Altering School Times: The first plan would have all schools starting within several minutes of each other with no school beginning earlier than 8 AM. Plan would require the purchase of 25 new busses and \$750,000 in driver and fuel costs. The second plan, which is more in keeping with the spirit of the bill, would stagger starts. This plan, however, would be particularly onerous for our small rural schools, which would require more buses for them. More drivers (if they could be found) and vastly increased fuel costs for double runs. As a case in point, Round Mountain would require 3 additional buses and an increase of fuel costs of \$120,000. Beatty fuel costs would be \$180,000 more and an additional 2 buses required. Other outlying schools would not require additional buses, but would have similarly higher fuel costs from \$79,000 at Tonopah to \$108,000 at Amargosa.

**Fiscal Impact:** There is no fiscal impact anticipated under this option.

**Issues**: During the winter, elementary school children will be dropped off at bus stops after dark. This late schedule will also affect activities for these children, i.e. soccer, t-ball, basketball, baseball, community classes, etc. This late schedule will also affect teachers ability to take University classes to further their education and improve their teaching skills.

# **OPTION 2**

Keep existing start times but flip flop school categories

**Fiscal Impact:** There is no fiscal impact anticipated under this option.

**Issue**: Middle school children now have the issue that High school children had. This late start for High Schools could also affect their after school extra-curricular activities, for example, getting certain sport completed before dark. There may be added cost of lighting fields so that these activities can be completed. It could also affect after school jobs for many students. High School students are now returning home later than elementary child and may affect baby sitting needs for many families.

The earliest this schedule could be started would be 2006-07 because the 440 additional buses could not be ordered and received in time for the 2005-06 school year.
