

ELEVENTH SESSION, 1883.

FIRST DAY.

Carson City (Monday), January 1, 1883.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and Statute, the Assembly was called to order at 12 m. by the Hon. Jasper Babcock, Secretary of State.

The roll was called, and the following members-elect answered to their names:

Messrs. Allen, Bell, Brown, Boskowitz, Crowninshield, Dale, Dovey, Franklin, Fox, Fish, Galland, Gray of Storey, Galusha, Grey of White Pine, Hamill, Hardesty, Hardin, Helm, Hill, Hires, Harper, Johnson, Keating, McBurney, Morris, Marsden, Muldoon, Melarkey, Perkins, Pike, Pratt, Price, Riepe, Tait, Varian, Wells and Williams.

Absent-Messrs. Howell, Smith and Schmidtlein.

The Chair appointed R. E. Lowery temporary Clerk and D. D. Donovan temporary Sergeant-at-Arms.

Mr. Fish of Washoe, moved that a committee of two be appointed by the Chair to wait upon one of the Judges of the Supreme Court

and request him to administer the oath of office to the memberselect of the Assembly.

Motion carried.

The Chair appointed Mr. Fish of Washoe, and Mr. Hill of Storey, as such committee.

The Clerk called the names of Mr. Howell and Mr. Smith, who answered to their names.

The committee appointed to wait upon the Supreme Judge returned in due time with Judge Hawley, who administered the oath of office to the following named members-elect of the Assembly.

Allen, Bell, Brown, Boskowitz, Crowninshield, Dale, Dovey, Franklin, Fox, Fish, Galland, Gray of Storey, Galusha, Grey of White Pine, Hamill, Hardesty, Hardin, Howell, Helm, Hill, Hires, Harper, Johnson, Keating, McBurney, Morris, Marsden, Muldoon, Melarkey, Perkins, Pike, Pratt, Price, Riepe, Smith, Tait, Varian, Wells and Williams.

Absent—Mr. Schmidtlein.

Mr. Brown of Ormsby, moved that the Assembly now proceed to the election of permanent officers.

Motion carried.

Mr. Brown of Ormsby, placed in nomination for Speaker Mr. Varian of Washoe; there being no opposition, Mr. McBurney moved that the Speaker be elected by acclamation.

Motion carried.

Mr. Brown moved that the Chair appoint a committee of two to conduct the Speaker-elect to the chair.

Motion carried.

The Chair appointed on that committee Mr. Brown of Ormsby, and Mr. Perkins of Storey.

The committee performed its duty, and Mr. Varian, on assuming the Chair, addressed the House in a few fitting and eloquent remarks.

Mr. Brown placed Mr. Grey of White Pine, in nomination for Speaker pro tem.

There being no opposition, Mr. Grey was elected by acclamation.

Mr. Brown moved that the organization of the House be com-

pleted by the election of the following-named officers:

R. L. Thomas, Chief Clerk; J. W. Ballard, Assistant Clerk; C. H. Stoddard, Sergeant-at-Arms; W. L. Rees, Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms; A. H. Harris, Minute Clerk; J. Kullman, Journal Clerk; H. T. Tucker, Committee Clerk; J. S. Honeyman, Committee Clerk; Benj. Edson, Committee Clerk; Samuel Wagner, Porter; G. L. Curnow, Messenger; A. Pechner, Page; Willie Ash, Page.

There being no opposition, they were elected by acclamation as

attaches of the House.

On motion of Mr. Wells the Chair appointed a committee of two to wait on one of the Supreme Judges, and request him to administer the oath of office to the attaches of the Assembly.

The committee appointed returned with Judge Leonard, who administered the oath of office to all the attaches of the Assembly.

Mr. Wells moved that the members come forward and sign the official oath at the Clerk's desk.

Motion carried.

Mr. Pike moved that the Senate be notified of the organization of the House.

Carried.

Mr. Brown moved that the joint rules and standing rules of the last session of the Legislature be adopted.

Motion carried.

Mr. Bell, of Nye, presented the credentials of Mr. Schmidtlein.

The members-elect of the Assembly came forward and signed the oath of office.

Absent-Mr. Schmidtlein.

Mr. Brown moved that thanks be tendered Supreme Judges Hawley and Leonard for kindness in administering the oath of office, and to Mr. Jasper Babcock for dignity and impartiality manifested while presiding over the organization of the House.

Carried.

Mr. Pike moved that a committee of two be appointed to wait on His Excellency the Governor, and inform him that the Assembly was organized and ready to receive communications from His Excellency.

Motion carried.

The Chair appointed on that committee Messrs. Pike and Hires.

Mr. Wells asked leave to introduce a bill without notice.

Leave granted.

Assembly Bill No. 1 introduced, entitled an Act to create a Legislative Fund.

Bill read first time.

Mr. Wells moved that the rules be suspended and Assembly Bill No. 1. be read second time by title, and referred to the Committee of the Whole.

Motion carried.

The committee appointed to wait on the Governor, returned with the information that His Excellency had no message at present.

Mr. Wells moved that the House resolve itself into Committee of the Whole.

Motion carried.

Assembly now in Committee of the Whole, with Mr. Brown in the chair, proceeded to consider Assembly Bill No. 1.

Mr. Wells moved that the committee arise and report the bill

back to the House with a recommendation that it pass.

Motion carried.

Mr. Wells moved that the amendment proposed by the committee be adopted.

Motion carried.

Mr. Wells moved that the rules be suspended, that the bill be considered engrossed and placed upon its third reading and final passage.

Motion carried.

Bill placed upon its third reading and final passage, and passed. Yeas, 39; nays, none.

The Speaker appointed the following Committee on Mileage: Messrs. McBurney, Reipe and Crowninshield.

On motion of Mr. Pike, at 1:10 p. m., the House adjourned.

The principal industry carried on at the prison is that of boot and shoe making, which your committee found running in full blast. About sixty convicts are employed in the different branches of this department, all under the direction of a very competent foreman. Although the manufacture of boots and shoes has not been a source of much revenue to the State, still, in the estimation of your committee, it is essential to good government, and we are convinced from the Warden's report, and our own observations, that, if properly conducted, it will never prove a losing enterprise to the State. The other departments of the prison we found in first-class order. We have examined thoroughly into the system of discipline, the number and disposition of the guards and the methods of punishment; into all that relates to the commissary and medical departments, to the enforcement of hard labor in the stone guarry and to the operations of the several indus-We have found that the prisoners are treated in a humane manner; that they are well provisioned and well clothed; that the medical advice furnished them is the best that the profession of the county affords. In conclusion, your committee would report that we cannot compliment too highly Warden Garrard for the very efficient manner in which he has conducted affairs appertaining to the State Prison. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Governor's Office, Carson City, February 23, 1883.

To the Honorable the Legislature of Nevada:

I desire to invite your attention to the limited scope for the investment of the proceeds of the sale of lands for educational purposes, now permitted by Section 3, Article XI. of the Constitution of this State, and to suggest to your honorable body the consideration of the propriety of an amendment to said section permitting a greater latitude for investing said moneys than in United States bonds or the bonds of this State, as now limited. To pay the high premium now charged on United States bonds so reduces the per cent. of moneys invested as to render them no longer desirable when other safe securities The State having exhausted its borrowing power to within about \$150,000, the money arising from the sale of these lands must, in the near future, find other securities than the bonds of this State. The bonds held by the State, not being subject to taxation, the same considerations should not enter into the investment of its school moneys as would naturally enter into the consideration of an individual making a similar investment which would be subject to taxation, and, in my opinion, it is desirable that such investment be made in good bonds paying a higher rate of interest than that now permitted by the Government of the United States. For these reasons, and in view of the fact that other State bonds of ample security are being offered at a fair per cent., I invite your consideration of the propriety of so amending the Constitution of this State as to permit an investment of the school moneys in such State bonds or other securities as you may deem expedient and proper.

Resolution as amended adopted.

By Mr. Bell:

Mr. Speaker:

I am about to perform one of the most pleasant duties of my life one that I will ever refer to with pride and pleasure. I have been selected from among my associates to present to you this beautiful watch as a feeble token of our esteem for you as a presiding officer and a gentleman. I regret that this pleasant duty had not fallen into abler hands, as it would have added to the pleasure of the closing hours of this session. I can assure you that language fails to express our gratitude to you for the fair and impartial manner in which you have administered the affairs of your responsible position. beautiful present is better fitted to express our admiration for you than is possible for one to do in words. I have here an elegant watch and chain. You can read on its face something of the ingenuity of man, and each tick tells us how time flies, and so it is with us. Each beat of the heart is one nearer our final resting-place, one step nearer that dark and mysterious river that separates us from the great unknown. And now may you live to an old age, and when the twilight of life gathers around to hide from you the troubles of this world, may eternity's sun rise on the other shore and open and adorn a brighter one.

In behalf of this Assembly I present to you this watch, hoping you

will accept it in the same spirit in which it is given.

To which the Speaker responded.

At 12—midnight—the Speaker declared the House adjourned sine

die, with the following remarks:

Gentlemen of the Assembly: In a few moments, under the decree of the law, the gavel will fall for the last time; our official relations will be severed, and the Eleventh Session of the State will have become one of the things of the past. It is my privilege and duty, at this time, to express my heartfelt gratitude for the uniform kindness, courtesy and fairness with which you have treated your presiding officer during the session. Steadily have you upheld the hands of your Speaker in each trying moment, and I have nothing to add in this connection, except that I fully appreciate your moderation. In return, I only hope to leave with you the conviction that

all my endeavors have been prompted by a conscientious and impartial determination to administer the law. The duties of the Chair are arduous and trying, and if at times the power confided to the keeping of your Speaker has been apparently exercised in an arbitrary and imperious manner, I trust to your generous spirit to blot from your memories all recollection of such unintentional wrong. Your labors in the past two months have, I am certain, been directed in the best interests of the State and for the welfare of its people, and it is to be hoped will be crowned with the success all intelligent and honest efforts deserves. And now as the gavel falls, let us say farewell to each other, "with malice toward none, with charity to all, and firmness in the right;" and in this spirit by virtue of the authority in me vested, under the Constitution and the laws, I declare this House adjourned sine die.


