SUMMARY—Revises provisions governing school attendance required for promotion to next grade. (BDR 34-788)

AN ACT relating to education; removing the requirement that the days on which a pupil is absent from school because of physical or mental illness must be credited towards the attendance required for promotion to the next higher grade; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

## THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1.** NRS 392.122 is hereby amended to read as follows: 392.122 1. The board of trustees of each school district shall prescribe a minimum number of days that a pupil who is enrolled in a school in the district must be in attendance for the pupil to be promoted to the next higher grade. For the purposes of this subsection, the days on which a pupil is not in attendance because the pupil is **F**:

8 (a) Physically or mentally unable to attend school; or

9 (b) Absent] absent for up to 10 days within 1 school year with

the approval of the teacher or principal of the school pursuant to
NRS 392.130 , [and only if he has completed course work
requirements,] must be credited towards the required days of



1 attendance [.] if the pupil has completed course-work 2 requirements.

*requirements.*2. A school shall inform the parents or legal guardian of each
pupil who is enrolled in the school that the parents or legal guardian
and the pupil are required to comply with the provisions governing
the attendance and truancy of pupils set forth in NRS 392.040 to
392.160, inclusive, and any other rules concerning attendance and
truancy adopted by the board of trustees of the school district.
