TWENTY-THIRD SESSION

FIRST DAY.

CARSON CITY (Monday), January 21, 1907.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and the statute, the Assembly was called to order at 12 m. by Hon. W. G. Douglass, Secretary of State.

Rev. H. H. McCreery of Carson City, upon invitation, opened the House with prayer.

Upon motion of Mr. Folsom, Richard Galligan of Esmeralda County was chosen temporary Sergeant-at-Arms.

Upon motion of Mr. Sadler, George A. Cole of Nye County was chosen temporary Chief Clerk.

The roll was called, and Mr. Russell of Elko County was noted absent.

Mr. Williams nominated Mr. R. E. Skaggs of Elko County for temporary Speaker.

Mr. Bray nominated Mr. A. W. Holmes of Washoe County for temporary Speaker.

Upon motion the temporary Chief Clerk was instructed to call the roll, and Mr. Skaggs was duly elected temporary Speaker by the following vote (it being understood that the vote cast for Mr. Holmes was a complimentary vote):

Not voting—Messrs. Holmes and Skaggs—2.

Messrs. Holmes, Williams, and Fernald were appointed a special committee to escort Mr. Skaggs to the chair.

On motion of Mr. Folsom, duly seconded, the Speaker appointed Messrs. Williams, Holmes, and Fellows to call upon the Supreme Justices and invite one of their number to administer the oath of office to the Assemblymen.

Chief Justice Talbot appeared within the bar of the Assembly and administered the following oath of office to the Assemblymen present:

I do solemnly swear that I will support, protect, and defend the Constitution and Government of the United States and the Constitution and Government of the State of Nevada against all enemies, whether domestic or foreign, and that I will bear true faith, allegiance, and loyalty to the same, any ordinance, resolution or law of any State Convention or Legislature to the contrary notwithstanding; and further, that I do this with a full determination, pledge and purpose, without any mental reservation, or evasion whatever. And I do further solemnly swear that I have not fought a duel, nor sent or accepted a challenge to fight a duel, nor been a second to either party, nor in any manner aided and assisted in such duel, nor been knowingly the bearer of such challenge or acceptance since the adoption of the Constitution of the State of Nevada, and that I will not be so engaged or concerned, directly or indirectly, in or about any such duel during my continuance in office, and further, that I will well and faithfully perform all the duties of the office of Assemblyman, on which I am about to enter. So help me God.

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER,
CARSON CITY, NEVADA, March 25, 1905.

To the Honorable the Secretary of State:

I have the honor to deposit with you, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 125—An Act to amend an Act entitled "An Act to prevent the pollution or contamination of the waters of the lakes, rivers, streams and ditches in the State of Nevada."

My objections to the provisions of this bill are that it differs from the Act which it

amends in no essential feature, except to extend the time of completion. The Legislature will assemble again before the time limit expires, and if necessary it may be extended. We have sued our neighbors across the line in California for polluting the waters of the Truckee River. It would certainly be commendable if we began the practice among ourselves of keeping the waters of our streams and lakes as free from pollution as we wish California to keep them.

The people of Reno and others living contiguous to the Truckee River have been very dilatory in commencing the system of drainage and sewerage as required by the law enacted two years ago, thereby subjecting thousands of people to the use of the contaminated waters flowing in the Truckee River. Not only this, but they have contributed immensely to its impurities, rendering it more deleterious to both health and life.

Two years of precious time have been wasted without any steps having been taken to assist those so exposed, and as there are two years more to run, I do not feel warranted in extending the time.

Taking into consideration the rapid growth of Reno and Sparks, work should, under the law, begin at once, and be pushed to completion as rapidly as possible.

The Ormsby Delegation reported Assembly Bill No. 72, with the recommendation that it pass.

The Elko Delegation reported Assembly Bill No. 57, with the recommendation that it pass.

Leave of absence was granted Mr. Smyth.

Messrs. Reymers, Vaughan, O'Brien, Syphus, Folsom, and Huskey were granted permission to introduce bills without previous notice.

The special order for 11:30 a. m.—Assembly Joint and Concurrent Resolution No. 1—was taken up with the veto message of the Governor thereto, which was read as follows:

VETO MESSAGE.

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER,
CARSON CITY, NEVADA, February 19, 1907.

To the Honorable the Assembly:

I have the honor to return to your honorable body without my approval, Assembly Joint and Concurrent Resolution No. 1, relative to railroad passes.

My objection to this resolution can be briefly stated.

It is too far-reaching in its application, and will interfere with private business.

If its provisions were confined strictly to official matters it would not be objectionable. Members of the Legislature and many of the State officials are men of business entirely disconnected with official duties. This resolution carries with it an implied insult to the integrity and character of men in whom the people of this State have had sufficient confidence to elect to high and responsible positions, and it does not seem to me reasonable or just that they should be placed in the light of suspicion concerning their official acts.

In business it frequently happens that the shipper desires to accompany his freight to market, and especially is this the case in the shipment of live stock. Railroads usually

tender the owner and attendants free passage in going and returning, and, should it be possible to enforce this resolution, it would work an injury to a class of citizens engaged in private business, and amount to nothing more than an incumbrance of the record.

Add "Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the several County Recorders, within ten days after the passage of this Act, to notify each of the several Mining District Recorders in their respective counties of the

passage of this Act, which shall take effect on and after the first day of April, 1907."

Mr. Bradley moved that the amendment, to be known as Section 5, be adopted as recommended by the Committee on Mines and Mining, as follows: Insert Section 5 to read the same as Section 3 of the original bill, and the motion carried.

The author of the bill was granted permission to insert the amendment with the assistance of the Clerk.

Rough stone of all kinds, iron ore, limestone, or other ore, stone or mineral, commonly used as fluxes, one-half cent a ton a mile.

Ores not exceeding \$20 a ton in value, one cent a ton a mile.

Ores not exceeding \$30 a ton in value, one and one-tenth cents a ton a mile.

Ores not exceeding \$40 a ton in value, one and one-fourth cents a ton a mile.

Ores not exceeding \$50 a ton in value, one and thirty-five hundredths cents a ton a mile.

Ores not exceeding \$60 a ton in value, one and one-half cents a ton a mile.

Ores not exceeding \$70 a ton in value, one and three-fourth cents a ton a mile.

Ores not exceeding \$80 a ton in value, one and nine-tenths cents a ton a mile.

Ores not exceeding \$100 a ton in value, two cents a ton a mile.

All other ores shall not be charged at a greater rate than two cents a ton a mile.

Amend class f of the same section by adding after the word "freight," on line 42 of page 10, the following: "Provided further, that all hauls of less than fifty miles may be charged as if actually hauled fifty miles, but where the haul is fifteen miles or less, the Commission shall fix such rate as it may deem just and fair."

On motion of Mr. Syphus, the following amendment to Assembly Bill No. 48 was adopted, namely: Amend Section 7, class c, to read as follows:

"All narrow-gage railroads may be permitted by the Commission to charge a rate not to exceed one hundred and fifty per cent higher than those mentioned for broad-gage railroads."

Amend Section 1 so as to read as follows: Strike out all of lines 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6, and the first eight words of line 7, and insert in lieu thereof as follows: Within thirty days from and after the passage of this Act the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, and Attorney-General shall appoint three men, who shall be actual shippers, to constitute a Shippers' Arbitration Board. No one shall be eligible to such appointment who has not been a resident of the State at least two years.

In line 12 strike out the word "Commission" and insert in lieu thereof the word "members."

In line 13 strike out the word "Commissioners" and insert in lieu thereof the word "members."

In line 16 strike out the word "Commissioners" and insert in lieu thereof the word "arbitrators."

In line 18 strike out the word "Commissioners" and insert in lieu thereof the word "arbitrators."

In line 20 strike out the word "Commissioners" and insert in lieu thereof the word "member."

In line 22 strike out the word "Commissioner" and insert in lieu thereof the word "member."

In line 26 strike out the word "Commissioner" and insert in lieu thereof the word "member."

In line 29 strike out the word "Commissioner" and insert in lieu thereof the word "arbitrator."

In line 34 strike out the word "Commissioner" and insert in lieu thereof the word "Board."

In line 35 strike out the word "Commission" and insert in lieu thereof the word "Board."

In line 39 strike out the word "Commissioners" and insert in lieu thereof the word "arbitrators."

In line 40 strike out the word "Commissioners" and insert in lieu thereof the word "arbitrators."

Strike out lines 41, 42, 43, and 44.

In line 45 strike out the word "Commissioners" and insert in lieu thereof the word "arbitrators."

Strike out lines 50, 51, and 52, and insert in lieu thereof as follows:

It shall be the duty of said Arbitration Board to hold meetings at least once every quarter, such meeting to be held at any point within the State, at the discretion of the Board. At such meetings of the Board they shall consider such complaints as to excessive charge of freight or any other railroad discrimination as may be presented to them for adjustment. The time of such said meetings shall not be less than three days, nor continue for more than ten days. The respective members of the Shippers' Arbitration Board shall each receive a salary of three hundred dollars per year, together with their actual expenses of traveling and their hotel bills actually incurred while performing

this Act. It is further provided that they shall each receive the sum of eight dollars per day while in attendance at the meetings prescribed in this Act.

Also to amend all other portions of the bill by inserting in lieu of the word "Commission" the word "Board," and in lieu of the word "Commissioners" the word "arbitrators," and in lieu of the word "Commissioner" insert the word "member."

Amend Section 4 by adding after the end of that section as follows: And before said sale is made, notice of such proposed sale must be given by publication in a newspaper, if there is a newspaper published in the district, for at least one week before said bonds are disposed of, inviting sealed bids to be made for said bonds, and said bonds are to be sold to the highest and best bidder for said bonds; *provided*, if there is

no newspaper published in said school district the notice herein provided for shall be given by posting in three public places in said school district for at least ten days before said bonds are disposed of.

Insert before Section 2 of said Act the following:

SEC. 2. Section 2 of the above entitled Act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:—

On page 2 of printed bill, line 1, strike out the figure "2" and insert in lieu thereof the figure "3"

Add another section to the end of the bill which shall read as follows:

SEC. 4. This Act shall take effect on and after the first day of July, A. D. 1907.

He shall also appoint one Deputy Assessor, who shall receive a salary of \$1,800 per annum. He shall also appoint as many Deputy Sheriffs as he may think necessary, but the County Commissioners of Esmeralda County shall fix the number and compensation of the deputies who are to be paid by Esmeralda County.

The special order for 11 a. m., Assembly Bill No. 46, was taken up.

Mr. Vaughan offered the following amendment to Section 1, namely: Amend line 2 of the printed bill by inserting after the word "of," and before the word "watchman," the word "private."

On motion of Mr. Folsom, the amendment was adopted, and the Clerk instructed to insert the same.

Mr. Vaughan offered an amendment to Section 1, as follows: Amend line 4 of the printed bill by striking out the word "private," after the word "or" and before the word "detective."

On motion of Mr. Vaughan, the amendment was adopted, and the Clerk instructed to insert the same.

Mr. Bradley moved to amend Section 1, as follows: Amend Section 1 by striking out the words "Board" and "Commissioners or other legislative authority of any city, city and county, or town," and by inserting between the words "the" and "of," the word "Sheriff," and between the words "of" and "county," the word "any," making the line read "the Sheriff of any county in which," etc.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE INSTITUTIONS.

CARSON CITY, NEVADA, March 9, 1907.

Mr. Speaker:

Your Committee on State Institutions beg leave to present their report on the State University:

We have visited the University, carefully inspected the buildings and grounds, and made diligent inquiry into its conditions and management. We would say, at the outset, that our University has done and is doing a great work for Nevada. Under the fostering care of a generous State, for many years in the throes of a financial depression, the University, with insufficient means and equipment, has grown in twenty-one years from a mere preparatory department to its present goodly proportions, ranking with the State Universities of several older States. It has given its graduates an education and training that has enabled them to take important positions in the mining world and positions of honor and responsibility in business and professional life. Considering its past condition in respect to population and financial means, Nevada has been liberal to its University. And yet many things which ought to have been done before have been left undone for lack of ample means. And, in consequence, conditions have been created that are not in harmony with the continued progress and usefulness of the University.

Our State is now in an era of remarkable progress and prosperity. The University should be enabled to get into line with these new conditions that it may better conserve its mission—the advanced education and proper physical and moral training of the young men and women of Nevada. We have examined into the reported dissatisfaction at the University and the decrease in the attendance arising therefrom. For one or two years prior to the present year there was some decrease in the attendance, but this was due largely to causes other than the one alleged. The falling off in attendance was in the Preparatory and Normal Departments. This was occasioned by improved opportunities for preparatory work at home, and by a largely increased demand for teachers in rural schools, enabling high-school students throughout the State to secure teachers' positions without attending Normal Schools.

Exaggerated reports as to the moral conditions in the City of Reno have influenced some parents to send their boys and girls to other Universities.

Your Committee might say in passing that, while Reno is undoubtedly a wide-open town, it is not more so than other towns in our State. It has its evil side, but it is a town of refined and cultivated people, few towns on the Coast containing a larger percentage of good people. Evidently, however, if it is to continue to be an educational center, it must abolish some existing evils or bring them under more effective control. Your Committee believes that the time is at hand for a marked broadening of at least one department of the University, and for making the University Campus more attractive, more home-like, more beneficial for the students—the young men and women for whose benefit and for whose future usefulness to the State the University is maintained. The salaries of the professors and the instructors at the University are admittedly too low. They are about what they were when the State was poor, and the cost of living about thirty per cent lower than at present. Good men cannot be had, or long retained, on insufficient salaries.

Specifically, your Committee would recommend as follows:

First—The purchase for the University of the present athletic field. It adjoins the Campus, and should be made a part of it. It is ideally located. For many years the students have had the free use of it, formerly through the kindness of Hon. J. N. Evans,

Regent of the University, and later through the courtesy of his heirs. It can be purchased for a very reasonable sum.

Second—There should be added to the Faculty of the University a first-class athletic instructor at a salary of \$2,400 a year. Not the few who volunteer for football, baseball, basket ball, etc., need athletic training, but every student in attendance, unless physically disabled. This training should be regular throughout the year. The best results in mental training are realized only when that is combined with physical and moral training.

Third—The basement of Lincoln Hall can be remodeled into a wholesome pleasure room for the young men located there at a cost of \$300. This should be done, and billiard and pool tables should be put in for their use. The best way to keep them from "downtown" resorts is to provide reasonable and wholesome entertainments on the Campus. This is done to advantage at other Universities and it would, therefore, be no mere experiment with us.

Fourth—The Domestic Science Department should, in the judgment of your Committee, be made more practical, if it is to be continued as a feature of University work for young women. Too much time is devoted to the making of cakes and candies; too little to the cooking of the average meal and economical management of the household. The young women students should be taught how to select the material for a nutritious meal, and how to make and care for common wearing apparel. The problem of good and economical housekeeping is a serious one in our day, and practical instruction therein would be beneficial.

Fifth—The means for securing and distributing a good supply of pure water for the University buildings are grossly inadequate. The water has to be hand-pumped and then transported in hand buckets and barrels to the different points on the Campus.

Sixth—We find there is no direct accounting to the Board of Regents for the management of the University Dining Hall, and that the expenses of maintenance or any profits arising therefrom do not go through the University books, although the profits, whatever they may be, are reported as being used for University purposes. Your Committee believes that it would be proper and wise to change this plan, and have a direct accounting to the Board of Regents of all matters in connection with the Dining Hall.

Seventh—The present means for heating are expensive and unsatisfactory. Each building is separately heated. Furnaces, stoves, fireplaces, etc., are employed. There should be a separate heating plant, situated behind Stewart Hall, about where the wooden building is now. From this place pipes could be run to all the buildings on the Campus. This would keep the fuel in one place, and would materially add to the looks of the Campus by doing away with the unsightly woodpiles behind each building. All that would be needed in addition would be a few cords of wood in the basement of each building for fireplaces.

Eighth—In addition to the above, improvements are recommended by the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds which will approximate in cost \$10,000, all of which seem to your Committee, upon careful examination, useful and essential. They are: A stone or other fence should be built on the front of the grounds from the gates to the corner of Virginia and Ninth Streets and then north to the Dining Hall. Cement walks on both streets the same distance would cost \$1,500. The lawns in front of Manzanita Hall and the grounds in the Valley running back as far as the reservoir should be put in order, and a cement bridge should be built over the Orr Ditch where the old bridge now is. In other words, the front part of the grounds should be fixed first, and the work extended back as far as the money lasts. Trees should be planted as soon as possible on the land mentioned, according to the plans already made by McKim, Meade & White. A provision should be made to bring the water on both sides of the Campus, as there is a natural grade there. This matter of water for irrigation should be taken up very soon, or we will not be able to get it without pumping, as was suggested two years ago. There should be at least \$1,000 for a cement walk from Stewart Hall to the Gymnasium. There is also another item of expense in regard to the new Mining Building. No provision has been made in the contract for a sewer from the building. There will be needed about \$700 to bring the sewer from this building to the sewer now connecting the shop and the Chemistry Building, a distance of 450 feet, and thence down the alley.

Ninth—Last, but not least, your Committee recommends that the Mining Department be made the major department of the University. The overshadowing importance of the mining industry in Nevada justifies this, while the Mackay donation renders it proper. Nevada is the center of mining development, and its State University should be the center of mining instruction. To this end there should be placed at the head of the Mining Department an experienced mining engineer—one conversant with the mining and milling of all ores—and provision should be made for paying a salary commensurate with the responsibility of the position.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE ON ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 89.

EXECUTIVE CHAMBER,
CARSON CITY, NEVADA, March 12, 1907.

To the Honorable the Assembly:

I have the honor to return to your honorable body, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 89—An Act to permit athletic clubs of over one hundred members and of three months good standing to put on amateur boxing bouts without a license, and certain restrictions relating to the same.

My objections are that boxing contests are stepping stones to prize fighting, and are really the same in detail and results, whether the class be amateur or professional, licensed or free. In my message to the honorable Legislature now convened, I earnestly recommended the repeal of the "Prize Fight Law" in force, and the enactment of a prohibitory measure in its stead. It can hardly be expected that my sense of justice and consistency will allow me to lend approval to the Act proposed, which is almost equally objectionable. It is beneath the dignity and honor of this State, and condemned by the sentiment of the people in all other States of the Union. We have public schools and educational institutions, with instructors sworn into service of the State, in which youths are instructed in physical, mental and moral culture sufficient for all useful purposes in life. It is natural that clever boxers are quite likely to develop into prize fighters, who will contribute nothing of value to the advancement of society, or materially promote the general welfare of our country. It is hard to beat the pitchfork and plow handle for the development of muscle.

SEC. 12. This franchise is granted with the express qualification that said grantee, its successors or assigns, shall not charge a higher rate than three-fourths of one cent per gallon for all water sold under the terms hereof. Upon the execution of a good and sufficient contract between the County Commissioners of Esmeralda County (or the City or Town of Goldfield) and said water company, for the per-

formance of the contract covering the terms and payment for installation of hydrants and maintaining the same as hereinafter provided, the said company shall install at its own expense at least sixty-one hydrants for fire protection upon a rental basis, charging therefor not exceeding ten dollars per month rental for each hydrant. Said company, its successors or assigns, to keep a tank for fire protection, so as to provide a minimum pressure of ninety pounds to the square inch at the hydrants during a fire. After a payment of ten years' rental of the fire hydrants so installed, the City or Town of Goldfield, if then incorporated, or the inhabitants of the City or Town of Goldfield, if unincorporated, shall have free service of all such hydrants. And, if said town shall have been incorporated, it shall have the option to purchase the entire plant of said water company at a valuation to be fixed by five appraisers, two of whom are to be selected by the City or Town of Goldfield, and two to be selected by the water company, and the fifth appraiser to be selected by these four. In calculating the value of the plant of said water company, the franchise herein granted shall be estimated and held to be of the value of one dollar. The said water company, its successors or assigns, shall furnish, without pay, water to the County of Esmeralda, to be used in or upon the following buildings in the Town of Goldfield: County hospital, county court house, county jail, fire engine houses, and public school houses, in a quantity not to exceed thirty thousand (30,000) gallons per month; *provided*, that the cost of making all water connections and implacing meters shall be paid by said county and such use and place of use to be definitely fixed, apportioned and designated by proper resolution of the Board of County Commissioners of said county or the legislative body of Goldfield and a certified copy of which resolution be served upon the grantee herein, its successors and assigns; *provided further*, that the water company shall implace meters and measure the water used in said buildings and if the amount used shall exceed the quantity above mentioned in any month, said excess shall be paid for by the county at the rate of three dollars for each one thousand gallons so used. If the legislative body of the Town of Goldfield shall elect prior to the entering into of any arrangement looking to the water company installing hydrants at its expense, said Town or City of Goldfield shall have the right to install its own pipe line, fire hydrants and fire protection service, and the said water company shall furnish to said pipe line and fire hydrants water, for fire protection only, free of charge. That the said water company shall at all times save and keep harmless the County of Esmeralda, or the City or Town of Goldfield, of and from all damages caused by and arising out of its occupancy of the streets of said City or Town of Goldfield.

A Board of Bank Commissioners is hereby created, to be composed of the Governor, Secretary of State and State Treasurer, and within thirty days after the passage of this Act, the said Board of Bank Commissioners shall organize, and appoint a competent person who shall be thoroughly capable to expert accounts; said appointee to be styled Bank Examiner, and it shall be his duty to examine the accounts and report upon the condition of all banks throughout the State. The person so appointed shall have no interest in or official connection with, nor shall he be in the employ of any bank, banking company, banking society, firm, association or corporation engaged in the business of banking, nor shall he be, during his term of office, interested in stock or other property thereof.

Amend Section 2 to read as follows:

SEC. 2. The said Bank Examiner shall receive a salary of \$2,750 per annum, payable in equal monthly installments, and his actual traveling expenses when compelled to travel in the discharge of his duties, to be paid by the State Treasurer upon warrants drawn by the State Controller when the same shall have been approved by the Bank Commissioners. The term of office shall be four years from and after the date of his appointment; *provided*, that should said Bank Examiner fail to perform his duties to the satisfaction of the Bank Commissioners the said Board may terminate such appointment and appoint a successor.

Amend Section 4 by striking out the words "a report to the Governor and State Controller," and insert as follows: "A report to the Bank Commissioners."

Amend Section 5, at the top of page 3, so as to read as follows: "Evidences of debt of such corporation, and all securities, to ascertain the condition of every such corporation, its solvency, its ability to fulfil its obligations, and shall report its condition to the Bank Commissioners as soon as practicable after such examination."

Amend Section 7 so as to read as follows:

SEC. 7. If the Bank Examiner shall have knowledge of the insolvency or unsafe condition of any corporation mentioned in this Act, and shall neglect to report the same in writing to the Bank Commissioners, as is required by this Act, he shall, on conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding ten thousand dollars, nor less than five thousand dollars, or by imprisonment in the State Prison not less than one year nor more than two years, or by both such fine and imprisonment, and his office shall be declared vacant by the Bank Commissioners and a successor shall be appointed for the unexpired term.

Amend Section 10 so as to read as follows to the bottom of page 6: If the Bank Examiner, on the examination of the affairs of any corporation mentioned in Section 4 of this Act, shall find that only such corporation has been guilty of violating its charter or laws of this State, or any of the provisions of this Act, or is conducting business in an unsafe manner, he shall, by an order addressed to the president and directors of the corporation so offending, direct discontinuance of such illegal and unsafe practices, and a conformity with the requirements of the law and its charter, and the provisions of this Act; and if such corporation shall refuse or neglect to conform with such requirements before the expiration of the time in the order specified, or if it shall appear to said Examiner that it is unsafe for any such corporation to continue to transact business, it shall be the duty of such Examiner to immediately report the condition of such corporation to the Bank Commissioners, and if the Bank Commissioners, either from the report of the Bank Examiner, or from their own knowledge, decide that it is unsafe for any such corporation to continue to transact business, they shall authorize the Bank Examiner to take such control of such corporation, and of the property and effects thereof, as may be by them deemed necessary to prevent waste or diversion of the assets, and to hold possession of the same until the order of court hereinafter mentioned, and it is hereby made the duty of the Attorney-General, upon being notified by the Bank Commissioners, to immediately commence suit in the proper court against such corporation and the directors and trustees thereof, to enjoin and prohibit them from the transaction of any further business. If upon the hearing of the case the court shall find that such corporation is solvent, and may safely continue business, it may dismiss the action, and order that the corporation be restored to the possession of the property, but—

Amend the title so as to read as follows:

An Act creating a Board of Bank Commissioners, defining their duties, providing for the appointment of a Bank Examiner, prescribing his duties, fixing his compensation, providing penalties for the violation of the provisions of this Act, and other matters relating thereto.

To the Honorable the Assembly:

I have the honor to report to your honorable body that I have approved, and deposited with the Secretary of State Assembly Bill No. 80—An Act to incorporate the Town of Yerington in Lyon County, and defining the boundaries thereof, and to authorize the establishment of a city government therefor, and all other matters relating thereto.

Also, Assembly Bill No. 99—An Act to authorize the Board of County Commissioners of Nye County to issue bonds for the purpose of creating a fund for the improvement and enlargement of the county court house of Nye County, and for other improvements the county may deem fit and necessary.

When the library shall have been so removed he shall, with the approval of the Justices of the Supreme Court, appoint a competent person to have charge of the law portion of the library, who shall purchase out of the Library Fund such law works as said Justices shall require, and who shall receive a salary of twelve hundred dollars per annum, payable in equal monthly installments out of the Library Fund."

SEC. 3. All Acts and parts of Acts in conflict with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.

Mr. Fesler addressed the Assembly on behalf of the White Pine Delegation.

Mr. Cole, Chief Clerk, addressed the Assembly in behalf of the attachés.

Mr. Speaker addressed the Assembly, thanking the attachés for their efficient services to the House.
