils for 24 apportionment purposes reported by each school district pursuant to 25 NRS 387.123 and the data reported by each school district *pursuant* to NRS 388.710 that is used to measure the effectiveness of the 26 27 implementation of [the] a plan developed by each school district [to 28 reduce the pupil-teacher ratio in kindergarten and grades 1, 2 and 3,] 29 as required by NRS [388.710.] 388.720.

30 2. Review each school district's report of the annual audit 31 conducted by a public accountant as required by NRS 354.624, and the annual report prepared by each district as required by NRS 32 33 387.303, and report the findings of the review to the State Board and the Legislative Committee on Education, with any recommendations 34 35 for legislation, revisions to regulations or training needed by school district employees. The report by the Department must identify 36 37 school districts which failed to comply with any statutes or 38 administrative regulations of this state or which had any:

39 (a) Long-term obligations in excess of the general obligation 40 debt limit; 41

(b) Deficit fund balances or retained earnings in any fund;

- 42 (c) Deficit cash balances in any fund;
- 43 (d) Variances of more than 10 percent between total general 44 fund revenues and budgeted general fund revenues; or



1 (e) Variances of more than 10 percent between total actual 2 general fund expenditures and budgeted total general fund expenditures. 3

3. In preparing its biennial budgetary request for the State 4 5 Distributive School Account, consult with the superintendent of schools of each school district or a person designated by the 6 7 superintendent.

8 4. Provide, in consultation with the Budget Division of the 9 Department of Administration and the Fiscal Analysis Division of the Legislative Counsel Bureau, training to the financial officers of 10 school districts in matters relating to financial accountability. 11

Sec. 6. NRS 388.060 is hereby amended to read as follows:

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388.060 1. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, 13 14 the board of trustees of each school district shall establish, equip and 15 maintain a kindergarten in each elementary school or each school attendance area in the district. If, on or before June 1 immediately 16 preceding the school year, admittance to kindergarten has been 17 requested for fewer than 15 children, the mandatory provisions of 18 19 this subsection do not apply to that school, and the board may decide whether to establish a kindergarten for those children. If the 20 21 board decides not to establish such a kindergarten, it may provide:

22 (a) Transportation for each child to enable him to attend 23 kindergarten at another school; or

24 (b) Upon agreement with a child's parent or guardian, an 25 authorized program of instruction for kindergarten to be offered in the child's home, which includes, without limitation, assigning 26 27 licensed educational personnel to assist and consult with the parent 28 or guardian as necessary.

29 2. The board of trustees of a school district in which a 30 kindergarten is to be established under the provisions of this title of 31 NRS shall budget for this purpose by including the costs in the next regular budget for the school district [-], including, without 32 limitation, the provision of kindergarten for a full school day to 33 children who are at risk. 34 35

Sec. 7. NRS 388.090 is hereby amended to read as follows:

388.090 1. Except as otherwise permitted pursuant to this 36 section, boards of trustees of school districts shall schedule and 37 38 provide a minimum of [180] 185 days of free school in the districts 39 under their charge.

40 The Superintendent of Public Instruction may, upon 2. 41 application by a board of trustees, authorize a reduction of not more 42 than 15 school days in a particular district to establish or maintain a 43 12-month school program or a program involving alternative 44 scheduling, if the board of trustees demonstrates that the proposed schedule for the program provides for a greater number of minutes 45



1 of instruction than would be provided under a program consisting of 2 [180] 185 school days. Before authorizing a reduction in the number of required school days pursuant to this subsection, the 3 Superintendent of Public Instruction must find that the proposed 4 5 schedule will be used to alleviate problems associated with a growth in enrollment or overcrowding, or to establish and maintain a 6 program of alternative schooling, including, without limitation, a 7 8 program of distance education provided by the board of trustees 9 pursuant to NRS 388.820 to 388.874, inclusive.

3. The Superintendent of Public Instruction may, upon
application by a board of trustees, authorize the addition of minutes
of instruction to any scheduled day of free school if days of free
school are lost because of any interscholastic activity. Not more than
5 days of free school so lost may be rescheduled in this manner.

4. Each school district shall schedule at least 3 contingent days of school in addition to the number of days required by this section, which must be used if a natural disaster, inclement weather or an accident necessitates the closing of a majority of the facilities within the district.

5. If more than 3 days of free school are lost because a natural disaster, inclement weather or an accident necessitates the closing of a majority of the facilities within a school district, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, upon application by the school district, may permit the additional days lost to be counted as school days in session. The application must be submitted in the manner prescribed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

6. The State Board shall adopt regulations providing procedures for changing schedules of instruction to be used if a natural disaster, inclement weather or an accident necessitates the closing of a particular school within a school district.

Sec. 8. NRS 388.700 is hereby amended to read as follows:

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32 388.700 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsections 2, 3 33 and 6, after the last day of the first month of the school year, the 34 ratio in each school district of pupils [per class in kindergarten and 35 grades 1, 2 and 3] per licensed teacher designated to teach [those] 36 classes full time [must not exceed 15 to 1] in classes where core 37 curriculum is taught [.]:

(a) In kindergarten and grades 1, 2 and 3, must not exceed 15
to 1; or

40 (b) If a plan is approved pursuant to subsection 2 of NRS 41 388.720, must not exceed the ratio set forth in that plan for the 42 grade levels specified in the plan.

43 In determining this ratio, all licensed educational personnel who

44 teach [kindergarten or grade 1, 2 or 3] a grade level specified in

45 paragraph (a) or a grade level specified in a plan that is approved



pursuant to subsection 2 of NRS 388.720, as applicable for the
 school district, must be counted except teachers of art, music,
 physical education or special education, counselors, librarians,
 administrators, deans and specialists.

5 2. A school district may, within the limits of any plan adopted 6 pursuant to NRS 388.720, assign a pupil whose enrollment in a 7 grade occurs after the last day of the first month of the school year 8 to any existing class regardless of the number of pupils in the class.

9 3. The State Board may grant to a school district a variance 10 from the limitation on the number of pupils per class set forth in 11 subsection 1 for good cause, including the lack of available financial 12 support specifically set aside for the reduction of pupil-teacher 13 ratios.

4. The State Board shall, on or before February 1 of each odd-numbered year, report to the Legislature on:

(a) Each variance granted by it during the preceding biennium,including the specific justification for the variance.

18 (b) The data reported to it by the various school districts 19 pursuant to subsection 2 of NRS 388.710, including an explanation 20 of that data, and the current pupil-teacher ratios per class in

21 [kindergarten and grades 1, 2 and 3.] the grade levels specified in 22 paragraph (a) of subsection 1 or the grade levels specified in a 23 plan that is approved pursuant to subsection 2 of NRS 388.720, as 24 applicable for the school district.

5. The Department shall, on or before November 15 of each year, report to the Chief of the Budget Division of the Department of Administration and the Fiscal Analysis Division of the Legislative Counsel Bureau:

(a) The number of teachers employed;

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30 (b) The number of teachers employed in order to attain the ratio 31 required by subsection 1;

(c) The number of pupils enrolled; and

(d) The number of teachers assigned to teach in the same
 classroom with another teacher or in any other arrangement other
 than one teacher assigned to one classroom of pupils,

36 during the current school year in [kindergarten and grades 1, 2 and

37 3] the grade levels specified in paragraph (a) of subsection 1 or the

38 grade levels specified in a plan that is approved pursuant to 39 subsection 2 of NRS 388.720, as applicable, for each school 40 district.

6. The provisions of this section do not apply to a charter
school or to a program of distance education provided pursuant to
NRS 388.820 to 388.874, inclusive.



Sec. 9. NRS 388.710 is hereby amended to read as follows:

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2 388.710 1. The State Board, in consultation with the trustees of the school districts and the recognized associations representing 3 licensed educational personnel, after receiving comments from the 4 5 general public, shall determine the data that must be monitored by 6 each school district and used to measure the effectiveness of the 7 implementation of [the] a plan developed by each school district [to 8 reduce the pupil-teacher ratio per class in kindergarten and grades 1, 9 2 and 3.] pursuant to NRS 388.720.

10 2. Each school district shall report the data to the State Board as required by the State Board. 11

Sec. 10. NRS 388.720 is hereby amended to read as follows: 388.720 [Each]

14 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, each school district together with the recognized associations representing 15 licensed educational personnel shall develop a plan to reduce the 16 district's pupil-teacher ratio per class in kindergarten and grades 1, 2 17 and 3 within the limits of available financial support specifically set 18 19 aside for this purpose and submit that plan to the State Board.

20 In lieu of complying with the pupil-teacher ratio prescribed 2. in paragraph (a) of subsection 1 of NRS 388.700, a school district 21 may, in consultation with recognized associations representing 22 licensed educational personnel, develop a plan to reduce the 23 24 district's pupil-teacher ratios per class for specified grade levels in elementary school. A plan developed pursuant to this subsection 25 must set forth the grade levels to which the ratios apply and must 26 27 be submitted to the State Board for its approval. The State Board 28 shall approve a plan if the plan: 29

(a) Reduces the district's pupil-teacher ratio; and

30 (b) Is fiscally neutral such that the plan will not cost more to 31 carry out than a plan that complies with the ratios prescribed in paragraph (a) of subsection 1 of NRS 388.700. 32

Sec. 11. NRS 391.160 is hereby amended to read as follows:

391.160 1. The salaries of teachers and other employees must 34 be determined by the character of the service required. A school 35 36 district shall not discriminate between male and female employees 37 in the matter of salary.

38 2. The annual base salary to which a licensed teacher or 39 other employee of a school district who is licensed pursuant to this 40 chapter is entitled to receive must be cumulatively increased on 41 July 1, 2005, and on July 1 of each year thereafter, by any 42 percentage by which the average industrial hourly wage in the 43 State increased during the previous fiscal year, as determined on 44 July 1 of each year by the Employment Security Division of the Department of Employment, Training and Rehabilitation. An 45



increase in salary given in accordance with this subsection is in
 addition to any other increase to which the teacher may otherwise
 be entitled, including, without limitation, the increase provided
 pursuant to subsection 3.

5 **3.** Each year when determining the salary of a teacher who 6 holds certification issued by the National Board for Professional 7 Teaching Standards, a school district shall add 5 percent to the 8 salary that the teacher would otherwise receive in 1 year for his 9 classification on the schedule of salaries for the school district if:

(a) On or before January 31 of the school year, the teacher has
 submitted evidence satisfactory to the school district of his current
 certification; and

13 (b) The teacher is assigned by the school district to provide 14 classroom instruction during that school year.

15 No increase in salary may be given during a particular school year to a teacher who submits evidence of certification after January 31 16 of that school year. For the first school year that a teacher submits 17 evidence of his current certification, the board of trustees of the 18 19 school district to whom the evidence was submitted shall pay 20 the increase in salary required by this subsection retroactively to the 21 beginning of that school year. Once a teacher has submitted 22 evidence of such certification to the school district, the school 23 district shall retain the evidence in its records, as applicable, for 24 future school years. An increase in salary given in accordance with 25 this subsection is in addition to any other increase to which the 26 teacher may otherwise be entitled.

[3.] 4. In determining the salary of a licensed teacher who is
employed by a school district after the teacher has been employed
by another school district in this state, the present employer shall,
except as otherwise provided in subsection [6:] 7:

(a) Give the teacher the same credit for previous teaching
 service as he was receiving from his former employer at the end of
 his former employment;

(b) Give the teacher credit for his final year of service with his
former employer, if credit for that service is not included in credit
given pursuant to paragraph (a); and

(c) Place the teacher on the schedule of salaries of the school
district in a classification that is commensurate with the level of
education acquired by the teacher, as set forth in the applicable
negotiated agreement with the present employer.

41 **[4.] 5.** A school district may give the credit required by 42 subsection **[3]** *4* for previous teaching service earned in another state 43 if the Commission has approved the standards for licensing teachers 44 of that state. The Commission shall adopt regulations that establish 45 the criteria by which the Commission will consider the standards for



licensing teachers of other states for the purposes of this subsection.
 The criteria may include, without limitation, whether the
 Commission has authorized reciprocal licensure of educational
 personnel from the state under consideration.

5 [5.] 6. In determining the salary of a licensed administrator, 6 other than the superintendent of schools, who is employed by a 7 school district after the administrator has been employed by another 8 school district in this state, the present employer shall, except as 9 otherwise provided in subsection [6:] 7:

10 (a) Give the administrator the same credit for previous 11 administrative service as he was receiving from his former 12 employer, at the end of his former employment;

(b) Give the administrator credit for his final year of service
with his former employer, if credit for that service is not otherwise
included in the credit given pursuant to paragraph (a); and

16 (c) Place the administrator on the schedule of salaries of the 17 school district in a classification that is comparable to the 18 classification the administrator had attained on the schedule of 19 salaries of his former employer.

[6.] 7. This section does not:

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(a) Require a school district to allow a teacher or administrator
 more credit for previous teaching or administrative service than the
 maximum credit for teaching or administrative experience provided
 for in the schedule of salaries established by it for its licensed
 personnel.

(b) Permit a school district to deny a teacher or administrator credit for his previous teaching or administrative service on the ground that the service differs in kind from the teaching or administrative experience for which credit is otherwise given by the school district.

[7.] 8. As used in this section:

(a) "Previous administrative service" means the total of:

(1) Any period of administrative service for which an
 administrator received credit from his former employer at the
 beginning of his former employment; and

36 (2) His period of administrative service in his former 37 employment.

38 (b) "Previous teaching service" means the total of:

(1) Any period of teaching service for which a teacher
received credit from his former employer at the beginning of his
former employment; and

42 (2) His period of teaching service in his former employment.

43 Sec. 12. NRS 392.040 is hereby amended to read as follows:

44 392.040 1. Except as otherwise provided by law, each parent, 45 custodial parent, guardian or other person in the State of Nevada



having control or charge of any child between the ages of 7 and 17 1 years shall send the child to a public school during all the time the 2 public school is in session in the school district in which the child 3 4 resides.

5 2. A child who is 5 years of age on or before September 30 of a school year may be admitted to kindergarten at the beginning of that 6 7 school year, and his enrollment must be counted for purposes of apportionment.
