





## THIRTY-THIRD SESSION

#### THE FIRST DAY

Carson City (Monday), January 17, 1927.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and Statutes, the Assembly was called to order by Hon. W. G. Greathouse, Secretary of State, at 12 o'clock noon.

On motion of Mr. Yeager, duly seconded and carried, Mr. George Hussman was elected temporary Chairman by acclamation.

Prayer by Father Murphy.

Mr. Hussman appointed Mr. Whitacre to act as temporary Clerk, and Mr. Maupin to act as temporary Sergeant-at-Arms.

The Clerk was instructed to call the roll.

The committee appointed to wait upon the Governor reported that it had informed the Governor that the Assembly was ready for business, and that the Governor had informed the committee he would present his message at a later date.

Mr. Robb, Mr. Mackay, and Mr. Patterson were the committee appointed to wait upon the Senate.

The Speaker appointed seats at the press table to Mr. Clyde, of the Carson News and Associated Press, Mr. Mighels of the Carson Appeal, Mr. Mooney of the Nevada State Journal, and Mr. Helmick of the Reno Evening Gazette.

### REPORTS OF SELECT COMMITTEES

To the Honorable Assembly of the State of Nevada:

We your legislative committee, heretofore appointed by your Speaker to prepare and submit to this body appropriate expressions of public regard for the memory and achievements of the late Denver S. Dickerson, and the late Emmet D. Boyle, beg leave to submit the following:

HON. DENVER S. DICKERSON, a native of the State of California, began his meteoric career of service by enlisting in the U.S. Cavalry of Volunteers in the Spanish American War, where his ability and indomitable courage won him rapid promotion. At the expiration of the war, be took up his residence in White Pine County, Nevada, where he served his county as County Clerk and County Recorder from 1902 to 1906, when he received honor from his party by being nominated and elected Lieutenant-Governor. With scarcely a year's service he was called upon to discharge the duties of Governor of this State. The same characteristics and energy which had previously guided him to continued success marked his official administration as the highest executive of the State, with distinction and added honor. Although he had now received the highest honor his people might confer, he answered the call to service and acted as Warden of the State Prison until 1916, when he again served his country as Federal Inspector of Explosives, and as Inspector of Federal Prisons. At the expiration of the war he returned to Nevada, and was appointed Warden of the State Prison and Superintendent of State Police, which position he held at the time of his untimely death.

At the age of fifty-four this man had occupied positions of honor and trust as diverse as they were numerous, and in no instance was a trust betrayed or a service inadequately performed. His honesty of purpose and uniform sincerity in every contest left him at its conclusion with the sincere respect of his opponent. The same admirable traits that surrounded his public career with a halo of glory made him a host of staunch friends, whose estimate of him will never be undermined while reason occupies its proper throne. We feel

that this brief and inadequate summary of the record of the career of Denver S. Dickerson deserves preservation, and feel that no more appropriate place could be suggested than in the records of this Assembly.

GOVERNOR EMMET D. BOYLE was a native of Nevada, raised and educated within its borders. Admitted to the University of Nevada at the age of sixteen, he developed a standing that marked his eventful life with success. Being impressed with the lure and possibilities of the mining industry, he fitted himself both theoretically and practically for a career of which he made a Although deeply interested in the great mining industry he was a careful student of public matters. Recognition of the young man's keen interest in and familiarity with the conditions and needs of the State, resulted, in 1914, in his being elected Governor of his native State, the youngest to have achieved that distinction. This high office he administered with signal success for eight years, which included the period that our Nation was a party in the World War. The additional and trying responsibilities thrust upon our young Governor, by reason of the war, were met with the same ready wisdom and rare judgment which characterized his administration as one of the most successful and beneficial in the history of Nevada. At the expiration of his service as Governor he continued his mining activities, and also entered the journalistic His knowledge of and interest in public and governmental affairs made his voice a power for the progress and prosperity of his State and people. His death at the age when most men are just beginning to be of real worth and service to their State and Country, leads us to the inevitable conclusion that the State of Nevada was deprived of a citizen whose future value, measured in the light of his past service, is beyond estimate. We feel that the best word picture we can paint of this man is by quoting the words of one who knew him as a friend: "No truthful picture of his life can be drawn without some attempt to shed on the outline of its events the radiance and color of its spirit. But who can describe adequately his keen and powerful intellect; the passionate and universal sympathy of his great heart; his enthusiasm for the virtues and gifts of his friends, his automatic obliviousness of their faults; his charm and wit; his inimitable power as reconteur; his gratitude to his very maligners, who relieved him a little of his ever-present urge of self-depreciation; his complete courage, physical and spiritual; his great joy in life and glory in

In conclusion, feeling that every man's life is but a lesson for the guidance of those who come after, we commend to the growing citizens of this commonwealth the estimable trait of character of these two citizens which enable them to leave engraved on the escutcheon of honor and achievement a record unsullied by the breath of scandal or dishonor—a record worthy the enulation of every just citizen.

We respectfully submit the foregoing for your approval and suggest that the same may be spread in full upon the Journal of this Assembly, and a copy be sent to Mrs. Denver S. Dickerson and Mrs. Emmet D. Boyle as a token of our

esteem of Denver S. Dickerson and Emmet D. Boyle.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE PRISON AND INSANE ASYLUM CARSON CITY, NEVADA, March 1, 1927.

Mr. Speaker:

Your Committee on State Prison and Insane Asylum begs leave to report that we have visited and inspected the State Prison at Carson City, and the

Hospital for Mental Diseases at Reno, Nevada.

At the former institution we found that the new buildings are apparently first-class in every respect. Everything about the institution is in first-class shape, as to cleanliness and order, and the inmates seemed to be, in the main, healthy and well cared for. The kitchen, dining room, etc., are kept in the very best of order, and the food supplied appears of the best.

The cellhouse is a model of efficiency, well ventilated and well drained, and

clean and wholesome.

A shortcoming of the prison, however, which demands immediate correction, both for the health and welfare of the prisoners, and the safety of the guards, is the lack of a proper assembly room for the prisoners during stormy weather. At present about 150 men, of all shades of guilt and criminal instincts, are compelled, in order to escape the storm, to huddle in a shed in the main yard, which is a disgrace to the State of Nevada, and to humanity. They are huddled into this insanitary, unsafe building, out of sight of the guards, where it is impossible to keep them under surveillance, and where they have absolutely nothing to do but lounge around and plot mischief. It is impossible to keep it clean, and the ventilation is nil. For heating there are some stoves, and in order to get fresh air at all, it is necessary to keep the one door wide open, in the coldest and stormiest weather. Should an unpopular guard, or other person, go in there, there is nothing to prevent some of the prisoners from murdering him, and as it is the habit of prisoners, it would be impossible to secure evidence that would bring the guilty participants in the crime to justice. Although your committee saw no vermin while on their visit, the place is necessarily foul, and a breeding place for lice. It should be torn down and replaced by a properly planned building, with a cage for a guard. With this exception, the prison is in good shape.

At the Hospital for Mental Diseases, we found that, while everything is kept as clean and sanitary as conditions will permit, the old building has been neglected until it is in a poor state of repair, and it is a question if it would not cost more to repair it than a new building of the same size and of modern construction would; and it would still be an old building. The kitchen, especially, is too old and too small for economical preparation of the necessary food for the inmates. The floors are old and worn, the paint is in bad shape, and the fact that it is a half-basement makes it hard to keep as clean as such a depart-

ment should be.

We found the water supply insanitary, and woefully insufficient for fire protection. In fact, it can truly be said that the whole institution is without protection in this regard. A tank capable of holding five thousand gallons of water on a good tower, constitutes the entire supply for domestic use and for fire protection, and in the event of a fire in any of the buildings it would be a miracle if some of the unfortunates who are confined there under treatment did not lose their lives; and if it got a good start in the main building it would be almost certain to burn to the ground, and the loss of life would amount to a holocaust. There is an attempt at making fire escapes, but with a large body of mentally unsound patients to take care of the attendants would be helpless.

The pumping machinery we find is obsolete in pattern, and so badly worn as to be practically junk. The cost of putting it in shape for efficient work would probably be greater than the cost of an entirely new and modern plant. The turbine wheel which drives the pumps and the electric generator is worn out, inefficient, and extravagant, in that it will not produce sufficient power to properly operate the small motors necessary for the operation of the heating plant.

It is recommended that this plant be either replaced by a new and modern machine of sufficient capacity to properly drive the machinery, or that it be abandoned, and connection made with the regular power lines which are

already installed.

The water supply comes from a well on the banks of the Truckee river, thirty feet from the stream, and thirty feet in depth, and is insanitary and insufficient.

An estimate has been made of the cost of laying a main from Sparks to the institution, eight inches in diameter, which main would, in our opinion, furnish an ample supply of wholesome water for domestic use and ample fire protection in addition. With a main pipe line of this size, and a quantity of water under good pressure, the cost would be returned in a few years in the shape of reduced insurance rates.

Any person, male or female, of the age of 21 years or over, whether a resident of the district or not, who is or has declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States and who is a bona fide holder of title, or evidence of title, as defined in section 1 hereof, to at least five (5) acres of land situated in the district, shall be entitled to one vote at any election held under the provisions of this Act, and shall be held to be referred to whenever the words elector or electors are used herein. Any elector residing outside of the district owning at least five (5) acres of land in the district, and qualified to vote at district elections, shall be considered as a resident of that division and precinct of the district in which the major portion of his lands are located. for the purpose of determining his place of voting and qualifications for holding Any elector residing within the district boundaries shall be deemed a resident of the division in which he actually resides, for the purpose of determining his qualification for voting and holding office. A guardian, executor or administrator shall be considered as the holder of title or evidence of title, as prescribed in section 1 hereof, to the land in the State for which he is such guardian, executor or administrator, and shall have the right to sign petitions, vote and do all things that any elector may or can do under this Act. Corporations holding land in the district shall be considered as persons entitled to exercise all the rights of natural persons, and the president of the corporations, or other person duly authorized by the president of the corporation, or other person duly authorized by the president or vice-president, in writing, may sign any petition authorized by this Act, and register and cast the vote of the corporation at any election."

Also, amend page 20 by striking out the last word in line 26, all of lines 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, and 32, and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "The assessments, tolls or charges fixed by the board of directors for the payment of operation and maintenance expenses, as in this Act provided, shall become a lieu upon all lands entitled to receive water from the irrigation district system of works, as of the date fixed by board of directors for the payment of the same, whether water is delivered to such lands or not." (Question)—No,' or '.....(Question) and bonds—Yes,' and '.....(Question) and bonds-No.' The board of directors may submit any such contract or proposed contract and bond issue, if any, to the District Court of the county wherein is located the office of said board, to determine the validity thereof and the authority of the board to enter into such contract or acquisition, and the authority for the validity of the issuance and deposit and transfer of said

bonds; whereupon the same proceedings shall be had as in the ordinary case of the judicial determination of the validity of bonds, and with like effect."

For combination passenger and freight carrying vehicles a flat rate of \$25 plus \$5 per passenger seating capacity, this to be computed on the basis of allowing 16 inches per passenger of seating space and 125 pounds in weight per passenger, the weight of passenger capacity to be deducted from the rated freight hauling capacity of the vehicle and the difference between the passenger capacity and the total freight hauling capacity to be charged for at the regular freight rate, or \$1 per 100 pounds." Section 4, page 3, line 20, strike out the word "permit" and insert the word "license"; in line 2, in the title of the Act, strike out the words "to provide an appropriation for license plates.'







