ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 86–ASSEMBLYWOMAN HARDY

SUMMARY—Revises provisions relating to animal welfare. (BDR 50-203)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: Increases or Newly Provides for Term of Imprisonment in County or City Jail or Detention Facility. Effect on the State: No.

EXPLANATION - Matter in *bolded italics* is new; matter between brackets [omitted material] is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to animals; revising provisions relating to animal cruelty; providing a penalty; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law prohibits a person from: (1) torturing or unjustifiably injuring, maiming, mutilating or killing an animal kept for companionship or pleasure or any cat or dog; or (2) overdriving, torturing, cruelly beating or unjustifiably injuring, maiming, mutilating or killing any animal or causing, procuring or allowing any such act against an animal. (NRS 574.100) **Section 1** of this bill also prohibits: (1) committing these acts against an animal kept for working purposes or a domesticated animal that is not owned by any person; and (2) with certain exceptions, depriving an animal of proper ventilation, necessary veterinary care or grooming and shearing under certain circumstances.

Existing law prohibits the abandonment of maimed, diseased, disabled or infirm animals. (NRS 574.110) Section 1 prohibits the abandonment of any animal and sets forth what constitutes abandonment of an animal.

13 Existing law prescribes minimum standards for the housing, keeping and 14 restraining of dogs and sets forth certain exceptions to these provisions. (NRS 15 574.100) Section 1 prohibits a person from restraining a dog using: (1) a collar, 16 harness or other device that is not properly fitted; or (2) a tether, chain, tie, trolley 17 or pulley system or other device that has a weight attached. Section 1 also prohibits 18 leaving a dog outside and unattended unless the dog is provided with: (1) adequate 19 shelter; (2) an area that allows the dog to avoid standing water and exposure to 20 excessive animal waste; (3) shade from direct sunlight; and (4) potable water. 21 Section 1 provides an exception from these prohibitions for a dog that is actively 22 engaged in or training for: (1) police, military, patrol or detection work; (2) search 23 and rescue; (3) herding, livestock guarding or other work; (4) guide dogs, hearing





- 24 25 26 27 dogs or service dogs; and (5) trials, sporting or other lawful competitions or competitive functions.
- Section 1.5 of this bill repeals a provision of existing law relating to the abandonment of disabled animals.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 **Section 1.** NRS 574.100 is hereby amended to read as follows: 2 574.100 1. A person shall not:

(a) Torture or unjustifiably *injure*, maim, mutilate or kill:

(1) An animal kept for companionship, [or] pleasure [,] or 4 5 for working purposes, whether belonging to the person or to 6 another; [or]

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(2) Any cat or dog; or

(3) A domesticated animal that is not owned by any person.

9 (b) [Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (a), overdrive, overload, torture,] Cause, procure or allow an animal to be 10 11 overdriven, overloaded, tortured, cruelly **[beat]** beaten or unjustifiably [injure, maim, mutilate] injured, maimed, mutilated or 12 13 [kill an animal, whether belonging] killed, regardless of whether 14 the animal belongs to the person, for to another fil person or is 15 not owned by any person;

16 (c) Deprive an animal of *or cause an animal to be deprived of* 17 necessary sustenance, food or drink, or neglect or refuse to furnish it 18 such sustenance or drink;

19 (d) [Cause, procure or allow an animal to be overdriven, overloaded, tortured, cruelly beaten, or unjustifiably injured, 20 maimed, mutilated or killed or to be deprived of necessary food or 21 22 drink:

(e) If an animal is confined inside of an enclosed space, 23 24 including, without limitation, a shed, barn or garage, deprive an animal of proper ventilation or neglect or refuse to furnish the 25 26 animal with proper ventilation;

27 (e) Except as otherwise provided in subsection 5, deprive an ill, 28 infirm or injured animal of necessary veterinary care, or neglect 29 or refuse to furnish the animal with necessary veterinary care, 30 resulting in the animal experiencing unnecessary or unjustifiable 31 pain, suffering or death;

32 (f) Except as otherwise provided in subsection 5, deprive an 33 animal of grooming or shearing or refuse to furnish the animal 34 such grooming or shearing, to the extent that such grooming or shearing is reasonably necessary to prevent adverse health effects, 35 pain, injury or the impediment of the natural movement of the 36 37 animal;





1 (g) Instigate, engage in, or in any way further an act of cruelty to 2 any animal, or any act tending to produce such cruelty; or

3 [(f)] (h) Abandon an animal [in circumstances other than those 4 prohibited in NRS 574.110. The provisions of this paragraph do not 5 apply to:], regardless of whether the animal is healthy, maimed, 6 diseased, disabled or infirm. For the purposes of this paragraph:

7 (1) Except as otherwise provided in this paragraph, an animal is considered abandoned if a person who owns or has 8 custody of the animal relinquishes his or her duty to care for that 9 animal by leaving the animal without providing minimal care, 10 11 which may include, without limitation, leaving an animal on the 12 property of the owner or another person, in a public place or on 13 open land, except that an animal that has been left on the property 14 of the animal's owner or person having custody of the animal is 15 not considered abandoned unless the animal is left for more than 72 hours. 16 17

(2) An animal is not considered abandoned if:

(I) A person delivers the animal to another person who 18 19 will accept ownership or custody of the animal or an animal 20 rescue organization or animal shelter; or

21 (II) The animal is a feral cat that has been caught to 22 provide vaccination, spaying or neutering and released back to the 23 location where the feral cat was caught after providing the 24 vaccination, spaying or neutering. [As used in this paragraph, "feral 25 cat" means a cat that has no apparent owner or identification and 26 appears to be unsocialized to humans and unmanageable or 27 otherwise demonstrates characteristics normally associated with a 28 wild or undomesticated animal.]

29 2. Except as otherwise provided in subsections 3 and 4 and 30 NRS 574.210 to 574.510, inclusive, a person shall not [restrain]:

31 (a) **Restrain** a dog:

32 [(a)] (1) Using a collar, harness or other device that is not 33 properly fitted;

34 (2) Using a tether, chain, tie, trolley or pulley system or other 35 device that:

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 $\left[\begin{array}{c} (1) \\ (1) \end{array}\right]$ Is less than 12 feet in length;

37 (2) Fails to allow the dog to move at least 12 feet or, if 38 the device is a pulley system, fails to allow the dog to move a total 39 of 12 feet; for

[(3)] (III) Allows the dog to reach a fence or other object 40 that may cause the dog to become injured or die by strangulation 41 42 after jumping the fence or object or otherwise becoming entangled 43 in the fence or object; or

44 (IV) Has a weight attached;





1 (b) (3) Using a prong, pinch or choke collar or similar 2 restraint: or

3 (c) (4) For more than 14 hours during a 24-hour period [;]; or

(b) Leave a dog, who does not have immediate access to the 4 5 indoors, outside and unattended unless the person provides the dog with access to: 6

7 (1) Adequate shelter, which must include, without *limitation, a sturdy structure that:* 8

(I) Is waterproof, ventilated and constructed of sound 9 and substantial material that is adequate to protect the dog from 10 inclement weather and which allows the dog to maintain a normal 11 12 body temperature:

13 (II) Provides a solid surface, resting platform, pad, floor 14 mat or similar device large enough for the dog to lie on in a normal manner and that can be maintained in a sanitary manner; 15

16 (III) Is appropriate for the size and breed of the dog with sufficient dimensions that allow the dog to stand erect, sit, 17 18 turn around and lie down in an unimpeded position while inside 19 the structure; and

20 (IV) Prevents pain, injury or a significant risk to the 21 *health of the dog;*

22 (2) An area that allows the dog to avoid standing water and 23 exposure to excessive animal waste;

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(3) Shade from direct sunlight; and

(4) Potable water.

26 3. [Any pen or other outdoor enclosure that is used to maintain 27 a dog must be appropriate for the size and breed of the dog.] If any 28 property that is used by a person to maintain a dog is of insufficient 29 size to ensure compliance by the person with the provisions of paragraph (a) of subsection 2, the person may maintain the dog 30 unrestrained in a pen or other outdoor enclosure that complies with 31 the provisions of [this subsection.] paragraph (b) of subsection 2. 32

33 4. The provisions of subsections 2 and 3 do not apply to a dog that is: 34

35 (a) Tethered, chained, tied, restrained or placed in a pen or enclosure by a veterinarian, as defined in NRS 574.330, during the 36 37 course of the veterinarian's practice;

(b) Being used lawfully to hunt a species of wildlife in this State 38 during the hunting season for that species; 39 40

(c) Receiving training to hunt a species of wildlife in this State;

(d) In attendance at and participating in an exhibition, show, 41 42 contest or other event in which the skill, breeding or stamina of the

43 dog is judged or examined;

44 (e) Being kept in [a] an animal shelter or boarding facility or 45 temporarily in a camping area;





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1 (f) Temporarily being cared for as part of a rescue operation or 2 in any other manner in conjunction with a bona fide nonprofit organization formed for animal welfare purposes; 3

(g) Living on land that is directly related to an active agricultural 4 5 operation, if the restraint is reasonably necessary to ensure the safety of the dog. As used in this paragraph, "agricultural operation" 6 7 means any activity that is necessary for the commercial growing and 8 harvesting of crops or the raising of livestock or poultry; [or]

(h) Actively engaged in or training for:

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(1) Police, military, patrol or detection work;

- (2) Search and rescue:
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(3) Herding, livestock guarding or otherwise working;

(4) A role as a guide dog, hearing dog or service dog; or

14 (5) Trials, sporting or other lawful competitions or 15 *competitive functions; or*

16 (i) With a person having custody or control of the dog, if the person is engaged in a temporary task or activity with the dog for 17 18 not more than 1 hour.

19 The provisions of paragraphs (e) and (f) of subsection 1 do 5. 20 not apply to an indigent person. A person may be determined to be 21 indigent if the person:

22 (a) Receives public assistance, as that term is defined in 23 NRS 422A.065:

24 (b) Resides in public housing, as that term is defined in 25 NRS 315.021;

26 (c) Has a household income that is less than 200 percent of the 27 federally designated level signifying poverty; or

- 28 (d) Any other relevant factor, as determined by a court. 29
 - **6**. A person shall not:

30 (a) Intentionally engage in horse tripping for sport, entertainment, competition or practice; or 31

32 (b) Knowingly organize, sponsor, promote, oversee or receive 33 money for the admission of any person to a charreada or rodeo that 34 includes horse tripping.

35 [6.] 7. A person who willfully and maliciously violates 36 paragraph (a) of subsection 1:

37 (a) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (b), is guilty of a category D felony and shall be punished as provided in 38 NRS 193.130. 39

40 (b) If the act is committed in order to threaten, intimidate or terrorize another person, is guilty of a category C felony and shall be 41 42 punished as provided in NRS 193.130.

43 [7.] 8. Except as otherwise provided in subsection [6,] 7, a 44 person who violates subsection 1, 2, 3 or 5:16:





1 (a) For the first offense within the immediately preceding 7 2 years, is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be sentenced to:

3 (1) Imprisonment in the city or county jail or detention 4 facility for not less than 2 days, but not more than 6 months; and

5 (2) Perform not less than 48 hours, but not more than 120 6 hours, of community service.

7 \rightarrow The person shall be further punished by a fine of not less than 8 \$200, but not more than \$1,000. A term of imprisonment imposed 9 pursuant to this paragraph may be served intermittently at the 10 discretion of the judge or justice of the peace, except that each 11 period of confinement must be not less than 4 consecutive hours and 12 must occur either at a time when the person is not required to be at 13 the person's place of employment or on a weekend.

(b) For the second offense within the immediately preceding 7
years, is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be sentenced to:

16 (1) Imprisonment in the city or county jail or detention 17 facility for not less than 10 days, but not more than 6 months; and

18 (2) Perform not less than 100 hours, but not more than 200 19 hours, of community service.

The person shall be further punished by a fine of not less than 5500, but not more than 1000.

(c) For the third and any subsequent offense within the
immediately preceding 7 years, is guilty of a category C felony and
shall be punished as provided in NRS 193.130.

[8.] 9. In addition to any other fine or penalty provided in subsection [6 or] 7 [.] or 8, a court shall order a person convicted of violating subsection 1, 2, 3 or [5] 6 to pay restitution for all costs associated with the care and impoundment of any mistreated animal under subsection 1, 2, 3 or [5] 6, including, without limitation, money expended for veterinary treatment, feed and housing.

31 [9.] 10. The court may order the person convicted of violating
32 subsection 1, 2, 3 or [5] 6 to surrender ownership or possession of
33 the mistreated animal [-] *if ownership has not already been divested*34 *in accordance with NRS 574.055, 574.203 and 574.2035.*

35 **[10.]** *11.* The provisions of this section do not apply with 36 respect to an injury to or the death of an animal that occurs 37 accidentally in the normal course of:

(a) Carrying out the activities of a rodeo or livestock show; or(b) Operating a ranch.

40 [11.] 12. As used in this section [, "horse tripping"]:

41 (a) "Animal rescue organization" has the meaning ascribed to 42 it in NRS 574.202.

43 (b) "Animal shelter" has the meaning ascribed to it in 44 NRS 574.240.





(c) "Feral cat" means a cat that has no apparent owner or 1 2 identification and appears to be unsocialized to humans and 3 unmanageable or otherwise demonstrates characteristics normally associated with a wild or undomesticated animal. 4 (d) "Horse tripping" means the roping of the legs of or 5 otherwise using a wire, pole, stick, rope or other object to 6 7 intentionally trip or intentionally cause a horse, mule, burro, ass or 8 other animal of the equine species to fall. The term does not include: 9 (a) (1) Tripping such an animal to provide medical or other 10 health care for the animal; or 11 (b) (2) Catching such an animal by the legs and then releasing 12 it as part of a horse roping event for which a permit has been issued 13 by the local government where the event is conducted. (e) "Minimal care" means proper sustenance or food 14 reasonably sufficient to meet the nutritional needs of an animal, 15 16 sufficient potable water and accessible shelter. 17 (f) "Properly fitted" means a collar, harness or other device 18 that: 19 (1) Is appropriate for the size of a dog based on the 20 measurements and body weight of the dog; 21 (2) Does not choke the dog or impede the normal breathing 22 or swallowing of the dog; and 23 (3) Does not cause pain or injury to the dog. 24 Sec. 1.5. NRS 574.110 is hereby repealed. Sec. 2. This act becomes effective on July 1, 2023. 25

TEXT OF REPEALED SECTION

574.110 Abandonment of disabled animal unlawful; penalty. 1. A person being the owner or possessor, or having charge or custody, of a maimed, diseased, disabled or infirm animal, who abandons such animal or leaves it to die in a public street, road or public place, or who allows it to lie in a public street, road or public place more than 3 hours after the person receives notice that it is left disabled, is guilty of a misdemeanor.

2. Any agent or officer of any society for the prevention of cruelty to animals, or of any society duly incorporated for that purpose, or any police officer, may lawfully destroy or cause to be destroyed any animal found abandoned and not properly cared for, appearing, in the judgment of two reputable citizens called by the agent or officer to view the same in his or her presence, to be glandered, injured or diseased past recovery for any useful purpose,





or after such agent or officer has obtained in writing from the owner of such animal the owner's consent to such destruction.

3. When any person arrested is, at the time of such arrest, in charge of any animal or of any vehicle drawn by or containing any animal, any agent or officer of such society or societies or any police officer may take charge of such animal and of such vehicle and its contents and deposit the same in a safe place of custody, or deliver the same into the possession of the police or sheriff of the county or place wherein such arrest was made, who shall thereupon assume the custody thereof. All necessary expenses incurred in taking charge of such property shall be a charge thereon.

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
