BDR 14-1091 revises provision relating to criminal justice.

This bill is updating NRS 176A to remove technical violations and temporary revocations, adding jail and house arrest sanctions for violations and increasing penalties for certain crimes. The exact impact cannot be calculated due to many changes in the bill. Many of the laws are reverting to variations of existing laws prior to 2020 which the Division can revert to prior practices.

Any change to the supervision terms of probation or parole will certainly have an impact on resource requirements of the division. Given the unknown number of similar cases in years past, we do not foresee the need for additional resources as they could likely be absorbed by current personnel.

Any addition or increase in criminal penalties will result in the need for more presentence investigation and parole/probation supervision. The total impact of this bill cannot be determined at this time. The agency reserves the right to go to the Interim Finance Committee for the future biennium should workload increases necessitate additional staffing.
