TWELFTH SESSION.

FIRST DAY.

CARSON CITY (Monday), January 5, 1885.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution of the State and the Statute relating thereto, the Assembly was called to order at twelve o'clock m. by the Honorable the Secretary of State, John M. Dormer, who appointed R. L. Thomas temporary Clerk, and F. C. Bishop temporary Sergeant-at-Arms.

The roll was called and the following-named gentlemen members-elect answered to their names:

Allen, Andrews, Archer, Armbrust, Birmingham, Byrne, Fassett, Flanningham, Folsom, George, Getchell, Gooding, Godfrey, Griswold, Hamill, Hanks, Hanna, Harper, Hawkes, Helm, Langan, Laycock, Leavitt, Liddle, Marden, McAfee, McMillan, Meyers, Pike, Reese, Rice, Smith, Stroh, Stearns, Turrittin, Tyrrell, Westfall, Williams, Williamson, Young.

Mr. Helm moved that the Assembly now proceed to elect a Speaker.

Motion carried.

Mr. George, placed in nomination by Mr. Williamson, was declared the Speaker by acclamation on motion of Mr. Pike.

Chair appointed Mr. Pike and Mr. Williams to conduct the Speaker to the chair.

The committee performed their duty, and Mr. George, on assuming the chair, addressed the Assembly appropriately.

Mr. Helm placed Mr. McMillan of Storey in nomination for Speaker *pro tem*. There being no opposition Mr. McMillan was elected by acclamation.

Mr. Williamson moved that the organization of the House be completed by the election of the following-named officers:

For Speaker, E. T. George; Chief Clerk, George H. Morrison; Assistant Chief Clerk, R. L. Thomas; Sergeant-at-Arms, Frank C. Bishop; Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, Peter Holm; Minute Clerk, A. B. Boles; Journal Clerk, W. H. Stoddard; Enrolling Clerk, G. W. Rutherford; Engrossing Clerk, E. T. Hale; Copying Clerks, Paul Roux and Miss Katie Kinkead; Committee Clerks, A. V. Bradley, Miss V. L. Clinton and Miss Mary Brown; Messenger, Harry E. Martin; Pages, Thomas Merry and David Reese; Porter, D. J. Harris.

On motion they were elected by acclamation attaches of the House.

On motion of Mr. Tyrrell, Mr. Helm and Mr. Flanningham were appointed to wait upon one of the Judges of the Supreme Court and request him to administer the oath of office to the members of the Assembly.

The committee appointed to wait upon the Supreme Judges returned in due time with Judge Hawley, who administered the oath of office to the members-elect of the Assembly.

On motion of Mr. Pike the Chair appointed Mr. Fassett and Mr. McMillan to wait on one of the Supreme Judges and request him to administer the oath of office to the attaches of the Assembly.

The committee appointed returned with Judge Leonard, who administered the oath of office to all the attaches of the Assembly.

Mr. Helm moved that the members come forward and sign the official oath at the desk of the Clerk.

Motion carried.

Mr. Helm moved that thanks be tendered Supreme Judges Hawley and Leonard for administering oath of office, and to Mr. John M. Dormer for the dignity and impartiality manifested while presiding over the organization of the House.

Motion carried.

Mr. Stearns moved that a committee of two be appointed to wait on His Excellency the Governor and inform him that the Assembly was organized and ready to receive communications from His Excellency.

Motion carried.

Mr. Pike moved that the Clerk be instructed to notify the Senate of the organization of the House.

Motion carried.

RESOLUTIONS.

By Mr. Allen:

Resolved, That the Sergeant-at-Arms be instructed to have printed for the use of the Assembly two thousand envelopes and two thousand

letter heads with the following inscription: "Assembly Chamber, Carson City, Nevada."

Adopted.

Mr. Pike gave notice that on to-morrow, or some future day, he would introduce a bill regulating fees and compensation of jurors, and other matters relating thereto.

Mr. Pike introduced Assembly Bill No. 1—An Act to create a Legislative Fund.

Read first time, rules suspended, read second time by title.

On motion of Mr. Pike the House resolved itself into Committee of the Whole with Mr. Pike in the chair, for the purpose of considering Assembly Bill No. 1, "An Act to create a Legislative Fund."

Committee proceeded to consider Assembly Bill No. 1.

Mr. Helm moved that the committee rise and report the bill back to the House with the recommendation that it do pass.

Motion carried.

On motion of Mr. Turriffin the rules were suspended, the bill considered engrossed and placed upon its third reading and final passage.

The Assembly met pursuant to adjournment.

Hon. John M. Dormer, Secretary of State :

I have the honor to return herewith, without my approval, Assembly bill No. 136, entitled "An Act authorizing the appointment and compensation of a Commissioner to aid in securing an appropriation from the General Government in improving the navigation of the Colorado river."

The State is represented in both branches of Congress by gentle-

men capable and willing to advance the interests of our State by securing all proper appropriations the General Government is willing to grant for improving the navigation of any streams bordering upon or within the State. Notwithstanding an earnest endeavor was made by the members from Nevada in the House of Representatives, at its last session, to obtain a small appropriation for the improvement of the Colorado river, yet the appropriation was refused on the ground that an Army Engineer, who had made a survey of the river, made an adverse report thereon. In my opinion all the arguments which can be at present urged have been urged upon Congress in favor of an appropriation as contemplated in the bill, and that no additional results would be obtained by the appointment of a Commissioner, and the expenditure of the amount named, especially at this time, when the treasury is not over-burdened with money. I do not deem it expedient or wise to draw therefrom the amount provided in the bill for the purpose of renewing a demand which has been so recently denied. I am therefore of the opinion that the interests of the State will be better served by withholding my assent to the bill. Very respectfully,

Your Standing Committee on Elections, to whom was referred the papers in the contest case of John A. Palmer vs. H. L. Byrne for the seat of Assemblyman from Elko county, have had the same under consideration, and beg leave to submit the following report :

Your committee, after carefully examining the facts of the case, find that on the 10th day of November, 1884, in accordance with law, R. R. Bigelow, District Judge of the Fourth Judicial District in and for Elko county, Nevada, duly canvassed the official returns for the Legislature from the several precincts of the said Elko county at the general election held Tuesday, November 4, 1884, and it appearing from said canvass that J. A. Palmer had received 635 votes, and H. L. Byrne had received 634 votes for the office of Assemblyman, and from said canvass of said returns of the several precincts of said county it appearing that said J. A. Palmer, having received a majority of one vote, was duly declared, by said District Judge, elected to the office of Assemblyman from said Elko county for the official term expiring on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1886. And your committee further find that said J. A. Palmer had received at said election 635 votes, and that H. L. Byrne, a duly qualified elector of said Elko county, and a candidate for the office of Assemblyman, had received at said election 634 votes. That on the 11th day of November, 1884, said H. L. Byrne duly applied to said Board of County Commissioners of said Elko county as one of the defeated candidates for the office of Assemblyman, in which application said H. L. Byrne duly set forth, under oath, among other things, that he had reason to believe, and did believe, that a mistake or mistakes had occurred on the part of the Inspectors of Election in the following-named precincts, to-wit : Carlin, Clover Valley, Columbia, Fort Hallock, Hallock Station, Huntington Valley, Jack Creek, Lamoyle Valley, Mound Valley, North Ruby, South Ruby, South Fork, Spruce Mountain, Star Valley, Tacoma, Toano, Tuscarora, Wells, and White Rock, sufficient to change the returns of said election for said office of Assemblyman, so far as said Palmer and Byrne were concerned, and that a recount of the votes would show that said Byrne had received a greater number of votes cast at said election for said office than said Palmer ; that thereupon said Board at once and on said 11th day of November, 1884, proceeded to count the votes of said precincts, and found thereby that said J. A. Palmer had received therein 534 votes and that H. L. Byrne had received therein 510 votes, and that said Byrne had received in said precincts three (3) votes more than appeared by the canvass of the official returns of said precincts made by the District

Judge, R. R. Bigelow ; that from said recount it appeared that said Byrne had received at said election a greater number of votes than said Palmer, to-wit : That said H. L. Byrne had received 637 votes, and the said J. A. Palmer 635 votes, whereupon said Palmer, on said 11th day of November, 1884, duly applied to said board as one of the defeated candidates for said office of Assemblyman, in which application he duly set forth, under oath, among other things, that he had reason to believe, and did believe, that a mistake or mistakes had occurred on the part of the Inspectors of Election in the following precincts, to-wit : Mardis, Elko, Railroad, Mountain City, and Island Mountain, sufficient to change the result of election for said office of Assemblyman, so far as the said Palmer and Byrne were concerned, and that a recount of the votes therein would show that said Palmer had received a greater number of the votes cast at said election than said Byrne. That thereupon said Board immediately proceeded to recount the vote of said last-named precincts and found thereby that said J. A. Palmer had received therein 101 votes, and that said H. L. Byrne had received therein 126 votes ; that the precincts hereinbefore named comprised all the election precincts and voting places in the said Elko county ; that all of the votes cast in Elko county at said election held November 4, 1884, were cast in said precincts ; that at said election in said precincts 1,271 votes were cast for said Palmer and Byrne for said office of Assemblyman, of which said Palmer received 635 votes and said Byrne 636 votes. And your committee further find that the County Commissioners of Elko county declared H. L. Byrne duly elected to the office of Assemblyman and issued a certificate accordingly.

Your committee has examined the law governing contested election cases, and find that the contestant, John A. Palmer, has failed to comply with the laws governing contested elections, as provided for in the revised Statutes of the State of Nevada, volume 2, page 23, sections 2,555 to 2,560, inclusive.

Wherefore, your Standing Committee on Elections submit the following resolution :

Resolved, That the Hon. H. L. Byrne is entitled to the seat now in controversy in this Assembly.

ing as aforesaid, are only certificates from the Secretary of State, bearing his signature and seal of the State of Nevada, that the matter contained in certain clippings from certain newspapers, which said clippings are attached to the several certificates and made part thereof, are true, full and correct copies of the original certain proposed amendments to the Constitution agreed to by a majority of the members of both Houses of the said eleventh session of the Legislature, and that the same were published three months prior to the last general election, as required, which certificates and papers thereto attached, fail to assume the form of a joint resolution and fail to give any history of the passage of any joint resolutions or amendments of the Constitution, or to show that the same were referred as required, or that said provisions of said section of the Constitution have been complied with ; and,

WHEREAS, The several papers submitted by messages as aforesaid from the Honorable the Senate to this Assembly, endorsed "Senate joint resolutions," purporting to be the joint resolutions or amendments to the Constitution, and to have been agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each House of the said eleventh session of the Legislature, are not joint resolutions within either the letter or spirit as contemplated by the said section one of said Article of the Constitution, but are only certificates of the Secretary of State as to certain matters therein contained ; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the said papers purporting to be Senate joint resolutions, purporting to agree to the said proposed Constitutional amendments, be and the same are hereby respectfully referred to the Honorable the Senate, with a request that said body furnish this Assembly with at least the proper preamble and resolutions bearing evidence that said joint resolutions or amendments, purporting to have been agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each House of the said eleventh session of the Legislature, have been duly agreed to and referred to this the next, to wit: the twelfth session of the Legislature, in compliance with section one of said Article of the Constitution, and that said amendments have been duly agreed to by a majority of the Honorable the Senate.

Mr. Williamson, by leave, out of order, submitted the following report :

Mr. Speaker :

Your Standing Committee on State Prison, having paid official visit to that institution on the 17th, 19th, 21st and 23d insts., respectfully submit the following report :

That we have given the matters relating to the official conduct of Warden and subordinate officers a rigid and careful examination, have carefully examined the biennial report of the Warden, together with the books and accounts of the Prison for the years 1883 and 1884, and find that they correspond ; also that the biennial report for said years compares favorably with former reports. We have made thorough investigation in regard to the discipline, the number and disposition of the guards, and the methods of punishing prisoners, and into all that relates to the commissary and medical departments, and also as to the manner of operating the several industries.

We find that the prisoners are well cared for, that the provisions and clothing are amply sufficient and of good quality, and that the medical advice furnished them is as good as the profession of the county affords.

The manufacture of boots and shoes we found to be the most important industry at the Prison. We made a thorough investigation as to the material, stock on hand and workmanship, and found them all to be of good quality and from which the State derives a fair profit; but for obvious reasons we do not believe the manufacture of boots and shoes in our Prison can ever be made an industry of much profit to the State; yet as long as the Prison remains where it now is we can see no other available self-sustaining industry.

In an institution of this kind the Warden cannot be expected to suit everybody, but we have endeavored to make such observations as would enable us to come to fair conclusions.

Our attention has been called to a few things which we think are of general and special interest. Economy is commendable in a public officer who has the disbursing of public funds, and when exercised with liberal judgment, and for the best interests of the State, should be encouraged. Yet in our opinion there is a possibility of carrying this matter too far.

FEMALE DEPARTMENT.

In our opinion there should have been an apartment for the use of the female prisoners constructed heretofore. The cells now occupied by these prisoners are under the same roof as the ice house. Your committee called the attention of Warden Bell to this fact, who stated that he had partitioned off a suitable place in the general store house for the storage of ice, which was inspected and found in course of construction. We would recommend to our succeeding Warden that two new and well ventilated cells be constructed for the use of the female prisoners.

HOSPITAL.

At present there are no accommodations for the sick and infirm prisoners. They are now compelled to occupy their cells or the large dining-room, either of which we consider unsuitable. We would recommend that the building constructed during the administrations of General Batterman and Major Garrard, and at present used as cell rooms for female prisoners, be fitted up for the exclusive use as a prison hospital.

ELECTION OF WARDEN.

From the evidence presented before your committee they are of the opinion that the general welfare of the Prison could be better subserved by changing the manner of electing the Warden. As the

law now stands much necessary legislation seems to hinge on the election of this or that candidate for this office. While in order to secure his election the Warden has frequently to promise each and every subordinate position in the institution to parties who control a vote or two in his election, he often finds positions promised to men who by experience he afterwards learns are not adapted to the duties assigned them. This manner of filling the subordinate positions we do not consider conducive to good results, and particularly does it prevent the maintenance of good discipline. A man might, for instance, make a good Commissary, while as Captain or Lieutenant of the Guard he would be entirely out of place.

We believe that the law should be so amended that the Warden could be elected without making any concessions or promises, and when an officer was found to be incompetent he would have no promises to break and no trusts to fulfill. In other words, we urge upon the Legislature the importance of electing a Warden in such a manner that he can take control of the Prison free handed and manage its affairs as his own judgment dictates, otherwise the discipline of the Prison is likely to become seriously impaired. In conclusion, your committee would say, in justice to Warden Bell, that we believe his character to be above reproach, and that he has endeavored to manage the Prison affairs with efficiency and strict economy for the best interest of the State.

To the Honorable the Senate :

I hereby return without my approval Senate bill No. 11, "An Act in relation to the salaries of County Assessors." During the last canvass no subject connected with State policy was so fully discussed as the general reduction of State and county expenses. As to the necessity of such reduction, owing to the falling off of our taxable property, there was but one opinion. The bill now before me increases the salary of the Assessor of Nye county from twelve hundred to sixteen hundred dollars per annum. I believe that county can be assessed in four months, and probably in three. I am assured that many competent men in the county are willing to accept the office and discharge all its duties at the present salary. With the heavy debt now burdening the tax-payers of Nye county, with their General Fund absolutely exhausted, and little or no tax due before next November, with the salaries of all the county officers unpaid for several months of the past year, and with the county indebtedness worth only twenty-five cents on the dollar, it seems to me we should endeavor by legislation to reduce the expenses of the county rather than to increase them. But the bill is wrong in principle. No salary should be increased or reduced during the term of an officer already elected. Under our government no citizen can be compelled to accept an office, and no inducement should be held out to any particular individual that an exception in his favor will be made, when other citizens, equally competent, stand ready to discharge the duties of the office at the compensation fixed by law.

The undersigned committee, representing the Mechanics' Union of Storey county, respectfully represent that they believe that it would be to the greatest good of our State to secure the removal of the State University now situated at Elko, Elko county, to either Carson or Reno, or wherever your honorable body deem it advisable in order to secure the most beneficial results.

The University as it is now situated in the eastern part of the State is not by any means easy of access to the masses of our population,

and for further argument in support of the removal of the University from its present locality, we would respectfully refer you to the biennial report of the Board of Regents of the University for the years 1883 and 1884, page nine (9).

We would also respectfully draw the attention of your honorable body to section four (4) of article eleven (11) of the State Constitution, wherein provision is made for the establishment of a State University which shall embrace Departments for Agriculture, Mechanic Arts and Mining. Especially would we call your attention to the Department of Mechanic Arts, for the teaching of which we believe no provision has ever been made. Taking into consideration the fact that we have no manufactories whereby the youth of Nevada can obtain a knowledge of the different trades by usual ways, that is by apprenticeship, we deem it pre-eminently the duty of the State to carry out the provisions and stipulations of said section, that is, so far as mechanic art is concerned.

We further believe that it is essential to the future welfare of the State to assist our boys in procuring an education that will enable them to obtain at least an elementary knowledge of mechanic arts, who at present, wishing to obtain the knowledge spoken of above, are forced to leave the State at great expense to parents and guardians. By following this course our young men, the very people we should most desire to keep among us, become alienated and rarely find their way back.

Further, that the law requiring publishing in newspapers of notice of proposals for stationery, for State and legislative purposes, be so amended as to have the State Printer print said notices in circular form and forward them to the respective wholesale houses on this coast and in eastern cities, thereby saving the cost of said publishing. That there be a law enacted making the janitor of the Capitol building responsible, under a bond, for the safe keeping of all property inventoried to him by the respective Sergeants-at-Arms of the Senate and Assembly in any way appertaining or belonging to the two rooms of the said bodies, until the next session of the Legislature of this State, to be by him delivered to the properly elected Sergeants-at-Arms of the incoming Senate and Assembly, to be used by them during their session.

Your Standing Committee on State Institutions hereby report and they have paid an official visit to the State Orphans' Home, that respectfully submit the following as our report : We found the children—fifty in number—seemingly healthy, cheerful and content. Their food and clothing good and their general appearance indicate that they are as well cared for as the circumstances will permit. The school we find to be very interesting, and judging from numerous recitations given during our visit were led to believe that the school connected with this institution will compare favorably with the best of our public schools. But while we found many things to commend we found many we must condemn. For instance, we found the sewerage bad ; the outhouses in a dilapidated and unhealthy condition ; the sinks or places for washing hands and faces, together with the bath tubs, are in a very bad condition and should at once be replaced by new ones ; the cellar under the main building, in which is stored vegetables, etc., needs repairing and renovating ; the boys and girls' playrooms should be repainted and calcimined ; the roof of the main building is in such condition that during stormy weather it leaks badly. With these and many other needed repairs we would most respectfully recommend that an appropriation of \$2,500 be made for this purpose. In conclusion will say that we believe the management of the institution to be good, honest and economical.

SECTION 1. Every native male citizen of the United States, and every naturalized male citizen, who shall have been a citizen of the United States at least six months next preceding any election (not laboring under the disabilities named in this Constitution), of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have actually, and not constructively, resided in the State one year, and in the district or county ninety days, next preceding any election, shall be entitled to vote for all officers that now are or hereafter may be elected by the

people, and upon all questions submitted to the electors at such elections; *provided*, that no person who has been or may be convicted of treason or felony, in any State or Territory of the United States, unless restored to civil rights, and no person convicted of the offense of selling his vote at any general or special election, held within this State, and no idiot or insane person, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

No. 16—Senate Concurrent Resolution relative to Constitutional amendment, passed February 28, 1883.

Resolved by the Senate, the Assembly concurring, That the Constitution of the State of Nevada be amended as follows:

Amend Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Nevada so as to read as follows:

SECTION 1. Any amendment or amendments to this Constitution may be proposed in the Senate or Assembly, and if agreed to by a vote of two-thirds of the members elected to each House, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be entered on the respective Journals of each House, with the yeas and nays taken thereon. Any amendment or amendments agreed to by the Legislature, as provided in this section, shall be published for three months next preceding the time for electing the next Legislature, and shall be submitted to the people at the time for electing the next Legislature in such manner as the Legislature agreeing to such amendment or amendments shall prescribe. And if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments by a majority of the electors voting for members of the Legislature at such election, such amendment or amendments shall become part of the Constitution.

SEC. 2. If at any time the Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of the members elected to each House, shall determine that it is necessary to cause a revision of this entire Constitution, they shall recommend to the electors in such manner and at such time as the Legislature shall prescribe, to vote for or against a convention; and if it shall appear that a majority of the electors voting at such election shall have voted in favor of calling a convention, the Legislature shall, at its next session, provide by law for calling a convention, to be holden within six months after the passage of such law, and such convention shall consist of a number of members, not more than that of both branches of the Legislature, and not less than one-half of that number. The Constitution adopted by such convention must be submitted to and ratified by a vote of the people.

No. 17—Senate Concurrent Resolution relative to an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nevada, passed February 28, 1883.

Resolved by the Senate, the Assembly concurring, That Section 3 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be amended so as to read as follows :

SECTION 3. All lands, including the sixteenth and thirty-sixth sections in every township, donated for the benefit of public schools in the Act of the Thirty-eighth Congress, to enable the people of the Territory of Nevada to form a State Government, the thirty thousand acres of public lands granted by an Act of Congress approved July second, A. D. eighteen hundred and sixty-two, for each Senator and Representative in Congress, and all proceeds of lands that have been, or may hereafter be granted or appropriated by the United States to this State; and also, the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new States under the Act of Congress distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several States of the Union, approved A. D. eighteen hundred and forty-nine; *provided*, that Congress make provision for or authorize such diversion to be made for the purpose herein contained, all estates that may escheat to the State, all of such per cent. as may be granted by Congress on the sale of lands, all fines collected under the penal laws of the State, all property given or bequeathed to the State for educational purposes, and all proceeds derived from any or all of said sources shall be, and the same are hereby solemnly pledged for educational purposes, and shall not be transferred to any other fund for other uses, and the interest thereon shall from time to time be apportioned among the several counties in proportion to the ascertained number of persons between the ages of six and eighteen years in the different counties, and the Legislature shall provide for the sale of floating land warrants to cover the aforesaid lands, and for the investment of all proceeds derived from any of the above mentioned sources in United States bonds, or bonds of this State, or bonds of such other State or States as may be selected by the boards authorized by law to make such investments; *provided*, that the interest only of the aforesaid proceeds shall be used for educational purposes, and any surplus interest shall be added to the principal sum; *and, provided further*, that such portion of said interest as may be necessary may be appropriated for the support of the State University.

Mr. Allen entered his written protest against the action of the Assembly in the matter of the proposed Constitutional amendments as follows :

I enter my protest against the passage of Senate Concurrent Resolutions Nos. 12, 16 and 17 on the grounds that there are no Constitutional amendments pending ; that the papers purporting to be such are only certificates of the Secretary of the State, as to matters therein contained as being true ; that said pretended resolutions were never spread on the Journals of either House of the Eleventh Session of the Legislature, and were not referred to the Twelfth Session of the Legislature in compliance with the provisions of the Constitution relating to amendments thereof.

The committee appointed to wait on His Excellency the Governor returned, bearing the compliments of that officer, and reported that the Governor had no further messages to transmit to or business to transact with the honorable the Assembly.

By Mr. Hamill (by leave):

Resolved, That the thanks of the House be and are hereby tendered to William McMillan, the Speaker *pro tem.*, for the able and courteous manner in which he has discharged his duties in such capacity.

On motion of Mr. Hamill the resolution was adopted.

Mr. Stearns moved that Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 29, relative to submitting the question of calling a Constitutional Convention, be corrected in its history so as to show that it was lost by not receiving the necessary two-thirds vote, quoting law in support of his motion.

Carried, and the history corrected in accordance with instructions.

Mr. Allen rose in his place and called the attention of the Assembly to the fact that the hour was near at hand when in accordance with the Constitution of the State, the twelfth session of the Nevada Legislature would adjourn. He addressed the Assembly in a dignified and eloquent manner as follows:

Mr. Speaker:

Social and business relations often beget ties near akin to those of blood. We came here at the pleasure of our constituents. Many of us met as strangers. We, as I believe, have honestly endeavored to perform the duties imposed upon us. True, on many issues, we have exercised our rights, and to the roll call answered "yea" or "nay," as duty appeared to dictate. We have had conscientious differences. In the future it will be pleasant to recall the fact that in debate these differences have been discussed in words of consideration and courtesy. No member, Mr. Speaker, during this the twelfth session of the Nevada Legislature has abused his privilege or wantonly wronged another. Soon we will go to our constituents to answer to them for our words and actions here. Before returning to our homes, Mr.

Speaker, we, over whom you have presided with dignity and marked impartiality during the session soon to close, must kindly assure you that a feeling nearly to that of kin exists between us and with us, as subordinates, toward you. Prompted by this feeling, allow me, Mr. Speaker, on behalf of this the Honorable the Assembly, of which you are the representative head, as evidence of our appreciation of you and your services, to present you with this cane, which will be ornamental to you while young, a staff in age, and when the trials of life are over a fit heirloom to pass to your children and children's children. Accept it, not as a mere souvenir from this Assembly, but as it is intended, as a mark of esteem that may prompt you to go onward and upward until you cross that river, from the other side of which none has ever returned.

Upon the conclusion of the remarks of Mr. Allen, Mr. George, Speaker of the Assembly, rose and in a feeling and impressive manner addressed the Assembly as follows :

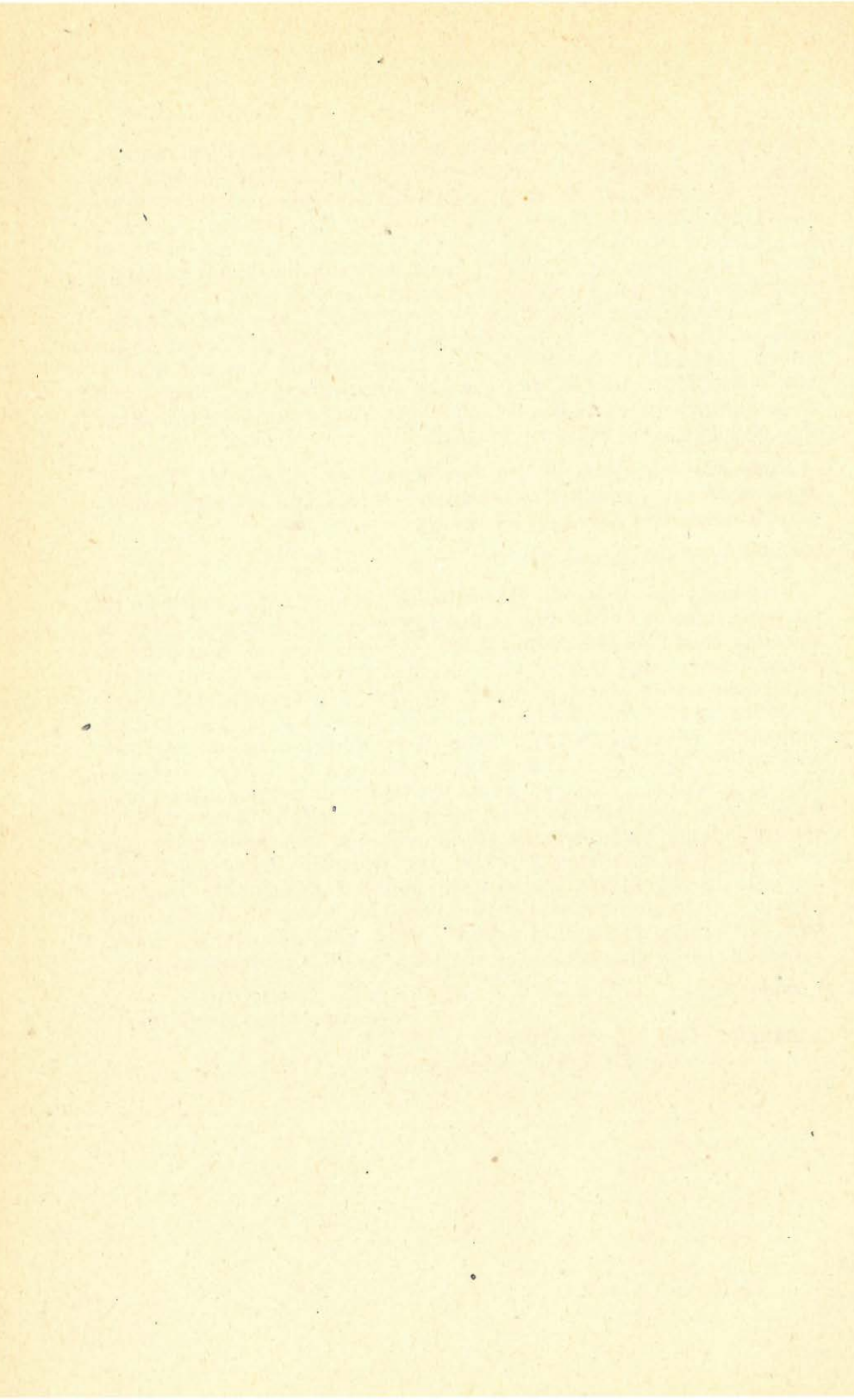
Gentlemen of the Assembly :

I sincerely thank you for this valuable present, not so much for its intrinsic value as for the kindly feelings which it expresses.
