- SUMMARY—Enacts provisions relating to ensuring security of State of Nevada and its residents with respect to acts of terrorism and related emergencies. (BDR 19-1139)
- FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: Yes. Effect on the State: Contains Appropriation not included in Executive Budget.

AN ACT relating to homeland security; creating the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security; setting forth the membership and duties of the Commission; providing certain exceptions to the open meeting law; requiring certain political subdivisions to adopt and maintain a response plan; establishing a plan for the continuation of state and local governmental operations; requiring certain utilities to conduct vulnerability assessments and to prepare emergency response plans; revising provisions relating to certain unlawful acts committed against utilities; providing for the confidentiality of certain documents, records and other information; imposing certain requirements for interoperability with respect to information and communication systems purchased by this state and local governments; requiring certain governmental entities to place automated external defibrillators in certain buildings and facilities; making various changes with respect to the authority of the Department of Motor Vehicles to accept and reject certain documents; increasing certain criminal penalties with respect to the fraudulent use of drivers' licenses and identification cards; making appropriations; providing



penalties; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Title 19 of NRS is hereby amended by adding 1 2 thereto a new chapter to consist of the provisions set forth as sections 2 to 27, inclusive, of this act. 3 4

Sec. 2. The Legislature hereby finds and declares that:

1. The tragic events of September 11, 2001, have refocused 5 6 attention on the importance of domestic preparedness for acts of 7 terrorism and related emergencies.

8 2. The events of September 11, 2001, not only impacted our 9 homeland, but also the way of life for all Nevadans.

10 3. More than ever, the Nevada Legislature, representatives of local government, law enforcement and other public safety 11 personnel, health care workers and technical service providers 12 13 must lead the charge in fighting against these destructive and demoralizing acts of violence with strong and effective procedural 14 15 deterrents and enhanced criminal penalties.

16 4. While local efforts and plans to respond to acts of terrorism and related emergencies are comprehensive, additional 17 18 statewide provisions are necessary to adequately prepare for acts of cyber-terrorism, environmental catastrophes and other related 19 20 incidents.

21 5. As a result of the increased threat of terrorism, the Legislature is compelled to address critical infrastructures, 22 23 governmental oversight and continuity, communications, and the 24 protection of important government documents and plans.

25 6. It is therefore within the public interest that the Legislature enact provisions to: 26

27 (a) Protect sensitive state documents and computer systems 28 from cyber-terrorism;

29 (b) Secure the State's energy, telecommunications and water 30 infrastructures;

31 (c) Ensure the continuity of government in the event of a 32 terrorist attack;

(d) Develop policies providing for effective communication 33 34 and interoperability among federal, state and local law 35 enforcement and other first responders;

(e) Provide safeguards in the issuance of government 36 37 identification; and

38 (f) Create an effective and comprehensive state oversight 39 structure to coordinate these and other antiterrorism initiatives.



Sec. 3. (Deleted by amendment.)

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2 Sec. 4. As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise 3 requires, the words and terms defined in sections 5 to 11, 4 inclusive, of this act have the meanings ascribed to them in those 5 sections.

6 Sec. 5. 1. "Act of terrorism" means any act that involves 7 the use or attempted use of sabotage, coercion or violence which is 8 intended to:

9 (a) Cause great bodily harm or death to the general 10 population; or

11 (b) Cause substantial destruction, contamination or 12 impairment of:

13 (1) Any building or infrastructure, communications,
14 transportation, utilities or services; or

(2) Any natural resource or the environment.

16 2. As used in this section, "coercion" does not include an act 17 of civil disobedience.

18 Sec. 6. "Commission" means the Nevada Commission on
19 Homeland Security created by section 12 of this act.

20 Sec. 7. "Governmental utility" means:

Any utility that is owned, operated or controlled by this
 state or an agency or instrumentality of this state, including,
 without limitation, the Colorado River Commission of Nevada.

24 2. Any utility that is owned, operated or controlled by any 25 county, city, town, general improvement district, special district or 26 other local governmental entity under the authority of any general 27 law, special law or city charter or any cooperative, interlocal or 28 other agreement.

29 Sec. 8. "Information system" means any computer 30 equipment, computer software, procedures or technology used to 31 collect, process, distribute or store information that is related to 32 the protection of homeland security.

33 Sec. 9. "Political subdivision" means a city or county of this 34 state.

Sec. 10. "Response agency" means an agency of this state or
of a political subdivision that provides services related to law
enforcement, firefighting, emergency medical care or public
safety, including, without limitation, the Nevada National Guard.

Sec. 10.3. "Restricted document" means any blueprint or
plan of a school, place of worship, airport, gaming establishment,
governmental building or any other building or facility which is
likely to be targeted for a terrorist attack.

43 Sec. 10.7. "System of communication" includes, without 44 limitation, any public safety radio system or telecommunication 45 system.



Sec. 11. 1. "Utility" means any public or private entity that: 1 2 (a) Provides water service, electric service or natural gas service to 500 or more service locations; or 3 4 (b) Operates any pipeline that is necessary to provide such 5 service. 2. The term includes, without limitation: 6 7 (a) A governmental utility. 8 (b) A public utility that is regulated by the Public Utilities 9 Commission of Nevada pursuant to chapter 704 of NRS. 10 (c) A rural electric cooperative established pursuant to chapter 81 of NRS. 11 (d) A cooperative association, nonprofit corporation, nonprofit 12 13 association or provider of electric service which is declared to be a 14 public utility pursuant to NRS 704.673 and which provides service 15 only to its members. (e) A community water system that is subject to the 16 requirements of 42 U.S.C. § 300i-2. 17 Sec. 12. 1. The Nevada Commission on Homeland 18 Security, consisting of a Chairman and at least 14 members, is 19 20 hereby created. 21 2. The Senate Majority Leader shall appoint two members of 22 the Senate as voting members to the Commission. 23 3. The Speaker of the Assembly shall appoint two members of 24 the Assembly as voting members to the Commission. 25 4. The Governor shall appoint to the Commission 10 voting members, at least one of whom represents the private sector. The 26 27 Governor may appoint as many nonvoting members as he chooses. 28 The members appointed by the Governor must possess expertise in 29 one or more of the following areas: 30 (a) Counterterrorism intelligence; 31 (b) Military service: 32 (c) Law enforcement; 33 (d) Fire fighting; 34 (e) Public health; (f) Hospital administration; 35 36 (g) Emergency management; (h) Administration of critical infrastructure and vital public 37 assets; 38 39 (i) Information technology; 40 (j) Transportation; 41 (k) Agriculture; and 42 (1) Business and industry. 43 The Governor may not appoint as a voting member of the 5. 44 Commission any employee of the Executive Branch of State

- 45 Government.



1 6. The Governor or his designee is a nonvoting member of 2 the Commission. The Governor or his designee shall serve as 3 Chairman of the Commission.

4 7. The voting members of the Commission shall elect from 5 among their membership a Vice Chairman who serves in that 6 office for a term of 1 year.

Sec. 13. 1. Except for the initial members:

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8 (a) The term of office of each voting member of the 9 Commission who is a Legislator is 2 years and commences on 10 July 1 of the year of appointment.

11 (b) The term of office of each voting member of the 12 Commission who is not a Legislator is 3 years and commences on 13 July 1 of the year of appointment.

14 2. The voting members of the Commission shall continue in 15 office until their successors are appointed. Voting members of the 16 Commission are eligible for reappointment. Vacancies among 17 the voting membership of the Commission must be filled for the 18 remainder of the unexpired term in the same manner as the 19 original appointment.

20 Sec. 14. 1. The Commission shall meet at the call of the 21 Chairman as frequently as required to perform its duties, but no 22 less than quarterly.

23 2. A majority of the voting members of the Commission 24 constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business, and a 25 majority of those voting members present at any meeting is 26 sufficient for any official action taken by the Commission.

27 Sec. 15. 1. Each member of the Commission who is not a 28 public employee is entitled to receive compensation of not more 29 than \$80 per day, as fixed by the Commission, while engaged in 30 the business of the Commission.

2. A member of the Commission who is a public employee may not receive any compensation for his services as a member of the Commission. Any member of the Commission who is a public employee must be granted administrative leave from his duties to engage in the business of the Commission without loss of his regular compensation. Such leave does not reduce the amount of the member's other accrued leave.

38 3. Except during a regular or special session of the 39 Legislature, each legislative member of the Commission is entitled 40 to receive the compensation provided for a majority of the 41 members of the Legislature during the first 60 days of the 42 preceding regular session for each day or portion of a day during 43 which he attends a meeting of the Commission or is otherwise 44 engaged in the business of the Commission. The compensation



and expenses of the legislative members of the Commission must
 be paid from the Legislative Fund.

4. In addition to any compensation received pursuant to this
section, while engaged in the business of the Commission, each
member and employee of the Commission is entitled to receive the
per diem allowance and travel expenses provided for state officers
and employees generally.

8 Sec. 16. 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsections 2 9 and 3, the Commission shall comply with the provisions of chapter 10 241 of NRS and all meetings of the Commission must be 11 conducted in accordance with that chapter.

12 2. The Commission may hold a closed meeting to:

13 (a) Receive security briefings;

14 (b) Discuss procedures for responding to acts of terrorism and 15 related emergencies; or

16 (c) Discuss deficiencies in security with respect to public 17 services, public facilities and infrastructure,

18 if the Commission determines, upon a majority vote of its 19 members, that the public disclosure of such matters would be 20 likely to compromise, jeopardize or otherwise threaten the safety of 21 the public.

3. All information and materials received or prepared by the
Commission during a meeting closed pursuant to subsection 2 and
all minutes and audiovisual or electronic reproductions of such a
meeting are confidential, not subject to subpoena or discovery,
and not subject to inspection by the general public.

27 Sec. 17. The Commission shall, within the limits of available 28 money:

1. Make recommendations to the Governor, the Legislature, agencies of this state, political subdivisions, businesses located within this state and private persons who reside in this state with respect to actions and measures that may be taken to protect residents of this state and visitors to this state from potential acts of terrorism and related emergencies.

2. Propose goals and programs that may be set and carried out, respectively, to counteract or prevent potential acts of terrorism and related emergencies before such acts of terrorism and related emergencies can harm or otherwise threaten residents of this state and visitors to this state.

40 3. With respect to buildings, facilities, geographic features 41 and infrastructure that must be protected from acts of terrorism 42 and related emergencies to ensure the safety of the residents of 43 this state and visitors to this state, including, without limitation, 44 airports, the Capitol Complex, dams, gaming establishments, 45 governmental buildings, highways, hotels, information technology



infrastructure, lakes, places of worship, power lines, public
 buildings, public utilities, reservoirs, rivers and their tributaries,
 and water facilities:

4 (a) Identify and categorize such buildings, facilities, 5 geographic features and infrastructure according to their 6 susceptibility to and need for protection from acts of terrorism and 7 related emergencies; and

8 (b) Study and assess the security of such buildings, facilities, 9 geographic features and infrastructure from acts of terrorism and 10 related emergencies.

11 4. Examine the use, deployment and coordination of response 12 agencies within this state to ensure that those agencies are 13 adequately prepared to protect residents of this state and visitors to 14 this state from acts of terrorism and related emergencies.

15 5. Assess, examine and review the use of information systems and systems of communication used by response agencies within 16 this state to determine the degree to which such systems are 17 compatible and interoperable. After conducting the assessment, 18 19 examination and review, the Commission shall establish a state plan setting forth criteria and standards for the compatibility and 20 21 interoperability of those systems when used by response agencies 22 within this state.

6. Assess, examine and review the operation and efficacy of
 telephone systems and related systems used to provide emergency
 911 service.

7. To the extent practicable, cooperate and coordinate with
the Division of Emergency Management of the Department of
Public Safety to avoid duplication of effort in developing policies
and programs for preventing and responding to acts of terrorism
and related emergencies.

8. Perform any other acts related to their duties set forth in
subsections 1 to 7, inclusive, that the Commission determines are
necessary to protect or enhance:

(a) The safety and security of the State of Nevada;

(b) The safety of residents of the State of Nevada; and

36 (c) The safety of visitors to the State of Nevada.

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37 Sec. 18. The Chairman of the Commission may, with the 38 approval of the Commission, appoint committees from its members 39 to assist in carrying out the duties of the Commission.

40 Sec. 19. The Governor shall provide such staff assistance to 41 the Commission as he deems appropriate and may designate a 42 state agency to provide such assistance.

43 Sec. 20. The Commission may apply for and receive gifts, 44 grants, contributions or other money from governmental and

45 private agencies, affiliated associations and other persons to carry



out the provisions of this chapter and to defray expenses incurred
 by the Commission in the discharge of its duties.

Sec. 21. 1. A document, record or other item of information 3 described in subsection 2 that is prepared and maintained for the 4 5 purpose of preventing or responding to an act of terrorism is confidential, not subject to subpoena or discovery and not subject 6 7 to inspection by the general public if the Governor determines, by executive order, that the disclosure or release of the document, 8 9 record or other item of information would thereby create a 10 substantial likelihood of compromising, jeopardizing or otherwise threatening the public health, safety or welfare. 11

12 2. The types of documents, records or other items of 13 information subject to executive order pursuant to subsection 1 14 are as follows:

15 (a) Assessments, plans or records that evaluate or reveal the 16 susceptibility of fire stations, police stations and other law 17 enforcement stations to acts of terrorism or other related 18 emergencies.

(b) Drawings, maps, plans or records that reveal the critical
infrastructure of primary buildings, facilities and other structures
used for storing, transporting or transmitting water or electricity,
natural gas or other forms of energy.

(c) Documents, records or other items of information which
 may reveal the details of a specific emergency response plan or
 other tactical operations by a response agency and any training
 relating to such emergency response plans or tactical operations.

(d) Handbooks, manuals or other forms of information
detailing procedures to be followed by response agencies in the
event of an act of terrorism or other related emergency.

30 (e) Documents, records or other items of information that 31 reveal information pertaining to specialized equipment used for 32 covert, emergency or tactical operations of a response agency, 33 other than records relating to expenditures for such equipment.

34 (f) Documents, records or other items of information that 35 reveal frequencies for radio transmissions used by response 36 agencies.

37 3. If a person knowingly and unlawfully discloses a 38 document, record or other item of information subject to an 39 executive order issued pursuant to subsection 1 or assists, solicits 40 or conspires with another person to disclose such a document, 41 record or other item of information, the person is guilty of:

42 (a) A gross misdemeanor; or

(b) A category C felony and shall be punished as provided in
NRS 193.130 if the person acted with the intent to:



1 (1) Commit, cause, aid, further or conceal, or attempt to 2 commit, cause, aid, further or conceal, any unlawful act involving 3 terrorism or sabotage; or

4 (2) Assist, solicit or conspire with another person to 5 commit, cause, aid, further or conceal any unlawful act involving 6 terrorism or sabotage.

7 Sec. 22. 1. Unless made confidential by specific statute, a 8 restricted document may be inspected only by a person who 9 provides:

10 (a) His name;

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11 (b) A copy of his driver's license or other photographic 12 identification that is issued by a governmental entity;

13 (c) The name of his employer, if any;

(d) His citizenship; and

15 (e) Except as otherwise provided in this paragraph, a statement 16 of the purpose for the inspection. A person is not required to 17 indicate the purpose for inspecting a restricted document if the 18 person is an employee of any fire-fighting or law enforcement 19 agency.

20 2. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 3, a public 21 officer or employee shall observe any person while the person 22 inspects a restricted document in a location and in a manner 23 which ensures that the person does not copy, duplicate or 24 reproduce the restricted document in any way.

25 3. A restricted document may be copied, duplicated or 26 reproduced:

27 (a) Upon the lawful order of a court of competent jurisdiction;

28 (b) As is reasonably necessary in the case of an act of 29 terrorism or other related emergency;

30 (c) To protect the rights and obligations of a governmental 31 entity or the public;

(d) Upon the request of a reporter or editorial employee who is
 employed by or affiliated with a newspaper, press association or
 commercially operated and federally licensed radio or television
 station and who uses the restricted document in the course of such
 employment or affiliation; or

(e) Upon the request of a registered architect, licensed
contractor or a designated employee of any such architect or
contractor who uses the restricted document in his professional
capacity.

41 **4.** A public officer or employee shall inform any person who 42 inspects a restricted document of the provisions of this section.



Sec. 23. 1. A public officer or employee who is the 2 custodian of a restricted document shall establish a log to record: (a) The information described in subsection 1 of section 22 of 4 this act when a person is allowed to inspect the document; and (b) The date and time of the inspection. The log is not a public record and may be inspected only 2. by: 8 (a) A representative of a law enforcement agency; or (b) A reporter or editorial employee who is employed by or 10 affiliated with a newspaper, press association or commercially operated and federally licensed radio or television station. Sec. 24. Nothing in section 22 or 23 of this act shall be 12 13 deemed to prohibit a public officer or employee from contacting a 14 law enforcement agency to report a suspicious or unusual request 15 to inspect a restricted document. Sec. 25. 1. Each political subdivision shall adopt and 16 maintain a response plan. Each new or revised plan must be filed 17 within 10 days after adoption or revision with: 18 19 (a) The Division of Emergency Management of the 20 Department of Public Safety; and (b) Each response agency that provides services to the political 22 subdivision. 23 2. The response plan required by subsection 1 must include: (a) A drawing or map of the layout and boundaries of the 24 *political subdivision;* (b) A drawing or description of the streets and highways within, and leading into and out of, the political subdivision, 28 including any approved routes for evacuation; (c) The location and inventory of emergency response 30 equipment and resources within the political subdivision; (d) The location of any unusually hazardous substances within 32 the political subdivision; (e) A telephone number that may be used by residents of the political subdivision to receive information and to make reports 34 with respect to an act of terrorism or related emergency; (f) The location of one or more emergency response command 36 posts that are located within the political subdivision; (g) A depiction of the location of each police station, sheriff's office and fire station that is located within the political 40 subdivision; (h) Plans for the continuity of the operations and services of 42 the political subdivision, which plans must be consistent with the 43 provisions of section 26 of this act; and (i) Any other information that the Commission may determine 45 to be relevant.



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1 3. A plan filed pursuant to the requirements of this section, 2 including any revisions adopted thereto, is confidential and must 3 be securely maintained by the entities with whom it is filed 4 pursuant to subsection 1. An officer, employee or other person to 5 whom the plan is entrusted by the entity with whom it is filed shall 6 not disclose the contents of such a plan except:

7 (a) Upon the lawful order of a court of competent jurisdiction; 8 or

9 (b) As is reasonably necessary in the case of an act of 10 terrorism or related emergency.

11 Sec. 26. 1. In accordance with the provisions of Section 37 12 of Article 4 of the Nevada Constitution, the Nevada Legislature 13 hereby establishes a plan for continuation of state and local 14 governmental operations. The provisions set forth in this section 15 apply only in, and must be used in accordance with, the 16 circumstances described in subsection 2.

17 2. In the event that this state or a portion of this state is stricken by a catastrophic emergency of such magnitude that, in 18 19 the opinion of the Governor or, in the absence of the Governor, 20 the Lieutenant Governor, the existing provisions of the Nevada 21 Constitution and the statutes of this state relating to the filling of 22 vacancies in office are not able to provide for a sufficiently 23 expedient continuity of government and temporary succession of 24 power as a result of vacancies in office created by the catastrophic 25 emergency, the provisions of subsections 3 to 10, inclusive, apply.

3. If a vacancy occurs in the Office of Governor as a result of a catastrophic emergency and none of the successors described in NRS 223.080 are able or available to act as Governor, the Legislature shall elect a person to serve as Governor. If the Legislature is not in session at the time the vacancy occurs, the Legislature may call itself into special session to elect a person to serve as Governor.

4. If vacancies occur in more than 15 percent of the seats in
either house of the Legislature as a result of a catastrophic
emergency:

(a) The remaining Legislators available for duty constitute the
Legislature and have full power to act in separate or joint
assembly by majority vote of those present;

39 (b) Any requirements for a quorum applicable to the 40 Legislature must initially be suspended and must subsequently be 41 adjusted as vacant offices are filled pursuant to NRS 218.043; and 42 (c) If the affirmative vote of a specified proportion of members 43 of the Legislature is required for the approval of a legislative

43 of the Legislature is required for the approval of a legislative 44 measure, the same proportion of remaining members of the

45 Legislature is sufficient for approval of that measure.



1 5. If vacancies occur in more than 15 percent of the positions 2 held by justices on the Supreme Court as a result of a catastrophic 3 emergency, the vacancies must be filled by appointment of the 4 Governor.

5 6. If vacancies occur in more than 15 percent of the positions 6 held by the district judges in any one judicial district as a result of 7 a catastrophic emergency, the vacancies must be filled by 8 appointment of the Supreme Court.

9 7. If vacancies occur on a board of county commissioners as 10 a result of a catastrophic emergency:

11 (a) The remaining members of the board available for duty 12 constitute the board and have full power to act by majority vote of 13 those present; and

(b) Any requirements for a quorum applicable to the board
must initially be suspended and must subsequently be adjusted as
vacant offices are filled.

17 If a board of county commissioners is rendered entirely vacant as 18 a result of a catastrophic emergency, such other elected officers of 19 the county as may be available to serve on the board have full

authority to act in all matters as a board of county commissioners.
8. If vacancies occur on a city council as a result of a
catastrophic emergency:

(a) The remaining members of the council available for duty
 constitute the council and have full power to act by majority vote
 of those present; and

(b) Any requirements for a quorum applicable to the council
must initially be suspended and must subsequently be adjusted as
vacant offices are filled.

If a city council is rendered entirely vacant as a result of a
catastrophic emergency, such other elected officers of the city as
may be available to serve on the council have full authority to act
in all matters as a city council.

9. If, during or following a catastrophic emergency, a
majority of the members of a legislative body described in this
section determines that, for purposes of safety or to address related
concerns, the legislative body should meet at a location other than
the location at which the legislative body ordinarily meets, the
legislative body may arrange to meet at an alternate location.

39 10. After a catastrophic emergency has taken place, the 40 Governor or, in the absence of the Governor, the Lieutenant 41 Governor, shall:

42 (a) Determine and announce publicly when conditions have 43 normalized within this state or the portion thereof affected by the

44 catastrophic emergency.



(b) In cooperation with the Secretary of State, develop 1 2 procedures and a reasonable schedule for filling by regular election the various offices filled temporarily pursuant to this 3 4 section.

11. As used in this section, "catastrophic emergency" means 5 an emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, in 6 7 accordance with Section 37 of Article 4 of the Nevada 8 Constitution.

9 Sec. 27. 1. Each utility shall:

10 (a) Conduct a vulnerability assessment in accordance with the requirements of the federal and regional agencies that regulate 11 the utility; and 12

13 (b) Prepare and maintain an emergency response plan in 14 accordance with the requirements of the federal and regional 15 agencies that regulate the utility.

2. Each utility shall:

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17 (a) As soon as practicable but not later than December 31, 2003, submit its vulnerability assessment and emergency response 18 plan to the Division of Emergency Management of the 19 20 Department of Public Safety; and

(b) At least once each year thereafter, review its vulnerability 21 22 assessment and emergency response plan and, as soon as practicable after its review is completed but not later than 23 24 December 31 of each year, submit the results of its review and any 25 additions or modifications to its emergency response plan to the Division of Emergency Management of the Department of Public 26 27 Safety.

28 3. Each vulnerability assessment and emergency response 29 plan of a utility and any other information concerning a utility 30 that is necessary to carry out the provisions of this section is 31 confidential and must be securely maintained by each person or entity that has possession, custody or control of the information. 32 33

4. A person shall not disclose such information, except:

34 (a) Upon the lawful order of a court of competent jurisdiction;

35 (b) As is reasonably necessary to carry out the provisions of this section or the operations of the utility, as determined by the 36 Division of Emergency Management of the Department of Public 37 38 Safety; or

39 (c) As is reasonably necessary in the case of an emergency 40 involving public health or safety, as determined by the Division of 41 Emergency Management of the Department of Public Safety.

42 5. If a person knowingly and unlawfully discloses such 43 information or assists, solicits or conspires with another person to

44 disclose such information, the person is guilty of:

45 (a) A gross misdemeanor; or



(b) A category C felony and shall be punished as provided in 1 2 NRS 193.130 if the person acted with the intent to:
