SEVENTEENTH SESSION.

FIRST DAY.

CARSON CITY (Monday), January 21, 1895.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and the statute, the Assembly was called to order at 12 m. by Hon. Eugene Howell, Secretary of State.

Mr. McNaughten moved that a committee of three be appointed to request one of the Justices of the Supreme Court to administer the oath of office to the members-elect of the Assembly.

Mr. Allen of Eureka moved to amend that the Assembly proceed to the election of temporary Clerk and temporary Sergeant-at-Arms.

Mr. McNaughten accepted the amendment.

Mr. McNaughten then moved that T. L. Hoppin of Humboldt be elected temporary Clerk, and H. P. Flannery of Storey be elected Sergeant-at-Arms.

There being no further nominations the vote was taken, and Messrs. Hoppin and Flannery, receiving a majority of the votes, were declared elected.

The roll was then called and the following answered to their names:

Messrs. Allen of Churchill, Allen of Eureka, Beals, Beck, Briggs, Brockliss, Conboie, Constant, Coryell, Court, Crisler, Denton, Flanigan, Francis, Gorman, Greenwood, Hall, Hinman, Hogan, Leidy, Murphy, McDonald, McNaughten, Newman, Noel, Pitt, Russell, Stanley, Weiland and Wilson.

All present.

Nominations for temporary Speaker and temporary Speaker pro tem. were declared in order.

Mr. Allen of Eureka nominated Mr. Allen of Churchill for temporary Speaker.

Mr. Weiland seconded the nomination.

There being no further nominations, Mr. Allen was elected, and took the chair.

Mr. McNaughten nominated Mr. Noel of Storey for temporary Speaker pro tem.

Mr. Wilson seconded the nomination.

There being no further nominations, Mr. Noel was declared elected.

Mr. Noel moved a committee of two be appointed to request one of the Justices of the Supreme Court to administer the oath of office to the members of the Assembly.

Carried.

Messrs. Noel and Allen of Eureka were appointed and retired, soon returning with Chief Justice Bigelow, who administered the oath of office to the following named members-elect:

Messrs. Allen of Churchill, Allen of Eureka, Beals, Beck, Briggs, Brockliss, Conboie, Constant, Coryell, Court, Crisler, Denton, Flanigan, Francis, Gorman, Greenwood, Hall, Hinman, Hogan, Leidy, Murphy, McDonald, McNaughten, Newman, Noel, Pitt, Russell, Stanley, Weiland and Wilson.

Nominations for Speaker were declared in order.

Mr. Denton nominated Mr. Allen of Churchill.

Mr. Weiland seconded the nomination.

Mr. Allen then called Mr. Noel, Speaker pro tem., to the chair.

Mr. Stanley nominated Mr. Conboie of Storey.

Mr. Murphy seconded the nomination.

Mr. Allen of Eureka moved the nominations be closed and a vote taken.

Carried.

Roll call resulted in the following vote:

For Allen of Churchill—Allen of Eureka, Beck, Constant, Coryell, Court, Denton, Francis, Gorman, Hinman, Leidy, McDonald, McNaughten, Newman, Noel, Pitt, Weiland and Wilson—17.

For Conboie—Beals, Briggs, Brockliss, Conboie, Crisler, Flanigan, Greenwood, Hall, Hogan, Murphy, Russell and Stanley—12.

Not voting—Mr. Allen of Churchill.

Mr. Allen receiving seventeen votes, and Mr. Conboie twelve, Mr. Allen was declared elected.

Mr. Allen then assumed the chair, thanking the Assembly for the honor conferred. He announced the next order of business to be the election of Speaker pro tem.

Mr. McNaughten nominated Mr. Noel of Storey, Mr. Wilson seconding the nomination.

Mr. McNaughten moved the nominations be closed.

Seconded by Mr. Wilson.

Carried.

Mr. Allen of Eureka moved that Mr. Noel be declared the unanimous choice of the convention.

Carried.

The election of Chief Clerk was declared the next order of business.

Mr. Pitt nominated T. L. Hoppin of Humboldt.

Mr. Francis seconded the nomination.

There being no further nominations, Mr. Hoppin was elected.

Mr. Allen of Eureka moved that Mr. Hoppin be declared the unanimous choice of the convention.

Carried.

Mr. McDonald nominated Wm. Laurensen of White Pine for Assistant Clerk.

Seconded by Mr. Denton.

Mr. Allen of Eureka moved that the list of caucus nominees for attaches be read.

Carried.

The following list was read: Chief Clerk, T. L. Hoppin, Humboldt; Assistant Clerk, Wm. Laurensen, White Pine; Sergeant-at-Arms, H. P. Flannery, Storey; Minute Clerk, W. H. North, Nye; Journal Clerk, C. R. Ford, Eureka; Enrolling Clerk, Lottie Armstrong, Washoe; Engrossing Clerk, Ida Gardner, Lyon; Committee Clerk, W. A. Bacon, Elko; Copying Clerk, Ida Minor, Humboldt; Messenger, James Dopson, Esmeralda; Porter, Richard Brown, Storey; Page, E. J. McDonald, Ormsby.

Mr. McNaughten moved that the persons named in the list read be declared the attaches of the Assembly.

Carried.

Mr. Noel moved to proceed to administer the oath of office.

Carried.

Mr. Coryell moved that a committee of two be appointed to request one of the Justices of the Supreme Court to administer the oath of office to the attaches.

Carried.

Messrs. Coryell and McDonald were appointed as such committee.

Judge Belknap was secured, and administered the oath.

Mr. Noel moved that the members of the Assembly and attaches subscribe to the official oath.

Seconded by Mr. McNaughten.

The Chair ruled next in order to be the appointment of a committee to wait on the Governor and Senate.

The point was raised that the Assembly was not duly organized.

Point sustained.

Mr. McNaughten moved that a committee of two be appointed to secure blanks for members-elect and attaches of the Assembly to sign the official oath.

Carried.

Messrs. McNaughten and Conboie were appointed such committee.

A committee of the Senate notified the House that the Senate was duly organized and ready for business.

The committee reported that they had procured the required blanks.

On motion of Mr. Conboie the Assembly recessed until 2:30 P. M.

HOUSE IN SESSION

At 2:30 P. M.

Quorum present.

Absent—Mr. Russell.

Mr. Beck filed notice of election contest of Amos R. Hardin vs. Frank Francis of Humboldt; also, notice of election contest of J. A. Leete vs. C. F. Murphy of Ormsby.

Mr. McDonald moved the adoption of the rules of the Sixteenth Session of the Nevada Legislature.

Mr. Allen of Eureka raised the point of order that the organization of the House was not complete, and Mr. McDonald withdrew his motion.

Mr. Francis moved to organize according to law before taking action on notices of election contests.

The Chair ruled the motion out of order, as the House had taken no action in the matter.

Mr. Noel moved to proceed to organize the House according to law.

Carried.

Mr. Noel moved to subscribe to the official oath.

Carried.

Mr. McNaughten moved that a committee of two be appointed to request the Chief Justice to be present while the members signed the official oath.

Messrs. Weiland and Gorman were appointed, and soon returned with Chief Justice Bigelow.

Mr. Allen of Eureka moved that each member step to the desk and sign the oath in the presence of the Chief Justice.

Carried.

Mr. Noel moved that the attaches sign the oath in the presence of a Justice of the Supreme Court.

They soon returned with Judge Belknap, and the following attaches signed the official oath in his presence:

Mr. McDonald moved the adoption of the standing rules of the Sixteenth Session until otherwise ordered.

Carried.

Mr. Conboie moved that a committee of three be appointed by the Chair to inform his Excellency the Governor that the Assembly is duly organized and ready to receive communications.

Carried.

Messrs. Conboie, Wilson and Pitt were appointed on this committee and retired to perform the assigned duty.

Mr. Noel moved that a committee of three be appointed to inform the Senate of the organization of the Assembly.

Carried.

Messrs. Noel, McDonald and Briggs were appointed, and retired.

Mr. Denton moved that a committee of three be appointed to wait on the clergymen of Carson and invite them to officiate alternately as Chaplain of the Assembly during the present session.

Carried.

Messrs. Denton, Newman and Crisler were appointed as such committee.

Concurrent Resolution No. 1—Relative to a Constitutional Convention to revise the Constitution of the State of Nevada.

Read first time.

The committee appointed to wait on the Governor reported that he had no communications to make to-day, but hoped to be able to deliver his inaugural to-morrow.

The committee appointed to wait on the Senate reported that the Senate desired a list of the officers of the Assembly.

Mr. Noel moved that the clerks prepare a list of the officers of the Assembly and present the same to the Senate.

Mr. Allen of Eureka moved to adjourn until 11 A. M. to-morrow, the 22d of January, 1895.

Your Committee on Elections, to whom was referred the case of Amos R. Hardin against Frank Francis for a seat in this honorable body as an Assemblyman for Humboldt county, beg leave to report as follows:

That we have examined and duly and carefully considered all the evidence furnished by both parties in this proceeding, and heard arguments on both sides by eminent counsel, and hereby submit the following report:

That on the sixth day of November, 1894, pursuant to the law and the proclamation of the Governor of said State of Nevada, a general election was duly held in said county, providing, among other officers, for the election of two members of the Assembly.

That the candidates for said offices of members of the Assembly were F. Francis, Amos R. Hardin, Henry Busch and W. C. Pitt, all being duly qualified.

That upon the completion of the official count and canvass of the votes cast for said officers held and made by the Board of County Commissioners of said county sitting as a Board of Canvassers commencing on the tenth day of November, 1894, it appeared that said named candidates had received the votes for said offices as follows, to wit:

W. C. Pitt, 498.

Amos R. Hardin, 454.

Frank Francis, 458.

Henry Busch, 387.

That from said count and canvass, it appearing that said W. C. Pitt and F. Francis had received the highest number of votes cast at said election for said offices, they were declared by the said Board duly elected thereto.

That afterwards and within the time required by law, said Amos R. Hardin filed with the Clerk of said Board an application for a recount of the votes cast at said election for said offices in due form, duly executed and attested by affidavit, in all requirements fully complying with the law, in which application said Amos R. Hardin duly set forth, among other things under oath, that he had reasons to believe, and did believe, that a mistake or mistakes had occurred on the part of the Inspectors of Election in each and every precinct of said county, particularly naming each and every precinct, sufficient to change the result of said election for said office, and it duly appearing from the said canvass that said Francis had received a majority of but four votes over said Hardin for said office, and that said majority was less than ten, the said Board commencing on the third day of December, 1894, after consideration of the premises, and as a Board of Canvassers, duly recounted under the provisions of the Australian Ballot law, passed in 1891, which is now the law of the State, all the votes cast at said election for said offices; that said recount was completed on the fourth day of December, 1894; that all the votes of election precincts, wherein mistakes were alleged to have occurred, were duly recounted, and from such recount, upon a completion thereof, it appeared:

The said Busch received 385 votes.

The said Francis received 446 votes.

The said Hardin received 453 votes.

The said Pitt received 494 votes.

That on the third day of December, 1894, and after the filing of said application for recount by said Hardin, and before the result of said recount was determined, the Clerk of said Board issued a certificate of election to said Francis for said office.

That said Board thereupon made an order declaring said Hardin duly elected as the result of said recount, and ordering a certificate of election issued to him, and annulling said certificate previously issued to said Francis.

That on the second day of January, 1895, upon a writ of certiorari granted by the Court of the Second Judicial District of the State of Nevada that said Board was commanded to show cause why their action should not be reviewed by the said Court on the grounds that they had exceeded their jurisdiction in holding the said recount and annulling the said certificate of election granted to said Francis.

That the cause came on for trial, the Court refused to set aside the recount held by said Board, but decided that after said Board had issued one certificate of election it had no power to annul the same and issue another.

Wherefore your committee have passed the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Hon. Amos R. Hardin be and is hereby declared entitled to a seat in this honorable body as an Assemblyman for Humboldt county.

Mr. Speaker:

The minority of your Committee on Elections to whom was referred the matter of contest instituted by Amos R. Hardin for the seat of Frank Francis, sitting member of this Assembly, beg leave to report that we find that at the general election held on the sixth day of November last, in the county of Humboldt, that among other officers voted for, were the following candidates for the Assembly, to wit: W. C. Pitt, A. R. Hardin, F. Francis and Henry Busch. That the result of said election as canvassed by the Board of County Commissioners of Humboldt county, sitting as a Board of Canvassers, it was ascertained and declared that W. C. Pitt had 498 votes for Assemblyman, that Frank Francis had 458 votes, that Amos R. Hardin had 454, and Henry Busch had 387 votes.

That thereupon said Board made an order declaring W. C. Pitt and said Frank Francis duly elected as the lawful Assemblymen from said county of Humboldt to the Seventeenth Session of the Nevada Legislature, and that then certificates of election were delivered to said persons last above named.

That subsequently a recount was had before said Board of County Commissioners, which resulted, after counting the ballots from all the precincts in the county, in finding that Frank Francis had 446 votes and A. R. Hardin 453 votes. That said last named result was obtained after throwing out and not counting thirty-three votes, twenty-three of which

were cast for said Francis and ten votes which had been cast for A. R. Hardin.

That in the opinion of a minority of this committee said Board of Canners clearly exceeded its lawful province in the premises, and that had the ballots been counted as cast by the voters and originally returned, said Francis would still have had a majority of four or more votes over A. R. Hardin.

That for the purpose of this report the affidavit of L. F. Dunn, County Clerk of said Humboldt county, under date of January 26, 1895, is made a part hereof, which said affidavit clearly shows in detail the names of the precincts from which said votes were thrown out and rejected.

That said recount, as aforesaid, was made contrary to the advice and protest of the District Attorney of said Humboldt county and the objection of one of the members of said Board.

That in the opinion of the undersigned said recount as aforesaid was contrary to law, and we refer for authority for so saying to the case of Garrard vs. Gallagher, decided by our Supreme Court, in which it was held that "the contest for members of the Legislature can only be made in pursuance of the provisions of the statute."

Garrard vs. Gallagher, 11 Nevada, page 382.

In conclusion, we do say that in our opinion it appears that at the said election more votes were cast for said Frank Francis than there were for said A. R. Hardin for said office aforesaid.

We therefore offer the following:

Resolved, That in view of the foregoing, and that the will of a majority of the voters of said Humboldt county may be regarded, it is the judgment of the Assembly that said Frank Francis be declared duly elected Assemblyman from said county.

A Grand Jury shall be drawn and summoned at least once a year in each county. In criminal prosecutions in any court whatever, the party accused shall have the right to a speedy public trial; to have the process of the court to compel the attendance of witnesses in his behalf, and to appear and defend in person and with counsel. No person shall be twice put in jeopardy for the same offense, nor be compelled, in any criminal case, to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation having been first made or secured, except in cases of war,

riot, fire or great public peril, in which case compensation shall be afterward made.

Mr. Speaker:

Your minority Committee on Counties and County Boundaries beg leave to report that they have carefully considered Assembly Bill No. 81.

It seems inherent in the human family to reach out and take without leave (either by combination or otherwise) that which may be acquired by the least effort and oftentimes, in making that effort, we are liable to overlook the interests of others in our hurry to appropriate to ourselves that which rightfully belongs to others. When we study up the reason why governments are necessary, we find that to correct such abuses governments are founded on that principle and that alone. For it would naturally follow that if each and every one, individually or collectively, were striving to do the right, there would be no abuses to correct, consequently no set of rules laid down and enforced with fines and imprisonment would be necessary. Now, as we are called together at regular periods to lay down rules for others to which are attached heavy fines and penalties for infractions of these rules by an individual or individuals appropriating to themselves that which in fee simple belongs to others, should it be any less wrong, or any more right, that this body should pass laws and lay down rules, and be the first to disregard them? Would it not have a tendency to lose respect for our law makers?

Now, in the matter of cutting down the established boundaries of counties that are prosperous and able to maintain a strong county government that can protect the interests of the weak against the strong, when it becomes necessary, without fear or favor:

Can we in justice dole out to other counties, parcels or pieces that would only temporarily strengthen them?

Now, take the county of Storey for instance—a county represented here

by six members—is it not a strange paradox that they should come here asking (and in all apparent sincerity) that a county that is only represented by four members should have her boundaries disturbed to the advantage of the county that has six members? What kind of a precedent do we establish in dealing out such heroic doses of justice? Would it not be better to protect the interests of those we represent, to lessen the expenses to the taxpayers, by consolidating weak counties? Can we continue to indefinitely brace up county governments that are steadily falling into decay? It seems to me that the principle is bad and the practice vicious.

I respectfully submit this minority report to your honorable body with the recommendation that Assembly Bill No. 81 do not pass.

Your Committee on State Prison and Insane Asylum beg leave to report that they have carefully examined the buildings of the Insane Asylum and State Prison, and their management.

We find that the Insane Asylum has been, and is now, conducted in a manner that is a credit to the State and the officers in charge. The inmates are humanely treated, and every consideration given for their care and comfort, that they may be restored, if possible, to society and usefulness.

We find the management badly cramped for room, particularly in Ward C, wherein are confined the patients that require isolation, and we think that it would be in the line of true economy to anticipate our future needs, and be prepared for an increased number of inmates.

We find, after an investigation of the State Prison buildings, that they are badly in need of repair, the water from leaky roofs coursing down the walls. They are falling into decay, and should be painted and the roofs repaired where needed, and in some instances the old roofs replaced with new ones. The cooking utensils and table ware are virtually worn out, while the dining tables, from long and continuous use, need new tops on them. We think, in the interest of economy, and for bettering

the condition of the inmates, the prisoners should be kept employed as much of the time as possible, and recommend that, for State buildings to be erected, all the stone needed in their construction should be quarried and dressed under the prison management.

We recommend that the sum of twenty-five hundred (\$2,500) dollars be appropriated to make necessary repairs.

In drawing your attention to the present run-down condition of the State Prison buildings, we, your committee, wish to be understood as not censuring any preceding management, as this is apparently the result of former Legislatures failing to make the necessary appropriations to keep the buildings in repair.
