

understood

#### ERRATA

Page 1, line 11, should be "\$1,510,000," instead of "\$1,500,000."

Page 23, at the end of line 11, insert "power of the."

Page 23, before heading "State Engineer's Office," insert the following:

#### RAILROAD AND PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

The last Legislature created a Public Service Commission, making the Railroad Commission, ex officio, the members of such Commission, and created the

office of Engineer. The effect of this law was to extend the jurisdiction of the Railroad Commission to cover electric-light, power, gas, sewer and water com-The report of each of these departments shows the work performed dur-

ing 1911 and 1912.

The Reno rate case has not been finally settled, although a reduction of about 20 per cent in the rates from eastern points on several hundred articles has been effected. If what are known as the "Fourth-Section" orders are sustained by the Supreme Court of the United States, where the issue is pending, this will result in a saving to the people of Nevada of several hundred thousand dollars, annually, in class and commodity rates on shipments from eastern territory.

The Commission has effected reductions on freight and passenger rates on a number of intrastate railroads during the last two years which are more particu-

larly covered in its report.

The work of the Public Service Commission relates to investigations into the conduct of public-service companies with respect to excessive and discriminatory charges, unjust regulations and practices and the correction of the same.

# REMARKS CONCERNING NOMINATIONS FOR UNITED STATES SENATOR

In placing Hon. Key Pittman in nomination for United States Senator from the State of Nevada, Mr. Cole spoke as follows:

Mr. Speaker:

This is one of the last times that any Legislature will meet to elect a United The people have said: "Gentlemen of the Legislature, you have sent too many Guggenheims, too many Baileys, too many Forakers to the Senate"-men of whom it has been said "The good old rule sufficeth them; the simple plan, that they should take who have the power, and they should keep who We intend to select a different type of Senator, and just as the direct primary law has changed the character of Legislatures so will the direct election of United States Senators change the character of the United States Senate. member of that body represents a million souls-a hundred thousand thousand joys and sorrows, hopes and fears, a million human lives. To represent the people in the final pinnacle of legislation is a man's work, and now is wanted the Happily our work is made easy. The people for the first time in the history of Nevada have looked south for a Senator. Here comes through the sands of the desert a young man bold and strong, unafraid, clean, sincere and able, and it is our pleasure and duty, freed of responsibility, to choose as United States Senator for Nevada, the choice of the people. We will gladly perform it and will proceed to select and elect to the United States Senate a citizen of Nye County, the Honorable Key Pittman, of Tonopah.

Mr. Fitzgerald of Eureka, in seconding the nomination, spoke as follows:

Mr. Speaker:

It is with especial and peculiar pleasure that I arise at this time to second the nomination made by the gentleman from Nye. The remarks that he has made called to my mind the following brief reflections: When those great statesmen, the framers of our Federal Constitution, made that immortal instrument they never dreamed that the body that they were creating, the Senate of the United States, which has been called, and perhaps justly called, the greatest legislative body ever formed, that the said body, to wit, the Senate of the United States, would ever degenerate to such a great degree that it would be called "a millionaire's club on the Potomac." I do not say that it has degenerated, but simply this-that if it has so degenerated, what a fall from the high ideal in the minds of its immortal framers! The idea with them that a seat therein, or one in the Congress of the United States, or even the office of the President, should be bought with money would have been intolerable. Think of a schoolboy having his high standard in his class determined by the number of dollars he or his father commanded, or a high school, college or university judged by the same standard! Now, when the youth of America goes forth from the public school, the high school, the college or university where merit and merit alone determined his rank and standard, what a shock when he learns that in the politics and government of his country, money, and not merit, is a test of high standing. Were I, Mr. Speaker, to go to one of the great colleges—Harvard, Yale, Stanford, Berkeley, or any other—and say to the directors or governors, or whatever they

may be called by said institutions: "Give me the title of Doctor of Laws and I will give you a million dollars"—suppose the bargain were made and such title were conferred upon me under such circumstances, would not my brow be branded eternally with infamy, instead of with honor; and would not the directors and governors of the institution who entered into the bargain be equally branded with myself with infamy and disgrace instead of with fame and excellence? Let me say, Mr. Speaker, that when the people of the United States or the people of Nevada sell an honor they disgrace themselves. Let them sell merchandise, commodities or all things of the market, but never bring the United States Senate, or any other office of honor, in the market for sale.

I believe, Mr. Speaker, that the gentleman who has been nominated by the gentleman from Nye is one who did not buy the honor to which he has been elected by the people of the State of Nevada. He went before the people of Nevada in a free and honorable competition for the high office of Senator of the United States. In establishing the two bodies, the Senate and the House of Representatives, the framers of the Constitution arranged two years as a term of the Representatives in Congress, said Representatives coming directly from the people at the present hour of the election, and represented the moment, the day, The Senate, from its very name, being composed of the elder men, was to represent the wisdom and experience of the past; and being elected for a longer term, to wit, six years-three times the length of term for the members of the House of Representatives-were designed to be something in the nature of a guard and check upon the push, vigor, energy and, let me say, sometimes the undue aggressiveness, of the youth of the present. The two ideas, the wisdom and experience of the past, guiding and aiding and helping the vigor and strength of the present are the two great columns on which the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States stand. May God grant that it may ever go hand in hand with wisdom and power. The people who now have the power, and, let me say, I rejoice that they do have it, in their votes last November gave the mandate to this Legislature to put the laurel of victory and honor upon the brow of Honorable Key Pittman. I cheerfully bow to the will of the people in that regard, and if it had not been my own personal choice I should have most respectfully obeyed it; and in the present instance, as it fully accords with my own personal choice, I say that it is with peculiar and especial pleasure that I second the nomination of the Honorable Key Pittman.

With reference to the gentleman whose nomination I second, I believe firmly that he has the courage of his convictions in filling his seat in the United States Senate, which he will soon have the honor to fill, and I have no doubt that he will march to the line of truth and not let passion, prejudice, money or power swerve him from the glorious path that he has marked out for himself. He will let truth and truth alone be the polar star upon which his eye will ever be cast.

Mr. Kinghorn, seconding the nomination of Hon. Key Pittman, spoke as follows:

Mr. Speaker:

In no other State in the Union, with the exception of the State of Oregon, would it be proper and consistent for a member of the minority to rise for the purpose of seconding and supporting the nomination of a majority candidate to be a Senator of the United States.

The State of Nevada occupies this proud position: Without waiting for a peremptory and mandatory enactment of the Legislature, the voters of the State have entered into a voluntary and honorable agreement, which, since its inception, has been ratified and endorsed by the candidates themselves, insuring, beyond the question of a doubt, that the senatorial candidate receiving the highest vote at the general election would also receive the votes of the Republican and Democratic members in both branches of the Legislature, regardless of their personal preferences or of their party affiliations.

Before casting my vote for the candidate who has received at the polls a substantial endorsement from the voters of the State, I wish to say that I hope and trust that this voluntary agreement will be continued in the State of Nevada, and that no rigid enactment by the Legislature will be deemed necessary, so that our people may continue to express their choice at the polls, firm and confident in the belief that their verdict will be endorsed by the Legislature of the State.

I now take pleasure in seconding and supporting the nomination of Honorable Key Pittman for the office of United States Senator from the State of Nevada.

I trust that I may be pardoned at this time for an expression of the hope that at no far distant day history may repeat itself, and that Democratic members of this body will second and support a nomination for this high office, made by a

Republican member in support of a Republican candidate.

I also desire to say, Mr. Speaker, that one of the most hopeful and encouraging signs of the times is the tendency to eliminate personalities and bitterness from the political campaigns in this State. In former years it was the custom to bring out the weaknesses and shortcomings of various candidates, and I am glad to say that in the recent campaign, in which Mr. Pittman was the winner, this factor of personal reflection and vilification was a negligible quantity.

And, before closing, Mr. Speaker, I would like to say that we have something to be grateful for, even in the weaknesses and shortcomings of our great men. Mankind is helped in its progress almost as much by the study of imperfection

as by the contemplation of perfection.

If we had nothing before us in our halting and futile lives but saints and the ideal, we might well fail altogether.

We grope blindly among the graveyards and catacombs of the world; we climb the dark, steep ladder of life; we reach out haltingly for the future, and vet we can scarce see an inch before or around us.

We stumble and falter and fall; our hands and knees are bruised and sore,

and we look above for help and guidance.

Could we see nothing but distant and unapproachable perfection, we might well sink prostrate, discouraged and disheartened in the hopelessness and weariness of despair.

Is it not then, Mr. Speaker, when all seems blank and dark, when strength and courage fail, and when perfection seems remote and distant as the farthest and faintest star in the firmament, is it not then that imperfection helps us?

When we see that the greatest and choicest images of God have had their weaknesses like ours, their temptations, their hours of darkness, their heartburnings and failures, are we not encouraged by their lapses and catastrophes to find energy for one more effort, and faith for one more struggle? Where they have failed we feel a less dishonor to fail; and their errors and sorrows make our ascent easier from the commonplace level on which we now stand to the distant and glorious heights to which we aspire.

Man, after all, Mr. Speaker, is not ripened and matured by virtue alone. If this were so the world would be a paradise of angels and a mighty lonesome

place for most of us to live in, even in the State of Nevada.

Like the fruit of the earth, he is the fruit of all seasons. He is the evolution of a hundred centuries of time, the accident of a thousand accidents, a

living mystery moving through the seen to the unseen.

He is born in honor as well as in dishonor; he is matured under all the varieties of heat and cold; in storm and in sunshine; in joy and in sorrow; in the melancholy of autumn and in the rugged torpor of winter as well as in the rapture and fragrance of summer and the balmy affluence of spring, with its breath and its sunshine; at the end, he is reaped; the product not of one climate but of all; not of good alone, but of evil and sorrow as well; perhaps mellowed and matured and ripened; perhaps withered and stricken and sour.

How, then, Mr. Speaker, shall we take it upon ourselves to judge anyone? How, at any rate, shall we pass judgment upon our intellectual giants and our leaders in statesmanship and public affairs? Men who are great in their gifts are great in their temptations, great in their strength and great in their weakness.

Let us glory in their strength and be comforted in their weakness, and, when we thank heaven for the great gift of their intellect, their patriotism and their public service, we do not need to remember wherein they are imperfect, nor can we bring ourselves to regret that they are made of the same common, ordinary clay as ourselves.

In placing in nomination Hon. G. A. Steele for United States Senator from the State of Nevada, Mr. Davis of Nye County spoke as follows:

Mr. Speaker:

While in hearty accord with the advanced method of the people of this State

in the selection of a candidate for United States Senator, I feel at this time a minority of the people should voice their selection, representing, as I do, 2,740 votes cast at the last general election. I wish to place the name of G. A. Steele in nomination for the office of United States Senator.

#### MINORITY REPORT, BY MR. GARDINER

To the Honorable the Assembly of the State of Nevada:

The undersigned, a minority of one, of your Committee on Judiciary, begs leave to report unfavorably upon Assembly Bill No. 17 and the substitute there-

for, and to recommend that it do not pass, for the following reasons:

Because the statute, as it now stands has been in existence for more than 51 years, having been passed at the first session of the Territorial Legislature. It was good enough for the people of this country at the time Nevada was welcomed into the Union to preserve the integrity of the Union; it was good enough for the people of this country when the salvation of a stream of Nevada gold maintained the credit of the Nation.

Because a six months' residence, under all of our statutes, is sufficient for the prosecution of any civil right, wherever it accrued, and there is no logical reason

for making a different rule in divorce cases.

Because our statute is now 75 per cent closer to the proposed uniform divorce law than are the statutes of the States, to escape the rigor of whose laws those unfortunately married seek the relief Nevada affords. Let such States take the first step toward uniformity, and the people of those States will not find it necessary to look to Nevada for assistance.

Because, in maintaining our laws as they now are, we are giving to people unfortunately married prompt relief and shaming the harshness of the archaic laws of other States.

Because, to pass this bill is to admit the justice of the malicious criticism our laws have received from certain Eastern States, and to prostrate ourselves before the self-sufficiency of their own harsh laws, instead of standing like red-blooded Westerners for the inviolate preservation of our own laws which have stood the test of more than half a century.

Because the tendency of modern legislation, both in this country and in England (where a commission recently reported in favor of more liberal divorce laws), is toward progressive legislation in this respect, and the bill submitted is a step

backward, rather than forward.

Because the bill admits that an early divorce is proper and right by giving such remedy upon six months' residence where the cause of action arises in this State, and, this being admitted, there can be no logic in denying relief within

that time to those whose cause of action arose out of the State.

Because to give those whose cause of action arose within the State a remedy in six months and to deny it to those whose causes arose out of the State is to deny to the people of those States the equal protection of our laws. While this may not be so in the strict constitutional sense, it certainly is true in fact, and I consider this harsh, unjust, un-American and cowardly.

Because the States of Idaho and Texas now have six-months statutes and such

statutes are in contemplation by Utah and New Mexico, and by standing with those States in a persistent defiance of the harsh laws of certain Eastern States we are advancing the cause of a uniform divorce law by keeping their harshness constantly before the public and hastening the time when they will be driven to give to their citizens a fair law, while to lie down before their tirades is simply to retard the day of the reformation of the laws of such States and the day of a uniform divorce law throughout the country.

Because the effect of the passage of this bill will be disastrously felt by the people of Washoe County, whom it most concerns, and because the opinion of the Washoe Delegation, as is customary in matters concerning one county, should

be most carefully weighed by the Legislature.

Because this bill, affecting so strongly the interests of Washoe County, has not been referred to the delegation from that county, nor has any expression of opinion from that delegation been considered.

And, finally, because the time in which said bill is to go into effect, January 1, next, is particularly harsh to Washoe County.

### MESSAGES FROM THE GOVERNOR, VETOING BILLS OF TWENTY-FIFTH SESSION

To the Honorable the Secretary of State:

I herewith deposit with you, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 60, entitled "An Act to secure to mechanics, artisans, miners, laborers, and other persons, immediate payment of their wages upon being discharged, or who, not having a contract, voluntary terminate their service with their employer; to provide for judgment and execution in suits brought under this Act, and to repeal any and all Acts in conflict herewith?

My objection to this bill lies in this, that the grievance for which remedy is sought could have been properly covered by a fair, just and reasonable measure; and a bill of such character would have met with my approval. The remedy for such grievance, provided for in this bill, however, is arbitrary, vicious and extreme; and contrary to established principles of justice, in which the circumstances and equities involved in such cases may be inquired into by the courts

and a measure of justice awarded on the findings.

While I am persuaded that some rational legislation on this subject is desirable to protect and insure employees in securing their wages, certain provisions of the new civil and criminal codes will go far towards improving existing conditions with respect to redress, and as well, certain other Acts of the Legislature which I have approved.

My objection to this bill lies in the fact that it is in conflict with the existing treaties entered into by the Government of the United States with foreign nations, and which the Legislature of this State has no power to abrogate, modify, or set aside, and under which treaties foreigners admitted into this country are guaranteed, so far as any law or statute may be enacted, the same rights and privileges, other than the right of franchise, as the citizens of our own country, except in special instances covered by such treaties.

To the Honorable the Secretary of State:

I herewith deposit with you, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 113, entitled "An Act to prohibit the procuring of intoxicating liquors by Indians,

and prescribing a penalty therefor.

My objection to this bill lies in the fact that it is a departure from the practice now obtaining in this and other States, under which it is a crime for a civilized person to sell or give intoxicating liquors to an Indian, by making it, also, a crime for the Indian to "knowingly purchase, accept or in any manner procure" the same.

Without the civilized person supplies an Indian with liquor and thereby commits a crime, the Indian has little opportunity of procuring it except by theft,

and in which case the Indian commits a punishable crime.

I am persuaded that it is not justice, considering the status and characteristics of the Indian, to make him co-criminal with his civilized tempter. Moreover, such an Act would render the practice of selling liquor to Indians more difficult to punish, by reason of the fact that the Indian could rely upon his statutory right to refuse to testify against the person selling him the liquor, on the ground that it would tend to incriminate himself. By leaving the law as covered by section 242 of the new criminal code, the ability of the State to convict and punish the real criminal will be enhanced, instead of lessened, as I believe it would be by this bill.

My objection to this bill is based entirely upon the conviction that the salary of any elective officer of the State should be fixed previous to his election, unless the question of raising the salary of such elective officer has been made a plank in the platform of both political parties, or in the platform of the one electing the majority of the Legislature, so that the people of the State have had an opportunity of expressing their approval. If at the next election of the Legislature the dominant political party at such election, or both political parties, should incorporate in their platforms such proposal, and thereafter the Legislature should pass such an Act. I would not withhold my approval. Or, if at the next session of the Legislature, a bill should pass providing for a just increase of the salaries of the State's elective officers, to take effect when the successors of the present state officers are installed, I would not withhold my approval. I am convinced that the salary of neither the Governor, Secretary of State, Controller, State Treasurer, Surveyor-General and Superintendent of Public Instruction is a fair, just and reasonable compensation for their services, and more especially in view of the large expense incident to election. There should be a general readjustment of the salaries of the public officials in this State by the next Legislature, and which should include an examination of what deputies, clerks, and employees are necessary in each of the several branches of the State Government, what just compensation they should receive, and the elimination of all such as are unnecessary.

Our commercial system generally is adjusted to the monthly payment of wages, which would have to be readjusted to the proposed law requiring semimonthly payments, leading to some needless disorganization of ordinary industrial and commercial affairs. I herewith deposit with you, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 222 entitled "An Act to amend section two of an Act to amend section one hundred and nine of an Act entitled 'An Act to provide revenue for the support of the government of the State of Nevada, and to repeal certain Acts relating thereto,' etc."

My objection to this bill lies in the fact that at the close of the legislative session I had choice of approval between this bill and Assembly Bill No. 138, covering the same subject-matter, but conflicting in terms. This bill provides for a division of the revenue derived from poll taxes equally between the State and the counties, while Assembly Bill No. 138, which I have approved, provides that all poll-tax receipts shall be retained by the counties. Assembly Bill No. 210, creating a State General Road Fund for the employment of convicts on the public roads and highways, was amended by the Senate striking out the provision that one-third of the poll-tax receipts should go into this fund, and the remaining two-thirds be retained by the counties, on the contention that all the poll-tax receipts should be retained by the several counties for road improvement, under the terms of the constitutional amendment adopted by the vote of the people on November 8, 1910. I am constrained to believe that the Honorable Senate was unconscious of the passage on March 15, one day earlier, of this Act, giving one-half of the said revenue to the State. I therefore withhold my approval of this bill, and for the further reason that if approved, while \$20,000 of the revenue derived by the State from its operations could be used under the provisions of said Assembly Bill No. 210, approximately \$40,000 additional, during the next two years, would accumulate in the State Treasury and be unavailable for any purpose until a succeeding session of the Legislature provided for its disbursement.

I herewith deposit with you, without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 74. entitled "An Act regulating contracts, leases, and conditional sales of personal

property and providing for the recording thereof."

My objection to this bill lies in the conviction, after giving it careful study, that the benefits in certain instances arising from its operations would be offset by new forms of fraud to which it would give rise, inasmuch as the bill does not require that the recorded instrument shall be accompanied with any affidavit to the effect that the contract or agreement is made in good faith and given for a debt actually owing, and is not made to hinder, delay or defraud any creditor. It is conclusive to me that the bill would have an injurious effect upon certain forms of commercial transaction, such as the sale of furniture, pianos, and certain other articles on the installment plan, found in practice to be of public benefit by enabling the average citizen to acquire valuable and necessary property which he would not likely acquire otherwise. The making of such transactions a matter of public record would tend to lessen the number of the same by reason of the average citizen's dislike to the publicity of his indebtedness. I am convinced, therefore, that the benefits arising from the operations of the bill would be more than counterbalanced by the injurious effects I have indicated. I therefore withhold my approval.

### COMMUNICATION FROM ATTORNEY-GENERAL

CARSON CITY, February 13, 1913.

The Honorable the Assembly of the State of Nevada:

Gentlemen: Complying with your resolution requesting the Attorney-General's office to advise the Assembly what legislation, in the opinion of the Attorney-General, is necessary to carry into effect the constitutional amendments approved by the people of the State at the last election, I have to advise:

That none of the amendments adopted by the people at the last election are self-executing with the exception of the amendment of section 3 to article 19

providing for the initiative, which is by its terms self-executing.

I have also to advise that the amendments to section 10 of the Constitution providing for the taxation and assessment of patented mining claims, in my opinion, is not effective at the present time, and proper legislation should be

enacted to carry it into effect.

I am handing you herewith, in compliance with your resolution, proposed bills to carry into effect the amendment of section 8 to article 1, providing for the filing of information in criminal cases, and the amendment of section 7 of article 15, relative to the appointment of females to the office of Notary Public, and the amendment of section 1 to article 10 of the Constitution, providing for the assessment and taxation of patented mines. In my opinion the amendment relative to the initiative should be supplemented by some legislation looking to the preservation of the integrity of all petitions that may be filed thereunder.

preservation of the integrity of all petitions that may be filed thereunder.

Section 9 added to article 2, providing for the recall, should be supplemented by legislation providing for the integrity of the petitions, specifically providing for the issuance of the call for the special election, and providing a method of nomi-

nating other candidates in the special recall election.

The amendment to section 3 of article 11, concerning the investment of school funds, should be supplemented by appropriate legislation that will safeguard and restrict investments and protect the governing board having control of the

investment of state school funds.

The matters of legislation concerning the recall, and the initiative, and the investment of school funds, are, I respectfully submit, purely matters of policy, and I should prefer to confer and advise with your appropriate committees before submitting any proposed bills to your body in that connection. #### MESSAGES FROM THE GOVERNOR

To the Honorable the Assembly:

I herewith transmit for your consideration the following letter from Dr. T. F. Richardson of Fallon, Nevada, State Veterinarian:

FALLON, NEVADA, January 25, 1913.

Hon. Tasker L. Oddie, Governor of Nevada, Carson City, Nevada.

SIR: As requested at our interview at Carson City, I am enclosing herewith a brief review of the reasons for my being appointed State Veterinarian of Nevada, and the cause of the expenses incurred by the office since my appointment.

the cause of the expenses incurred by the office since my appointment.

In June, 1911, a committee of ranchers in Churchill County appeared before the Board of County Commissioners and made a demand that something be done to stop \* the epidemic of glanders that had made its reappearance in the horses in that section of the State; the District Attorney was instructed to go to Carson City and lay the

matter before the Governor; upon his return he requested an interview with me. At that meeting he informed me that there was no fund in the State Treasury to pay for my services, but if I would undertake the work of stamping out the glanders the Governor would guarantee that a relief measure would be introduced at the next session of the Legislature for my benefit; and to give due authority for whatever action I did the Governor would appoint me the State Veterinarian of Nevada. I accepted this proposition, and on July 1, 1911, I received my commission from your Excellency. A full report of my work in cleaning up Churchill County from glanders

is now on file in your office.

At about the time I was finishing up my work in Churchill County I was requested by your Excellency to go over into Lyon County and investigate an out-break of disease in hogs which had been reported from that section of the State. My report on this outbreak of hog cholera is also on file in your office. Some time later, by the District Attorney of Lyon County, through the Governor, I was requested to investigate an outbreak of glanders in Mason, a case having been reported from that section. A statement of my action in this matter was also placed on file with you. The rest of my time has been taken up at intervals testing cattle for tuberculosis and isolated cases of suspected glanders in horses.

In brief, your Excellency will notice that no work was performed by this office except upon direct request of the officials of the different counties, their request

coming to me through the Governor.

I am enclosing a copy of a relief measure which I am asking Senator Dolf to introduce for my benefit and respectfully request your Excellency to supplement his efforts in my behalf by sending a special message to the Legislature recommending

its passage.

### REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

To the Honorable the Senate and the Assembly:

Your committee on the investigation of the State Bank and Trust Company

herewith presents and respectfully submits a preliminary report:

We find upon an examination of the records, papers, and files in the case of the State of Nevada, ex rel. John Sparks, v. State Bank and Trust Company, et al., in the District Court of the First Judicial District in and for the County of Ormsby, being the case in which Frank L. Wildes was appointed Receiver of the State Bank and Trust Company, that on the 2d day of December, 1912, the Receiver, Frank L. Wildes, filed with the Court an unverified petition, petitioning the Court to fix his compensation as Receiver. It appears from the records and files that since the 18th day of May, 1908, Frank L. Wildes has been acting as Receiver of the State Bank and Trust Company; that compensation was allowed to the Receiver by the Court, for two months from May 18, 1908, to July 8, 1908, and since that time and up to March 7, 1913, a period of over five years, no order was ever made fixing the compensation of the Receiver of the State Bank and Trust Company. Although it does not appear from the records and files in the case, we presume that Mr. Wildes has been drawing compensation over that whole period of time, to wit, five years, without any order of the Court, a matter in itself which, taken in connection with

subsequent developments, gives a bad odor to the whole transaction.

It appears from the petition of Mr. Wildes in which he asks for the fixing of his compensation, and he alleges therein that the duties of the receivership have, "ever since the 18th day of May, 1908, consumed the entire time, attention and energy of your petitioner," and the Court, the Hon. Frank P. Langan, proceeded so to find in his decision rendered on March 7, 1913.

The decision of the Court wherein the Court finds that the Receiver has given his entire time to the affairs of the receivership may be in a measure justified upon the allegations of the petition of Frank L. Wildes, but it seems to your committee that the Court should take judicial notice of the fact, within the notice of almost every one, that during the first nineteen months of that period in which the Receiver was supposed to be giving his entire time and attention to the affairs of the receivership, he was drawing down a salary of \$166.66 per month as Deputy State Treasurer of the State of Nevada. Either the exercise of memory, or a slight investigation by independent action of the Court would have disclosed this fact.

Your committee finds that, from May 18, 1908, to December 30, 1909, in addition to compensation at the rate of ten thousand dollars per year paid to Frank L. Wildes, as Receiver, for giving his entire time to the affairs of the defunct State Bank and Trust Company, he also drew down and pulled out of the State Treasury of the State of Nevada a salary as Deputy State Treasurer in the sum of \$3,166.66, for which he was also, under the law, devoting his entire time, attention and energy, to the affairs of the State of Nevada—a most wonderful

man, with a most wonderful personality.

During the time he was drawing this salary as Receiver of the State Bank and Trust Company, and devoting his entire time and attention to the affairs of the State in the State Treasurer's office, he had some two or more deputies to the Receiver who drew down salaries aggregating about \$550 a month.

Therefore it appears to your committee that during a period of almost two years the Receiver of the State Bank and Trust Company and ex officio Deputy Treasurer of the State of Nevada was drawing down \$166 per month from the State Treasury, almost \$1,000 per month as Receiver of the State Bank and Trust Company, and had deputies in his employ aggregating \$550 a month, a total received by the Receiver, Deputy Treasurer, and deputies of the Receiver, of about \$1,700 a month.

The foregoing statements are borne out and shown by the records, papers and files in the case of *State of Nevada*, ex rel. John Sparks, v. State Bank and Trust Company, and by the records and files in the office of the Controller of

the State of Nevada.

Your committee recommends that this report be submitted to your Committee on Judiciary, with instructions that it take up the matter of this report with the Attorney-General in order that we may determine the legal status of this affair, and your committee stands ready and willing to furnish the necessary evidence to substantiate all of the matters set forth in this report.

To the Honorable Members of the Nevada Legislature:

GENTLEMEN: We, the undersigned selected committee, do recommend that whatever appropriation may be made by your honorable body, that the same be equally divided between the Panama-Pacific International Exposition to be held in the City of San Francisco, California, and the Panama-California Exposition, to be held in San Diego, California, in the year 1915.

After having inspected, unofficially, the Panama-Pacific International Exposition and compared the same in as many of its features as our limited time permitted, we feel that the results produced for the amount of money expended will be as great in San Diego as in San Francisco, on account of the difference of the

character of the Exposition, San Diego making a specialty of irrigation, agriculture, and horticulture processes and progresses made along the above indi-

cated lines

No doubt the various members of your honorable body are more familiar with the plans of the proposed Panama-Pacific Exposition than those of the Panama-California Exposition, and we therefore submit a few of the plans as outlined by the last-named Exposition. They are as follows: The Exposition grounds will cover an area of about six hundred and fifteen (615) acres. The general exhibits and main buildings to cover about one hundred (100) acres; the States and foreign countries, about one hundred (100) acres; the counties in California, about twenty-five (25) acres; open-air exhibits, one hundred (100) acres; landscape gardens and parks, two hundred and fifty (250) acres; the amusement section, known as the "Isthmus," about twenty-five (25) acres, or about eight thousand (8,000) feet of space.

This committee has selected a site for the State of Nevada that adjoins those of New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, and Montana, subject to the approval

of your honorable body and the Governor of the State of Nevada.

In conclusion, this committee is unanimous that whatever appropriation is made that it be equally divided between these two Expositions.

# REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Report of Special Investigating Committee as follows, received and read:

To the Honorable the Senate and Assembly:

Gentlemen: Your special joint investigating committee herewith submits a report of its proceedings. In submitting this report the committee feels that it has gone as thoroughly into the matters referred to it as was possible in the short time at its disposal. The committee from the outset has regarded its investigations as a solemn duty to the State and at no time has prejudice taken the place of fairness in the proceedings.

The committee has taken a mass of evidence bearing on nearly every department of the state government. In every case it has been the aim to get at the bottom of things, regardless of who might be affected. It has worked on the theory that a public office is a public trust, and that those entrusted with the management of the affairs of state must at all times be ready to give an account

of their stewardship.

We hope that our labors will be productive of good. In many cases changes should be made in existing statutes. The recent growth of the State has brought about many conditions which were not anticipated, and this Legislature should endeavor to remedy the conditions discovered in our deliberations.

For some there are nothing but words of commendation; censure must be the lot of others; and there is a great middle ground where honest mistakes have been made which has led to laxity that must be corrected. We feel that the pruning-knife may be used to advantage in some departments. It is evident that greater restrictions must be placed on others. But the thing that must be practiced is the proper observance of the law on the part of every officer.

In the main the statutes are mandatory. There is little ground for discretion, and if discretion is used too freely there arises a condition that produces friction between departments. It is this fault, more than any other, that is responsible for the present condition of affairs and which led to our investigations.

We hope that this report will prompt a higher standard of citizenship and a higher regard for the majesty of the law. When any person assumes that his position is above the law he is treading on ground that is unstable and his footsteps are bound to lead him to disaster.

It is evident that restrictions should be placed on appointments and that all deputies and clerks should be qualified to hold their positions without receiving their tuition at the expense of the State. To a large extent civil-service rules would be desirable.

One instance is the failure of the Board of Capitol Commissioners to appoint an additional watchman as provided for by the Legislature of 1911, which undoubtedly felt that additional protection was needed. However, from the failure of the members of the board to agree on any person the position has not been filled and the State has been without that protection which an additional man would have afforded. Happily the State has not suffered, but it has been found that the reduced insurance rates would offset the salary provided.

# THE STATE UNIVERSITY

Our first subject of investigation was the State University. This subject was considered first for the reason that more good could be done there than in almost any other place. The findings submitted are based upon sworn testimony and the reports of certified public accountants.

It must be said that the new order of things at this institution bears no resemblance to the old. Where uncertainty and disorder prevailed, order has been substituted, and this committee feels justified in saying that the University can now be looked upon as a thriving institution. Were it not for the fact that some of the old traditions and management still prevail, it would be well to "let the dead past bury its dead." But for the good of all state institutions we append some of the disclosures made.

At the outset it became evident that if the same management that controlled the State's leading educational institution were applied to a private institution, the bankruptcy courts would have sounded its death knell long before this. The evidence adduced at the hearings shows an utter disregard for all business rules and a carelessness that cannot be condoned. This is accentuated by the fact that all that is correct in business life has been disregarded in a place which is supposed to teach these principles.

The present Board of Regents is doing good work, based upon the wise provision of the last legislature in making an appropriation for a thorough audit of the affairs of the University, and the result of the disclosures made by the auditors.

It was discovered that there was a deplorable lack of system. The statutory rights of the Regents were ridden over rough-shod by the President, and there is sufficient to show that the Regents have supinely submitted. The President had been at the head of the institution for seventeen years, and undoubtedly came to regard the place as his private property. This resulted in a condition of affairs that threatened the life of the school and made it one of the costliest, if not the most wasteful, in the country.

The auditors recommended that a comptroller be appointed to handle all the financial affairs and suggested a standard system of bookkeeping adapted to the needs of the school. The position of the President in objecting to the plan and his insisting on a continuation of the old order of things until 1913 is untenable.

Formerly ten sets of books were kept. Bank deposits were scattered all over the city, and the stub and canceled checks formed the main part of the book-keeping. Liberties were taken with government funds until confusion reigned and it became necessary to use all sorts of means to correct the erorrs. The true situation of affairs can best be expressed in the words of the auditor, Allen Knight, in his report of August 17, 1912, two days before Dr. Stubbs departed on his leave of absence:

"\* \* \* \* With all due respect to your august President, Dr. Stubbs shows, by his contradictory actions, and inconsistent attitude, a melancholy lack of acquaintance with the principles of accountancy. Unfortunately for both your President and Secretary the records show that juggling with the funds has transpired, and reports intentionally deceptive have been made to the Government."

This deception was in an apparent shortage of over \$4,000 in the government funds—money paid for the support of the Agricultural College—caused by the wrongful diversion of money to other school purposes. That the President was aware of the seriousness of the situation is shown by the effort made to cover up the shortage by double vouchers for salaries and supplies. This amount had to be covered by state funds, and money that had been appropriated in good faith for the support of the University had to be diverted to replenish the depleted government funds. An extract from the accountant's report is

pertinent:

Government Funds: I pointed out on page 4 of my last report the deficiency and errors in the Mackay Donation Account, and on page 5 the errors and double payments in the A. & M. College Fund and the Hatch and Adams Funds, stating that such things were possible only by improper connivance of officials and poor checking by the authorities. In turning over to the comptroller, the legal and other papers of the University, Secretary Taylor has produced the July, 1911, report of the A. & M. College Fund which could not be found when I was in Reno in February last, and I want to state right here, that my remark "improper connivance of officials" is amply borne out, as report to the United States Secretary of the Interior showed a balance on hand of \$4,294.34, whilst the balance in the bank at the same time was only \$170.32. Secretary Taylor's explanatory letter to the United States Government officials, accompanying the report, contained a glaring misstatement, and the President of the University evidently appreciated the seriousness of the situation when he offered to make good the balance of \$4,294.34, which the report to the Government called for.

The offer to make good was in the form of a note tendered to the Board of Regents by Dr. Stubbs and refused by them on the ground that they had no authority to agree to any such proposal. While there was not, evidently, anything of a criminal nature in the shortage of government funds, the amazing offer of the President leads to the conclusion that a great business wrong was

committed.

The record shows many additional instances of carelessness on the part of the Regents in performing their duties in a perfunctory manner, and of letting

the President usurp their functions.

One of the most glaring injustices was the imposition on the students supporting the dining-hall, which was under the supervision of the President, of a large number of dead-heads, employees of the University, who could well afford to pay. The dining-hall was conducted at a loss, and this undoubtedly

accounts for some of the diversion of funds.

Dr. Stubbs is now enjoying a sabbatical leave of absence of one year at full pay, \$5,000 per year. His value to the University from an educational standpoint, during the years of his connection with the institution, cannot be overestimated. It is true that he has given the best years of his life to the work, and has in many cases added to the endowments through his personal efforts. His leave will expire in August of this year, and we feel that the Board of Regents should adopt and serve him with notice of such restrictions relative to his business administration of the University as will prevent a recurrence of the unfortunate occurrences of the past. However, this committee feels that the Board of Regents, having the appointing power, are responsible to the people of the State as to what action will be taken following the disclosures made in this report.

#### THE JOSEPHS CASE

Pursuant to Assembly resolution this committee investigated the charge that Joe Josephs was not a citizen. We called on the author of the letters, Miss Somers, to furnish proof of her allegation, which she did through her brother-in-law, D. P. Morgan, who appeared before the committee.

The letters showed that Josephs was born in Berlin, though he always registered as having been born in Albany, N. Y. Josephs was called and produced papers showing that he had been naturalized at Stockton, California, on October 22, 1871. A copy of the minutes of the court was afterward secured showing

that the papers were genuine. Josephs defended himself by saying that he was led to declare his American birth through pride and by the influence of the company he kept. He stated further that he hesitated to correct the error

after the matter had run so long.

However, your committee is compelled to report more severely on another matter-that of accepting a division of salary from a deputy. It has been a hard matter for the committee to fathom the rumors that have been current, but finally succeeded. The testimony shows that Josephs demanded, and afterward indirectly received, for seven months during the years 1911-1912, the sum of \$35 per month to his own use or for his benefit, from Guy Guinan, his regularly appointed deputy, all of which is in violation of section 6313 of the Revised Laws.

The deputy at present employed by Josephs is paying \$100 a month for assistance. Until the first of this year the wife of the Clerk was the assistant. We commend the record in this case to your consideration as the entire transcript reveals pitiful incompetence and a labored effort to show that things are as they should be. It is apparent that the deputy in the office of Clerk of the Supreme Court is wholly incompetent, a matter for which Josephs is alone

responsible.

We recommend that this report be referred to the Judiciary Committee of

the Assembly for such action as is provided in cases of this character.

#### NEVADA STATE POLICE

Your committee made a thorough investigation of the affairs of the Nevada State Police. We realize that a great deal of criticism has been directed toward the department since its organization, and felt that a searching inquiry

should be made. Nearly every member was examined.

While the expenses of the department for the past two years have been very heavy, we were unable to get any reason therefor except that the details were more numerous and costly than formerly, and if retrenchment is to be applied in the State Police, it must be done along this line. One case came to our notice of a detail in Clark County—the search of the Indian Quiho—that lasted several months and for which the expense was heavy. After several hundred dollars had been spent, it developed that the Indian was not wanted.

The State Police have been detailed on gambling cases where the local officers should have attended to the duty. Many other instances of this kind might be cited, wherein the state organization was called in to do work that could have been done by the local officers. And right here we want to say that we think that the State has been forced to pay in cases where local officers wanted to

shift the blame for making arrests.

It transpires that there is friction in the department, which seems to revolve principally around the head of the Inspector. This is a condition that should not exist in any place, and we feel that steps should be taken at once to correct

There is no doubt that the accounts are well kept and that all claims are properly audited. It has come to light, however, that transportation has been secured without the authority of the Governor, other than what appears to be

a general order, as required by the Act of 1911.

The evidence in the police inquiry showed that many of the complaints made were prompted by suspicion, rather than being based on facts. Every member was questioned closely, and details of many accusations that have been current for the past several years have either been cleared up or denied by the ones against whom the accusations were made. We would call your attention to the record of this examination.

In this matter the committee feels warranted to make these recommenda-

That the law in regard to transportation be strictly complied with.

That every man employed be named on the roster.

That the Governor and Superintendent make investigation where aid is asked unless it appear that quick relief is necessary.

That steps be taken to correct the friction in the department.

That strict economy be practiced, the expenses of conducting the department for the last two years-\$64,000-being one of the causes of complaint against the department, notwithstanding that the Ely trouble was responsible for a large part of the expense. We feel that the department as a whole has done the work required of it to the best of its ability, and that if any changes are required that it should be made by amendments to existing laws.

#### STATE OFFICERS

In pursuance of another Assembly resolution different state officers were called before the committee regarding the employees who work for them and other matters relating to the conduct of the offices.

The committee found that in the following offices the wives of the officers were employed in different capacities: State Printer, State Controller, Superintendent of Public Instruction, State Treasurer, and Secretary of State. In every case the witnesses swore that the appointments were made properly in that no law existed defining who the appointees should be. They all testified further that they required the help.

It is evident that the proper way to remedy this condition, against which so much criticism has been directed, is to pay adequate salaries to state officers and enact laws bearing on the subject. In a State like Nevada, where so much territory has to be covered, and where peculiar conditions have to be met, the salaries are inadequate.

Every witness summoned gave an explanation of the circumstances connected with the employment of wives in clerical positions. All claimed that the work was being done properly, and that the State was not losing by reason of the employment of relatives. This is another matter in which we must call your attention to the record, for it is a matter far beyond the power of any committee, no matter how diligent, to point out cases in which employees of this kind have been remiss in their duties. It is evident that better service could have been rendered in some cases, but the appointing power alone is responsible for the administration of the different offices. The record alone will make this clear, and if there is a general demand for reform along this line statutory enactment is the only remedy.

In the cases where this condition exists, six in all, conditions vary to a large extent. There is no doubt that more discretion could have been used in some cases. The committee questioned the witnesses very carefully as to the fitness of those employees to fill the positions, and the answers were all to the effect that they were. Questions were asked as to the attendance of employees. The answers were all to the effect that the appointees performed all the duties required of them.

This is where opinions differ. The appointing power is the one to be satisfied, but the public is the one who raises objection and from which comes complaint. The fact of the employment of wives and other relatives is apparent. This is a matter that should be settled for all time, and that as soon as possible. We think that a reduction of one person in the office force of every state officer where more than two people are regularly employed, including the principal, can be made without imparing the efficiency of any department. In a few instances where the heads of departments are frequently called to other parts of the State, this could not apply. There is no reason why all offices should not be open for business not later than 9 a. m., nor that they should be closed on every semi-holiday.

The University of Nevada requires special mention. When the Acts of Congress donating different land grants for educational purposes in this State were passed, the Legislature accepted the provisions of the grants by special Acts. Whether by inadvertence, mistake or inexcusable neglect, without a full regard for the solemnity of the promises made, things have come to such a condition that the State is responsible to the Federal Government for the lax administration of the trust that has been placed in it.

By the acceptance of the 90,000-Acre Grant and the Morrill Land Grant, the State obligated itself to comply with the terms of the grants in return for the great benefits bestowed. The State Controller testified that notifications were made according to law. The Governor, as president of the State Board of Education, testified that efforts were made to comply with the law, but that for various reasons the matter was delayed and that the letter of the law could not be followed.

It is the duty of this Legislature to assure the Federal Government, by resolution or otherwise, that steps will be taken to comply with the provisions of

the grants, and that those entrusted with the management of these affairs will be held strictly responsible. The amendments to the state bond issue are calculated to take care of the present difficulty, and future officers and Legislatures should exercise great care that this beneficent endowment should be surrounded

by the greatest safeguards.

The school situation in Nevada requires greater care and more attention to the details than has been given in the past. The repeal of the ten per cent differential in favor of home merchants offers a ground for saving that should result in material benefit. Cases have come to our attention where school boards of all degrees of authority have used discretion that has resulted in extravagance in numerous cases. A specific case was presented to us in the last few days from G. E. Anderson, Deputy Superintendent for Elko County, of specific cases of favoritism in the award of contracts. The savings that could have been effected are alleged to average 40 per cent. The school boards of the counties and the State Board of Education are answerable for this condition of affairs, and steps should be taken to correct this abuse.

#### STATE INSTITUTIONS

The resignation of the Superintendent of the State Orphans' Home prevented the necessity of this committee's going into the details of the management of that institution. For a number of years past criticism has been directed toward the management of that institution. We feel that the public has a right to demand from the authority that has the appointing power in this case that discretion be exercised in the appointment and that strict compliance with the law be demanded.

We think further that the Superintendent should be a man of strict integrity,

unquestioned ability and of undoubted moral character.

A change has taken place in the management of the State Prison. The suggestions offered in the preceding paragraph should prevail in the case of this institution. The public is wearied of reports of mismanagement and favoritism, and the time has arrived when the Warden should be able to account to the public for his management regardless of political debts, special favors, or the bearing of his action on future political preferment.

We think that the new management should take cognizance of the fact that employees have been discharged for their participation in the drug traffic without further prosecution. The laws of the State are explicit on this point and a moral wrong is committed when the matter is not pressed. The Warden is supposed to have supreme authority, and as such is responsible to the whole

people for his conduct.

The suggestions herein offered come as a result of our investigation along

different lines, and will be borne out by an examination of the transcript.

The committee has not had the time nor opportunity to look into the affairs of the Insane Asylum or the State Fish Commission, and we recommend that the committees having those matters under their consideration give these institutions their full consideration.

#### IN CONCLUSION

The committee feels that it has done its duty as well as possible under the circumstances. The time has been comparatively short, and, with the press of other work in which the members have been interested, the task has been a heavy one. We feel that in the future the work could be carried on to advantage by several committees, each having a special duty.

The result of our investigations may be summed up in these words: "Those holding office or employment are, under the state government, responsible to the public and amenable to the law, and that if their sense of duty and patriot-

ism does not guide their conduct, the fear of punishment should."

We hope that this investigation will have the result on the management of state affairs that was intended. It is plain that many of the existing conditions are the result of a growth that had its beginning long ago. But this cannot be considered in the light of an excuse. Greater care for the intent of the law is necessary. Greater cooperation between officers is imperative. The realization of the maxim that a public office is a public trust should be the guidance of all those who hold office. Personal likes and dislikes must be eliminated. The law, not the man, is the final arbiter.

Man is not infallible, nor is the membership of this committee. Though we have worked according to the best of our ability, without prejudice or hope of reward, without fear of consequences or disfavor, we call attention to the record of our proceedings and trust that in it much more enlightenment can be found than is related in this review.

CARSON CITY, March 13, 1913.

To the Honorable the Senate and the Assembly:

The attention of your honorable bodies is called to the fact that during the present year the United States battleship "Nevada," of the Dreadnaught class, and one of the largest battleships in the American Navy, will be launched from the

Fore River shippards.

It has been the custom for every State, after which a battleship is named, to present the battleship with a silver service, and the fact that Nevada is a great mining State makes it particularly pertinent that such a presentation should not be omitted. I believe that the producing gold and silver mines of the State would be agreeable to contributing the precious metals required for such service in order that the same can be made from Nevada gold and silver. I believe further that the people of the State generally will be glad to contribute, by popular subscription, towards making up a fund sufficient for a suitable service. At the same time I am of the opinion that the State should make an appropriation to supplement such contributions, in order to insure a suitable service. It might be that no part of such appropriation would be required, but I deem it advisable that a fund should be available in the event that the cost of the service cannot be covered by subscription as aforesaid.

Section 9, line 14. Insert after the word "the" the words "not more than," and add thereto the following words: "The board of government is hereby authorized to accept gifts, and in order that the home herein provided for may be prepared as soon as possible, to borrow money at a rate not to exceed six per cent, to be repaid from the fund created by this Act."

Section 13. This Act shall be construed in conformity with the intent as well as the express provisions thereof, and shall confer upon the board authority to do all those lawful acts which it deems necessary to promote the prosperity of the school and the well-being and education of its inmates, including the organization of trade schools, purchase of materials for use therein, and the doing of all other things, not prohibited, which are required to carry out the purposes of this Act. The board is further authorized to pay those committed to said school small weekly or monthly sums in lieu of clothing and other necessary articles, if, in its judgment, such a course would better promote discipline and training; and for this purpose, and also to meet small current and incidental expenses, the said board is hereby authorized to place in the hands of the superintendent of this industrial school, through requisitions approved by the State Board of Examiners and issued and paid by warrants as provided herein, sums of money not to exceed five hundred dollars at any one time; provided, that the superintendent shall make a complete financial report each month to the board of trustees of all moneys handled by him.

Section 15. For the fiscal year commencing January 1, 1913, the fiscal year commencing January 1, 1914, an ad valorem tax of two cents on each one hundred dollars of taxable property is hereby levied and directed to be collected, for the purposes of this Act, upon all the taxable property in this State, including the net proceeds of mines and mining claims, except such property as is by law exempt from taxation, and all money derived from said taxes shall be paid into the treasury to the credit of the Nevada School of Industry Fund hereby created.

The matter is therefore left, without any recommendation on your committee's part, to the judgment and discretion of the Assembly, and to the judgment and discretion of the Governor of Nevada, as to calling an extra session of the Legislature that such proceedings might be taken and carried through.

From the facts stated concerning the matter of Joe Josephs, and the evidence on which it was based, it would seem that crimes and violations of law have been committed by the said Joe Josephs, and by others also. But as to all these matters your committee, for the reason above stated, to wit, the lack of time, makes no definite suggestion as to what proceedings should be had, leaving these and all to the judgment and discretion of the Assembly and of the Governor of Nevada of the matters mentioned in said report and the further suggestion is made that if the evidence of the Committee of Investigation were brought to the attention of the Grand Jury of Ormsby County, it is not impossible that the said Grand Jury would be able to do something serviceable in the matter.

#### COMMUNICATION

Communication from Judge Langan in regard to State Bank. Referred to Attorney-General, and entered on the Journal.

CARSON CITY, NEVADA, March 19, 1913.

To the Hon. T. A. Brandon, Speaker of the Assembly of the State of Nevada.

MY DEAR SIR: My attention has been called by resolution, proposed legislation and various articles appearing through the press of the State to a serious reflection upon, and criticism of, the administration of the affairs of the State Bank and Trust Company. This bank estate and the receivership thereof are now pending in the court over which I have the honor to preside. Under ordinary conditions, through usage, custom and practice contributing to the independence of the judiciary, it is eminently proper that judicial acts should be dependent solely upon competent evidence properly submitted to the Court and not upon public comment, rumor or extraneous matters. The reason for this, without further amplified statement, must be obvious. I am strongly of the opinion, however, that in justice to myself, to my position, and for the preservation and integrity of the court over which I preside, that in this instance a departure from this well-recognized rule and principle is more than amply justified. Aside from an assailment of my own personal integrity, honor and reputation, which after all is a man's dearest possession, the court and its integrity have been seriously questioned.

The purpose of this communication is to urge upon the honorable body over which you preside immediate action looking to a complete investigation of this receivership. If I have betrayed my trust, disgraced my office or wilfully violated my oath, the people of this State should know it, and my removal should follow. If, on the other hand, these attacks upon my reputation, honor and integrity are unwarranted, it is only fair that the court, myself and those dear to me should be

made to realize the injustice of this statewide reflection.

If there should be delay in ordering ways and means for this investigation I propose at once to call the grand jury of Ormsby County in session, that all facts may be fully represented, and complete disclosures made.

I sincerely hope that the suggestions of this letter be speedily acted upon and that you will find it convenient and proper to communicate its contents to the Assembly. Very respectfully, FRANK P. LANGAN, District Judge.
