THE FIRST DAY

CARSON CITY (Monday), May 9, 1966

The Governor delivered his message as follows:

MESSAGE OF THE GOVERNOR TO THE LEGISLATURE OF NEVADA Special Session, 1966

CARSON CITY, May 9, 1966

Mr. President, Mr. Speaker, Distinguished Members of the Legislature, and Guests:

The primary reason for calling this special session is the compelling need to continue strong state support of education, both at the school district level and at the university level. Other matters can and should be reviewed but aid to education is the dominant need of our State.

The State has made great progress in its aid to education. Presently 64 percent of the public school expenditures come from the State. In 1958–59, the State provided only 46 percent. However, the State can do more and should do more to help solve the needs of education.

The needs are critical and urgent at all levels. Critical because there is a momentum to modern progress. Science and technology are demanding more and more from our young people, and we must give them both technical skills and an understanding of the arts and humanities which will allow them to direct modern technology in the interest of mankind. If this momentum is lost, the spiral of progress not only stops but decay and retrogression creep into our society. The need is urgent because it concerns the needs of our young people, now, in the elementary schools, in high school, in vocational training, and at the University. We cannot wait until the next regular session without running a serious danger of critically weakening our educational structure and depriving our children of the full education they need to make their maximum contribution to the growth of our society.

The financing of public education in Nevada is fundamentally a state problem. Local districts have only those sources of revenue which are made available by the Legislature. I have in the past recommended that local governments (including counties and cities) be given the option of having additional local revenue sources. I will again recommend the consideration of such optional revenues as a means of solving financial problems at the local level. However, I feel that this is a matter for the next regular session and am not recommending it at this special session. A special session does not allow sufficient time to fully analyze the ramifications of such a complex problem. A solution is needed now so the momentum of educational progress is not lost. To this end I am recommending an appropriation of \$2,444,109 for education at all levels.

As additional aid to public schools, I am recommending \$1,500,000 from the General Fund plus additions of \$139,930 to the fund to pay for teachers' retirement; \$122,020 for the State School Construction Fund, and \$32,635 additional for the care of deaf, dumb, and blind handicapped children in a residential instructional institution.

At the same time, I wish to urge the local school districts to develop the local programs for educating these handicapped children as rapidly as possible in order to avoid the necessity of taking these children out of their homes.

UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA

I am recommending an appropriation of \$579,524 for the University of Nevada, \$200,000 of which is to be used to obtain a loan for the construction of a student union at Nevada Southern University.

For instructors' salaries for the University of Nevada, both campuses, I am recommending \$379,524. This will provide for 33.5 professional instructors' positions as well as aid for graduate assistants. This amount is necessary because presently anticipated enrollment is 10 percent more than was anticipated at the last regular session.

The ever-increasing enrollment at the University again makes it desirable to provide authority to issue revenue bonds for the construction of a dormitory and dining facility on its Reno campus and I am therefore requesting this necessary legislation. The Department of Education, Division of Vocational Education, is asking for moneys to operate a vocational education facility on a portion of the Stead Air Base. I am recommending \$70,000 for this purpose.

Finally, with respect to education, I suggest that legislative consideration be given to raising the salary of the State Superintendent of Schools to enable the State Board of Education to attract the best candidates for this position.

In the field of education, by some standards, a state can never do enough. How does one measure the value of excellent and dedicated teachers to whom we entrust our children for a substantial portion of their lives? We believe the amounts requested will allow us to maintain an education system that is comparable or superior to that provided by surrounding states. We owe our teachers and our children no less. More may indeed be necessary. I have been guided in my recommendations by the need for responsible management of financial resources of our State under its present tax structure and the need to limit requests to those which are of an emergency nature.

DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION

The State Department of Conservation has completed its appraisals of land for the proposed Lake Tahoe Park. The Attorney General has indicated that he does not have the staff time for any legal services for this case and I am recommending that the Department of Conservation be granted a \$50,000 appropriation to match the \$50,000 donation from the Fleischmann Foundation for legal and court costs involved in acquiring the Lake Tahoe Park.

The Water Resources Division is requesting, and I am recommending, a \$10,440 appropriation from the General Fund to hire an additional engineer to inventory the water usage and water rights in the Lake Tahoe Basin.

These requests are in keeping with a general policy of promoting the natural beauty and recreational attractiveness of our State.

PRISON

The prison population has increased greatly above the amounts we anticipated in the budget submitted to you in 1965, principally because of longer confinements and later paroles. For example, the population estimate for December of this year will be 750. Our previous estimate submitted to you was 532. This is a 41 percent increase. Because of this, it is essential that we provide additional staff for the prison as well as additional capital improvement. I am recommending \$194,809 for additional staff and operation at the prison. For capital improvements, I am recommending \$1,020,500 for an additional dormitory and dining facility at the minimum security prison and security measures at both minimum and maximum security prisons.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND WELFARE

At the State Hospital, I am recommending \$8,687 for two additional nursing attendants to allow greater coverage in the intensive care units. I am also recommending \$97,400 for capital improvements at the State Hospital which will provide better holding facilities and better protection to the inmates in the intensive care ward.

For the Child Welfare Services Budget, I am recommending \$40,300 which will allow the State to bring foster home care payments back to the level that was in existence before January 1, when due to increased caseload it was necessary to reduce the payments in order to avoid a deficiency in this fund.

Estimations of welfare caseloads have been difficult. The number of recipients in programs such as Aid to the Blind and Aid to Dependent Children has been less than was anticipated at the regular legislative session. On the other hand, the Old Age Assistance and Medical Assistance to the Aged recipients have been more than estimated. It is, therefore, recommended that legislation be passed permitting a transfer of funds up to \$30,000 from Aid to the Blind and Aid to Dependent Children, providing that such transfers do not decrease the level of support presently provided under these programs.

MISCELLANEOUS

The bills for the State's share of the sewer charges in Carson City were not received in the correct fiscal years and in order to be paid must be approved by the Legislature. I am asking for \$10,883 for this purpose.

The Board of Examiners' Emergency Fund, which has a statutory limit of \$100,000, has been reduced to \$19,454. I am asking for an appropriation of \$80,546 to bring this fund back to its authorized balance.

The high incident of highway deaths reflects another type of emergency. For the safety of our citizens and those visiting our State, additional funds are necessary for the Highway Patrol. The amount requested will allow the hiring of 15 additional patrolmen, an augmentation which is justified by every meaningful standard for measuring the adequacy of law enforcement on the highways. The recommended appropriation will also allow Nevada's participation in two new law enforcement communications systems, in which every western state except Nevada is now participating. Together, they will provide more effective contact with communities within Nevada and with neighboring states.

These appropriations are recommended after thorough study of the financial status of our State. Due to the increasing high level of prosperity of our State, these recommended appropriations can be made without new or increased taxes and without endangering the policy of sound fiscal management which is the cornerstone of responsible democratic government.

CORRECTIVE LEGISLATION

The 1965 session of the Legislature passed several bills which the last year has shown now require corrective legislation. I am recommending the following matters to you for your consideration:

Reversion Date

The reversion date for money appropriated for the purchase of furniture for a new dormitory at the University of Nevada was inadvertently set at June 30, 1966. The new dormitory will not be completed prior to that date, and, therefore, I request that you extend that reversion date by 1 year.

County Motor Fuel Tax

Counties with populations of 25,000 or more are now given the option of imposing an additional 1-cent-per-gallon motor vehicle fuel tax for use in high-way construction and planning. A number of the representatives from the less populated counties have requested that this option be extended to those counties with populations of under 25,000. I am, therefore, requesting that you consider such amendments.

Bonding attorneys have also recommended a number of technical changes in this law which will enable the bonds to which these revenues may be applied to be more marketable and at lower interest rates. I ask you to consider these technical changes.

Liquor Credit Law

A liquor credit law was enacted which adds new grounds for suspension or revocation of intoxicating liquor licenses. A closer scrutiny of Assembly Bill No. 602 which contains these provisions reveals a number of inequities. I ask that you consider amendments to this law which provide for more realistic credit provisions.

Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax Refunds

The motor vehicle fuel tax law was revised by Assembly Bill No. 255. This bill was lengthy and contained many technical changes. In the process of amendment apparently a number of changes were inadvertently omitted contrary to legislative intent. This has resulted in unfair advantage being given to some fuel users over others. I am thus recommending that you consider amendments with respect to the refund of the tax on fuel used in noncommercial aircraft, the fuel used in auxiliary engines on vehicular equipment, and the farmers' or ranchers' use of premium-grade motor fuel.

Mobilehome Tax Penalty

Mobilehome owners are now required to pay a penalty of \$25 for any delinquency in the payment of the property tax due on these homes. The amount of this penalty seems a bit severe as it may often exceed the amount of the tax due; therefore, I am requesting corrective legislation in this area.

Moratorium on Sale of State Lands

A moratorium has been placed upon the sale, lease, or exchange of any state lands until authorized by the Legislature. The Attorney General is of the opinion that this moratorium applies to agricultural associations as state institutions and prevents the sale of land owned by them. I do not believe that the Legislature intended to extend the moratorium this far, and so I ask that you consider legislation to remedy this situation.

The existence of this moratorium has also cast some doubt on the previous authority of the Colorado River Commission to sell lands under the Fort Mohave Development Project. I am proposing that this doubt be removed by proper legislation.

Technical Errors in Special Charters

At the 1963 session of the Legislature an error was made in the special charter of North Las Vegas. A similar error was made at the 1965 session of the Legislature and extended to the special charters of Henderson and Sparks. I recommend that the special charters of North Las Vegas, Henderson, and Sparks be amended to correct these technical errors with respect to boundaries and local improvement bonds.

GENERAL

Viet Nam Veterans

A great deal of public sentiment has been expressed both for and against participation by the United States in the Viet Nam conflict. Unfortunately, although I believe they are a minority, those who are against the role our nation has taken in that country seem to receive the widest publicity. It is easy to understand, then, that the members of our Armed Forces serving in Viet Nam may be bewildered and angered by the anti-Viet Nam policy demonstrations which have taken place in our nation. It is therefore incumbent upon those of us at home to utilize every means available to us to show our Armed Forces that we support them in the task they have been assigned to fulfill.

Nevada law provides a property tax exemption to the extent of \$1,000 assessed valuation for veterans who entered the Armed Forces and served during certain specified wartime periods. This exemption should logically be extended to veterans of the Viet Nam conflict, for they are making no less a sacrifice than was made by other veterans who are presently entitled to this exemption. I recommend that you adopt legislation which will accomplish this purpose.

Ruby Valley Fish Hatchery

The Nevada Fish and Game Commission has received a commitment of federal funds under the Land and Water Conservation Fund program to assist it in the reconstruction of the Ruby Valley fish hatchery. The total allotment which will be received under this program will not be available prior to June of this year. In order to prevent the loss of 2 years' production at the Ruby Valley hatchery, it is essential that the Commission be prepared to start construction in June. Therefore, it is requested that you authorize the Nevada Fish and Game Commission to borrow sufficient funds from its current year's revenues to enable it to complete this job, with the understanding that this money will be replaced into the Fish and Game Fund as soon as the Fish and Game Commission is reimbursed under the Land and Water Conservation Fund program.

Basic Science Examination

It has become increasingly more difficult to recruit qualified medical personnel for employment by the State of Nevada or to practice in some of the smaller communities of our State. Nevada law requires that each medical doctor wishing to practice in this State must take a basic science examination. There are no reciprocity provisions which waive this requirement if a medical practitioner has passed an examination substantially equivalent to that required under our law. This problem of recruitment will become more critical than ever before within the next few months. I recommend that you enact legislation containing reciprocity provisions which will enable the Board of Basic Science Examiners to waive this examination.

Local Government Bond Validating Act

Since the 1965 session of the Legislature adjourned, many cities and counties have held bond elections, and various bond measures have been approved. In

order that these bonds may be sold more quickly and easily and to facilitate the purpose of these elections as early as possible, I recommend that you adopt a local government bond validating act.

Legislative Fund Appropriation

Because a special session of the Legislature is limited in its business to matters brought before it by the Governor, there has been some question as to whether it is necessary for me to specifically recommend the appropriation of moneys for expense of the session. However, to insure there will be no legal difficulties, I formally request you to enact necessary legislation appropriating moneys to the Legislative Fund for the purpose of defraying expenses of the special session.

Senator Humphrey moved that the Senate and the Assembly in Joint Session extend a vote of thanks to the Governor for his timely, able, and constructive message.

Seconded by Assemblyman Bunker. Motion carried unanimously.

DEAR MR. SPEAKER: The 1965 session of the Legislature approved an increase in the benefits payable to permanently and totally disabled pensioners which was to be effective July 1, 1965. In the course of amending the bill which granted this increase, a provision

In the course of amending the bill which granted this increase, a provision was added that resulted in this increase in benefits being applicable only to pensioners who became permanently and totally disabled after July 1, 1965. An increase in these benefits was also intended for some 151 pensioners who were already eligible prior to this date. It would be unfair to deny this increase to those people already receiving these payments and then grant it to people who become eligible in the future. The cost of living is the same for both. The result, therefore, was apparently not what the Legislature had intended.

In addition, there may be a need to increase temporary total disability compensation, awards to those permanently partially disabled, and pensions for the totally disabled, and to those surviving widows and children of deceased workmen.

I am requesting that you review the matter with a view toward correcting the inequity to those pensioners permanently and totally disabled prior to July 1, 1965, and toward increasing the Nevada Industrial Commission benefits where otherwise justifiable.

7. Failure of a licensee to report or falsely reporting to the tax commission that a retail liquor store has become delinquent in payment for wholesale liquors.]

2. The board of county commissioners shall recommend the suspension or revocation of a license:

(a) If the licensee sells liquor, except for cash as provided in section 1 of this act, to a retail liquor store which is delinquent in its payment for wholesale liquors; or

(b) If the licensee fails to report or falsely reports to the tax commission that a retail liquor store has become delinquent in payment for wholesale liquors.

Where the licensee is not the person to whom the delinquent account is due, his license shall not be suspended or revoked unless it is shown that the sale to a delinquent retail liquor store was made after receipt of a notice of delinquency from the tax commission."

Amendment No. 55A.
