



The President of the Senate welcomed the Governor and asked him to read his message.

The Governor delivered his message as follows.

To the Honorable, the Senate and Assembly:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 10 of the Constitution of Nevada, the Governor is required to communicate by message to the Legislature at every regular session and recommend such measures as he may deem expedient.

In compliance with this constitutional provision, it is my privilege and duty to report to you, as members of the Forty-first regular session, conditions existing within the State, and to briefly comment upon them and its State institutions.

The financial condition of the State and its various departments is sound, and in a better condition than when I reported to the Fortieth Legislature.

Economic conditions in this State are good and in many sections are above normal. Livestock, wool, produce, and strategic metals are in demand. Good prices are being paid for them, with the result that business along almost every line is doing well. As a governmental war measure many of our gold and silver producing mines have been shut down. Naturally, our State revenue from this source will be decreased and business enterprises will suffer.

It should be borne in mind that extraordinary conditions brought about by the war are responsible for a certain amount of prosperity within the State.

BIENNIAL BUDGET

The Statutes of 1919, page 58, require that the Biennial Budget for the fiscal years 1944–1945, with the accompanying proposed appropriation bill, be laid before you within twenty days after the Legislature has convened. This must be made after all departmental reports of receipts and estimated expenditures are received and studied. This budget will contain financial statements of all departments of the State Government during the past one and one-half years, as well as estimated expenditures for the six months ending June 30, 1943; also, estimated requirements as approved by the Executive for the ensuing two years commencing July 1, 1943, and ending June 30, 1945.

I shall have the budget in your hands within a few days and I request your

careful consideration of and attention thereto.

STATE FINANCES

The records of the State Treasurer show the net balance of State funds in the State Treasury, as of January 5, 1943, to be \$2,713,915.48. On the same date the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the State amounted to \$585,000, all of which is held by trust fund accounts.

On June 30, 1942, bonds owned by the various State trust funds had a book value of \$3,869,840.58. On December 31, 1942, these investments had a book value of \$3,904,043.42. Income from interest on the bonds from July 1, 1940, to June 30, 1942, amounted to \$207,791.21. On December 31, 1942, the sum of \$58,469.11 was available in cash for investment.

STRENGTHENING OUR WAR EFFORT

We are well aware that our national debt is increasing daily at a tremendous rate. I urge you to keep in mind that this debt must be met and that a corresponding increase in State obligations to it would only place two heavy financial burdens upon our people. Economy within our State has been the fundamental basis of our prosperity, and it is with pride that we point to the fact that our State is almost free of bonded indebtedness.

I urge you to complete this session within the shortest time possible, having in mind that your work should be done well and with precision. Reduce legislative expenses, weigh carefully appropriations, and grant only those tending to improve and build our State. Obtain value received for every dollar of out-

lay of funds.

Insofar as the enactment of war legislation is concerned, each member of the Senate and Assembly should ask himself two questions: Will this bill promote national morale—or injure it? Will it help the war effort—or hamper it?

The people of our State are in no mood to tolerate any political battles in this time of national crisis. At least, until complete victory is had, political hatchets must be buried or delay and embarrassment will result and we will

be courting tragedy and disaster.

In some States, Governors have already been given broad latitudes to suspend and modify laws on their own motion. I do not ask for extraordinary powers as your war-time Governor, nor do I recommend that such powers be given the Chief Executive of Nevada. I am proposing that careful study be given to laws we now have on our statute books and the enactment of new laws, to the end that we might meet existing and anticipated emergency conditions. For instance, special attention should be given to our law dealing with civilian defense and our State Police organization, as hereinafter specifically mentioned in this message. Special attention should be given to the broadening of the laws applying to the practice of dentistry and medicine to allow temporary permits to practitioners for the duration of the war.

STATE COUNCIL OF DEFENSE

The present State Council of Defense was set up under a law passed in 1919. The council has been functioning well, but I am of the opinion that a new law should be passed covering this subject in order that greater efficiency in civilian defense can be obtained in these critical times. The old law was enacted in peace times, and portions of it are obsolete and do not cover many of the present emergencies that arise from day to day.

I recommend that there be a sufficient appropriation made to allow the council to operate as a separate entity and not have it dependent upon any other State department for support. Under the present set-up support is being obtained from other State departments, which lessens the efficiency of those departments as well as the council itself. It is extremely important that

every department should function properly.

POLICE PROTECTION

In two previous messages I have requested that our State Police law be strengthened. The last Legislature did away with the Highway Patrol and set up a system under the Public Service Commission by which inspectors served as license collectors of automobiles, trucks, and busses. The inspectors were stripped of police powers and were not even granted the right to perform highway patrol duties, such as making arrests for drunken and reckless driving. There were 107 deaths due to accidents on the Nevada State highways during the year 1942 and 102 deaths in 1941, as compared to 77 deaths in 1940 and 71 deaths in 1939.

The present State Police force consists of one paid officer and a secretary. We have no highway patrol protection, except through the local sheriffs, constables, and city police, whose duties are confined within limits of their legally extended in indicate the confined within limits of their legally

established jurisdictions.

Our National Guard has been inducted into the regular army. The expense

of organizing and maintaining a State Guard under present conditions is prohibitive. The compensation as set by law for the National Guard would be so negligible that we could not hope to interest valuable or even satisfactory personnel in a State Guard to carry on such duties as it might be required to

perform.

In my judgment a sufficient State Police force, properly stationed over the State, would be a great aid to the protection and safety of the people of our State. They would work in conjunction with sheriffs, constables, and city police and act as a coordinating body with those law enforcement agencies, the Department of Justice and other Federal agencies. A State Police force, with a sufficient number of officers, which I believe should not exceed ten men, cooperating with city, county, and national officers would be specially important in controlling subversive activities, prevalent throughout our State and Nation.

The State of Nevada is the only State in the Union that does not maintain a State Police force. In many of the States the State Police is the unit under which protective measures and policies are formulated and carried out for the

various State Councils of Defense.

It appears to me to be a shirking of responsibility to let this important piece

of legislation lag from year to year.

I recommend that a direct appropriation be made in an amount sufficient to pay proper salaries and supply equipment for a State Police force for the State of Nevada.

If you desire to change the name of the organization to "Nevada Enforcement Bureau" or "Nevada Bureau of Investigation," or some other name, that is your privilege, but I respectfully urge that you take action on this important measure at this session.

WAR EMERGENCY FUND

I respectfully recommend that the amount of the Emergency Fund created by the 1941 Legislature be increased for use in the event that the hazards of these times should bring major disasters and increased dangers to our State. This fund is handled under the direction of your State Board of Examiners.

AMENDMENT TO THE POLL TAX LAW

I urge you to amend the present poll tax law so as to exempt those who enter the armed forces from paying a poll tax for the duration. I believe that they are entitled to this consideration, which is very little compared to the sacrifices that they are making.

HIGHWAYS

For the duration of the war all that we can hope to do on our highway system is to maintain those roads we now have and collaborate with the Federal Government in constructing new roads in strategic areas. In fact, the Federal Government has limited the outlay of its funds to necessary military and strategic roads and will not cooperate with the State in the construction of any other class of roads. On account of gas rationing and the policy to save rubber, funds from gasoline taxes have recently dropped substantially, which will give us less money upon which to operate for some time to come.

During the years 1941 and 1942 the personnel in the Maintenance Division of our Highway Department has been reduced 18%. The personnel in all other divisions of the Highway Department has been reduced 37.6%. Further reduction in personnel shall be made in the future as the necessity demands.

THE NEVADA INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION

I respectfully refer you to the report of the legally appointed accountant of the Nevada Industrial Commission, submitted September 9, 1942. This report contains a résumé of the financial transactions of the Commission from July 1, 1913, to June 30, 1942.

Due largely to the unprecedented volume of work being carried on in construction projects within Nevada in the year 1942, the cash and investment holdings appear to be abnormally large. It must be kept in mind, however,

that a study must be made over a period of time in order to determine, with any degree of accuracy, the amount of the reserves necessary to meet liabilities

resulting from risks involved in new and additional construction.

I have made a study of the situation and have discussed it with members of the Commission, who are now preparing a revised rate schedule, which will provide lower rates in those classifications whose experience warrants such action, and I have suggested that they also consider the advisability of increasing the rate of compensation to injured workmen.

TRANSPORTATION

This problem has become acute and complicated in aiding the Federal Government in the conservation of vital transportation equipment and in the prompt and continuous movement of traffic concerned with the national war effort and with the preservation of the domestic wartime economy. Since Nevada might be termed a bridge State in the transportation field, we necessarily have been called upon to follow liberal policies in allowing the movement of war materials, man power, etc. I consider our laws broad enough to take care of the problems arising at the present time.

Institutions

At the Fortieth Session of the Nevada Legislature an Act was passed creating a bond issue to enlarge the State Prison. Work was begun by obtaining plans and specifications for the building and supplying stone, sand, and gravel for the construction program. Inmates of the prison quarried and shaped this stone and hauled the sand and gravel.

Priorities on steel and other necessary material could not be obtained, so the construction must necessarily be postponed until after the war. This will furnish work for some laborers during the postwar program. The overcrowded condition of the prison has been somewhat relieved due to there being less crime since the beginning of the war, but the situation as to housing facilities

for State prisoners is still grave.

As a very important part of the war program in this State, I have requested certain State institutions to increase food production in order to become as nearly self-supporting as possible. I refer to the Nevada State Prison, the Orphans' Home, the Nevada State Hospital for Mental Diseases, and the Nevada School of Industry. Each one of these institutions has land, labor, and facilities to produce food commodities in greater quantities. I also appeal to the Agricultural Department of the Nevada State University to exert every effort at its command to help increase production throughout the State.

Food shortages will be extreme for some time to come. We must feed our armed forces, our civilian population, and assist our allies in this important phase of carrying on the war.

STATES RIGHTS

For some time past I have been protesting various authorities, policies, and requirements of the National Social Security Board. Using the argument that it was a war measure, this board took over the Employment Division of our Employment Security Department. It was turned over to the Federal Government, by your Governor, with the reservation that it be returned to the State at the end of the war.

An effort was made by the same board to further augment its authority by taking over the Compensation Division of the Employment Security Department. It appears to me that the action that has been taken was a direct attempt to federalize this department of our government that has been func-

tioning so well in our State.

Attempts have been made to federalize other State departments over the period of the past few years. There has appeared to develop a definite tendency in our national life, which, if followed up, will ultimately result in the loss of that democracy which we are so anxiously striving to make secure.

I am willing to concede that every power that is necessary for the Federal Government to exercise for the successful prosecution of this war should be accorded. But in doing so, two principles should be borne in mind: First,

that the power should not be surrendered unless it is a necessity toward the war effort; and, second, that the return of that power from the Federal Government to the local governments will come with the end of the war.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

A proposed plan for the economic and social development of Nevada, termed the "Six Year Plan," has been supplied to each of you. While our present effort must be centered on winning the war, we cannot overlook future lines of governmental endeavor in postwar planning. We must first win the war, and we can and will do so. Then comes the period of reconstruction. We of Nevada must be ready with a program for building, for protection of persons and property, conservation of health and sanitation, improving natural resources, enlarging hospitals and institutions, broadening education, extending highways, and developing any project or plan for the physical or social betterment of the State.

The State Planning Board is to be commended upon the "Six Year Plan" they have outlined and I ask that it be given your careful consideration.

In order that this work may go on under the Planning Board, I suggest that a fund be appropriated for incidental expenses and for traveling expenses, in order that the members may hold occasional meetings at some central point. For the past two years such meetings have necessitated the expenditure of the private funds of the board members. No salaries have been paid to those persons acting as members of the Planning Board and I do not ask that moneys be appropriated for this purpose.

On May 8 and 9, 1942, Nevada's First Economic Conference was held in Reno, Nevada, and was attended by representative citizens from all sections of the State.

I called this conference, having in mind that the economic and social development of our State is the responsibility of all of its people, and that we should all have our opportunity to participate in our State's present and future welfare.

Prior to the conference, State committees were organized and State chairmen appointed to represent various phases of our social and industrial life. Papers were presented by the State chairmen in order that there would be a basis for discussion and subsequent recommendations might be made by the various groups. At the first State-wide conference a foundation for future county conferences was laid. I am confident that county conferences will be held and conclusions from their deliberations will be taken up at general State Economic Conferences, to be called as the occasion or necessity demands. I consider this a truly democratic process through which we can work out many of our present and postwar problems.

I am bringing this conference to your attention with the request that you review the proceedings, and I particularly call your attention to the summary of recommendations from the various groups. I feel that there are many suggestions in the proceedings that should have the consideration of your honorable bodies. I do not feel, however, that it is my prerogative to incorporate them in my message, but do urge that each of you investigate the report of the first conference and consult among yourselves as to the worthiness of suggestions and recommendations that were made.

RECOMMENDATIONS CONTAINED IN ATTORNEY-GENERAL'S REPORT

The last report of the Attorney-General contained several recommendations concerning amendments to some of our laws now on our statute books. As they all have merit, I request your earnest consideration of the recommendations that have been made. I call your particular attention to the following:

- 1. "Appointed Officers-End of Term."
- 2. "Salaries-State Officers and Employees."
- 3. "Constitution of State—Method of Amending." 4. "Official Bonds of Public Officers—State Bonding Act."
- "Repeated Recommendations."

CONCLUSIONS

Under the law you have the right to make investigations of State departments and institutions. I invite you to use this authority, if you see fit, to determine whether the departments and institutions are functioning properly. I also invite constructive suggestions as to means of improving departments, as your investigations might disclose.

I ask you to feel free at all times during the session to discuss matters of State with me. It is impossible to comment upon all matters of State in a message, so I have directed to your attention only such matters as appear to be most pressing and deserving of consideration. I reserve the right to supplement this message with other communications during the session.

In all of our efforts let us bear in mind that times are not normal; that in some portions of our State conditions are much better than in other parts; that prices are unstable and commodities are becoming harder to obtain.

We are living in a Nation locked in a life and death struggle that the rights we cherish as a free people will not perish from the earth. We must think,

we must work, we must be thrifty and cooperate as one big family.

We have a vital job to do here at home. We must direct our efforts toward backing up the men we have sent "Over There." Then, too, we must keep in mind the adjustments that must be made in the transition from war to a

peace-time economy.

Let each of us bear his fair share of the burden so that when our boys come home they can step into a well-planned economic program that will gradually lead us back to normal times. Those boys must have jobs, and by foresight and careful planning through our local and State government we will be in a position to offer to them, in appreciation of their sacrifices, proper opportunities for the inevitable readjustments necessary for the normal lives that they temporarily gave up.

Proposal to amend section 1, article XVI, of the Constitution of the State of Nevada.

Resolved by the Assembly, the Senate concurring, That section 1 of article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be amended to read as follows: Section 1. Any amendment or amendments to this Constitution may be proposed in the Senate or Assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of all the members elected to each of the two Houses, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be entered on their respective Journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the Legislature then next to be chosen, and shall be published for three months next preceding the time of making such choice. And if, in the Legislature next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to by a majority of all the members elected to each House, then it shall be the duty of the Legislature to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people in such manner and at such time as the Legislature shall prescribe; and if the people shall

approve and ratify such amendment or amendments by a majority of the average number of votes cast by the electors for State candidates having opposition in such election, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the Constitution.

Assembly Joint Resolution No. 2:

Section 1. The rights of suffrage and office-holding shall not be withheld from any citizen of the United States by reason of his or her color or previous condition of servitude.

Assembly Joint Resolution No. 3, relative to memorializing the Congress of the United States to protect and enhance the social security benefits to all persons inducted into the military services, and to provide a cushion for postwar conditions.

Whereas, Many persons have been inducted into the armed services of the United States who have since the inception of the Social Security Act contributed substantial sums for unemployment benefits; and

Whereas, Congress is considering legislation designed to protect the interests

of these persons when they have completed their service; and

Whereas, The members of the Legislature of the State of Nevada deem it advisable to provide those persons who are discharged from the armed forces with unemployment benefits without disrupting the economic standards of the

country at the time of their discharge; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly and the Senate of the State of Nevada, jointly, That the Legislature of the State of Nevada hereby memorializes and petitions Congress to enact legislation which will provide that such persons who are inducted into the military or naval services of the United States shall be paid unemployment benefits of one hundred dollars (\$100) per month for a period of twelve (12) months following their discharge from such services, which said monthly payments will cushion a period of adjustment and permit such discharged personnel to secure appropriate employment; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this joint resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States, to the Vice President of the United States, and to each member of the Senate and the House of Representatives of the United States, and that the Senators and Representatives representing the State of Nevada

in Congress be urged actively to support such legislation.

Dear Sir: Herewith there is deposited in your office for filing, within the constitutional time limit and without my approval, Assembly Bill No. 47, introduced March 13, 1941, by the Committee on Judiciary and entitled "An Act regulating the business of making loans; providing for maximum rates of interest: providing penalties for violations of this act; and other matters properly relating thereto."

The Executive Office believes that legislation of the general character of the present bill would be advisable and that there does exist the evil of the

activities of the so-called "loan sharks" with their excessive charges.

The present measure, however, goes beyond the restrictions required to properly regulate the making of those comparatively small loans where this evil is manifest.

I believe a measure of this character should be restricted to loans of a defined maximum amount, while the present bill is so drawn as to undoubtedly interfere with purely commercial loans where our existing usury law affords all necessary protection.

This Act would amend a section of our public school law defining the powers and duties of trustees by requiring them to publish quarterly reports of their expenditures in all cases where a school has an enrollment of fifty students

or more

It is the view of the Executive Office, concurred in by the Educational Department, and very generally expressed by school boards throughout the State, that the expense involved in many cases would run into many hundreds of dollars each year, which makes this legislation unwise, particularly in view of the fact that any interested person has now available to him complete records of such expenditures.

The problem of our public schools is to have sufficient money to carry on and effectively accomplish the work for which our schools are designed. What money is now available had better be spent in furthering the educational work designed to be done by the schools rather than in duplicating information which

is now available to any interested taxpayer.

This bill is entitled as an Act to amend a law which is general in character and applicable to all the counties of the State, but the bill seeks to add to the Act a section which would make it not such a general law but one restricted to a very limited number of counties in the State. This may not be done

without a suitable amendment of the title of the original Act.

courts, defining the same, providing for the issuance of permits for the construction and operation of the same, and providing a penalty for the violation of this Act, and other matters properly relating thereto."

This bill goes beyond that title and covers operation of trailers on highways. Its definition of "tourist court" is so broad that it embraces every hotel and

lodging house in the State.

While legislation of the general character here sought to be enacted might be very advisable, that legislation should be contained in a more carefully prepared Act and one definitely constitutional in form.

STATE OF NEVADA EXECUTIVE CHAMBER CARSON CITY, January 25, 1943.

To the Honorable, the Senate and Assembly:

In compliance with chapter 60, 1921 Statutes, I respectfully submit the Executive Budget for the fiscal years 1944 and 1945.

Schedules are submitted showing actual expenditures for the period from July 1, 1941, to December 31, 1942, also estimated expenditures for the period from January 1, 1943, to June 30, 1943.

Provisions are also made for carrying forward sufficient balances at the

end of the biennium, June 30, 1945.

Your attention is respectfully called to the State Controller's printed reports for the years covered by this budget, as these reports detail each transaction of the State's business. I have omitted much of this information in the interests of economy. Any additional information will be gladly furnished upon request. Existing statutory provisions have governed my recommendations and estimates in many cases.

SUPPLEMENTAL MESSAGE OF THE GOVERNOR TO THE FORTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE OF NEVADA

STATE OF NEVADA EXECUTIVE CHAMBER CARSON CITY, January 25, 1943.

To the Honorable, the Senate and Assembly:

The Nevada we visualize after the war is not one which we know now. We must look forward to a marked economic transformation and we should recognize our State's resources and opportunities and make them ready for peacetime utilization.

To do this I urge that there be created a fund of \$1,000,000 as a cushion to help meet situations that may, and probably will, come in the later phases of the war and in the postwar period. This amount is safely available from the State's Treasury for the purposes mentioned.

LABOR

I can report to you that both labor and management in this State have been particularly cooperative, and it has been necessary to intervene in very few instances. In this we are indeed fortunate, and we are grateful that amicable agreements are invariably brought about when the groups in our State repre-

senting labor and employers get together.

As our ranchers, stockmen, and farmers enter a new year they are being asked by the Federal Government to increase production substantially. To do this job they must have the necessary labor. They need two kinds of labor. First, regular year-around labor, and second, seasonable labor. I trust that the action by the War Man Power Commission and the Selective Service System will effectively meet this problem. However, we must be alert and look forward to the use of such workers as the students, workers who have partial disability and handicaps, workers now engaged in nonproductive enterprises and who supply nothing toward the expansion of production and useful employment. We see many of the latter class of workers in our cities and towns.

An alternative is the utilization of labor from those now held in reception centers. The use of this class of labor should be only under the strictest supervision by proper authority to guard against the danger of subversive

activities and sabotage.

OLD-AGE ASSISTANCE

The increased cost of fuel, food, rents, and services has presented a serious problem for those wholly or partially dependent on old-age assistance.

I recommend that our present law be amended to increase the maximum amount of the allowance to a higher figure to meet this problem brought about by present unsettled conditions. Respectfully submitted,

House Joint Memorial No. 2: A Joint Memorial protesting favoritism for youth of Japanese extraction in the advantages of higher education.

To the President and Congress of the United States:

Your memorialists respectfully represents:

Upon the shoulders of American boys, eighteen years of age or over, has been placed the responsibility of forming a part of the armed forces engaged in the present titanic struggle for world liberty. They are proud to accept this responsibility, and their parents and loved ones are proud to share it with them.

Apart from the physical aspects of the sacrifice our younger men are thus called upon to make, is the matter of their education. It is a serious and a momentous thing, to them and to their country, to interrupt, perhaps to prevent, their academic and professional training. This, of course, was well understood when the policy was considered of including 'teen age men in the draft, and was waived only from necessity.

However, it now appears that it is the purpose of the War Relocation Authority of the United States to accord eligibility to some twenty-five hundred young Japanese-American students, located in war relocation centers, to leave such centers and enter any of a large number of colleges and universities—in other words, to accord the privileges of higher education to a group of young people, citizens by virtue of their birth in this country, whose loyalty and patriotism are rendered doubtful because of their racial extraction, thereby unfitting them to be soldiers, while denying a similar opportunity to our own

young men of unquestioned loyalty.

That these Japanese-American young men will pay their own way is no justification for such discrimination. Our young men also pay their way, and it is to the credit of American courage and determination that many of them pay their way under the most difficult circumstances.

It is admitted that practically all of the Japanese-Americans to whom higher education is to be afforded are physically fit and capable of performing services which would be useful to the war effort; where their patriotism might be demonstrated without placing them in a position where possible disloyalty might be perilous.

Wherefore your memorialists, the Sixteenth State Legislature of the State

of Arizona, urgently requests:

1. That steps be taken, through executive intervention or order, or by means of legislation if necessary, to prevent according to Japanese-American youths the privilege of leaving concentration centers and securing an education in American colleges and universities while the same privilege is denied to loyal

American young men called to military service.

2. That no discrimination be shown in the matter of educational advantages, between America's young citizens, of whatever race or nationality—in short, while young men of undoubted loyalty and Caucasian extraction are required to serve in the armed forces, that these young men of Japanese ancestry and less certain loyalty be given opportunity to serve the war effort in ways in which their racial extraction will prove no impediment.

3. That if any Japanese-American youths have already been given the privilege of attending colleges and universities, they be returned to their relocation

Whereas, The gold and silver mines of the State of Nevada brought about the admission of the Territory of Nevada into the Nation as the Battle-Born State during the dark days of the Civil War; and

Whereas, These mines poured the blood of economic life into a Nation whose treasury was depleted and whose resources were sorely strained by

years of war effort; and

Whereas, By reason of the patriotic efforts of the mining industry of the

State of Nevada, the credit of the Nation was strengthened and the final victory was hastened; and

Whereas, The gold mines of the State of Nevada with lavish hand, through years of peace and war, have continued to pour their wealth into the Nation's economic structure; and

Whereas, The prosperity of the State of Nevada has always been, and now is, geared to the productivity of her gold mines, and many of her towns and communities have had birth and prosperity by reason thereof; and

Whereas, The loyalty of the people of Nevada again supports a Nation once more engaged in war to the end that free government may continue to exist; and

Whereas, It has been necessary during the progress of this great war to impose drastic restrictions upon industry, as well as upon individuals, all for the purpose of strengthening the Nation's economy and her military might; and

Whereas, Among other restrictions heretofore imposed has been that of closing all gold mines and all operations connected therewith, thus striking at the very heart of the prosperity and welfare of the State of Nevada, and her most loyal and patriotic people; and

Whereas, The people of the State of Nevada are as willing now as they were during the Civil War to give their lives and the fruits of their industry to the Nation that secures to them the priceless privileges of American citizenship, and it is not the thought nor desire of the State of Nevada, nor her people, to question or criticize any order promulgated for the common good; nevertheless, the people of the State of Nevada do feel that the order closing the gold mines and all activity connected therewith, was not, and is not, conducive to the welfare of the State of Nevada, the Nation, or the general war effort; and

Whereas, The people of the State of Nevada feel that the loss suffered to her citizens and to the owners and operators of her gold mines and industries by reason of such closing order far exceeds the national gain, if any, from such order; and

Whereas, It appears that while certain restrictions have been placed upon the gold mining industry in allied nations, the mines of those nations have continued to operate and produce, thus sustaining the domestic welfare and economy of such mining districts, this even though many millions of dollars of "lend-lease" aid is being given by the United States to such allies; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate and Assembly of the State of Nevada, That the gold mining industry in the United States should have opportunities equal to those had by the same industry in allied countries receiving "lend-lease" aid, particularly when the restrictions placed upon our domestic industry is upon the premise that our converted gold mining industry will make possible the production of more essential commodities of war and "lend-lease" supplies; and be it further

Resolved, That in this particular instance the gold mining industry in the United States is the national step-child, denied the right to protect and preserve the many millions of dollars invested, while compelled to labor in the so-called essential industries to the end that the sinews of war and "lendlease" material may be shipped to other nations in which gold mining continues to flourish, affected only by the ordinary results of a war economy; and be it further

Resolved, That the Congress of the United States give its considered thought to the discriminatory nature of the gold mine closing order, both as to the local effect and its international aspect; that Congress consider the little good that has been accomplished by such order as against the great local harm that has been done in every gold mining district in the United States, and particularly in the State of Nevada; and be it further

Resolved, That if the order cannot be rescinded, that Congress enact suitable legislation compensating the industry for the great financial burden and loss unfairly and discriminatingly imposed on it, through being required to

pay greatly increased taxes on idle property and equipment, interest on millions of investment denied a right to earn, millions expended to prevent watering and deterioration of mine workings, and in the maintenance of

improvements generally.

Resolved, That duly certified copies of these resolutions be forwarded to the President of the United States, to our Senators and Congressman at Washington, D. C., and that copies of this resolution, certified by the proper officers of the Senate and Assembly of the State of Nevada, be transmitted to the several Western States.

MESSAGE FROM THE GOVERNOR

STATE OF NEVADA EXECUTIVE CHAMBER CARSON CITY, February 16, 1943

To the Honorable, the Senate and Assembly:

By this message I wish to officially inform you that Senate Bill No. 2 (amending section 1 and repealing section 2 of the 1941 Act, commonly called the "Boulder Dam Revenue Act"), has been permitted by me to become a law

without any action upon my part.

I feel that the right of Clark County to participate to any extent in the annual payments to be made to the State under the Boulder Canyon Adjustment Act is a question that should be determined definitely and finally by the Courts. So far as the Executive Office is concerned, I have said, and I now repeat, that I will not go contrary to the will of the Legislature in this par-

ticular matter.

The former Act having been now amended to eliminate any payment to Clark County, you should anticipate that said county will institute proceedings to bring about a determination of the question. In that event there seems to be a question as to a possible disqualification of the Attorney-General to represent the State in that litigation. I, therefore, respectfully suggest that you confer with the Attorney-General and ascertain his views upon the subject of his qualification or disqualification in such litigation. If you are advised by him to take such a step, it would be well for you to pass an Act appropriating a definite sum of money to be expended in retaining council to represent the State in the matter.

PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS

In conformity with a resolution passed by the 1941 Legislature, your committee appointed as a fact-finding committee to investigate the State Highway

Department begs leave to report its findings:

In the resolution one feature was stressed for the attention of the committee, that of existing inequalities in the salary scale of the Highway Department employees, particularly those in the lower brackets. Your committee has spent some time on the study of the pay rolls and the necessity for such a large personnel by the department. Of great assistance in our inquiry is a survey made by the American Society of Civil Engineers, at the instigation of the Board of Highway Directors of Nevada, on engineering positions and salaries in the Nevada Highway Department. This study was completed on October 17, 1940, shortly before the convening of the last session of the Legislature, and the recommendations contained in that survey were adopted by the Highway Board on January 14, 1941, with a gradual increase in the rates as recommended ordered by the Board. Practically all employees had been raised to the new rate by 1942.

Laboring people on the maintenance crews now receive \$6.44 and \$6.90 per day, and the foremen get \$7.47 per day. The number of employees of the department was not out of line with the duties assigned. Survey crews in the field were comparable in number to those in other States, and the maintenance crews in Nevada were not overmanned. The same is true of the engineering

crews in the office.

With the outbreak of the war, and the necessary readjustments that followed in its wake, there was a cutting down of the highway force commensurate with a decrease in funds. Federal funds for use of the department in building and rebuilding roads were frozen. Military authorities have authorized work at the present time on U. S. 40 through the northern part of the State, and U. S. 91 through the southern part of the State, both of these routes having been designated as vital to military operations. All of the work since the war, however, has been curtailed. The personnel of the

department has been cut down considerably and a great many of the men from key positions in the department have been loaned to other agencies of the Government at much larger salaries than they were receiving in the department. The records of the department show that all of the personnel who went into the armed forces are on leave for military purposes and, in accordance with the Act of the Legislature, they will resume their jobs when they return from the service. In the past year, faced by the rising cost of living, the Highway Department Directors authorized an increase of approximately 15% in the salaries of all employees of the department with the exception of the Highway Engineer.

The ability of the department's personnel to carry out the duties of the State's largest agency becomes evident in the constant demand from war industries for the services of these men. Those who are left on the department's engineering staff have been able to carry on the work to the satisfaction of the Public Roads Administration, and the traveling public will give testimony to the highway system in Nevada, described by impartial motorists as the best

in the Nation.

Secondary roads, and the lack of them, have been the subject of some criticism. Your committee has found that in the last biennium all secondary roads certified as acceptable to the Public Roads Administration, and amounting to forty-four (44) miles, have been built, while one hundred twenty-seven (127) miles of main highways, also acceptable to the Public Roads Administration.

tration, have been constructed.

Your committee feels that much of the criticism of the Highway Department has been directed at the Highway Engineer, who has been the victim of censure that should have been placed elsewhere. Although the situation does not exist today, there has been the practice in the past on the part of the Highway Board of Directors to use the Highway Engineer as a buffer for disgruntled job seekers. The Highway Engineer has taken this criticism in stride and has carried out the duties of the office in a manner that reflects credit to the State. Your committee respectfully suggests that the State Highway Engineer, instead of being retained on a day to day basis "at the pleasure of the Board," he appointed to a definite term of office.

We have attached hereto various curves indicating the employment classifications and wages paid for employees in the department. A copy of the report on reclassification is also appended for the information of those mem-

bers of the Legislature who care to peruse it.

The resolution of the last Legislature which authorized the present committee specifically stated that no money was to be expended in making such an inquiry. That directive has been carried out, and the job of investigating an agency as large as the Highway Department is not a small one. The majority of the original members of that committee are not now members of the Legislature, and the work involved in the investigation has fallen upon the remaining committee members. We wish to acknowledge with grateful thanks the assistance we have received in securing the data for which we asked.

Mr. Boak moved that the Assembly convey their thanks and appreciation to the members of the joint committee who made the investigation.

I have the honor herewith to present for the consideration of your honorable body Senate Bill No. 14, which passed the Senate February 17, 1943, by the following vote: Yeas, 17; nays, none, after having been amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as section 3, and reading as follows: "Sec. 3. The allotment made under the provisions of this Act to the needy blind persons, so ordered by the County Commissioners of the respective counties, shall not in any manner be used to reduce any allowances to any needy blind person, but shall be in addition to the allowances made by the County Commissioners of the various counties, in accordance with the provisions of that certain Act of the Legislature of the State of Nevada entitled 'An Act to provide a relief fund in the several counties of the State of Nevada for the needy blind; providing for and prescribing the powers and duties of Boards of County Commissioners in every county,' approved February 25, 1925." Also, by adding before the word "This," line 31, page 2, the word and figure "Sec. 4."

Also, Senate Bill No. 24, which passed the Senate, as amended: Yeas, 17; nays, none. Amend section 1 by inserting in line 8, page 1, after the second word "be" the words "and to have been."

Also, Senate Bill No. 29, which passed: Yeas, 17; nays, none.

Also, Senate Bill No. 31, which passed, as amended: Yeas, 17; nays, none. Amend the title by striking therefrom the following: "being chapter 213 Statutes of Nevada." Amend section 11 by inserting the following after the word "herewith" in line 7, page 6: "including that certain Act entitled 'An Act for the better protection of motor-vehicle dealers, garage keepers, and automobile repairmen, and giving them a lien on motor vehicles for supplies, accessories, repairs, and labor, and making it a misdemeanor to incur a bill on a motor vehicle without the consent of the owner,' approved March 24, 1917, and being sections 3772 to 3779, both inclusive, N. C. L. 1929."

Assembly Bill No. 126—An Act to amend section 4782, Nevada Compiled Laws 1929, of an Act entitled "An Act relating to officers, their qualifications, times of election, terms of office, official duties, resignations, removals, vacancies in office, and the mode of supplying the same, misconduct in office, and to enforce official duty," approved March 9, 1866, together with the Acts amendatory thereof or supplemental thereto.

Mr. Smith moved that rules be suspended, reading so far had considered first reading, rules further suspended, bill read second time by title, and referred to Committee on Judiciary.

Carried.

Mr. Jepson requested permission to introduce a bill.

Permission granted.

By Mr. Jepson:

Assembly Bill No. 127—An Act authorizing the Board of Directors of the State Orphans' Home of the State of Nevada to convey to the Department of Highways of said State all its right, title, and use of certain State lands situated in Ormsby County, now under the jurisdiction of said Board of Directors.

Mr. Jepson moved that rules be suspended, reading so far had considered first reading, rules further suspended, bill read second time by

title, and referred to Committee on State Institutions.

Carried.

Pursuant to previous notice, Mr. Crawford introduced a resolution.

By Mr. Crawford:

Assembly Joint Resolution No. 18, relative to amending section 3 of article I, sections 5 and 9 of article II, sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 18, 23, 25, 28, 33, and 35 of article IV, sections 3, 4, 9, 17, and 20 of article V, section 2 of article VI, sections 1 and 3 of article VII, section 13 of article XV, sections 1 and 2 of article XVI, and section 9 of article XVII, and repealing section 34 of article IV, section 11 of article V, section 6 of article XV, and sections 6, 10, 11, and 12 of article XVII, and by adding to article IV a new section, to be known as section 36, of the Constitution of the State of Nevada.

Resolved by the Assembly and the Senate of the State of Nevada, That the Constitution of the State of Nevada be amended by amending the hereinafterstated sections and articles thereof, by repealing certain sections hereinafter named and specified, and by adding to the Constitution the section of an article thereof as hereinafter set forth, that is to say:
That section 3 of article I of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 3. The right of trial by jury shall be secured to all, and remain inviolate forever; but a jury trial may be waived by the parties in all civil cases, in the manner to be prescribed by law; and in civil cases, if threefourths of the jurors agree upon a verdict, it shall stand and have the same force and effect as a verdict by the whole jury; provided, the Legislature, by a law passed by a two-thirds vote of all the members elected thereto, may require a unanimous verdict, notwithstanding this provision.

That section 5 of article II of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. All elections by the people shall be by ballot, and all elections by the Legislature shall be 'viva voce.'"

That section 9 of article II of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 9. Every public officer in the State of Nevada is subject, as herein provided, to recall from office by the qualified electors of the State, or of the county, district, or municipality from which he was elected. For this purpose not less than twenty-five percent (25%) of the qualified electors who vote in the State or in the county, district, or municipality electing said officer, at the preceding election, for Justice of the Supreme Court, shall file their petition in the manner herein provided, demanding his recall by the people; they shall set forth in said petition, in not exceeding two hundred (200) words, the reasons why said recall is demanded. If he shall offer his resignation it shall be accepted and take effect on the day it is offered, and the vacancy thereby caused shall be filled in the manner provided by law. If he shall not resign within five (5) days after the petition is filed, a special election shall be

ordered to be held within twenty (20) days after the issuance of the call therefor, in the State or county, district, or municipality electing said officer, to determine whether the people will recall said officer. On the ballot at said election shall be printed verbatim as set forth in the recall petition, the reasons for demanding the recall of said officer, and in not more than two hundred (200) words the officer's justification of his course in office. continue to perform the duties of his office until the result of said election shall be finally declared. Other candidates for the office may be nominated to be voted for at said special election. The candidate who shall receive the highest number of votes at said special election shall be deemed elected for the remainder of the term, whether it be the person against whom the recall petition was filed, or another. The recall petition shall be filed with the officer with whom the petition for nomination to such office shall be filed, and the same officer shall order the special election when it is required. No such petition shall be circulated or filed against any officer until he has actually held his office six (6) months, save and except that it may be filed against a member of the Legislature at any time after ten (10) days from the beginning of the first session after his election. After one such petition and special election, no further recall petition shall be filed against the same officer during the term for which he was elected, unless such further petitioners shall pay into the public treasury from which the expenses of said special election have been paid, the whole amount paid out of said public treasury as expenses for the preceding special election. Such additional legislation as may aid the operation of this section shall be provided by law."

That section 1 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The legislative authority of this State shall be vested in a Legislature, which shall be designated The Legislature of the State of Nevada,' and the sessions of such Legislature shall be held at the seat of government of the State."

That section 2 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

The sessions of the Legislature shall be biennial, and shall commence on the third Monday of January next ensuing the election of members of the Legislature, unless the Governor of the State shall, in the interim, convene the Legislature by proclamation."

That section 3 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 3. No person shall be eligible to be elected a member of the Legislature who is not a qualified elector of this State and the county in which he resides, and who, at the time of such election, has not attained the age of thirty years, and who shall not have been a citizen resident of this State and of the county for two years next preceding the election."

That section 4 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 4. At the first biennial election next after the adoption of this section, the members of the Legislature shall be chosen by the qualified electors of the respective counties of the State, and their term of office shall be four years for one member from each county and two years for each additional member of such county, and at each subsequent biennial election thereafter one member in each county shall be elected for four years and the additional member or members two years; provided, that at the first biennial election next after the adoption of this section, Senators elected under the prior constitutional provisions whose terms of office have not expired shall be deemed to have been elected members of the Legislature under this section for a term of two years, and their respective counties shall elect only the additional member or members of their representation."

That section 5 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

Members of the Legislature shall be apportioned among the different counties as follows, that is to say: Churchill County, two members;

Clark County, six members; Douglas County, one member; Elko County, four members; Esmeralda County, one member; Eureka County, one member; Humboldt County, two members; Lander County, one member; Lincoln County, two members; Lyon County, two members; Mineral County, two members; Nye County, two members; Ormsby County, one member; Pershing County, one member; Storey County, one member; Washoe County, twelve members; White Pine County, four members; and such apportionment shall be the legislative apportionment until otherwise provided by law; provided. the number of members of the Legislature shall never exceed fifty; provided, no county shall have less than one member in its representation."

That section 6 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

The Legislature shall judge of the qualifications, elections, and returns of its own members, choose its own officers, determine the rules of its proceedings, and may punish its members for disorderly conduct, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds of all the members elected, expel a member."

That section 7 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The Legislature, during the session, may punish, by imprisonment, any person, not a member, who shall have been guilty of disrespect to the Legislature by disorderly or contemptuous behavior in its presence; but such imprisonment shall not extend beyond the final adjournment of the session."

That section 8 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 8. No member of the Legislature shall, during the term for which he shall have been elected, nor for one year thereafter, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased, during such term, except such office as may be filled by election by the people."

That section 12 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

In case of the death or resignation of any member of the Legislature, the County Commissioners of the county from which such member was elected shall appoint a person of the same political party as the party which elected such member to fill such vacancy; provided, that this section shall apply only in cases where no general election takes place between the time of such death or resignation and the next succeeding session of the Legislature."

That section 13 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 13. A majority of all the members elected to the Legislature shall constitute a quorum to transact business, but a smaller number may adjourn, from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as the Legislature may prescribe."

That section 14 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

The Legislature shall keep a journal of its proceedings, which shall be published, and the yeas and nays of the members of the Legislature, on any question, shall, at the desire of any three members present, be entered on the Journal."

That section 15 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

The doors of the legislative hall shall be kept open during the session of the Legislature, and it shall not adjourn for more than three days during any session, except it may adjourn sine die, nor may it adjourn to any other place than that in which the Legislature may be holding its session."

That section 16 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

All bills, except laws initiated by the people, shall originate in "SEC. 16.

the Legislature."

That section 18 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 18. Every bill shall be read by sections on three several days in the Legislature, unless in case of emergency, two-thirds of the Legislature shall deem it expedient to dispense with this rule; but the reading of a bill by sections, on its final passage, shall in no case be dispensed with, and the vote on the final passage of every bill or joint resolution shall be taken by yeas and nays, to be entered on the Journal of the Legislature; and a majority of all the members elected thereto shall be necessary to pass every bill or joint resolution, and all bills or joint resolutions so passed shall be signed by the presiding officer of the Legislature."

That section 23 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 23. The enacting clause of every law shall be as follows: 'The People of the State of Nevada, represented in the Legislature, do enact as follows:' and no law shall be enacted except by bill."

That section 25 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 25. The Legislature shall establish a system of county and township government which shall be uniform throughout the State."

That section 28 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 28. No money shall be drawn from the State Treasury as salary or compensation to any officer or employee of the Legislature, except in cases where such salary or compensation has been fixed by a law in force prior to the election or appointment of such officer or employee, and the salary or compensation so fixed shall neither be increased nor diminished so as to apply to any officer or employee of the Legislature at such session; provided, that this restriction shall not apply to the first session of the Legislature."

That section 33 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 33. The members of the Legislature shall receive for their services a compensation to be fixed by law, and paid out of the public treasury; but no increase of such compensation shall take effect during the term for which the members shall have been elected; provided, that an appropriation may be made for the payment of such actual expenses as members of the Legislature may incur for postage, express charges, newspapers, and stationery, not exceeding the sum of sixty dollars for any general or special session to each member."

That section 34 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be,

and the same is, hereby repealed.

That section 35 of article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 35. Every bill which may have passed the Legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it with his objections to the Legislature, which shall cause such objections to be entered upon its Journal and proceed to reconsider it; if, after such reconsideration, it again pass the Legislature, by yeas and nays, by a vote of two-thirds of the members elected thereto, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the Governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within five days after it shall have been presented to him (Sundays excepted), exclusive of the day on which he received it, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the Legislature, by its final adjournment, prevent such return, in which case it shall be a law, unless the Governor, within ten days next after the adjournment (Sundays excepted), shall file such bill, with his objections thereto, in the office of the Secretary of State, who shall lay the same before the Legislature at its next session, in like manner as if it had been returned by the Governor; and if the same shall receive the vote of two-thirds of the members elected to the Legislature, upon a vote taken by yeas and nays, to be entered upon the Journal thereof, it shall become a law."

That article IV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be amended by

adding thereto an additional section to be known as section 37.

"Sec. 37. The compensation and perquisites of the members of the Legislature and the attachés thereof shall be the compensation allowed by law at the time of the taking effect of this section for members of the former Assembly, and until otherwise provided by law."

That section 3 of article V of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 3. No person shall be eligible to the office of Governor who is not a qualified elector, and who, at the time of such election, has not attained the age of thirty-five years, and who, except at the first election under this Constitution, shall not have been a citizen resident of this State for two years next preceding the election."

That section 4 of article V of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 4. The returns of every election for United States Senator and Member of Congress, district, and State officers, and for and against any questions submitted to the electors of the State of Nevada, voted for at the general election, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of government, directed to the Secretary of State, and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and the Associate Justices, or a majority thereof, shall meet at the office of the Secretary of State, on a day to be fixed by law, and open and canvass the election returns for United States Senator and Member of Congress, district and State officers, and for and against any questions submitted to the electors of the State of Nevada, and forthwith declare the result and publish the names of the persons elected and the results of the vote cast upon any question submitted to the electors of the State of Nevada. The persons having the highest number of votes for the respective offices shall be declared elected, but in case any two or more have an equal and the highest number of votes for the same office, the Legislature shall elect one of said persons to fill said office."

That section 9 of article V of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 9. The Governor may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the Legislature by proclamation, and state thereto, when organized, the purpose for which they have been convened, and the Legislature shall transact no legislative business except that for which they were especially convened, or such other legislative business as the Governor may call to the attention of the Legislature while in session."

That section 11 of article V of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be,

and the same is, hereby repealed.

That section 17 of article V of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 17. A Lieutenant Governor shall be elected at the same time and places, and in the same manner as the Governor, and his term of office and his eligibility shall also be the same. If, during a vacancy of the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor shall be impeached, displaced, resign, die, or become incapable of performing the duties of the office, or be absent from the State, the Secretary of State shall act as Governor until the vacancy be filled or the disability cease."

That section 20 of article V of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 20. The Secretary of State shall keep a true record of the official acts of the legislative and executive departments of the Government, and shall, when required, lay the same, and all matters relative thereto, before the Legislature."

That section 2 of article VI of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and two Associate Justices, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum; provided, that the Legislature, by a majority of all the members elected thereto, may provide for the election of two additional Associate Justices, and if so increased, three shall constitute a quorum. The concurrence of a majority of the whole court shall be necessary to render a decision."

That section 1 of article VII of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature shall have the sole power of impeaching. The concurrence of a majority of all the members elected shall be necessary to an impeachment. All impeachments shall be tried by the Legislature, and, when sitting for that purpose, the legislators shall be upon oath or affirmation to do justice according to law and evidence. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court shall preside over the Legislature while sitting to try the Governor or Lieutenant Governor upon impeachment. No person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the legislators elected."

That section 3 of article VII of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 3. For any reasonable cause, to be entered on the Journal of the Legislature, which may or may not be sufficient grounds for impeachment, the Chief Justice and Associate Justices of the Supreme Court and Judges of the District Courts shall be removed from office on the vote of two-thirds of the members elected to the Legislature, and the justices or judge complained of shall be served with a copy of the complaint against him, and shall have an opportunity of being heard in person, or by counsel, in his defense; provided, that no member of the Legislature shall be eligible to fill the vacancy occasioned by such removal."

That section 6 of article XV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be,

and the same is, hereby repealed.

That section 13 of article XV of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 13. The enumeration of the inhabitants of this State shall be taken under the direction of the Legislature, if deemed necessary, in A. D. eighteen hundred and sixty-five, A. D. eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, A. D. eighteen hundred and seventy-five, and every ten years thereafter; and these enumerations, together with the census that may be taken under the direction of the Congress of the United States in A. D. eighteen hundred and seventy, and every subsequent ten years, shall serve as the basis of representation in the Legislature."

That section 1 of article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. Any amendment or amendments to this Constitution may be proposed in the Legislature; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of all the members elected thereto, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be entered on the Journal with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the Legislature then next to be chosen, and shall be published for three months next preceding the time of making such choice. And if, in the Legislature next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to by a majority of all the members elected thereto, then it shall be the duty of the Legislature to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people in such manner and at such time as the Legislature shall prescribe; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the Legislature voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the Constitution."

That section 2 of article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 2. If at any time the Legislature, by a vote of two-thirds of its duly elected members, shall determine that it is necessary to cause a revision of this entire Constitution, they shall recommend to the electors, at the next election for members of the Legislature, to vote for or against a convention, and if it shall appear that a majority of the electors voting at such election shall have voted in favor of calling a convention, the Legislature shall, at its next session, provide by law for calling a convention to be holden within six months after the passage of such law; and such convention shall consist of a number of members not less than that of the Legislature. In determining what is a majority of the electors voting at such election, reference shall be

had to the highest number of votes cast at such election for the candidates for any office or on any question."

That section 9 of article 17 of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be

amended to read as follows:

"SEC. 9. The members of the Legislature to be elected at the first election under this Constitution shall draw lots, so that the term of one-half of the number, as nearly as may be, shall expire on the day succeeding the general election in A. D. nineteen hundred and forty-nine, and the term of the other half sha'l expire on the day succeeding the general election in A. D. nineteen hundred and fifty-one; provided, that in drawing lots for all legislative terms, the legislative representation shall be allotted so that in the counties having two or more legislators, the terms thereof shall be divided, as nearly as may be, between the long and short terms."

That section 6 of article XVII of the Constitution of the State of Nevada

be, and the same is, hereby repealed.

That section 10 of article XVII of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be, and the same is, hereby repealed.

That section 11 of article XVII of the Constitution of the State of Nevada

be, and the same is, hereby repealed.

That section 12 of article XVII of the Constitution of the State of Nevada be, and the same is, hereby repealed.

Whereas, Upon the shoulders of American boys, eighteen years of age or over, has been placed the responsibility of forming a part of the armed forces engaged in the present titanic struggle for world liberty. They are proud to accept this responsibility, and their parents and loved ones are proud to share it with them; and

Whereas, Apart from the physical aspects of the sacrifice our younger men are thus called upon to make, is the matter of their education. It is a serious and a momentous thing, to them and to their country, to interrupt, perhaps to prevent, their academic and professional training. This, of course, was well understood when the policy was considered of including 'teen age men in the

draft, and was waived only from necessity; and

Whereas, It now appears that it is the purpose of the War Relocation Authority of the United States to accord eligibility to some twenty-five hundred young Japanese-American students, located in war relocation centers, to leave such centers and enter any of a large number of colleges and universities—in other words, to accord the privileges of higher education to a group of young people, citizens by virtue of their birth in this country, whose loyalty and patriotism are rendered doubtful because of their racial extraction, thereby unfitting them to be soldiers, while denying a similar opportunity to our own young men of unquestioned loyalty; and

Whereas, That Japanese-American young men will pay their own way is no justification for such discrimination. Our young men also pay their way, and it is to the credit of American courage and determination that many of

them pay their way under the most difficult circumstances; and

Whereas, It is admitted that practically all of the Japanese-Americans to whom higher education is to be afforded are physically fit and capable of performing services which would be useful to the war effort, where their patriotism might be demonstrated without placing them in a position where possible disloyalty might be perilous; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of Nevada, the Senate concurring, That steps be taken, through executive intervention or order, or by means of legislation if necessary, to prevent according to Japanese-American youths the privilege of leaving concentration centers and securing an education in American colleges and universities while the same privilege is denied to loyal

American young men called to military service; and be it further

Resolved, That no discrimination be shown in the matter of educational advantages, between America's young citizens, of whatever race or nationality—in short, while young men of undoubted loyalty and Caucasian extraction are required to serve in the armed forces, that these young men of Japanese ancestry, and less certain loyalty, be given opportunity to serve the war effort in ways in which their racial extraction will prove no impediment; and be it further

Resolved, That if any Japanese-American youths have already been given the privilege of attending colleges and universities, they be returned to their

relocation camps; and be it further

Whereas, The population of the eleven Western States is thinly spread over an area of 1,189,140 square miles, with a railroad trackage of only about 40,000 miles; and

Whereas, Within the State of Nevada there are 265 communities wholly dependent upon highway transportation for the movement of persons and

property; and

Whereas, The farming and stockraising industries are almost wholly dependent upon highway transportation for the shipment of inbound equipment and supplies, and the hauling of their products to market; and

Whereas, The mining industry is entirely dependent upon truck transportation for equipment, materials, and supplies and the movement of ore to the

mill or to railhead; and

Whereas, The State of Nevada depends heavily upon neighboring States, particularly California, Idaho, and Utah, for a large portion of its fruits, vegetables, meat products and vital food supplies of all kinds, which must of necessity be transported by truck during all or part of the journey to the retail outlet or ultimate consumer; and

Whereas, Nevada is an important bridge State through which must necessarily pass huge quantities of essential war materials, foodstuffs, and other important commodities moving between the Pacific Coast and inland points, a

large portion of which must move via highway; and

Whereas, Large numbers of Nevada's citizens are dependent upon highway buses for transportation from point to point, particularly at the present time,

when the use of private automobiles is drastically restricted; and

Whereas, The railroads are overburdened in furnishing the transportation needs of the armed forces of the United States during the war emergency, and are not equipped with rolling stock, cars, or locomotives to take over any considerable portion of the transportation of foodstuffs, war materials, and commodities essential to the maintenance of the necessary civilian economy, heretofore transported by motor vehicles; and

Whereas, New or additional motor vehicles are unobtainable; and

Whereas, Large numbers of motor trucks, trailers, buses, and motorized farm implements, indispensable for the necessary production of foods, supplies, and war materials are in disrepair and out of service because needed repair parts or tires cannot be obtained; and

Whereas, Motor truck and bus transportation is rapidly becoming difficult or impossible to obtain, due to the increasing demands and the lessening number of motor vehicles available for the necessary needs of the people; and

Whereas, Any further lessening of the number of motor vehicles available for transportation will seriously interfere with the agricultural, livestock, and mining industries of this State and jeopardize the supply of food, the production of strategic minerals, and the essential civilian economy of the State of Nevada: and

Whereas, It is apprehended that because of the conditions recited above, the farmers, fruit and vegetable growers, and livestock men will be hindered in the production and marketing of food, and there will not be a sufficient number of motor vehicles to transport this year's crops of vegetables, fruits, grains, and livestock to market, and the transportation of strategic minerals and other raw and processed materials from and to war production plants will be seriously interfered with; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly and the Senate of the State of Nevada, jointly, That the Congress of the United States be, and the same is hereby, memorialized to appoint a committee to immediately investigate conditions that prevail in the highway transportation industry in the eleven Western States in respect to the procurement of necessary repair parts and tire replacements, and

to take such other and necessary action in the premises as will relieve and prevent any further disruption of the motor trucking and passenger bus industry, and enable food producers to produce and cultivate their crops and convey the same to market, and insure the production and transportation of strategic ores and minerals; and be it further

Resolved, That copies of this resolution be forwarded to the President and Vice President of the United States, to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and to each Nevada Senator and Member of the House of Repre-

sentatives in the Congress of the United States.

On page 6, between lines 23 and 24, insert a new section to be known as section $5\frac{1}{2}$, to read as follows: "Sec. $5\frac{1}{2}$. Section 12 of the above-entitled Act is hereby amended to read as follows: Section 12. Every teacher who in and after the fiscal year in which age 60 is attained has complied with all other requirements of this Act and has at least 30 years of total service credit shall be entitled to retire and receive a retirement salary or the annuities provided for in this Act. An original member upon retirement and upon fulfillment of all the requirements of this Act shall be entitled to receive, during life, a retirement salary under plan No. 1 of section 10 hereof, or a retirement salary and a member's annuity matched by a State annuity as provided under plan No. 2 of section 10 hereof. A new member upon retirement and upon fulfillment of all the requirements of this Act shall be entitled to receive, during life, a member's annuity as provided in section 15 and a State annuity as provided in section 17 hereof. In the case of any teacher coming within the provisions of section 14 of this Act, the minimum age requirement of sixty (60) years for retirement under the provisions of this Act shall not apply. The foregoing minimum retirement age of sixty (60) shall not be a requirement for retirement in case of original members who have completed, on or before the effective date of this Act, at least twenty school years of the 30 years of total service credit required under section 12 hereof; and said teachers, upon making written request to the public school teachers retirement salary fund board, and after fulfillment of all other requirements as stated in this Act, may be retired and receive the retirement benefits provided by this Act. Nothing in this section shall prevent a teacher from receiving retirement salary after the age of sixty (60) who has withdrawn from active service after thirty (30) years of teaching service, but before reaching the age of sixty (60), and who has met all other necessary requirements of this Act for obtain-

ing retirement benefits."

Further amend, page 6, section 6, line 26, by striking out all following the period in line 26, down to and including the period in line 9, page 7, and inserting in lieu the following: "Sec. 14. The Public School Teachers Retirement Salary Fund Board is hereby given power to allow the retirement from teaching of any teacher who has reached the age of or is over the age of fifty-five (55) years, and who has 30 years or more of total service credit, when, by reason of physical or mental infirmity or disability, such teacher is physically or mentally incapacitated for further teaching service. The Public School Teachers Retirement Salary Fund Board is hereby given sole power to determine the capacity or incapacity for further teaching service of the teacher in each individual case."

An additional penalty of five (5%) percent shall be added and collected by the Tax Receiver on the total amount of taxes in the event said total amount of taxes, or any installment thereof, together with accumulated penalties, are not paid on or before the first Monday in August; and the Tax Receiver shall immediately prepare a delinquent list, verified by the oath of himself or deputy, and shall file the same in the office of the County Auditor on or before the second Monday in August."

Your Committee on State Institutions herewith submits to this honorable

body a report covering the University of Nevada: Upon our arrival at the University we called upon Dr. Hartman, President of the University, at his office and he directed us to seats and gave us a general description of the various progressing plans for the future welfare of the University. Dr. Hartman called in Mr. Gorman, who is Comptroller of the Board of Regents, who escorted your committee through the various buildings

on the campus.

First we entered the new State Engineering Building which is a magnificent building consisting of reinforced concrete, brick, and stone. The building is now completed and in service at a cost of \$175,000, which is a great asset to the University of Nevada. At the present time it is not fully equipped nor completely furnished, however, all preparations are made for this equipment and furnishing of same. In the basement are two laboratories of the Department of Hydraulics and two steel vaults for the storing of valuable equipment and so forth.

Mr. Gorman explained to the committee regarding the construction, building, and completing of the retaining wall facing south at the foot of the campus grounds which greatly improved the appearance of the University, and this work was completed mostly by W. P. A. labor. In addition to this improvement the Orr ditch was also walled up on both sides for a short dis-

tance which also added to the appearance of the campus.

Your committee was then escorted to the dining room of the campus where many of the students and two hundred and fifty men in the armed service were fed in cafeteria style in approximately forty minutes. This dining room and the kitchen were in the very best of condition and all sanitary precau-

tions were of the highest type.

Your committee was then escorted to the new gymnasium which is one of the finest buildings in the west, having a seating capacity of approximately four thousand persons. It also is constructed so as to divide the main floor into two departments by what is known as a "floating wall" that can be removed in a very few minutes. By this dividing wall two basketball games can be played at the same time without interruption from either side. It also has bathrooms both for girls and boys which will enable two complete basketball teams to take their baths immediately after the game is played without any delay. This new gymnasium is a wonderful improvement to the State University, but it is not as yet fully completed on account of being delayed in waiting for material, and also hampered by shortage of labor.

At the present time there are two hundred and fifty men in the armed service staying at the campus and we were informed that in a short time the University will make preparations to receive two hundred and fifty more soldiers. At the time of our visit there were five different groups of soldiers training on the campus at one time. The basement of the old gymnasium is now being used for the training of service men in the art of preparing them to become great marksmen, and this training has produced excellent results.

The chief of the fire department has requested that the shop in the basement of Lincoln Hall should be moved to some other building immediately as it constitutes a serious fire hazard, particularly at this time when it is filled to capacity with the army air cadets. The seriousness of this situation should have been placed before this legislative body sooner; however, as Mr. Gorman has appeared before the Committee on State Institutions, the Committee on Education, and the Committee on Ways and Means explaining this situation, we are now of the opinion that this condition will be taken care of immediately.

Mr. Gorman, Chairman of the Board of Regents, took us to the boilerroom and heating plant which has just recently been completed and told us that the two boilers were now in operation, but that only one half of the campus buildings were receiving heat on account of not enough material to complete all computations to the remaining shifldings.

connections to the remaining buildings.

We also went through the various laboratories which are fully equipped and in perfect operation, also being used constantly by the students in all kinds of tests being made regarding weights and measures, mines, and mining ores being tested for various metals and also for many other purposes.

Your committee found that everything coming within the jurisdiction of the University of Nevada is now progressing, advancing, and that many improvements were being made for the benefit of all concerned as rapidly as possible.

Your committee wishes to compliment the Board of Regents on the excellent work that has been accomplished during the past two years and is now still progressing.

We also wish to thank the personnel of the University for the extreme

courtesy extended to your committee.

DEAR ASSEMBLYMAN COVINGTON: This will acknowledge receipt of your letter of March 16, 1943, in which you state that the Ways and Means Committee of the Assembly have under consideration Assembly Bill No. 179 intro-

duced by Assemblyman Boak on March 12, 1943. We have carefully studied this bill and fully realize the seriousness and importance of the questions therein involved. As you know, it is the constitutional and statutory duty of the Attorney-General to represent and defend the State and its officers. The Attorney-General and his deputies are under oath to do this. This office, on June 30, 1942, wrote an opinion upholding the constitutionality of chapter 141, 1941 Statutes of Nevada, as a valid expression of the legislative will. The present 1943 Legislature has amended this Act so as to place all funds received under the Boulder Canyon Project Adjustment Act in the General Fund of the State Treasury. (Senate Bill No. 2, chapter 7, 1943 Statutes of Nevada.)

It is the opinion of this office that this amendatory Act is an equally valid

and constitutional expression of the legislative will.

If and when a suit should be brought against the State or its officers by Clark County I believe that this office is in a position to defend such suit and I do not believe that either myself or either of my deputies is disqualified from fairly and honestly defending such suit and fully protecting the State's interests.

Your letter suggests an appropriation of \$10,000, to be used by this office in defending this suit. I do not at this time foresee the necessity of incurring additional expense. However, it is entirely possible that contingencies may arise and that the work in this office will become so heavy that additional legal assistance may be necessary. Accordingly, your suggestion of \$10,000 to provide an emergency fund which may be used for payment of additional counsel, if needed, and payment of additional costs and expenses of suit, if any, is entirely acceptable.

We shall select as special deputies to assist us in this case attorneys recommended by the Board of Directors of the State Bar of Nevada or by the

Governor.

Mr. Speaker:

Your Committee on State Prison and Hospital for Mental Diseases composed of Messrs. McElroy, Chairman, Murphy, Crawford, Allen, Mack, Munk, and

White, reports as follows:

The Committee, with all members present, visited the Nevada State Prison on two different occasions, once at the beginning of the Forty-first Session, to discuss with Warden Richard Sheehy matters of policy, and once, a few days ago, to conduct an inspection of all buildings and installations at the Prison and to ascertain in what degree of efficiency the Prison was being managed.

Our inspection was not perfunctory, and we investigated this institution carefully, bearing in mind the idea that we might be able to make certain recommendations that would be helpful to the State officials in charge. Our

conclusions and recommendations follow:

1. Condition of Buildings-

Your Committee found that all buildings were in good state of repair, with everything being done to maintain them in that condition.

2. Sanitation-

After having inspected the kitchen commissary, dining hall, bathrooms, etc., your Committee feels that the executive personnel of the Nevada State Prison has done everything in its power to maintain sanitary conditions for the benefit and protection of the inmates.

3. Personnel-

We feel that the personnel of the Prison, both executive and administrative, is efficient and at all times has the well-being of the institution at heart.

4. Economy—

We feel that this institution has been put on a sound economical basis, with the per diem cost of maintaining the inmates at a lower figure than most like institutions in the country, yet acknowledging the fact that the inmates are well clothed and well fed.

5. Recreational Facilities-

A good library is maintained. While many of the books and periodicals are old, we feel that this is a condition that cannot be remedied at the present time, since many organizations are carrying on drives to acquire books for the members of the armed forces. We found that boxing matches were staged occasionally and baseball was practiced by the prisoners in good weather.

6. Vocational Activity-

Your Committee found that many of the prisoners were engaged in various lines of personal enterprise, with leatherworking, silversmithing, etc., predominating. Products of this labor are sold to provide the prisoners with a few luxuries such as cigarettes, candy, etc. The license plate department

employs a number of men periodically, and a sack-patching department is in the process of installation. In addition, prison labor is utilized to quarry the stone for the new cell block from the prison quarry. At the present time approximately two thirds of the stone necessary for the new cell block has been worked, and it is expected that the rest of the necessary stone will be quarried this summer.

7. Recommendations-

1. Your Committee feels that the Nevada State Prison is being well run and well managed, with the executive personnel of the Prison having in mind at all times the welfare of the taxpayers of the State of Nevada and the inmates of the penitentiary.

2. We feel that it is necessary for the well-being of the inmates that whenever possible they be employed at some necessary task, or engaged in some

sort of recreational activity.

3. We urge that, as soon as the present war emergency is past, steps immediately be taken to acquire the necessary steel, mechanical devices, etc., to build and equip the new cell block. This would have the effect of alleviating the present crowded condition, which probably presents a problem of immorality caused by the placing of two men in a cell designed to accommodate one man.

Prison Farm-

A thorough inspection of the Prison Farm was also made by this Committee. We found all buildings of the farm maintained in good condition—clean and sanitary; all machinery under cover and in good condition. Some of the

machinery was old and may have to be replaced in the near future.

The Prison Farm furnishes meat, milk, eggs, and vegetables for the Prison, and the Committee was informed that the herd at the farm is being built up and more extensive farming program planned for the coming season, which will no doubt provide vegetables and meat for the Prison without procuring these commodities from outside markets.

Mr. Speaker:

Your Committee on the State Prison and Insane Asylum, composed of Messrs. McElroy, Chairman, Murphy, Crawford, Allen, Mack, Munk, and White, reports on the Insane Asylum as follows:

The Committee, with all members present, visited the Insane Asylum on February 19, 1943, to conduct an inspection of all buildings, personnel, and installation at the Asylum, and to determine to what degree of efficiency the

institution was being managed.

This inspection was conducted in the most efficient manner possible and was undertaken with the idea that, through personal observation, the Committee might be able to make certain recommendations that would be helpful to the personnel in charge. The conclusions and recommendations of the Committee follow:

Personnel—The Committee desires to compliment Dr. Wyman and his staff on the very efficient yet humane manner in which they have conducted the

hospital.

Sanitary Conditions—Sanitation, we found, is a primary prerequisite of an institution of this kind; and, after a visit to the creamery, bakery, kitchen, dining rooms, bathrooms, etc., your Committee decided that cleanliness was uppermost in the minds of the personnel in charge.

Condition of Buildings—Your Committee, after a most painstaking examination of the buildings at the Asylum, finds said buildings greatly in need of

repair, both external and internal. Especially we feel that repairs should be

made to the roofs, plaster, and paint.

Economy—Through the utilization of its land, the Asylum has been able to help make itself self-sufficient. Butter for the use of the institution is churned, milk and eggs produced, and other farm products are raised.

Recommendations—

1. Your Committee feels that some effort should be made, wherever practicable, to segregate the senile or dotards from the actual insane. Also, that

the insane or moronic children be segregated from the adult insane.

2. That, if possible, and the administrative budget allows, an effort be made to patch or rehabilitate the roofs. Your Committee feels that any inside improvements such as paint, etc., is rendered valueless if leakage is allowed to occur through inferior roofs. However, your Committee feels that, if the management is assured that the roofs are adequate, the management should carry on an interior painting program such as has been started. We feel that the psychological benefit of cheery surroundings is great.

3. That every effort be made on the part of the staff to keep abreast of the times in regard to the treatment of the insane. We feel that great progress has been made in this field through the advent of the sulfa drugs, malarial

treatment, insulin shock, etc.

4. We also feel that, if practicable and possible, the hydrotherapeutic apparatus be put back in operation, since we are convinced that this machine could be put to extremely beneficial use in the therapy of the insane.


